### TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Goshen in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Goshen on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To hear the reports of the Selectmen and other Town Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for repair of highways and bridges.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to apply for State Aid or Class Five Assistance, for permanent improvement of highways, and raise and appropriate the necessary money therefor.

ARTICLE 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Library.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the town poor and old age assistance.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to sand roads and raise and appropriate the money therefor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote and appropriate for the purpose of buying fire equipment-

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24.00 in cooperation with the other towns of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

ARTICLE 12. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to have the Newbury and Goshen town line surveyed and to raise and appropriate the necessary money therefor.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for control of white pine blister rust.

ARTICLE 15. To see what sum or sums of money the voters of the Town of Goshen will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of laying out and constructing a highway leading from the Brook Road to the Cottages on the west side of Rands Pond.

ARTICLE 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

We had no forest fires in the year 1940, which is a very good record. There were 28 permits issued. At present we have 18 knapsack pumps, but are very much in need of more fire fighting tools now that we have a tool house to store them in. The following list is recommended by the State Forestry Department:

- 8 axes, handled
- 2 cross-cut saws and wedges
- 4 Pulaski tools (combination ax mattock)
- 12 fire rakes, mowing machine type
- 12 hazel hoes (special fire grub-hoe)
- 12 shovels, handled
- 12 water pails
- 12 oil lanterns
- 2 drinking water canteens, 1 gallon Total estimated cost to town
