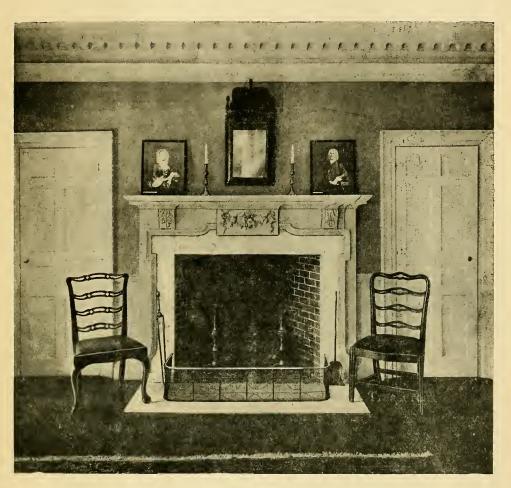

To the inhabitants of the town of Greenland in the county of Rockingham and state of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:-

You are hereby notified to meet at the Assembly Hall (Stone School) in Greenland on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at seven of the clock of the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges.
- 4. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Weeks Public Library.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the care of cemeteries, parks and dump.
 - 6. To see if the voters of the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.
 - 7. To see if the town will vote to continue the Building Ordnance which was passed last year.
 - 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$50.00.

- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for the extension of the water lines.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for laying a water line from the water main to the Brick School.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class V. roads and raise and appropriate \$99.46 for said purpose.
- 12. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Seacoast Regional

The Seacoast Region of New Hampshire consists of the towns bordering on the seacoast and tidewaters of the State.

These communities have common interests in economic betterment, in regional problems, and in necessary adjustments to changing conditions brought about by war emergencies.

The New Hampshire Seacoast Regional Development Association is the accredited organization through which this and the other regional communities are brought together in combined efforts to attain their related objectives of development and improvements.

It serves the individual interests of the Community to the extent of its facilities in accordance with expressed desires of the Community.

There are five Reginal Associations in New Hampshire. The Seacoast Association organized in 1934 and incorporated in 1936 is the official State Co-ordinating Agency for the Seacoast Region. The Executive Secretary is the only paid official and his salary is provided for by State appropriation administered by the State Planning and Development Commission under certain rules of procedure.

Consistent with the State Statute, City and Town appropriations, requested on an approximate basis of one one-hundredth of one per cent of net assessed valuation or less than 10 cents for a thousand dollars, are used for publicizing the resources of your community. Each community has representation on the Board of Directors and its representative citizens serve as members on committees.

The Association works in co-operation with Regional, City and Town, State and Federal Departments and officials, the State University Extension Services, the New England Council Chamber of Commerce, Farm, Industrial and other accredited organizations and has established contacts, brought about conferences and surveys and gathered information necessary to determining the needs of the Region. This work has contributed to developments and considerations which could be realized only through cooperative effort.

Promotional publicity, not only through publications but through personal contacts, conferences, information service and otherwise has brought year round business, as well as the retail business, the professional and other services, and the resort business are all recipients of added income resulting from this work. Of added importance is the maintenance of tax producing property and individual benefits of employment.

In view of the necessary planning for the post-war period this promotional work assumes more importance than ever.

Evidences of the work of Association officials and the various committees are most apparent but difficult to publicize. Bridges have been built, new highways constructed, others improved, funds are available for coastal protection and bridge construction when priorities permit. Industrial plants have received war contracts. Some of the needs of this vital defense area have been recognized by the Federal Government; some added transportation facilities have been provided; information on the population increase has been presented for purposes of securing adequate rationing quotas; surveys pointing to inland water area development are in progress; development of fishery resources are in prospect and consideration is being directed to forestry and farm conservation needs.

The recently released report "A Plan for the Development of the Seacoast Region" prepared by the State Planning and Development Commission represents much time and work of the officers and committees, together with that of the State Commission.

The factual findings of this report have proven to be of particular value for Federal and local use in the present emergency and with continued studies will be of the utmost importance for guiding future planning.

Copies of the report have been sent to Boards of Selectmen, City Officials and individuals who are contributing to the overhead expense of the Association.

The Association stands on its record of accomplishment with equal consideration for the interests of all regional communities and it is obvious in view of increasing demands for service that the value of regional co-operation is important to everyone.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Greenland, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the fourteenth in the series.

The statistical tables which follow this report, together with the treasurer's report and the budget proposed for the next school year, present in a concise form the details of the business affairs of our schools.

The number of pupils enrolled for the school year which ended last June was considerably smaller than that of the year before. The enrollment to date in the current year indicates that by next June we shall have enrolled a few more than last year. The year 1940-1941 was a year of much moving in and out of Greenland. Many pupils remained in our schools only a short time. The year 1941-1942 perhaps shows the normal number of pupils which we may expect for the next few years.

Reports from Portsmouth schools indicate that there are this year no failing marks among those received by Greenland pupils. This reflects credit on the local school. Two of our teaching force are new this year, a circumstance which, of course, must have its effect on the school but which any well ordered school should take in stride. On the whole we have a stronger school in many ways than in any of the prewar years. pils are all receiving instruction geared to modern texts and times by competent, interested teachers. The older members of our force keep up their high standard of The newer members are efficiently finding their work. places and producing the expected good results. Again I commend to your attention the report of our faithful school nurse whose watchful care of the pupils is largely responsible for good health in the schools. I am glad to report again that the work in music, as supervised by Mrs. Coombs is of great value to our pupils. She is carrying on the excellent training in music that our schools have had at her hands in other years.

Thanks to your constant care and that of the efficient janitor the building is in better repair than at any time I have known it. A building used all day by 140 pupils and on many evenings by meetings of adults for various purposes is subjected to much wear. Often there is limited time for needed janitor work after the evening meetings are ended. But the building is a very useful and valuable community asset and Greenland is fortunate in having it.

All schools are affected by the present war conditions, perhaps ours in Union No. 16 less seriously than those in many other sections of the nation. In spite of extra work and some unusual difficulties that arise, we in this Union have, so far, been able to carry on our schools in a fairly normal way. I am sure however, that the children in school now will always remember the war posters, the sale of Victory bonds and stamps, the collection of scrap, the great and rapid changes in geography, the new emphasis placed on history and many other additions and changes in the school life which result from the present world situation. When we remember that the young men now headed to the four corners of the earth with their healthy bodies, clear eyes, fine ideals and ardent patriotism were lately in our schools, we can again be proud of the American public school as one of the builders of that true democracy which we are now defending.

The past year will always be notable for the ease and efficiency with which, on many occasions, teachers, school board members and many other citizens all over the United States aided in the war effort by registering users of war ration books. You and the Greenland teachers and all assisting persons share in the thanks of the government for this service.

Thanks for your interest in our work are due you from all of us who are concerned with the daily operation of our schools, and are gladly given. Again we pledge our best efforts in our work.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

There were 115 children examined with 47 more or less serious conditions found. Of these 43 were definitely corrected during the year through the cooperation of parents, family physicians or clinics. No dental clinic was held due to the overwork of the dentist who can find no time for clinic work at this time. A few parents are cooperating and are having dental work done for their children by their own dentist. There is more dental work to be done and I hope that parents will attend to this as soon as possible. I shall be very glad to All children help in transportation when necessary. except one are vaccinated and 72 are inoculated against diphtheria. No serious epidemics in the schools appeared last year. 40 visits were made to the school.

The new lighting system is a great improvement and I feel that there will be less eye strain and fewer glasses necessary as a result.

I wish to thank our Superintendent, Mr. Towle, School Board, teachers and parents for their cooperation and help with my work.
