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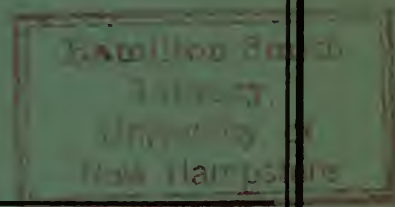

TOWN MEETING WARRANT

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, qualified to vote
in town affairs—*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 10th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, for the public library, for the recreation commission, for free hospital beds, toward the maintenance of a District Nurse, for observance of Memorial Day, for band concerts and for all other town charges.

ARTICLE 3. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line construction of highways in this town under the provisions of Chapters 80, 84 and 85 of the Public Laws, and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of main highways throughout the State in accordance with the foregoing Chapters.

ARTICLE 4. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line maintenance of highways in this town, in accordance with the foregoing Chapters of the Public Laws.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, in co-operation with the State Forester, in the work of preventing the spread of the disease commonly known as White Pine Blister Rust.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt By-Laws relative to the licensing and regulating of public dance halls and dances.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its vote at Town Meeting, March 13, 1928, instructing the Selectmen to appoint an expert highway agent to perform the duties of highway agent under the laws of the State.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to sell its right, title and interest, or any part thereof, in the land deeded the Apthorp Reservoir Company by Rodney C. and Joseph F. Johnson, and wives, December 20, 1882, Grafton Registry of Deeds, Liber 375, Folio 246, and any water rights appurtenant thereto; also, any spring or water rights situate on the farm land in said Littleton, of William Kenney; and to appoint an agent, or agents, to legally transfer the same to the purchaser thereof.

ARTICLE 9. To see what action the town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the Selectmen to give any druggist, doing business in this town, a prescription permit to sell pure spirituous and malt liquor for medicinal, sacramental, and mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chapter 51 of the Laws of New Hampshire, 1929.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 11. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS

In fairness to the taxpayers within the Littleton Village District, your Commissioners feel that a review of the work which has been carried on during the past year, involving the expenditure of money entrusted to us, be given consideration, and it is our pleasure to enumerate in a general way these items in addition to the detailed report herewith submitted.

It has been our aim to carry on a constructive and up-building program as far as possible in connection with the several departments of our District's needs with the funds available for such purposes. Along this line we feel much has been accomplished, in the way of better roads, sidewalks, sewers and more efficient fire protection; striving to better general conditions and eliminate as far as possible the patch, patch, patch and get-no-where method of maintenance.

Much money has been spent in the past year upon the roads which require much attention owing to increased motor traffic and general conditions. More of the funds has been spent upon asphalt, heavy oil, cold patch, etc., than in previous years. Much attention has been given to oiling the hills, which is a start toward more permanent road beds and elimination of frequent and costly repairs without gain. A great many additional catch basins and manholes have been added, culverts, both cement and metal, replacing old wooden ones which were out of order, to better handle surface drainage, thereby protecting roadbeds against maintenance expense. Many side street road beds have been cleared of mud holes by drainage, and coating with gravel, which are getting into shape for oil coverings and thus resulting in better highways. The removal of snow from our main business section and keeping roadways plowed open, which is quite an expense, is

generally agreed to be a valuable asset to our business community, and a worthwhile venture.

New equipment has been purchased to replace old antiquated methods and keep pace with demands for lower cost of producing results.

The Fire Department, one of our most inestimable assets, has also been given vigilant attention and during the past year this department has been brought out from a semi-demoralized body of fire fighters, without proper leadership and cooperation, up to a remarkable fine organization of men, who are ready for call at any minute, night or day, to perform their duty of protecting our property and lives from the hazard of fire. This wonderful change has been brought about by reorganization of the old members and addition of new men, selecting their chief and officers among themselves and also by the cooperation and encouragement from the commissioners. This spirit and morale of the members has brought this department up to a most efficient body of firemen and they are to be commended upon their progress. Their aim is to become recognized as one of the best call fire departments of the State. Your commissioners are equally interested and give their support. You as citizens, should consider their hazard, sacrifice of time and occasional soaking for the small pay they receive. Give them encouragement and support; it is our additional protection from fire and possible loss of life.

Additional small equipment has been purchased for this department during the past year adding to its efficiency and more must be furnished to bring our fire fighting apparatus up to a standard which is required by the State Board of Fire Underwriters. This additional equipment must be provided a little each year in order that extra funds will not be required, with the exception of an appropriation for the purchase of a new Pumper Truck, which the Commissioners strongly recommend as necessary for further protection to Littleton's valuable property.

Additional new sewers had to be laid on Summit Avenue to accommodate a new building development at an expense of about \$300.00. The storm sewer at Apthorp has been installed as by special vote of last year's Precinct Meeting, an appropriation of \$1,500.00 being voted for that purpose, but the expenditure necessary to properly complete the project was about \$500.00 in excess of this appropriation.

