

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

### **TOWN WARRANT**

Cheshire, ss.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, 1944, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Auditors, Town Treasurer, Road Agent, Collectors of Taxes, Trustees of Public Funds, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Fence Viewers, Delegates to National Conventions, and all other necessary officers.
- Art. 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, for town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and for such other current expenses as may accrue.
- Art. 3. To see if the own will vote to authorize its selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses, in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to repair the road known as Depot Hill, and raise money therefor.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$446.05 for Class V roads, the State to contribute \$1,784.21.

- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to improve the road to and on which the Homestead cottages, so-called, are located.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to repair the roof of the Town Hall, and raise money therefor.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will authorize its selectmen to administer and dispose of and deed any real estate acquired by the town on tax collectors' deeds.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds as have been left it during the past year.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400 for eradicating White Pine Blister Rust.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$370 to the Monadnock District Association.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to pay its selectmen for added labor in appraising wood and timber land separately, as required by the Tax Commission in the classification of forest land.
- Art. 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TOWN LIBRARY

Statistics for the year show a circulation of 7,687 of adult literature and 2,509 junior books and 714 magazines. 86 books were loaned us by the state library and 52 by the Public Library Commission of New Hampshire and we also borrowed from the Congregational Christian Conference 5 books for the church reading club.

Books purchased for the Bridge Memorial Library and the branch library in North Walpole total 257. The circulation for the North Walpole Library was 5,489.

From December to May the librarian continued the story hour for children up to ten, on Thursday afternoons. A special Christmas Story Hour was in charge of Mrs. John Galloway, a member of the library committee, assisted by Mrs. Ethel Skinner and Mrs. Lyle Jeffrey, the latter posing as the Madonna in the story, "The Song the Shepherds Heard." The Christmas Tree for this occasion was kindly donated by the Woodwards.

For a period of three weeks before Christmas the New Hampshire Public Library Commission loaned us children's books called the "publisher's exhibit" which parents and friends found most helpful in making gift selections.

National Art Week in November was observed by an exhibit of oils, water colors and block prints by local artists who included Mrs. G. Leighton Bridge, Mrs. David Reed, Mrs. Hudson Bridge, Dwight Bridge, Mrs. Edward Cutter, Mrs. Allison and Mrs. Ward, the two latter, residents of Alstead Center.

The teachers and students of the schools use the library constantly for reference work and student reading and the librarian opens the library during one noon hour a week for their especial convenience.

The committee gratefully acknowledges books given to the library by the following people: Mrs. Sara Runyon, Mrs. William Kingsbury, Mrs. John Babbitt, Mrs. Willard Reynolds, Mrs. E. C. Townsend, Mrs. Mabel Leete, Miss Isobel White and Mr. John Bellows.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Walpole:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

#### ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

Replacements on the teaching staff were made as follows:

At North Walpole, Mrs. Mary Fitzgerald, who substituted during the latter part of the last school year, was elected in grade 6 at the John Kilburn school.

The vacancies on the Walpole High School staff were filled by the election of Lois Moore, Barbara Adams, and Ruth Young, graduates of Keene Teachers College, and Frances Weeks from Plymouth Teachers College. These teachers were assigned to courses in English, Social Science, French, Latin, and Home Economics.

Miss Charlotte Marsh was transferred from Drewsville to the Walpole village primary department. Miss Hazel Bassett is the new teacher at Drewsville. She will receive her degree from Keene Teachers College after the completion of her work this year.

Mrs. Barbara Angus, a graduate of the teacher training course of the New England Conservatory of Music, was employed to supervise the instruction in music in all of the schools of the district. Mrs. Angus previously served as music supervisor in other schools of the state and has had much experience in private instruction.

The development of the North Walpole school as an elementary unit under the recently adopted plan of reorganization, has been most interesting to observe. The teaching staff has been organized and teachers' meetings are held regularly. This permits an interchange of ideas and promotes a unification of purpose. A strong school spirit is developing as the result of a planned activity program. This year special emphasis has been placed on health instruction, physical education, and wood working proj-

ects. The older boys have made many useful articles of instructional equipment for use in the kindergarten and lower grades. These projects have included such items as model houses, barns, and store display counters. It is difficult to appraise the real value of such work in our\*schools. We do know, however, that these pupils are gaining skill in handling tools as well as an appreciation of construction problems and experience in planning.

The large attendance at the several public programs held in Russell Hall during the year, is evidence of the general interest in the work of the school. Such support on the part of the parents and townspeople is encouraging for the pupils and helpful to the teachers.

