TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
2. To elect one Selectman for three years.
3. To elect all necessary officers for the ensuing year.
4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges.
5. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 87, Section 1 of the revised statutes on a section of the Cheshire Road, so called, and appropriate or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of \$475 for this purpose.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairing of highways and bridges.
7. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for highway construction and appropriate sufficient money for same.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Trunk Line Maintenance.
9. To see if the town will vote for continued application for Trunk Line Construction for 1928 and 1929, and authorize

the Selectmen to borrow in 1927 on notes to pay for same to complete in 1927 the three unimproved sections at Chesterfield middle town, at Camp Marquette, and at Spofford, so called, or act thereon.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal on the Trunk Line.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to repair and make improvements on Town Hall as outlined by the Committee.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be used to repair the highway leading from the Hinsdale town line toward Chesterfield Center, known as the Bear Hill road.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400 in addition to \$1,000 which has already been appropriated to secure the services of resident physician or act thereon.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 in addition to the \$500 already appropriated for construction of a town vault or act thereon.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of the poor.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Town Library in addition to what is required by law.

17. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400 to fight the Blister Rust.

19. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate money for same.

20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lighting for the ensuing year.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to repair and renovate the old parsonage to make it suitable for a town library or vote to return it to the donor with his permission.

22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to add the names of Dennie W. Farr and Henry C. Streeter, Civil War veterans to the marker on the Common without expense to the town.

23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, the road leading from the Hoyt Stearn's place, so called, to the Westmoreland line.

24. To see if the town will vote to accept in trust the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) from the estate of Ella C. Stearns, late of Seneca Falls, New York, the income therefrom to be paid to the Trustees of the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the care and maintenance of the burial lot in which the said Ella C. Stearns and her husband, Gardis R. Stearns, are buried, in the cemetery of the said association.

25. To see if the town will vote to accept from James C. Naylor the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) in trust to be known as the James C. Naylor Trust Fund. The income to be expended for the perpetual care and improvement of the Naylor lot in Spofford Cemetery.

26. To see if the town will vote to accept from Mary A. Howe the sum of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150) in trust to be known as the Henry H. Howe Trust Fund, the income to be

expended for the perpetual care and improvement of the Henry H. Howe burial lot, which includes the terraces on the west to the drive in the Spofford Cemetery.

27. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1926

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 9th, 1926.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Louis D. Herrick at 9 a. m. and the warrant read by the Town Clerk.

The articles of the Warrant were disposed of as follows:

Article 1. Election of Town Clerk. Whole number of votes cast 90, necessary for choice 46. Charles A. Post had 36, Viola Tuttle 1, Roger Spaulding 1, Imogene L. Chickering 52. Imogene L. Chickering, having a majority of votes cast, was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 2. Election of one Selectman for 3 years. Whole number of votes cast 99, necessary for choice 50. Albert L. Post had 51, Charles A. Puffer 1, Roger C. Spaulding 47. Albert L. Post, having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 3. Election of one Selectman for 2 years. Whole number of votes cast 94, necessary for choice 48. Viola Tuttle had 1, Fred E. Atherton 93. Fred E. Atherton, having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 4. Election of other Town Officers. Election of Road Agent at the West Village. Whole number of votes cast 73, necessary for choice 37. C. E. Chickering had 1, Viola Tuttle, 1, Viola D. Tuttle 1, Clifford E. Chickering 70. Clifford E. Chickering having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Road Agent for the Spofford District. Whole number of votes cast 99, necessary for choice 50. Walter J. Post had 72, Clint M. Joslyn 26, Leon E. Smith 1. Walter J. Post having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Road Agent for the Center Village. Whole number of votes cast 103, necessary for choice 52. Frank M. Holman had 38, Leon E. Smith had 65. Leon E. Smith, having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Treasurer. Whole number of votes cast 68, necessary for choice 35. Viola V. Tuttle had 3, Harold E. Foster 65. Harold E. Foster, having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Auditors. Clifford Tuttle, Chester M. Burnham and Merle W. Cobleigh were elected as auditors by a voice vote—and Chester M. Burnham and Merle W. Cobleigh took the oath of office.

