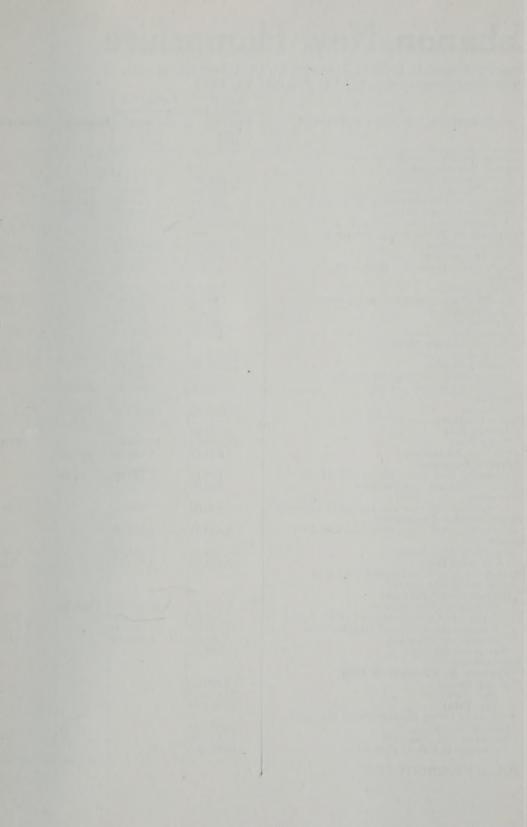

#### WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL MEETING

#### March 12, 1940

#### State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lebanon qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the Second Tuesday of March next at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

First—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the Budget Committee and vote to adopt their recommendations as printed.

Second—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Third—To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division.

Fourth—On a petition of ten or more legal voters to see if the Town will appropriate money for building and rebuilding of sidewalks on School Street, beginning at the corner of Spring Street to the corner of South Street. To E. W. Berry's driveway from Wm. Gray line to end of R. J. Couillard line.

Fifth—On a petition of ten or more legal voters to see if the town will instruct the Selectmen not to give or renew permission for the storage of junk within the precinct. And to refuse a license to any junk dealer who stores junk within the precinct limits.

**Sixth**—On a petition of ten or more legal voters to see if the town will vote to elect a Superintendent of Sidewalks and Sewers.

**Seventh**—On a petition of ten or more legal voters to see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to pay Town employes by check rather than in cash.

**Eighth**—On a petition of ten or more legal voters to see what action the town will take to select a board of five persons to work with the Overseer of the Poor.

**Ninth**—To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.

Tenth—To choose a Town Clerk, a Tax Collector, Overseer of the Poor Agent, Treasurer, a Highway Agent, a Chief of Police, and two Auditors for the ensuing year.

**Eleventh**—To choose two Library Trustees for the ensuing three years.

Twelfth—To choose a Trustee to administer the Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.

Thirteenth—To choose four members to act on the Budget Committee for the ensuing three years.

Fourteenth—To bring in your ballots for four delegates-at-large and their alternates and two district delegates and their alternates for the Democrat and Republican Presidential Conventions.

Fifteenth—To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

However, subject to our comments herein, we believe the Exhibits in the report reflect the financial condition of the Town of Lebanon on January 31, 1940, and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date, with reasonable accuracy.

#### **COMMENTS**

#### Scope of Audit

In auditing your books and records, we proceeded from the General Ledger and reviewed the operations of the Town and its several departments as reflected by the books and records of each department, bringing all such records into agreement with the General Ledger. We then proceeded to verify all supporting vouchers, checks and other related records and from them, we have reviewed the reports prepared by the various department heads.

#### Accounting System and Procedure

The accounting system and procedure is evidently intended to be a double entry system of accounting operating on a supposedly accrual basis. We found, however, that transactions were recorded more on a cash basis than accrual basis and the procedure was undoubtedly based more or less on such cash basis for we found no accounts reflecting revenue or expense accruing. Under existing conditions of accounting procedure, it becomes necessary to clear many items directly through the account called "Net Debt" and thereby confuse rather than clarify the accounting of all transactions.

The classification of accounts should be revised to provide more informative reports and to conform with Uniform Municipal Accounts in reporting under Public Laws, Chapter 68, as amended by Chapter 211, Laws of 1939. This will require some minor changes in the classification of accounts now in use, and we will gladly cooperate with your Town Officers to effect such changes. We plan to cover this subject more fully in our proposed supplement to the report.

#### Selectmen's Records

Records of cash received and disbursements ordered were compared with supporting records and

vouchers. We found them in good order and in agreement with Cash Receipts and Cash Disbursements as recorded by the Town Treasurer.

