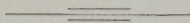

Commissioners' Report.

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

Agreeably to the laws of the State of New Hampshire, we submit the following report for consideration; also the reports of the Superintendent of the County Farm and Almshouse, County Treasurer, Clerk of the Court, Solicitor, Sheriff, Jailor, and Auditors, with a copy of the proceedings of the County Conventions:

The affairs of the county are in a satisfactory condition. The county buildings have been repaired at an expense of \$2,061.05, and as the treasurer's report shows, all maturing bonds and interest paid, and the debt of the county has been reduced \$6,300.96.

The superintendent and matron, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Phillips, are entitled to our thanks for their good management of the Almshouse and kindness to those under their care. While the whole expense of the farm is not as much as last year, the expense for labor has been more on account of the freshet of last spring which covered the land with flood wood, sawdust and mud, and necessitated the plowing and seeding of a good many acres before it would be in a proper condition for producing a crop of hay. Also in expending the appropriations for repairs on the farm buildings, which was done in the early part of the year and necessitated the keeping of extra help which is not charged in the permanent improvement fund.

We are trying to carry out the idea of our predecessors

in the matter of general improvements and bringing the farm to a higher state of cultivation. We have put in a silo 10 ft. x 15 ft., 23 ft. in depth, and the dairy has been increased to the number of 54 cows from which, besides supplying the institution, 16000 pounds of milk was delivered to the North Haverhill creamery in the month of December. We believe that the citizens of Grafton County share in the feelings shown at the present time in the management of every county farm in the state, that the farm should be well tilled, the buildings kept in suitable repair and the inmates properly fed and clothed, and given best of case during sickness, even if the cost to the county be increased thereby.

The commissioners would kindly acknowledge the courtesy and kindness extended them by the retiring board who aided them in many ways upon their assuming the duties of their office.

We desire to call your notice to Chapter 27, Sections 9, 10, 11; and Chapter 85, Sections 1, 2, 4, 5, 14 and 15 of the Public Statutes, and inform you that no bills will be PAID for more than thirty days' support previous to the proper affidavits being furnished us according to the requirements of these statutes. The evidence as to the settlement must show the name, age, place of present or former residence of the applicant since 1880; the amount of property owned by and taxed to them in any place since Jan. 1, 1880; whether married or single; if married, when and to whom; if under the age of thirty years, the name and place and residence and parents; the amount of property owned by and taxed to either of them; if they have received any aid, when and by whom; where they have lived since 1880, and any other material facts bearing upon the matter.

We also call your attention to chapter 58, Section 1, Pamphlet laws of 1883, entitled, "An act for the punish-

ment of parents who neglect to provide for the support of their minor children," and to report any such case at once to the commissioners, so that such delinquents may be compelled to perform their duty to their legitimate offspring.

We would also call your attention to Chapter 84, Sections 9, 10 and 11, Public Statutes, in relation to aid furnished to indigent soldiers, and providing for entrance to the Soldiers' Home in certain cases, and request you to see that the provisions of said statutes are complied with before furnishing aid at the expense of the County.

You are requested to present to the County Commissioners during the first week of each term of Court all legal claims which said town has against said county for the support of county paupers.

You are also requested to look after the interests of said paupers, and be SURE that each pauper gets a dollar's worth of goods for a dollar, and settle no bills that are not particularly itemized as regards weight, quantity, and price.

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In accordance with Chapter 30, Section 1, Public Statutes, the Superintendent of the County Farm shall make up his report to January 1st, annually, and also Sec. 2 of said chapter requires that the Superintendent's report shall contain, in addition, a list of the paupers actually supported at the Farm, and the number of weeks each was so supported, also a statement of the average cost per week for each pauper, with an explanation of the basis upon which said calculations were made.

The whole number of persons supported and partially supported for the year ending December 31, 1895, was (136) one hundred and thirty-six.

The number of weeks' board is ascertained by taking the number of days between the day of admittance and the day of departure of each individual, and dividing that number by seven, it gives the number of weeks each individual has been so supported.

The whole cost of supporting paupers at the farm for the year ending December 31, 1895, is \$8,093.21, and this sum divided by the whole number of weeks board furnished, viz: 5,145 gives \$1.57 as the price per week.

Physician's Report.

To the Honorable Commissioners of Grafton County:

For the first time I have the honor to submit to the citizens of the county, through you, my annual statement concerning the sanitary condition of the Almshouse for the year just closed.

The acute diseases requiring my attention have been comparatively few, nearly all the deaths having been caused by old age or some chronic affection which was beyond medical aid.