Election of Constables. William D. Pierce, Leon E. Smith and Charles H. Spaulding were elected constables by a voice vote and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Trustee of Town Library. Fred O. C. Farr was elected Trustee of Public Library for 3 years by a voice vote and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Trustee of Trust Funds. George W. Bevis was elected Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years by voice vote and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. Clifford E. Chickering, Harold E. Foster and Frank M. Holman were elected Surveyors of wood and Lumber by voice vote and Clifford E. Chickering and Harold E. Foster took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Fence Viewers. Fred O. C. Farr, Lyle B. Chickering and Olin E. Butler were elected Fence Viewers by voice vote and Fred O. C. Farr and Lyle B. Chickering took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 6. Voted to accept the provisions of Chapter 87, Section 1 of the revised statutes on a section of the Cheshire Road so called, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for same.

Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the repairing of highways and bridges.

Article 8. Voted to accept State Aid for highway construction and to appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for same.

Article 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance.

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$571.43 to secure State Aid for the repair and maintenance of the Suspension Bridge so called.

Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the purchase of suitable snow fences to be used on Trunk Line where needed.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be used in purchasing a suitable tractor and equipment for the purpose of grading and snow removal, said tractor to be in the care of the Selectmen who are to rent it to any of the three road agents at the Selectmen's discretion for road clearing or repairing at the rate of \$12.00 per day, manned. Also that the Selectmen are to provide one individual so near as possible, to drive and care for the tractor.

Article 13. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of

\$500.00 to gravel a section of road near New Boston Cemetery, so-called, and a section of road at the head of the Gulf Road so called.

Article 14. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the support of the poor.

Article 15. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to make the whole sum of \$150.00 for the support of Town Library according to and required by law.

Article 16. Voted to leave the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year with the Selectmen.

Article 17. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to fight the Pine Blister Rust.

Article 18. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the observance of Old Home Day and a committee consisting of Charles H. Spaulding, Morris Friedsam, Fred Atherton, Mrs. Walter Dunbar, Mrs. Alice Spaulding and Mrs. David Allen was elected to have charge of same.

Article 19. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for street lighting.

Article 20. Voted to pass over the article concerning the raising of a sufficient sum of money for a dust layer to be used on the Silverdale Road from the so called Pierce Four Corners to the end of the row of cottages on said road.

Article 21. Voted in place of Article 21 to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for improvements at Town Hall to include toilet rooms and modern kitchen. Three citizens, Morris Friedsam, George Bevis and Harold Foster were appointed to look after the matter.

Article 22. This article in regard to the addition of names of soldiers on the Town Memorial was deferred.

Article 23. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for snow removal on Trunk Line.

Article 24. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Clark-Bullock Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Charles Clark burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 25. Voted to accept from Mrs. Henry R. Brown the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Ellen A. Smith Trust Fund, the income therefrom to be used for the perpetual care and maintenance of the George A. Smith burial lot in which Ellen A. Smith is buried. Said sum to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association.

Article 26. Voted to accept from Charles A. Hildreth the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the John W. and Africa Hildreth Trust Fund, the income therefrom to be used for the care and maintenance of the John W. and Africa Hildreth lot in the Chesterfield Cemetery.

Article 27. Voted to accept from Freeman Naylor the sum of \$200.00 in trust, the income from which to be used for the care and maintenance of the Naylor lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 28. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust from Mrs. Ida P. Johnson Russell the income from which to be used for the care and maintenance of the Elwin Johnson lot in the Spofford cemetery.

Article 29. Voted to appoint a competent committee with full power to take up matter of a resident physician. The committee appointed is composed of Mrs. Gibson, Mrs. Agnes Chickering and Rev. C. E. Savage. Voted to raise the sum of \$1,400.00 to be used with the \$1,000.00 already appropriated for the said resident physician's salary of \$100.00 a month for two years. The use of the old parsonage as a residence gratis.

Voted to install two lights on the Westmoreland Road and an additional light on the Henry Field Corner.