The Selectmen's record book is the basis of classification for receipts and disbursements, and it is also the book of original entries for the General Ledger. It is therefor very important that proper and consistent interpretation be made of all transactions recorded to obtain more informative reports.

#### Tax Collector

All collections made by the Tax Collector and remitted to the Town Treasurer were verified by reconciliation with the Tax Warrants and uncollected balances therein, consideration being given to added taxes, abatements and other correcting entries. Uncollected balances were listed and found to be in close agreement with the General Ledger. Unpaid property and poll taxes are in process of further verification by direct correspondence with the individual debtors. We believe, however, that accounting for Taxes Bought by the Town and Property Deeded to the Town could be materially improved. We will offer suggestions to so improve the accounting of such items in our supplement to this report.

At this time, however, we strongly urge that a Cash Register be provided for the Tax Collector. It is, in our opinion, sadly needed, and it will provide more adequate protection of the funds collected as well as improve the accounting method for such collections.

#### Town Clerk

All permits and licenses issued by the Town Clerk were accounted for numerically and reconciled with remittances to the Town Treasurer and the Selectmen's books. Receipts of \$22.18 on hand at the close of the year were deposited on February 1 in regular order.

#### Town Treasurer

The records of Cash Received and Cash Disbursed were in agreement with reported receipts from all sources and orders issued by the Selectmen. Cancelled checks were inspected and compared with supporting vouchers and orders. The balance in bank was reconciled with the Bank Statement and all records were found to be in full agreement. Bonds paid and Interest coupons were exhibited and found to be properly cancelled.

#### Trust Funds

Balances of Trust Funds were compared with corresponding Bank Books and the activity therein was found to be properly supported by receipts and vouchers for payments.

The accounting for such funds should be revised, however, to give more informative reports and to better segregate the principal of Trust Funds from income thereon. It is also noted that funds are held by the Trustees of the Public Library and Trustees of Trust Funds. We recommend that principal of all Trust Funds be held by the Trustees of Trust Funds provided no legal objection prevents such procedure.

#### Library and Cemeteries

The library and cemetery accounts were found in good order and all records were properly supported. Cash balances were reconciled with statements from the depositories.

#### **Municipal Court**

Upon request we have reviewed the books and records of the Municipal Court. The balance of Cash in Bank was reconciled with the Statement from the depository bank. All receipts and disbursements appeared fully supported. The balance due the Town as of January 31, 1940, was not set up on the Town's Balance Sheet as remittances are made to the Town only at intervals and such procedure would only tend to confuse the records.

#### Departmental Reports

We have inspected departmental reports submitted by several Town Officers and compared them with recorded activities for the purpose of uniformity in reporting. Wherever such reports indicate a small balance due the Town, we have not found it advisable to include such items in the Town's Balance Sheet for such inclusion would confuse the records without materially changing the true financial condition of the Town.

#### Surety Bonds and Insurance

We have not fully examined surety bonds and insurance policies but a proper analysis of such items is contemplated. The results will be shown in our supplement to this report.

#### **Balance Sheet**

The Balance Sheet as of January 31, 1940, does not include any receivable items other than taxes unpaid and taxes bought by the Town. Verification of any possible receivable items indicated that such inclusion would not materially change the financial position of the Town and, in our opinion, should not be considered unless covered by accounting on accrual basis.

Exhibit 2 in our opinion reflects the activity flowing through the account "Net Debt" under existing procedure. It is a reasonably accurate reconciliation of the Net Debt as of January 31, 1940, with the Net Debt as of January 31, 1939.

