DEPARTMENT REPORTS



REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Gentlemen of the School Board:

I respectfully submit the following report concerning the schools of Antrim for the year ending February 15, 1916.

Soon after the writing of last year's report, Mr. Arthur G. Davis, principal of the high school, asked for a release from his contract in order that he might accept the offer of a position that was particularly attractive to him because of the nature of the work and also because of the financial reward. The release was granted and as a result Mr. Davis has been the agricultural agent for Merrimack county since the first of last April. At about the same time, Miss Anna Cuddihy gave up her position as teacher of the North Branch school for what appeared later as matrimonial reasons. With the end of the school year in June, Misses Alice R. Peaslee and Faith B. Linsley, assistants in the high school, and Miss Edith A. Barker, teacher of the primary room, severed their connections with the Antrim schools. Miss Peaslee's position on the force deserves more than passing notice from the fact that she was the first teacher of domestic science ever employed in the Antrim schools. Under her direction, that phase of school work received a good start—neatness and order being two of the essential features that were strongly emphasized.

The search for a principal resulted in the selection of Mr. Lewis J. Brown, a graduate of the University of Maine, with a brief teaching experience. Miss Myrtie K. Brooks, a graduate of the Antrim High school and also of a business college, who

had acquired some experience in both teaching and business, accepted an offer of the North Branch school. Miss Ruth T. Humiston of East Jaffrey, a graduate of Bates College with two years of teaching experience, and Miss Carrie E. Hoitt of Durham, a graduate of New Hampshire State College, accepted offers of assistants' positions in the high school. Miss Helen M. Williams, of Campello, Massachusetts, a graduate of Miss Wheelock's Kindergarten School in Boston, was secured to teach the primary room in the South school.

Under Mr. Davis' vigorous administration, a campaign was inaugurated in favor of more thorough scholarship and of stricter punctuality. This campaign has been continued ever since with gratifying results, for I think that there has been no time in recent years when the pupils have been more earnest in their work, nor when the number of tardinesses in the high school has been smaller. The records show that there were approximately a hundred less last fall term than during the fall term of the previous year. Those in authority realize, however, that eternal vigilance is the price to be paid for this improvement as well as for many other desirable conditions.

The annual report of the high school transmitted to the state department at the end of the school year was much more satisfactory than some that have been sent. It is possible that it may not be generally known that the approval or disapproval of the state department is largely determined by these annual reports which contain information regarding the amount of work done by each class, the number of pupils in the classes, and the number who fail to come up to the required standard. It is easy to see from this that the standing of the school is finally determined by the efforts of the individual pupils.

During the year, new text books in history and arithmetic have been placed in the schools. In this connection it may be of interest to note that some of the discarded arithmetics had been in commission since nineteen hundred eight, which speaks well for the binding of the books and for the treatment that they received.

Recently, a list of busy work has been placed in the hands of the primary teachers which was compiled from reports sent in

by the various teachers in the supervisory district. Also, each grade teacher has been supplied with a list of memory selections to be taught to the pupils as a part of their language work.

Near the close of last school year, the teachers of the supervisory district reported concerning the books and papers that they had read during the year. A summary of these reports containing a list of the books and papers read by the different teachers has been given to each teacher. One copy was forwarded to State Superintendent Morrison who sent in return a letter commending the teachers for their professional zeal as indicated by their reading.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. F. L. Kendall,
Superintendent of Schools:—

I wish to submit the following report of the work of Antrim High School for the year ending February 15th, 1916.

At present we have a larger enrollment than last year, there being fifty-three in all, thirty girls and twenty-three boys. The graduation in June, 1915, of a class of twelve girls and one boy has tended to make the numbers of boys and girls in the school more evenly balanced.

It may be of interest to note how the school is divided according to the courses offered. There are eight taking the classical course, twenty-seven the domestic arts course and eighteen the agricultural course. In spite of the popularity of the other two courses and the fact that there was no first year latin class

last year, three pupils have started the classical course this year. We are glad to see that the interest in this course has not entirely died out.