As in previous years hot lunches are being served at the Walpole village school during the winter months. These are prepared and served by the girls of the home economics classes. They supply a hot nourishing dish to supplement the lunch brought from home.

As a measure of safety in the transportation of pupils all of the Walpole school busses are inspected several times each year. These inspections are made by an experienced automobile mechanic and are additional to the ordinary inspections required by the state.

This periodic check-up includes an inspection of tires, emergency doors, exhaust, safety appurtenances, and all operating mechanical parts.

The bus owners and drivers have been very cooperative in putting their busses in order for inspection and in complying with the recommendations for repairs.

In view of the very acute shortage of teachers, we were fortunate in starting the school year with a qualified teaching staff. Some adjustments were necessary in order to meet emergency situations, but in every case, the teachers were well prepared for the work assigned to them.

The problem of finding teachers for our rural schools has been very difficult. The few new teachers who are available early in the season seek positions in larger towns which are convenient to public transportation. The positions in these communities usually offer the added inducement of higher salaries and fewer grades.

Many schools in the state opened last fall with teachers approved only because of the emergency. The supply of this type of teachers is also very limited and vacancies occurring during the year have been practically impossible to fill. The situation next yaer will be even more serious.

Our teachers have worked hard this year and have willingly accepted all of the increased work and responsibility placed upon them as a result of the special war time activity.

We must continue to operate our schools at the present high standard, if possible. The children now attending school cannot relive their school years or make up for the loss of benefits to which they are entitled. A good teacher, qualified by training and experience, is the most important single factor in maintaining standard schools. Each district, I believe, should give attention to the seriousness of the teacher supply situation and should make every possible effort to retain the teachers now in service in the district.

Sixty-one pupils from North Walpole were attending high school at Bellows Falls during the fall term.

The plan of uniformity in text book adoptions, which was established several years ago, has been continued. Under this plan new books are purchased within budget limits according to a definite list of book adoptions. The books on the list are adapted to the grades for which they are selected and conform with the outline of studies prescribed in the state program. In most cases the books on the list of adoptions have been selected by groups of teachers or recommended after trial by some of our more experienced teachers. This plan of introducing new books tends to secure a uniformity of instruction in the schools of the supervisory union and benefits those pupils who move about from school to school.

In practically all of the districts of the union the budget limit for books is established each year at the state average cost per pupil. This amount is usually sufficient to purchase the additional books for new pupils and to replace worn-out copies. It does not, however, permit much expansion into new or addditional material. Our pupils would benefit if the usual budget amount could be supplemented occasionally with an additional appropriation for the replacement of out-dated books. This situation is especially necessary in the field of social science and the language arts where unusually rapid changes in content and instructional method have occurred.

#### MUSIC

Recognizing that music is a very important factor in the lives of all our people, and realizing its value as a builder of morale in these days of many activities, the music supervisor gave an instrumental demonstration at the beginning of this year to lay the foundation for a school band at Walpole. Twenty-five beginners on various instruments was the result and after the purchase of a few larger instruments by the school department, a fine start was made toward the goal.

The allotted rehearsal time is one rehearsal every two weeks, so that it is necessary to rehearse on some Sundays and evenings, in order that the group may make definite progress. All lessons are given free of charge and they include instruction on all reed, brass, and percussion instruments. The band is working to prepare for a Spring Music Program to be given in Walpole.

The high school orchestra has twenty-five members and has played at the School Fair and also at the Christmas Program. The orchestra selections included "Christmas Overture" as well as brass quartet selections and glee club.

The different grades prepared special Christmas music, including some carols played by members of the new band.

At North Walpole, the Christmas program included a toy orchestra by the kindergarten. This orchestra was conducted by a kindergarten pupil in uniform. Grades one to three presented an operetta: "The Isle of Christmas Dreams" and carols were sung by the pupils in grades four to six.

The 7th and 8th grade chorus at North Walpole presented a group of songs between the acts of their drama, "Peck's Bad Boy." In early spring the North Walpole group hopes to give the famous Gilbert and Sullivan operetta "Pinafore."

At Drewsville and Number 14 schools Thanksgiving and Christmas music was presented for the parents.

Systematic vocal instruction is part of the program, including the high school chorus, high school glee club, and vocal training in the grades with emphasis on appreciation through participation.

