

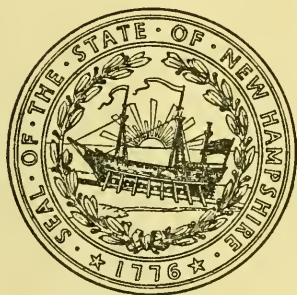

# TOWN WARRANT

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STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE      CARROLL SS.  
To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett in the County  
of Carroll in said State qualified to vote in Town  
affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall  
in said Bartlett on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March  
next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon  
the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers  
for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be  
necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year,  
and to make appropriations for the same.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and  
appropriate the sums of money called for in the budget  
as prepared by the Selectmen and the budget commit-  
tee.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and  
appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for Blister  
Rust Control.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and  
appropriate the sum of \$98.00 as its share of the White  
Mountains Region Association advertising.

Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize  
the Selectmen to borrow necessary sums in anticipation  
of taxes.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize  
the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the

time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid Construction, and will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,492.00, for same.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$402.00, for business and recreational inducements.

Art. 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

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## Report of Superintendent

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### To the School Board and Citizens of Bartlett:

Two changes were made in the teaching staff on account of the resignations last summer of Roland Pariseau of the high school and of Miss Mary Leso, for many years teacher in the Bartlett graded school. Charles Harmon, a graduate and post graduate student of the University of Vermont, became our high school assistant, and Miss Helen Chambers, a graduate of the four-year elementary course of Salem Teachers' College, took over grades five and six in the graded school.

A short time prior to the end of the fall term Miss Harriet M. Curren who has served us well as school nurse, sustained an injury and has been hospitalized since that time. Her work has been carried on by Mrs. Hester Bemis, a graduate of Peter Bent Brigham hospital and of the Simmons College Public Health Nursing course. Mrs. Bemis has had one and a half years of experience in the city of Augusta as Public Health nurse.

Those who read my report last year recall that I made a careful analysis of the financial situation of the district and that there was an apparent deficit of

\$2,200 to be met at the end of last year. The district meeting raised and appropriated \$700 to take care of a part of this deficit with the understanding that the balance would be taken care of this year and next. Since that time we have received about \$700 from the sale of the old schoolhouses and \$412 addition state-aid money from an adjustment on the year 1939. A recent re-check which we have made indicates that if the district meeting this year will appropriate \$300 for this old deficiency, we should close this year with no outstanding bills. At the close of the year in June 1940 the selectmen had turned over to the school district the assessment for that year, all previous unpaid assessments, and the \$700 voted as a deficiency appropriation at the March 1940 meeting.

Under the special articles in the warrant the school board recommends raising \$317 for insurance which is the exact amount of the premiums due from July 1941 to June 1942.

The school board also recommends the appropriation of \$918 for transportation of high school pupils. As most of the transportation is done by one transporter who carries both high school and elementary pupils, we arbitrarily divide the total expense so that \$918 appears as high school transportation. This is nearly correct but it is not material. State-aid is allowed on the elementary transportation so far as approved but not on high school transportation which is optional with the district and must be raised by a special vote.

An article is included in the warrant asking whether or not the district wishes to acquire from the Maine Central railroad a parcel of land in the rear of the graded school at Bartlett. The railroad company has made a proposal to the school district and it should be presented to the district if only as a matter of business courtesy.

I wish to refer briefly in this report to several matters of interest and importance to the welfare of the school.

The school savings club is continuing in its service to the pupils. The total deposits to date amount to \$224.95. This club is becoming increasingly important as a means of saving for the Washington trip. It is also helping to form regular habits of saving among certain of our pupils and we hope that more members of the school will avail themselves of this service as time goes on.

Our membership has shown a marked falling off over that of last year. This condition is general over the whole country and is due to two main causes: first, the operation of our immigration laws and second, the gradual yet marked decrease in the size of the average American family. In Bartlett a third cause has also operated: the moving away of several families.

There has been a very marked improvement in attendance during the past two years. This has resulted, in our small school, in about two more pupils in attendance each day of the school year. Those who are familiar with school work will readily appreciate the significance of this improvement. Parents and pupils alike are to be congratulated on this result.

Parents are always interested in the welfare of their children. This is a mere truism. Why then do so many parents fail to follow up that interest when their children get to high school? How many parents pay close attention to the work their children are doing in high school? How many parents make it a point

to see and talk with the teachers when their children are failing in their work? And yet we know the value of such personal and friendly contacts when they have been tried. Many a teacher has found out more about a pupil in a ten-minute conversation with the parent than he has after months of struggling with a pupil. Conditions vital to the welfare of the pupil are frequently brought to light when the parent and the teacher, both interested in the same task, come together in a cooperative spirit for a few minutes of conversation.

Parents have sometimes asked me what they could do to help in other ways than that of personal conference and I am therefore taking this opportunity to make a few suggestions entirely in the spirit of helpfulness to the boys and girls under my charge.

First—Watch closely the attendance record of your boys and girls. Get them off to school on time and see that they take time to do justice to a good breakfast. I have already alluded to the value of regular attendance. Try it on yourself. Do you not lose interest in the Odd Fellows or the Ladies' Auxiliary the moment your attendance becomes irregular?

Second—Make the coming of the report card a real event in your family. Study it with care. Ask questions about it. Your attitude toward the report card unconsciously becomes the attitude of your children and will be reflected in their work.

Third—See that your child, at least when he gets into high school, has a regular time and a proper place for home study and see to it that he forms the habit of home study. Ask those who do consistently good work if they study at home.

Fourth—Insist on regular habits of sleep. Those young people who are out every night in the week will not get ahead. Friday and Saturday evenings should be left open for our young people. Too often mid-week parties are planned by adults, the result of which

is to utterly unfit our young people for the work they have to do the next day. Any teacher can point out at once those who have stayed up the night before to attend a late party or a dance. They show it in their listless attitude if not in their utter weariness.

Are these not the true and proper functions of all parents? Are they at least not worth trying? Ask those parents who practice them as a matter of course. Try them out wholly in the spirit of helpfulness to your children and see the results in the renewed interest and the revived ambition which they awaken.

I am glad to take this opportunity to thank you and the members of the school committee for your cooperation in all those matters which effect the welfare of the school. Moreover I know that I reflect the true feelings of all members of the school in paying grateful acknowledgement to those parents and friends who year after year extend their helping hands to the senior classes as they prepare for their annual trips to Washington.
