TOWN WARRANT

(L. S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Croydon, in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, and the polls to close at 6 o'clock p. m., to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year, a Library Trustee and a Trustee of the Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.

Art. 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid for Class V roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$331.18, the State to pay \$1,324.71.

Art. 4. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges, and for keeping the roads open during the winter.

Art. 5. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the General Expense of the Highway Department.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire all necessary sums of money for its use during the year in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, calling attention to the

resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy a dump truck for use on the town highways, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Art. 9. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of building a road from a point near the Partridge residence, to the shore of Rockybound Pond.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control, to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.

Art. 11. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Chapter 150, Laws of New Hampshire

Section 6—Every owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually on or before April 30 cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for one year from the first day of the ensuing May, in the office of the clerk of the city or town wherein said dog is kept, and shall cause it to wear around its neck a collar distinctly marked with its owner's name, and bearing attached to said collar a metal tag distinctly marked with its registered number. Said tag shall be furnished by the clerk at the expense of the city or town from the amount received from dog license fees.

Section 18—The mayor of each city and the selectmen of each town shall annually within ten days from May first issue a warrant to one or more police officers or constables directing them to proceed forthwith either to kill or cause to be killed all dogs within such city or town not licensed and collared according to the provision of this chapter, and to enter complaint against the owners or keepers thereof; and any person may, and every police officer and constable shall kill or cause to be killed all such dogs, whenever and wherever found.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Croydon School Board:

We have been fortunate again this year in holding both teachers in their position, Mrs. Doris Kibbey at Croydon Flat School, Mrs. Ruth Fisher at the East Village School. The number has dropped to sixteen but that is more of a help than a hindrance in an eight grade school, the teacher can find more time to help individuals.

Teaching is hard work and it is especially hard in school with all eight grades to keep the pupils' work progressing to modern requirements, prepare each day's work and correct papers.

The shortage of teachers is alarming. Patriotism and higher salaries have called many from the teaching profession to other fields. It is expected that many will stop teaching as soon as their contracts run out in the spring. I recommend if possible we hold the same faculty for next year.

Financially, the teachers have been hard hit. Teachers' wages always have been low, in the comparison to years of study and expenses required to prepare for their work. According to a study made by the N.E.A. the cost of living already has risen 19% since the war began, but food, 35% and clothing, 25%. The wages of factory workers have gone up 59% and teachers' salaries only 7%. Another inducement that kept teachers in their position before 1939 was that they had no income tax to pay.

Transportation is another serious problem. The cost is higher and it will soon be hard to find good drivers. Without transportation, however, we would

be forced to open up a large number of small schools with the difficulty of finding teachers.

Books are in good condition and teachers can get along with less supplies than would be desirable. Unless new homes are built we will not need new furniture.

I appreciate the help and sympathy that I received from the School Board, the teachers and pupils during my sickness. I am sorry for the inconvenience brought to them and wish to thank them for the extra work they so willingly have done.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

January 1942 to January 1943

School health activities tend more and more to spread from the school proper into the home and community. It is now taken for granted that the various infectious diseases and defects of eyes, ears, teeth, nose, throat, general nutrition, posture and speech etc. form the chief objects sought in routine health inspection. Experience teaches that many of these and other important irregularities are traceable to circumstances and conditions which parents do not recognize as unhealthful. Also the measures necessary for the correction of these and other unfortunate sources of health disturbances often lie chiefly in the hands of the parents.

The nurse and teacher, by training and experience, become able to recognize these causes and often to suggest corrective measures necessary. Both nurse and teacher welcome these opportunities for service.

During the year I made 12 visits to the school and on 9 occasions have visited the homes of pupils.