The general health of the inmates as a whole has been exceptionably good, no epidemic diseases having prevailed during the year. I attribute the fact to the almost perfect arrangements of the buildings and the scrupulous cleanliness so thoroughly enforced in all its departments. With future efficient hygienic precautions, epidemic diseases can find here little or nothing for development.

The sick and afflicted are tenderly cared for and those in charge deserve much credit for the patience and tenderness with which the unfortunate are made comfortable and contented. No pains or expense are spared to make this institution a cheerful and happy home for those whose lot it is to become a county charge. The annual Christmas dinner and tree given for the benefit of the inmates is one of the manifestations of this fact, as those who had the pleasure of watching the assemblage at the tables so bountifully spread and their eagerness and beaming faces as the presents were distributed from the trees, can testify. To the Honorable Commissioners and to the Citizens of Grafton County :

Religious services have been held on alternate Sabbaths. The inmates are not required to attend these services unless they choose to do so, but many of those whose health permits are regularly present. Some who are not able to be present at the regular services are pleased to have me visit them in their rooms. I find here striking illustrations of the truth that earthly misfortune is relieved by the consolations of religion.

Where so many people are brought together there is a great variety of character and disposition. To manage such an institution as this requires a great deal of tact and patience. The present management seems to me to be remarkably successful, and all that can reasonably be expected is being done for the comfort of the inmates. This is appreciated by the better class of inmates, and they cheerfully bear testimony to the kindness with which they are treated. I believe that the Commissioners are actuated by a desire to promote the well being of the inmates, and I trust that for this they will be commended by the citizens of the county. The fraction of a dollar added to the cost per week for each inmate makes but a trifle when divided among the tax payers of the county, and no humane man will begrudge a few cents to add to the comfort of the poor.

Solicitor's Report.

I submit herewith report for the term extending from December 31, 1894 to March 31, 1895.

At the expiration of my term there were two civil cases upon the docket (one of which, "the Petition of Grafton county for the Almy reward" has since been disposed of) and the case of the town of Plymouth against the county.

At the March term of court there were four criminal cases upon the docket remaining from previous terms, three of which were disposed of. One justice appeal was entered at this term and dismissed. The Grand Jury reported forty-seven indictments of which forty-one were for violation of the liquor laws. Of the remaining six, two were for aggravated assault and one each for adultery, arson, forgery and larceny.

There were three cases undisposed of at the close of my term.

Upon assuming his official duties the present incumbent found but one civil action pending in court in which the county was a party, viz: Town of Plymouth v. Grafton county. This case still remains upon the docket and is the only civil action now pending in which the county is a party.

Three criminal cases were also pending at that time, and seventy have since been added to the Criminal Docket, of which 67 were indictments found at the November Term, and three were justice appeals. Fifty-one of said indictments were for illegal sales of liquor, all of which have been disposed of, except those in which the respondents were without the jurisdiction of the Court. There are now six cases upon the criminal docket.

D. C. Remick requested information as to the chairman and clerk having been sworn.

The chairman not having been sworn Mr. Remick administered the oath.

The clerk made statement of having taken the oath before J. W. Remick.

The first article of the call was then read by the chairman (previously recorded.)

D. C. Remick moved the adoption of the following resolution; seconded.

“Resolved that the commissioners be, and hereby are authorized to sell and dispose of the whole or any part of the pine now standing or already felled on the county farm in Haverhill, to such party or parties and at such price as to the commissioners seems expedient, and any bargain or contract heretofore made with reference to that subject matter by the commissioners with any party is hereby ratified, confirmed and made binding upon the county to all intents and purposes, the same as if such contract or bargain had been originally authorized by this convention.”

Remarks were made by Smith of Alexandria; Remick of Littleton; Chase of Plymouth.

Carbee of Haverhill called for the re-reading of the resolution, which was read by the chairman.

No further remarks being made the chairman called for a rising vote on the adoption of the resolution with the following result:

Thirty gentlemen voted yes; one gentleman voted no; one gentleman not voting; and the resolution was declared adopted.

The chairman read the second article of the call for the convention (previously recorded.)

Mr. Remick accepting the amendment and no remarks being made the question on the adoption of the resolution being put it was carried in the affirmative by a unanimous rising vote.

Mr. Remick, by suggestion of the chairman, moved that "the clerk be instructed to make up the roll of the members of the convention with their pay per diem and mileage as per the Public Statutes and present the same to the County Treasurer, who is hereby instructed and directed to pay the same. Carried by rising vote.