#### HEALTH

Good health is a vital factor in constructive, happy and cooperative living. Health education is an integral part of the school curriculum. The teacher has innumerable opportunities to contribute to the healthy growth of children through the development of a working health education program. A physical examination of each pupil is made annually by the school nurse. When necessary, frequent checkups are made. A record of defects is kept and every possible effort is made to direct serious attention to correcting them promptly.

Health inspection showed the following defects:

- 421 pupils were inspected.
  - 10 pupils showed defective vision—uncorrected.
- 288 pupils were in need of dental care.
  - 5 pupils were unvaccinated—without proper excuse.
- 31 pupils were advised to have throat and nose examinations by a physician.
  - 40 pupils were underweight.

Dental clinics were held March 17th to 26th, and April 6th to 13th, 1943. Work done as follows:

# BUILINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Improvements and repairs were made at the schools during the year as follows:

# Number 14 School:

The woodwork in the hallway and toilets was painted. The desk tops were varnished. Repairs were made on the doors, windows, playground apparatus, and drinking fountain. The ceilings were insulated.

#### Drewsville School:

The ceilings were insulated. New windows were purchased for the woodshed. The desk tops and library doors were varnished. The stove jacket, swing standards, and teeter boards were painted.

# North Walpole School:

### John Kilburn School:

Dipped cedar shingles were applied over tar paper on all sides of the building. A new double entrance was built in with a new set of doors. Both entrances to the third floor were closed; a door way through the partition was left on one side. Six hundred bottom nipples on the radiators were changed. Repairs were made on the iron star rails at the approach to the front entrance.

# Elisha Keep School:

The boiler was covered on one side. A hot water faucet was installed by tapping the boiler.

# Walpole Village Schools:

The laboratory walls and ceiling were painted. The boys' toilet and the toilet booths in both basements were painted. The desk tops in all class rooms were varnished. The outside doors, blinds, and fire escapes were painted. New curtains were purchased for the main room. The glass in the greenhouse sash was reset and the frames were painted. A new room was finished-off in the attic of the primary building for use as a music room.

# REPORT OF PRINCIPAL NORTH WALPOLE SCHOOLS

#### Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my report as principal of the North Walpole Schools.

#### REGISTRATION

The enrollment has increased slightly over last year. This has been due to the fact that new families have moved into the vilage. The summary of the first twenty weeks of the school year is as follows:

The attendance record is in keeping with our record of other years, that is fairly high. The tardy record shows an improvement over last year, but the number still could be decreased even more, if the parents would cooperate with the school in seeing that their children get started so that they would get to school on time.

#### SCHOLARSHIP

Intelligence tests were again given in Grades three, five, and seven at the beginning of the year. With this set of tests we now have the intelligence quotient of all the pupils in the school. These marks have proved to be a source of help to the teacher for purposes of classification and as to what to expect in the line of school work from each child.

Two changes have been made in our regular course of studies. Physical Education and an Interest Period have been added to our schedule. These changes together with the ones made last year have brought the school up to a more progessive plane. The aim of the Physical Education program is: to develop vigorous minds and bodies by promoting such physical activities, skills, attitudes, and knowledge as will enable the individual to make adjustments for right living now and in the future. In the Interest period the pupils are permitted to follow or develop any particular interest or hobby that they had or would like to work on. Many of the boys especially in the upper grades have done considerable in the line of woodwork. I wish to thank "The Greene Box Company" for their kind cooperation in making it possible for our boys to do something in woodwork by furnishing the school with lumber and nails. I hope that some provisions will be made next year so that the school may continue this line of work.

The school will hold an exhibit of the work accomplished in the different grades during this period, sometime in the Spring.

### ORGANIZATION

The Assembly Programs have been continued this year, as in the past, in grades seven and eight under the

guidance of the English teacher, Miss Mulcahy. Assembly programs have also been introduced into Grades four, five and six. The grades alternate in being responsible for the program. Thus all the pupils from grades four to eight inclusive are given the opportunity to express themselves in some way or another according to their talent and ability.

The Patrol System was installed again this year and is being taken care of by the boys and girls of grades seven and eight. Since its installation a few years ago, there has not been one serious accident at any crossing patrolled by the girls and boys. This is indeed a noteworthy fact and speaks well for the ones doing this work.

The purchase of War Stamps and Bonds by the pupils of the school seem to indicate that they have the proper spirit toward the "War Effort." The goal this year is "A JEEP" and from all indications the goal will be realized and probably exceeded.

