## TOWN WARRANT

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bradford, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bradford, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The raising of money and other articles in the warrant will be taken up at one o'clock p. m.

3A. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,047.00 for the construction of the Center Road, provided the State shall appropriate the sum of \$2,094.00 for the same purpose, it being understood that if said appropriation is made by the State and the town accepts said special aid, that the town shall not be entitled to State Aid for Class II roads.

3B. To see if the town will accept State Aid for construction of the Class II road known as Center Road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1,047.00; or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$676.26.

4. To see if the town would care to take over the Bradford and Newbury Fair Grounds with the grandstand thereon, for the use as a Public Park, or any Civic or Community purpose. This offer, if accepted, to be subject to the approval of the Bradford Fair Association and the Bradford Grandstand Association.

5. If approval of the Fair Ground and Grandstand Association is received, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to put a new steel roof on the building.

6. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 to cover the expenditure of damage done to roads by the flood rains of last April.

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

8. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

10. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

11. To see if the town will vote to appoint a Town Planning Board of five or seven members, if the General Court has enacted enabling legislation.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

If any school is in session on any of these days, it may close in June that number of days earlier than scheduled. If other days are lost they must be made up. The day for Hopkinton Fair is allowed on condition that at least 50% of the pupils attend on the same day.

Teachers' salaries will be paid in ten equal installments one on the week following the first Saturday of the month.

The regular school hours are from 8:45-12:00 a. m. and from 1:00-3:45 p. m.

In all schools the teacher is to remain at the school building or grounds during this noon intermission. Organized plays and games are to be provided by the teacher in cooperation with the pupils.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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*To the School Board of Bradford District:—*

GENTLEMEN :—

After an interim of one year it is very pleasing to me to have once more the pleasure and privilege of writing an annual superintendent's report for your district. Following is a statistical report of Bradford Schools for the year 1933-34 under the able direction of Supt. A. W. Bushnell.

From the above table it may be noted:—

1. One or two days were lost in each school.
2. The overage membership for the district has increased about 8.
3. The percent of attendance has fallen considerably and is about 4% below the average for the state. Regular attendance is essential to regular progress in the work of pupils.
4. The number of tardinesses has increased about 76%. Parents should make every effort to teach punctuality. Getting to school on time is a practical way to do it.
5. Of the fifteen pupils who completed the work of the eighth grade last June, nearly two-thirds have gone to high schools in nearby towns.

Good progress was made in health work in the schools during the year. A dental clinic was held with the assistance of Dr. R. F. Oliver and Miss Wilson who was part-time school nurse for a few months. More work of this kind is needed. Health of school children is a matter of prime importance. Without this they can accomplish little. We would recommend the regular employment of a school nurse sharing her time with other districts and paying a proportionate part of her salary. The cost would probably be about \$125.00 per year.

Considerable interest in instruction in music in the schools has been manifested. A trained teacher who would give at least a half hour of instruction weekly in this subject in each school of the district could be hired for \$150.00. Music is a subject of instruction in practically all the schools of the state, and is taught in all the other districts in this supervisory union. The children of this district would receive much benefit from instruction in this subject which is becoming more and more a part of our daily life.

As in our report for 1932 we would continue to recommend the consideration of a new building for the village school. The cost of materials and labor is now comparatively low. Aid may be obtained from the Federal Government on very generous terms. The old building is poorly lighted, and ventilated. The playground is entirely inadequate to the needs of the school, and pupils playing there are exposed to the danger of traffic on the main road. The children of the district are worthy of a better school home.

In conclusion we thank the parents and other citizens of the district who have co-operated with the schools for the benefit of the pupils. The loyalty, support, and unflagging interest of all the teachers and members of the school board have made the progress of the schools certain, and work with them a pleasure.