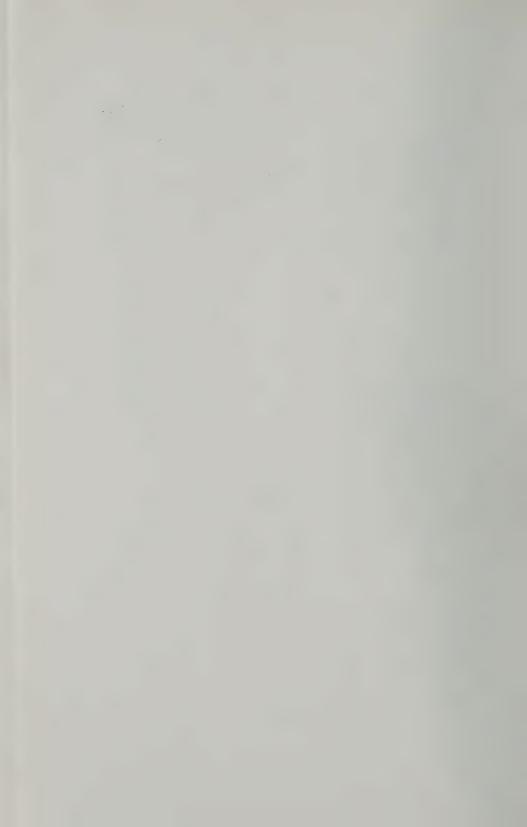

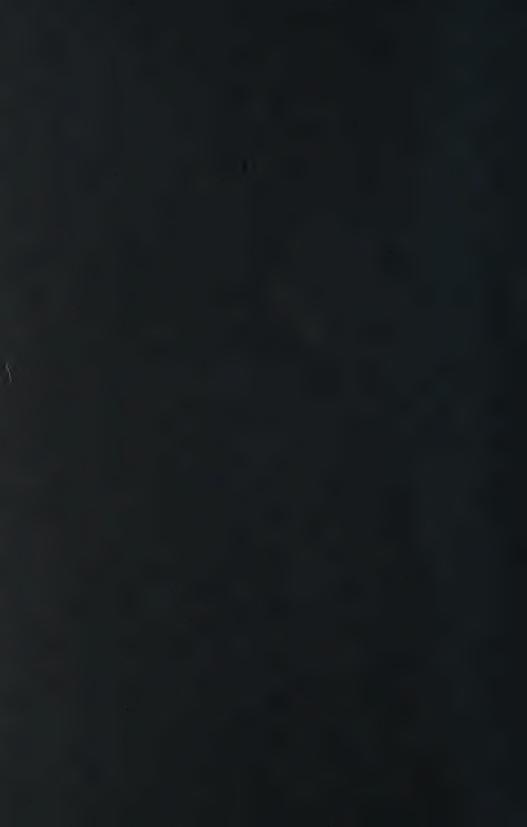

#### HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

In making my report for the year just past, I am pleased to say that there have been no serious cases of contagious diseases and no deaths resulting. I have received from Doctors and Nurses reports as follows: 15 cases of Scarlet Fever, 8 cases of Chicken Pox, 2 cases of Measles, 3 cases of German Measles and 5 cases of Syphilis. No cases of Typhoid Fever have

been reported.

The Public Health Nursing Division make the following report of their activities in Lebanon, during the year. Number of Child Clinics held 12, Attendance 249, Defects found 62. Defects corrected 12. Number of Diptheria Immunization Clinics held 12. Number of Children receiving treatment 40. Ages 6 months to 1 year 15, 1 year to 6 years school, 24. Number of times State Nurses visited Town 62. Signed Elizabeth H. Carriel, Staff Nurse, State Board of Health.

We have had the usual number of complaints of dumps, odors and infractions of Health Regulations, and I have answered every call and as soon as possible have removed the cause.

It is important that some changes be made in our Sewer System, as it has been the cause of many com-

plaints, most of them well sustained.

Again I wish to thank every one who have assisted me in my duties, as it would be impossible to carry on the work of this department, without the cooperation of the public.

#### Gentlemen:

Conforming to the usual practice, and furthermore so that you may include in the town's annual report a record of White Pine Blister Rust Control expenditures, we are submitting a financial statement covering this work in your town during 1939.

Expenditures made in this project became available through town and state appropriations and an allotment of W. P. A. funds from the federal Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine. These combined funds thus permitted employment over a considerable period of the spring and summer months.

Men employed on town funds were obtained by application to town authorities, while those paid from the W. P. A. allotment had to be restricted to cases certified by public relief agencies, and obtained from the W. P. A. Assignment Office.

Since a definite program of control work had previously been formulated in each town, Blister Rust Control proved an ideal project for unemployment relief. With a supervisory force already familiar with local conditions it was possible to put men to work with little loss of time. There was probably no other W. P. A. project in this State where such a high percentage of allotted funds have gone directly into wages, actually more than 96 per cent.

The hurricane of 1938 inflicted severe losses to our white pine forests, especially the larger growth. Much of the remaining stands are composed of young and medium sized trees which are killed more quickly by the rust. Owing to this and the long period before such growth can be marketed it is vital that these immature stands be given early protection from this destructive disease.

#### REPORT OF MILK INSPECTOR

The work of milk inspection has been carried on about as usual as far as general routine is concerned.

