REPORT OF TRUSTEES  
OF WOLFEBORO TOWN LIBRARY.

On July 2, 1900, the library received from the state 109 volumes. Since that time there have been 374 books purchased and 15 gifts, making a total of 498. By classes as follows:—Useful and Fine Arts, 23; Biography 45; Social Science, Political Economy and Education, 26; Fiction, 221; History, 56, Literature, including essays and poetry, 52; Reference, 4; Science and Philosophy, 27; Travel, 27; Religion and Theology, 17.

Five periodicals have been subscribed for. As soon as these are taken from the reading room, they are put into general circulation.

It is impossible to give the circulation exactly because the books have been loaned with those from Brewster Library; but for both libraries, the per centage of Fiction has been 71, Biography 3, History 3, Literature 6, Science 2, Travel 3, other classes 12.

An effort has been made to make the books accessible to people living in the outlying villages, through the district schools; and books in lots of 25 each are sent to North Wolfborough. As the library grows, more will be done in this line.

Two years ago you chose library trustees who at once applied for \$100 worth of books from the State and got them.

By the courtesy of the Brewster trustees we have all necessary use of the Brewster Library building without expense to the town.

We arranged to have the library opened at 3 P. M., instead of 4 P. M., and two evenings a week instead of one evening and pay the librarian one dollar per week.

We desire to commend your librarian, Miss Inez A. Brewster, for being polite, helpful, faithful and eminently well qualified for her position.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

## TO THE SELECTMEN OF WOLFBOROUGH:

The Board of Health most respectfully submit the following:

The contagious or infectious diseases reported to this board have been: two of scarlet fever, four typhoid fever and one hundred and twenty-three of measles, and no deaths from any of these cases.

We have had more typhoid the past year than for any one year for the last six, and as this is a filth disease, it is reprehensible for a family to allow matter in or around their premises conducive to its propagation. Some may doubt the statement that it is a filth disease. We will give a little history of what did take place in a town in this state within three years, omitting names. A young man returned to his parental home from a town in a neighboring state a little indisposed in health. A physician was called, and after an examination, said it was a typical case of typhoid fever, and ordered all matter taken from the sick room buried, but contrary to the order it was taken to rear of buildings and flung on the grass-ground on the hillside. Soon a drenching rain occurred, this matter was washed into a near by chattering brook, which joined the brimming river a half mile down the hillside, and four and one-half miles down that river a village of several hundred inhabitants took their water for domestic use, and in less than twenty-five days they had more than two hundred and thirty cases of typhoid fever, and several deaths. In view of this bit of history, can we say that we are not our brother's keeper to some extent?

The per cent. of deaths were 12.56 per 1,000. The average for our state for 1900 was 18.23 per 1,000.

The incidental expenses of the board are much larger than usual from the fact that the recent Statutes compelled us to vaccinate the scholars of the town, which was successfully performed in more than two hundred cases.

We sent to State Board of Health samples of the drinking water from four different schools, one of which was condemned as unfit for domestic use, and we notified the School Board to that effect.

We also complied from the laws of the State and the laws and rules of the State Board of Health, together with some additional rules made applicable to our needs which were legally approved and recorded, and are how operative and binding as other laws.