With the placing of Physical Education into the schedule, recess periods, when the weather permits, are now given over to organized play. The boys engage in the seasonal sports, and the girls play games under the supervision of the grade teachers. I wish to express my apprecation to the teachers for the interest shown in carrying out this part of the program. The school this year has a Junior High Basketball Team, made up from the pupils of grades six, seven, and eight. They have joined the "Inter Town League" and to date have won all of their games. I hope that something will be done in the near future about getting heated space facilities for our winter sports program, so that all of our pupils will get a chance to participate instead of a chosen few.

In November the pupils from grades seven and eight presented the three act comedy, "Peck's Bad Boy." The comments and criticisms by those in attendance were very favorable and to Miss Mulcahy goes a great deal of the credit for the successful performance of the play. At Christmas time two plays were given, one an operetta,

"Isle of Christmas Dreams," by the Primary grades, and the other a one act play, "Christmas Broadcast," by the Intermediate grades. The Kindergarten Toy Orchestra also made its first public appearance at the same time and gave a very creditable performance. The two plays were well received by the audience and the teachers along with our music supervisor, Mrs. Angus, are to be commended for the time and effort expended, to make the plays the success that they were. The second public presentation of grades seven and eight will be the operetta, "H. M. S. Pinafore," which will take place February sixteenth.

The pupils, this year, are again helped in meeting their reading requirements by books from the State Library. These books are procured by Miss Mulcahy who distributes them to the various reading groups.

I and the teaching staff acknowledge the cooperation of the school board, superintendent and townspeople, in making our school year a pleasant and successful one.

# REPORT OF HEADMASTER WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

The total enrollment has remained at the figure of the past two years but our present enrollment is greater than usual. It is gratifying to note the small number of pupils who have withdrawn when, as never before, there are so many opportunities to secure lucrative positions. Two of this number transferred to other schools while the remaining four secured positions locally. It is apparent that the majority of pupils realize that in the years to come the value of a high school education will more than compensate for the time involved.

While we have had no severe epidemics this year a rather steady absence due to colds has lowered our attendance record below the usual average for our school.

Our tardiness record is high yet in fairness to our pupils it must be explained that we have very few instances of tardiness where the pupil is responsible. The great majority of cases have been caused by inability or failure of the busses to complete their trip on time.

Non-resident enrollment continues to increase. These pupils from our neighboring towns of Westmoreland and Westminster, Vermont, make a splendid addition to our school.

### GRADUATES

Our 1943 graduating class was unique in that it was composed entirely of girls. This class of fourteen was a very active and capable group. One member became the first girl from this town to enlist in the Waves; four entered training for nursing; one is conducting a nursery school; one is working in town; one is at home; two entered the University of New Hampshire; one, Jackson College; one, Bryant College; one, Northampton Business College; and one is enrolled at Boston University.

#### ORGANIZATION

The interscholastic athletic program, because of limited travel facilities, has been curtailed to include competitive games with only nearby schools. Yet our athletic program in general has continued to interest the great majority of our pupils and we have striven to maintain an intra-school program designed for participation by the majority of pupils rather than a chosen few.

Our School Safety Patrol has continued its guidance of our pupils across the main lines of traffic during the noon recess and at the close of school. Probably no activity in the school offers so little actual enjoyment and I realize that it is a real sacrifice for pupils to carry out this program. I wish to pay tribute to the boys and girls who, during fair weather and foul, have performed in line of duty.

The music program has offered an opportunity for all interested pupils in both the choral and instrumental fields. The operetta presented last spring was an outstand-

ing success. Our school orchestra has performed in a most creditable manner in the public appearances they have made. The band, composed mainly of younger pupils, has ben making steady progress and real interest has been developed.

In dramatics the work has centered around the Thespian club. Regular meetings are held with programs devoted to various phases of the work. Three one act plays were presented during the winter. The acting reflected much credit on the participants.

Interest in our school socials has increased to a point where the recreation room at the Hooper School is hardly adequate. Each class conducts one free social. The Blue and White club has been especially active in these affairs, planning Freshman Reception and the annual Christmas Party.

Assemblies are held on Friday of each week directed by the Blue and White club and members of the faculty.

# PARTICIPATION IN THE WAR EFFORT

Fire and air raid drills have been held at various intervals. While less emphasis has ben given to air raid danger we have continued our plans to be ready for any event. The fire drills which are of special importance are carried on in a manner that will give the pupils practice in leaving the buildings from differtn exits. We have continued to clear the building in less than one minute.