No other business appearing it was voted to adjourn at 4.45 P. M.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I herewith submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

TEACHERS

We were fortunate this year in having only one change in our teaching force. Mrs. Imogene Chickering resigned her position in charge of the upper grades at Chesterfield Village and Miss Marion Stanton a graduate of Keene Normal School took her place.

The following table gives the organization of the schools for the year 1926-1927.

I take pleasure in reporting that there has been throughout the year a fine spirit of cooperation toward maintaining better schools in Chesterfield by the School Board, teachers and parents.

NOON LUNCH

Because so many children in Chesterfield live at a distance from the school house a large number have to carry lunch to school. The teachers with the help of some of the older girls have served a hot food or drink during the winter months to supplement what is brought from home. In most cases the material for the hot dish such as cocoa, corn, potatoes, milk or other food has been brought by the children. At Spofford

\$25 was raised through an entertainment and used for noon lunches.

I believe it is very desirable to have in every class room where a noon lunch is served a kitchen unit consisting of a sink, shelf and a cupboard with doors. There has been installed at Spofford this year a very efficient little unit of this type. I hope that soon such an arrangement can be made in the other two school houses.

TRANSPORTATION

The law regarding transportation of pupils states that if a child lives two miles or more from the school house he shall be transported at the expense of the district. It has been customary in Chesterfield to require any child under the two mile limit to walk to school or ride at his own expense.

Obviously, during the severe part of the winter to ask our young children to walk from $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 miles in order to reach school is an unsatisfactory state of affairs. I believe there have been a few children this winter who might well have been transported.

Having in mind the fact that the law charges the School Board to furnish "as nearly equal advantages as practicable" I should recommend that a sum of money be put at the disposal of the School Board with which to transport certain pupils who live less than two miles from the school house during the worst of the winter.

HEALTH

I am continually impressed with the important part the health of the school child plays in his school work. His physical well being is, I believe, one of the fundamental things we must endeavor to improve in order to bring the work of the pupils up to a higher standard.

School and home should cooperate in doing more to safeguard the health of our children, not only to keep the children free from disease but to foster health habits and impart health

knowledge so that they will have an abundance of energy and vigor which will be a foundation for good school work.

There was an attempt made last year to raise money for a School Nurse who would spend her entire time caring for the children in the Walpole Union. This movement was started too late to be discussed at the Chesterfield School Meeting. The other towns all raised money for this purpose although as it turned out Walpole's vote was illegal and the money could not be used. In order to have such a full time nurse all four towns must agree at the same time and this is rather difficult. Such a school nurse would be of great value in our schools, I believe.

BUILDINGS

During the year blackboards were installed in both rooms at Spofford. These are a great improvement over the old ones. There are two chimneys in this building. One was repaired last year and the other one is in need of attention and should be looked after in the near future. A shelf, cupboard and sink have been installed in the advanced room at Spofford. The woodshed roof should be shingled this summer as it is in bad shape. The lack of ample room for a playground is a handicap at Spofford.

Only minor repairs have been made at Chesterfield Village. The building is in good condition.

The chemical toilets purchased a year ago were installed at West Chesterfield last summer. This building is badly in need of new blackboards.

All three buildings are in need of paint.

NEW EQUIPMENT

The wall maps in all the school houses are in bad condition and out of date. They should be replaced by new sets. A good dictionary and a simple set of encyclopediae are very valuable in any classroom. I believe it would be profitable to purchase these books for West Chesterfield and the Advanced room at the other two schools.

REORGANIZATION

Chesterfield is facing a situation in which five teachers are hired to teach pupils which could well be handled by four if the children were all in one locality. There is a possibility of reorganizing to save the salary of one teacher and yet this is a difficult problem. There is also a possibility of reorganizing some of the transportation to eliminate one school team. Your Superintendent and School Board are in search of a salution to this problem but have no definite plan to offer at this time.

This year for the first time Chesterfield schools will keep open for 37 weeks.

I wish to thank the School Board and the teachers for their cordial support.
