HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

CONCORD, Jan. 13, 1897.

The members of the Coos County delegation met for the organization of the county delegation in Representatives' Hall in Concord, N. H. Upon motion, Carlos P. Day of Berlin was nominated and elected as chairman. Upon motion, Frank G. McKellips of Northumberland was nominated and elected clerk of the delegation, and Frank G. McKellips was duly sworn to perform his duties by Chester B. Jordan, Justice of the Peace and Quorum throughout the state of New Hampshire. On motion, voted to adjourn subject to the call of the chairman.

Agreeably to adjournment the delegation met in Representatives' Hall at 10 o'clock a. m. The chairman called the convention to order. The records of the last meeting were read and approved. The convention, upon motion of Mr. Bell of Whitefield, considered house bill No. 164, relating to the holding of two terms of the probate court at Whitefield each year. Upon motion of Noyes of Whitefield, the bill was amended by striking out the word *first* and inserting the word *second* in the fifth line of section one of said bill, so it shall read, "the second Tuesday of February and the first Tuesday of September in each year," and to recommend the passage of the bill with the above amendment. Judge of Probate A. R. Evans of Gorham was given a hearing upon house bill No. 51, in relation to the salary of certain county officers in the county of Coos. Upon motion of Mr. Gould of Colebrook, final action upon house bill No. 51 was postponed until Wednesday, Feb. 10, 1897, at 10 a. m. To which hour, upon motion of Mr. Gould of Colebrook, the convention adjourned.

The delegation met agreeably to the adjournment of Feb. 3. The chairman called to order, and house bill No.

51 was taken up for consideration, but upon motion of Mr. Day of Berlin, the bill was laid upon the table for one week to allow parties to be heard upon the same. The committee appointed January 28, to visit the county farm and confer with the county commissioners in regard to the appropriation for the next two years, reported they had attended to that duty, and Mr. Chas. F. Noyes of Whitefield, chairman of the committee, offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) be and hereby is appropriated annually for the years 1897 and 1898, for the current expenses of the county of Coos. And such sums as are not expended for the legitimate expenses of the county be applied on the indebtedness of the county, to reduce the county debt.

Upon motion, Burleigh Roberts of Lancaster and James H. Curtis of Northumberland were chosen county auditors for the ensuing two years.

The chairman called to order, and house bill No. 51, relating to the salaries of certain Coos County officers was taken from the table. Sheriff T. C. Beattie addressed the delegation in support of the bill. Mr. Gould of Colebrook made a motion that the committee report inexpedient to legislate upon the bill. Mr. Twitchell of Gorham moved to amend by reporting in favor of increasing the salaries of the judge and register of probate and the sheriff one hundred dollars (\$100) each. Upon a vote the amendment was lost. The motion of Mr. Gould of Colebrook, in-

expedient to legislate, was adopted, and the committee was authorized to so report upon the bill to the house. Upon motion, the convention adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

Commissioners' Report.

To the Citizens of Coos County:

In compliance with the requirements of the statutes of the state, we herewith submit the annual report of your commissioners, together with the reports of the superintendent of the county farm, physician, chaplain, sheriff, jailor, county solicitor, clerk of court, county treasurer, and auditors.

The county farm during the past year, has been under the management of Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Fuller, whom, the citizens may be assured, are making this home for the poor and unfortunate, as comfortable and happy as can possibly be expected. The house and all outbuildings are kept in a very clean and healthy condition.

It is our wish that more of the citizens of the county would visit the farm and judge for themselves of the condition and care of those unfortunates who are dependent upon the county's bounty.

These poor, unfortunate beings have come to look forward to Christmas as the one bright spot in their lives, and to those ladies and gentlemen who each year so kindly contribute, and by their presence make at least one day in the year a bright and happy one to them, we wish to extend our sincere thanks.

How much good might be done if each town had a committee to investigate the condition of families that are known to be poor, and by soliciting contributions, and distributing them, make many a home cheerful and happy that is otherwise desolate. Nearly everyone of means has old clothing and other necessaries that they would contribute, and this would not only help the poor and needy, but would tend to reduce the poor expense in both town and county.

There has been considerable expense in repairing roads in unorganized towns during the past year, caused by the freshet of July, which on the Pinkham road in the mountains did damage that cost \$718.97. The new Dixville road cost \$574.

There has also been considerable expense in repairing the jail and for boarding the large number of inmates. The bill for board paid at the October term was \$1,639.98. A new boiler was put into the court house at an expense of \$400, the old one having been condemned.

In the future, all pauper bills must be presented to the commissioners by the overseer of the poor or the selectmen of the several towns, and be rendered at the several terms of court in each district. The commissioners also insist that in all cases affidavits shall be taken and sent to them, and blanks will be furnished for that purpose on application.

THE NEW LAW IN RELATION TO THE APPOINTMENT OF AUDITORS. AN ACT in relation to county auditors.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

SECTION 1. The Supreme Court, on or before the first day of April, annually, beginning with April 1897, shall appoint two Auditors, one from each of the two leading political parties, for each county of the State, who shall once in three months audit the accounts of the County Commissioners, Superintendent of the County Farm, and County Treasurer, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 24 of the Public Statutes. The auditors shall also audit once in three months the bills of the county commissioners for services and expenses, and report their findings to the court. Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the supreme court, a semi-annual or annual audit shall be deemed sufficient in any county or counties in said state, the said court may so direct, and the auditors shall make up semi-annual or annual statements of receipts and disbursements accordingly, and the supreme court shall have authority to direct special examinations in such manner as they deem advisable, if in their judgment the same are required.

SEC. 2 The county commissioners shall file with the auditors at each audit a sworn statement of all bills outstanding.

SEC. 3. The supreme court shall fix the compensation of the auditors.

SEC. 4. The auditors shall issue for publication in any or all newspapers in the county, when requested, an itemized statement of the receipts and disbursements of the county immediately after each audit, provided, however, that such publication shall be made without compensation, and shall make an annual report of the receipts and disbursements of the county for publication in the county report, together with such recommendations as they may deem advisable.

SEC. 5. This act shall take effect upon its passage.
