Concord, N. H., Jan. 9, 1895.

Carroll County delegation met at 4 o'clock p. m., in room No. 4 of the State House, agreeably to a call announced by the Speaker of the House, and organized by electing Charles S. Miles, Chairman; Orlando Richardson, Clerk.

Elected by unanimous vote, Samuel B. Wiggin, of Sandwich, and Ralph G. Foster, of Freedom, Auditors of the County.

Voted to adjourn to call of the Chair.

2d. Heard reports of the Commissioners and Treasurer.

3d. On motion of Mr. Dow, of Tamworth, voted to raise the sum of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00) to defray the expenses of the County for each year of 1896 and 1897.

4th. Voted to adjourn subject to a call of the Chairman.

It is with pleasure that we present to the citizens of the County the above financial statement, which cannot but please them.

The net debt of the County as per last year's report, was \$6,330.90. This amount has been entirely wiped out with the exception of the small sum of \$206.58.

The Pitman farm which adjoins the County property has been purchased at a cost of \$850.00. This property was purchased by the old Board of Commissioners, at our request, on the day their term of office expired, the County delegation having authorized them to do it, although no appropriation was made for it. Had this purchase not been made, we should have had money enough on hand to pay all of our indebtedness, and over \$600.00 left in the treasury.

The purchase of this property was a good investment for the County, there being a large amount of wood on the place, a good pasture, and a field which cuts ten or more tons of hay; also a good set of buildings, consisting of a house, which is large enough to accommodate two families comfortably, and a good barn.

The buildings at the farm are in the very best condition, the barn having been painted during the past year, also considerable done in the interior of the house, which tends to add something to the cost per week for running the institution.

The sanitary condition of the almshouse has been good. Dr. Andrews, the County Physician, has been

unremitting in his care of those who have needed his services.

The services of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Manson as Superintendent and Matron for the year 1895, was secured by the old Board of Commissioners, the present Board concurring in the contract; but unfortunately, Mr. Manson died before the present Board of Commissioners' term of office commenced, after serving the county faithfully and efficiently for a long time. Mr. Manson was a man of large experience and rare good judgment, honored and esteemed by every one who knew him.

The Commissioners consider themselves fortunate in having been able to secure the services of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Meloon, of Effingham, to fill the place thus made vacant. Although Mr. and Mrs. Meloon have never had any experience in this institution before, still, they have given most excellent satisfaction, and the Commissioners feel that the interest of the county as well as that of the inmates, are being faithfully attended to by Mr. and Mrs. Meloon.

Everything at the farm is always found in good order, and the discipline and management of the inmates good.

The citizens of the county are respectfully solicited to visit the county almshouse and farm, and personally inspect the condition and management of the institution.

There are still people in the county who think the almshouse is a place to be avoided; they think that people in need of assistance should be kept outside of the institution; but after careful observation, we think that more of our paupers should be supported at the almshouse, where the county has provided a suitable

and comfortable place, and where those in need of assistance would find a better home than where they are supported outside.

We make these remarks, not to save a little expense to the county, but in the interest of the poor unfortunates under our control. It pleases us to acknowledge our great obligation to the Selectmen of the several towns in the county, for their faithful services in looking after the poor in their respective towns.

During the year the Grand Jury has found thirty-eight indictments, as follows:

At the April term there was one criminal jury trial, in which respondent was given sentence of ninety days, and ordered to recognize to keep the peace, &c., for one year.

In three cases, respondents were given sentence of three months each; in one case, one year and one day; in one case, one year, on payment of costs, mittimus not to issue during good behavior; in two cases, two years each, on payment of costs, mittimus not to issue during good behavior; three cases were continued, respondents being beyond the jurisdiction; one, continued, respondent having fled to parts unknown; one continued on recognizance; one, continued for sentence; and in two, cases Nolle Prosequi was entered. The two liquor cases were continued, bail fixed, respondent having fled to parts unknown.

At the October Term there was no criminal jury

trial. In one case, respondent was given sentence of five dollars ; in one, two months ; one case was marked ; not to go forward on payment of costs ; three continued, bail fixed, respondents having fled to parts unknown ; two, continued on recognizance ; and in one, Nolle Prosequi was entered. In the liquor cases, respondents were sentenced in nine cases ; one was marked : not to go forward on payment of costs, respondent being in insolvency ; and one continued, bail fixed, respondent having fled to parts unknown. Fines and costs have been paid in some of these cases and mittimus ordered in the remainder.

Three appeals from Justices of the Peace were entered, of which one was continued ; one dismissed ; and in the other Nolle Prosequi was entered.

Of the Continued Docket, at the October Term, in one case *capias* was issued and costs paid as per order : two cases were marked : not to go forward nisi, respondents not having been heard of ; one, marked : not to go forward, costs having been paid ; one, continued on recognizance ; the others continued, respondents being beyond the jurisdiction.

The County has not been a party in any civil causes during the past year.

TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF CARROLL COUNTY:

As Physician to the Carroll County Almshouse, I would submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1895:

During the first months of this year many of the inmates suffered from influenza. Several died from the immediate effects of this disease, while others partially

recovering from influenza, succumbed, being unable to withstand the effect of inter-current disease.

There have been no diseases arising from bad sanitary conditions.

The deaths for the past year, with one exception, have been among those enfeebled by age and chronic troubles.