At the beginning of the present year we had a deficit of \$2,950.00, due to the rebuilding of Saranac Street from a bad discreditable road to a gravel-asphalt surface permanent road. This was a necessity and money well spent. In view of all work which has been carried on, we have nevertheless been able to reduce this deficit at the end of the year by \$350.00, which was not as large an amount as we wished for.

At the time of our check up in the late fall we felt that half of the deficit would be met, but owing to necessities, which later developed, such as replacing of storage batteries for the fire alarm system which went out of commission, due to old age. The replacement of a complete set of new tires on the hose truck and ladder truck, which were unsafe to operate also had to be provided. As no other means for handling snow and plowing out our streets was available we were obliged to purchase a plow for this purpose. These and a few other items which had to be provided, while expensive are really equipment, or items of long period service.

We are in hopes, however, the balance of this deficit can be wiped out by the end of this fiscal year, without asking for additional funds to carry on our program for this year.

Many other items could be enumerated which fall within the scope of our activities, and all cost money. However, we are trying to keep within our limits as closely as possible, considering emergencies which arise and must be met as best they can.

In closing we wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation and support we have had from you as citizens at large. Of course we have met with some criticisms which we take as part of our job, but generally they have not been of a serious nature. We are at your service and strive to meet the various problems to the best of our ability and judgment and assure that cooperation of our citizens will make for a better, brighter and busier Littleton.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

TO THE CITIZENS OF LITTLETON:

Again the School Board presents its annual report for your consideration and approval. Again we bring before you the results of our efforts in acting as your agents, appointed by you to maintain the educational interests in the town of Littleton.

Each year brings its special and unexpected problems to be solved. While some of you may question our judgment in these matters, perhaps if the various angles to be considered, the underlying principles involved, were understood, you would better realize that in all cases the Board must decide not for the one but for the whole, not for the individual child but for all the future citizens of Littleton, in order that the standards set by our State Board of Education may be met and our school system function as efficiently as that of other towns of equal size and importance. For further information regarding reports of scholastic achievement you are referred to the comprehensive and detailed reports of our Superintendent and Headmaster.

In considering our budget for the coming year, there are certain obligations that must be met over which your School Board has absolutely no control.

The per capita tax, two dollars for every child registered in our schools. As our numbers increase, so also does this tax, and the Board has been notified that the seventh and eighth grades of the Parochial School will be added to our enrollment this coming year. The debt on our high school and interest on same must be paid, less each year to be sure, but still a major item. Insurance on all school property, premiums of which are especially large. These constitute our

fixed charges and amount this year to \$18,800.00. Transportation is another large item and while not strictly a fixed charge, the mileage limit is determined by state law.

Money actually needed to maintain standard schools, according to the budget estimates published on another page of this report amount to \$55,200.00. This added to our fixed charges makes a total to be raised of \$74,000.00

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To G. H. Barrett, Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith present my ninth annual report as Headmaster of Littleton High School.

The present school year has been a prosperous one in many respects for Littleton High School. The enrollment has reached 223, the largest in the history of the school. Of this number few have left except for reason of removal from town. The scholarship average has been high, a fact that speaks well for the individual pupil, efficiency of teachers and co-operation of parents.

We have been very fortunate in having few changes in our teaching staff. I feel that the retaining of efficient teachers is the most vital factor in a good school system. We have indeed been fortunate in the selection of the two new teachers

to replace Miss Ricker and Mr. Kimball, and in the extra teacher made necessary by the increase in enrollment.

The morale and spirit of the school has been excellent. An attendance record to February 1, 1931 of 97.1 be-speaks a desire on the part of pupils to be in school. The average membership of the school to date has been 211.5. I believe that this will be somewhat larger next year. An increase in enrollment of ten to fifteen pupils however would not entail a larger teaching force, but would require an increase of equipment.

BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT

The high school building was put in excellent condition during the summer months and at the opening of school this fall it would have been hard to say that it had been in use for four years. The addition of the extra teacher has made it possible to do away with student proctors and has resulted in better care of the plant and equipment. Several very much needed and helpful pieces of equipment have been added. To the Manual Arts Department, a power grinder and speed drill, paid for by the work of boys for outside parties; to the Music Department a combination phonograph and radio, being paid for by the teachers and pupils. A new piano for this department is an urgent need. Filing equipment and equipment to teach filing is needed in the Commercial Department. A definite sum for reference books for the library should be appropriated each year.

SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Extra curriculum activities have been sponsored by the school as last year. The Senior play produced January 30 and 31, under the direction of Mrs. Wright, proved a very decided success.