The classes in agriculture have been rearranged somewhat to conform to a uniform system adopted by the state department. The present scheme of the agricultural course is for the first year pupils to take up the study of soils and horticulture, requiring each pupil to carry on a vegetable project during the summer with the idea of the school making a public exhibit in the fall. The second year is devoted to the study of field crops, the third year to animal industry and the last year is given over to farm management and farm accounting. The spirit in the school seems to be steadily improving. An association has been formed for the purpose of creating better unity among the pupils and teachers, bringing out the necessity of higher aims and ideals.

The teachers at this time wish to express their appreciation of the co-operation of the pupils and parents in helping to maintain a high standard of work.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools:—

The following report of the Music Department of the Antrim school is respectfully submitted. Dating from February of last year, this report should include mention of the public concert given last May as an exhibition of song work in the schools. This included songs from all the grades from Grade 1 to High school. I was quite pleased with the spirit of interest shown by the pupils. On this occasion we had the assistance of the Hillsboro High school orchestra and were very fortunate in having Mrs. Robert Jameson as soloist.

In the grades, the songs are of course only a part of the work, the instruction in reading music with the Latin syllables being started in the first grades. I would suggest that those interested in this work visit the regular classes to observe the process of instruction.

This year the first three grades have shown marked improvement, showing the advantage in having a regular teacher who can successfully sing rote songs and in the other work carry out the Supervisor's plans in an interested way.

The willingness to work both in the Grammar and High school has been gratifying. The boys in the High school have done well this year. We sing mostly three part music on account of the lack of tenor voices. There is need of a new piano in the High school room, as the present one is very poor. We are fortunate, however, in having a very good accompanist.

Each district school is divided into several classes. At the centre there are four, and as a whole are doing very good work. Allowing one-half hour to each school and hearing from three to four classes in that time makes the Supervisor's time with each class very limited, consequently the results depend largely on the regular teacher's ability. In almost every case, I feel that the teachers are doing their best to keep the music work up to a high standard.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MANUAL ARTS

To the Superintendent of Schools:—

The following report of the Department of the Manual Arts is herewith respectfully submitted.

The work in the schools of Antrim in drawing is a continuation of the work of previous years, and includes courses in the

following subjects: Nature drawing, color, design, paper and cardboard construction, and construction drawing. The courses aim to develop in children the power to express their ideas in graphic form, to think constructively, work accurately and neatly, and to appreciate beauty.

I have felt encouraged by the evidence of the progress and improvement in the work shown since last year. But there are conditions in the schools that will always hamper the success of the work in drawing. These conditions are due to the fact that in two of the rooms of the village school there are three grades.

The planning of suitable lessons for each grade in the allotted space of time is an unsolved problem and will remain so.

The work in the district schools follows that planned for the village school. An additional interest has been given the construction work by the presentation of sand tables to several of the schools. These tables were made by the boys under the direction of Mr. Brown.

I appreciate the assistance and the earnest co-operation of teachers and pupils.

REMARKS BY THE SCHOOL BOARD

Citizens of Antrim:—

We believe the objects for which our school system exists are being attained in a thorough and efficient manner. An excellent spirit of harmony and willingness to work for high standards actuates teachers and pupils and attracts the interest of

parents as well. Our efforts to get that which is superior in teaching force and in equipment and supplies have been crowned with a measure of success that is pleasant, and promises to make itself felt yet more in the future.

Across this bright prospect, however, falls the shadow of a diminishing surplus. Doing the best we could, we have been unable in the last two years to make our income pay expenses. While expenses have remained nearly the same, our income from various sources is considerably less. We have received, for tuition this year \$250 less than in 1914. Business conditions have led people either to deny themselves school privileges or to seek shorter and cheaper courses of study elsewhere. The establishment of a high school at Hancock has been a large factor in producing this result. Then too, the amount required by law to be raised is more than \$200 less than formerly. This, of course, lightens the burden of taxes, but it also reduces the revenue for schools by an equal amount.