The sale of war stamps and bonds on Wednesday of each week has been continued. Pupil purchases have been made on an even greater scale than last year. For the present school year to January 31, 1944 the Walpole Village pupils purchased a total of \$2,432.75 in war bonds and stamps.

Another goal was reached this year when we were granted the right to fly the Minute Man flag. This is symbolic of the fact that at least ninety percent of the pupils purchase at least one stamp each month. In order to fly this flag a school must maintain a ninety percent average

every month. During November we had a one hundred percent participation.

Once again our boys and girls responded to the urgent call for help in harvesting crops in the patronage area of the school. Forty-four boys and girls worked a total of four hundred and thirty work days assisting farmers in the "Food for Freedom" program.

Each home room made a one hundred percent contribution to the Junior Red Cross fund. The part of this income that remains in the local chapter will be used to purchase material to make needed supplies for the soldiers. Contributions were also made to the Tuberculosis campaign fund and the March of Dimes collection.

The recommended courses in Aeronautics and Electricity that were added to the curricula have been enthusiastically received by the boys and girls electing these subjects. The motion picture projector has been very helpful as a teaching device and means of information.

The course in Physical Fitness made available for Juniors and Seniors should prove very valuable not only in preparation for service in the armed forces but in the development of healthy well developed bodies. We are indebted to Dr. Stevens and Dr. Kendall for the physical examinations conducted without charge.

#### HOME ECONOMICS

The two courses included in the Home Economics curriculum this year are Clothing and Textiles for grades 9 and 10 and The Home Its Care and Management for grades 11 and 12. Each class has twelve members.

In the Home class the program has included the selecting and furnishing of homes and their care and management. Pieces of furniture were refinished to gain a working knowledge of necessary procedures and to demonstrate the possibilities for this work in the home.

The Clothing class is studying the construction of various garments and their care. The study of fabrics and consumer education for the individual selecting her personal clothing has been stressed.

The freshman-sophomore class is taking the responsibility for the preparation and serving of hot lunches. A variety of healthful dishes are included in this program of serving one hot dish each noon to supplement the individual lunch.

Home projects, as usual, form an important part of the work. One hundred and twenty hours of this practice is required for the Clothing and Textile group and sixty hours for the Home class.

#### AGRICULTURE

At the beginning of the school year our enrollment in the Agricultural course had increased to thirty nine. Of this number seventeen were juniors and seniors which is a good representation considering inducements now offered for boys to leave school.

During the spring months of last year the boys spent considerable time pruning and spraying the school orchards and carrying on custom spraying as well as greenhouse and coldframe practices. The demand for plants was much greater than in previous years due to the added number of home gardens. The older boys surveyed the orchard site by means of a plane table and so became competent to take rough measurements of any such plot.

The first half of the school year has been crowded with the necessary work of harvesting and grading the sizeable crop of apples at the Hooper orchard with the small group of boys that were not out of school assisting farmers in the fall harvest. A ready market locally was available as fast as the apples could be graded.

With the orchard ready for winter and the other essential fall jobs completed it was time to start shop work and attempt to catch up on needed repairs of farm machinery and equipment. At present both classes are engaged in this work. This offers a fine opportunity for needed repairs of the home farm to be completed in the school shop.

The nineteenth annual school fair was held October seventh. School exhibits were shown as usual and the

community department was forced to expand as the townspeople responded to the requests for victory garden exhibits.

Individuals have shown a proficiency in many phases of agricultural work. Roy Paine took part in the National Junior Vegetable Growers Scholarship contest and placed well up with the leaders. Donald Kingsbury, Richard Pearce, George Graves, Robert Graves and Charles Welch received fifty chicks each as second place winners in the annual Hubbard Farms Vocational Agriculture Poultry Contest based on records showing the greatest efficiency in poultry projects.

In the majority of cases the supervised practice farming programs, that are a necessary part of each boy's work, have been conducted in an efficient manner as evidenced by the returns. Were the net profits from all enterprises totaled, it would make a sizeable figure. At the same time most of these boys were helping with the agricultural pursuits on the home farm and doing their utmost to increase production. Apparently it is of the greatest importance that these records of 1943 be duplicated or even exceeded during the coming year.

As we look back over the activities and results of the school year it is clearly evident that, for the most part, the boys and girls of our school are making an earnest endeavor to prepare themselves for the work ahead while at the same time doing their utmost in the war activities on the home front.

I am grateful for the cooperation of the School Board, Superintendent, teachers, pupils and townspeople in making our school year a success.