We have had no outbreak of disease traced directly to the milk supply this year due, I think, to the fact that a great amount of our milk is now Pasteurized and some of the milk producers have had their herds Bang tested thus relieving the danger of Undulant Fever.

I would like to suggest that the people of Lebanon take trips out to their milk producers and see for themselves the condition under which their supply is produced. I am sure any producer will welcome them as the conditions today are in very good shape.

According to the reports from the Laboratory of Hygiene on the milk samples shipped there for analysis, we are getting a very excellent grade of milk. We have had some instances where samples have had to be taken over and mistakes in the technique of handling corrected, but on the whole the milk has been very satisfactory. The stables and milk rooms have been inspected and scored for light, sanitation and etc, samples taken on the street just as the milk is to be delivered and shipped to the Laboratory of Hygeine for analysis as in other years.

It has been necessary in a few cases this year to go over and test each quarter of each animal in the herd using the Brom Thymol test to discover the sources of high Bacteria count, this requires considerable time but is very important in that it is one method of discovering Mastitus and preventing the spread of Septic Sore throat to the consumer.

#### REPORT OF RELIEF DEPARTMENT

From January 1, 1939 to December 31, 1939 orders were made in the Local Relief Office for the Direct Relief Cases and Town Boarding Adults to the amount of \$18,450.28.

In 1939 there was no State refund on any Direct Relief costs. Towns and Counties bore the entire load.

This year there were no Town Boarding Children. Small lots of clothing bought at wholesale, as well as all wood, is carried in this office in separate accounts, as neither can become direct relief charges to either Town or County cases until actual delivery is made.

The expense of Administration was \$2,794.49, in-

cluding Overseer's salary.

County orders over the same period were made for County Direct Relief and miscellaneous expenses of County Boarding Adults to the amount of \$38,535.86.

Board and Care of the County's Boarding Adults and Boarding Children is paid directly through the

County Office.

During the year seven cases with twenty-nine persons were transferred from Town to County, accord-

ing to law.

During the calendar year of 1939 there was given aid through this office to a monthly average of 201 Town persons and 496 County persons under the above mentioned classifications.

In addition to these figures are dozens of cases appearing and claiming residence, which after the proper investigation, prove to be the responsibility of other towns, counties, or states. There are laws, rules and regulations governing all cases and conditions. With these all relief workers have to be familiar in order to protect the tax payers.

# REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN TOWN OF LEBANON 1939

In view of the serious fire hazard resulting from down timber caused by the hurricane of 1938, we believe that we were particularly fortunate in having no really bad forest fires during the past year. As Forest Fire Warden, I want to express my sincere thanks to the townspeople, town officials and others who have made this fire record possible.

Prior to the forest fire season, we received delivery of the specially equipped forest fire truck which, in combination with the State owned portable pump and 2000 feet of hose, has proved its worth, time and time again, particularly in combating farm fires. While our supply of forest fire fighting tools and equipment is considered very nearly adequate to handle any ordinary situation, a list of additional small hand tools, is recommended, to be purchased; at half price from the State Forestry Department, thereby receiving \$150.00 worth of small hand tools for an expenditure of only \$75.00 by the town.

During 1939, the work of our local forest fire organization received high compliments for their work from District Chief Richardson, State Forester Foster and State Forestry Department, as well as from the District Project Supervisor of the United States Service and other individuals. Particularly for their cooperation during the Lyme-Dorchester fire and fires which occurred at or near United States Government storage sites.

I would like to call everyone's attention to the fact that 1940 will be much more hazardous than last year because of the added dryness of slash, brush and blown down timber still remaining in the woods. The Forest Service and W. P. A. crews have done and are still doing a fine job in clearing fire lanes into bad areas and reducing this hazard in other ways, but in spite of all this work, an increased forest fire

hazard will be with us for some few years to come. Extreme caution should be exercised at all times when in the woods and any fires discovered should be reported at once to the Forest Fire Warden, telephone Lebanon 80. Don't leave it for the other fellow to do. We don't mind the number of calls received but we do want to get to the danger zone as quickly as possible.

It should be remembered that when the ground is not covered with snow, it is unlawful to kindle, or cause to be kindled any fire in or near woodlands or where the fire may communicate to woodlands, without first obtaining the written permit of the Forest Fire Warden. Anyone violating this law is liable not only for all costs involved but also is subject to court action.

A report of the location of any high hazard condition should be reported to me so that we may plan our actions accordingly.

The greater percentage of forest fires are caused by carelessness. Let us all cooperate by being more careful and thereby keeping our forests green; also keeping fire suppression and damage costs at a minimum.