We have tried to bridge this gap by strict economy wherever possible, but rather than carry this process to the extent of crippling the work of the schools, we have decided to ask for what is practically a ten per cent increase.

You have already conceded this increase, and more too, on about everything else that affects human life. To falter here would involve us in the problem of giving a valid reason.

That preparedness which the schools are able to give should be of the best kind, even if we have to pay the price. For a detailed account of the work you are referred to the accompanying reports. The amount of money required by law for carrying on school work is as follows:

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

Antrim, N. H., February 8, 1916.

It is most gratifying to report that the year just ended has been one of the most successful in the history of the James A. Tuttle Library. With a total circulation exceeding 9800 books exclusive of a large number of papers and magazines, this has been the best patronized year since the Library opened.

A pleasing feature of the year has been the installation of a good number of standard magazines, monthly and weekly, covering a wide field of information and suitable for all ages and tastes. The list of magazines includes the following: Literary Digest, Good Housekeeping, Scribner's, World's Work, The American Boy, Outlook, Munsey's, Field and Stream, The National Geographic Magazine, The Ladies' Home Journal, Popular Mechanics, Leslie's Weekly, and St. Nicholas. Each evening that the Library is open the reading rooms are well filled with readers, especially the young people of the town and the students of the High School.

Besides the usual number of new books purchased during the past year, a number of town histories have been added to the reference department from the income of the Nathan C. Jameson Fund. Included in the list are the History of Amherst, Gilmanton, Newport, Manchester, Dunstable, Londonderry, Jaffrey, New Ipswich and The New Hampshire Soldiers at Bennington. At the present time the Tuttle Library also owns copies of the History of Andover, Mass., Exeter, Lyndeborough, Hudson, Stoddard, Washington, Hancock, Antrim, Francestown, Keene, the Vital Statistics of Londonderry and a well preserved copy of Whiton's History of Antrim. It is largely through the efforts of Mr. F. F. Roach, of the board of trustees, that the Library has been able to secure these books at reasonable prices. It is the purpose of the trustees to secure as complete a list of town histories as possible.

As in former years the Library has been generously remembered by its many friends not only here in town but from other towns and cities: among those who have contributed books and magazines the past year are Mrs. S. E. Gordon, of Clifftondale, Mass., who sent a copy of Whiton's History of Antrim, Wyman K. Flint, Mrs. Eliza A. Duncan, Edward Neville Vose, of New York City, Alonzo Alford, the Antrim Woman's Missionary Alliance, the Pioneer Reading Club, Mrs. Melvin D. Poor, Miss Addie Munhall, Mrs L. J. White, Miss Helen Stanley, Mrs. Eugene H. Woodward, Everett N. Davis, Mrs. Edwin T. Adams, Mrs. Sarah Dodge Jones of Keene, Mrs. Charles R. Talbot of Brookline, Mass., and Miss Edith Wilkinson of Brooklyn, N. Y. The Antrim Reporter and the Scientific American have been kindly donated through the courtesy of Mr. H. W. Eldredge; other valuable gifts include interesting and valuable D. A. R. records from Molly Aiken Chapter, D. A. R., an old fashioned china sugar bowl once the property of Mrs. Polly Carr Boutelle from Mrs. Mary Bass, a stone Indian tomahawk head loaned by Mr. Anson Swett. Mr. Clark B. Cochrane presented the historical department with an ancient article used in cooking over the fireplace.

Another gift received during the year was a large framed picture of the late William H. Boutelle, of Rochester, N. Y., given by Mr. and Mrs. George Ed. Hutchinson. Mr. Boutelle, who was a former resident of the town, was much interested in the Tuttle Library to which he presented at the time of its dedication the sum of \$500.00, the interest of which is used for the purchase of scientific books.

A large number of visitors from many different States, as well as one visitor from South America, have registered in the visitor's book during the year.

The outlook for the coming year is most encouraging and gives promise of still better things for the James A. Tuttle Library.