Instrumental music under the direction of Mr. Wentworth has been continued. Combined orchestra concerts in Gorham, Groveton, Lancaster and Littleton were held last Spring. I would again recommend, when possible, that this work be

placed on the same basis as other work of the school, Mr. Wentworth retained two days and paid by the school district.

Mrs. Cushing replaced Miss McFague for vocal music and is doing an excellent piece of work. She has a boys' glee club of 35, a girls' glee club of 45, and a general chorus of the whole school, which for the first time in several years is working.

Debating last spring under the direction of Miss Fletcher resulted in four victories and no defeats.

Athletics are under the direction of Mr. Wright who has the cooperation and liking of the boys and girls. The control is with the Advisory Board as formerly. Financially, the association is in good shape. The following trial balance as of February 5 will serve to show the various activities of the school and their financial condition.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the fine spirit of cooperation manifested by all concerned with the welfare of the school.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Littleton:

I herewith present my third annual report of the progress and needs of the Littleton schools. Our total enrollment to date this year is 692, an increase of five pupils over last year's total. The Headmaster's report shows that this year's increase came in the high school which made it necessary to secure another teacher, furniture for another room, and books and supplies sufficient for thirty-five pupils, all of which added \$3,000.00 to the total expenditure for the current year. This extra was not provided for in the annual budget. The enrollment at North Littleton increased to 34 this year. Fifteen to twenty pupils representing all eight grades makes a maximum load for a rural teacher. We tried in every way for the first half year to expand our organization to accommodate the extra number but were unable to reach the standards for the different grades so were compelled to have a helping teacher for the remainder of the year. This will further increase the extra expense by \$400.00. The enrollment at Mann's Hill has been decreasing for the past four years. Last fall the number of children in that section was only seven; too few for a standard school. While the people there were anxious to keep their school open, they saw clearly that the best interests of the children were of first importance, and finally agreed to give transportation, to the village schools,

a fair trial. The results are proving satisfactory and unless the number of children increases to twelve or fifteen it will be much better to continue the present arrangement. In general transportation expenditure has increased during the past five years. This is partly due to the closing of Mann's Hill School which is really a decrease in total expenditure, transportation in this case being less than the cost of maintaining the school. More children are transported now than formerly and four new routes have been added. The cost per route has not increased. Transportation of school children is specifically provided for by state law. Any child of school age, residing two miles or more from the school, to which he is assigned by the school board, must be transported at the expense of the district.

The Littleton Union School District owns, at the present time, six buildings, three within the village limits and three outside. All except the high school have been in constant use for many years, hence the problem of alteration and maintenance to keep abreast of modern standards, is one of increasing difficulty. Our average expenditure for repairs and up-keep for the past five years is only \$1,450.00, less than \$250.00 per building per year. Regardless of cost our buildings are now in fair condition, but to maintain school property in harmony with the high standards of the town as a whole we shall be obliged to have a much larger annual allotment for general up-keep and improvements, \$2,000.00 to \$2,500.00 at least. Due to adjustments connected with exceptionally high fixed charges and a large prospective increase in pupil enrollment next year, we are not planning any improvements and only such repairs as are absolutely necessary.

The scholastic work has followed the progressive lines previously laid out and stabilized a year ago. The State Department of Education in cooperation with many teachers throughout the state, Littleton included, made up and adopted a new standard program of studies for elementary schools. While we have not been able on account of expense involved

in changing textbooks and other equipment to put the new improved program in operation, we believe it represents a decided forward step in educational procedure which the Littleton elementary schools should take as soon as extra money can be made available for the purpose.

At the end of the school year, June 1930, one of our teachers left to go into business, one was transferred from the primary to the music supervisory department, three were promoted to much more desirable positions both professionally and financially in New Hampshire, and three first class experienced teachers who had served an apprenticeship of five years in the Littleton schools went to Pennsylvania and Massachusetts positions paying \$400.00 per year more than we could offer. Five of our vacancies were filled by graduates of New Hampshire University and normal schools, class of 1930. The other vacancies were filled by teachers of one and more years of experience. It is needless to say that the number of changes listed above is far too many for any one year. The efficiency of the whole system is liable to be seriously impaired by too frequent changes in the teaching staff. One of the best remedies is an adequate salary schedule that provides for automatic increases up to a maximum for elementary teachers of \$1,500.00 per year instead of the present maximum of \$1,100.00. Our high school salaries while below the average for the state are proportionately higher than our elementary.

In closing I wish to commend all of our teachers and other helpers for their efficiency and faithfulness in the performance of their important duties. I especially appreciate the sympathetic interest and hearty cooperation of the school board. They have given freely and generously of their time and thought without compensation. This is a public service which I am sure is appreciated by all who are vitally interested in the Littleton schools.
