The State of New Hampshire

- To the Inhabitants of the Town of Milton in the County of Strafford, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, with polls not closing before seven of the clock in the afternoon, to act on the following subjects:
 - 1. To bring in your ballots for Town Officers.
- 2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) for repairing highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to pay for breaking roads and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for sidewalk construction and repair and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to oil and construct Church Street, so-called, and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of the Class II road known as Union to Farmington road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of two thousand one hundred ninety-four dollars (\$2,194.00).

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to oil hard surfaced streets, for the ensuing year.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00) to be expended on private roads leading from "New Bridge" road, so-called, to cottages.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Town charges and expenses and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the maintenance of hydrants in the Milton Fire Precinct.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) for the maintenance of the Fire Department for the ensuing year and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to pay the First and Second Engineers and Firemen in addition to the amount allowed by law; to see how much per hour the Town will vote to pay the engineers and firemen while fighting fires and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the purpose of maintenance of the fire engine in the Milton Mills Fire District.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed two thousand three hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,350.00) for the maintenance of street lights for the ensuing year.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) for Memorial Day expenses.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the benefit of the Free Public Library at Milton Mills and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire on notes of the Town a sum of money necessary to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes of 1942 and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to obtain W. P. A. and N. Y. A. Projects and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred forty-six dollars (\$146.00) to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 20. By petition of Roger J. Daviault and nine others: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to grade and oil School Street, so-called, in Milton Village, and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand six hundred twenty-eight dollars and ninety cents (\$1,628.90) and further to revise the vote of March 10, 1925, on article No. 12 so as to allow the selectmen to use the two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) with accrued interest towards reimbursing

the treasurer for the purchase of the grader in 1941, same to be paid back in 1943 and 1944 with bankable interest thus rescinding the authority given the selectmen in 1941 to borrow five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to pay for same. Should construction of state highway make repayment of sinking fund necessary before 1944, to see if town will vote to give the selectmen power to borrow on notes of the town to replace same and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

- 22. To see what rate per hour the town will charge for use of town equipment and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 23. During the emergency to determine the salaries, wages, and other compensation and allowances for all persons serving the town.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) to provide for additional fire protection due to the war emergency.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) to provide watchmen and additional police protection due to the war emergency.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the use of the town health officer and board of health due to the war emergency.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) for Parks and Playgrounds to be expended as follows: five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for lifeguard and maintenance of recreation area, fifty dollars (\$50.00) for garden plots in Milton and Milton Mills; one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) for skating rinks in Milton and Milton Mills and to pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

- 28. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 29. By petition: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be expended for permanent construction, on the road on Nute Ridge.
- 30. By petition of Cortez Willey and ten others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) towards reconstruct and oil the highway known as the Willey Road in Milton Mills Village, leading from the village to Sanbornville, and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 31. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to sell that portion of the Town Farm, consisting of the buildings and land situated on the easterly side of Route No. 16, for not less than two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of the Commissioners of the Milton Fire District

During the last year water systems of all types were called upon to meet unusual demands owing to the severe drought. We are pleased to report our practically new system withstood this test, showing no defects in supply or delivery. No restrictions were placed upon the amount of water used, and faucets were placed at the disposal of those living outside the Precinct and in need of water.

Three new services were installed: Ernest Dickson, Napoleon St. John and Roy Leavitt.

The Precinct tax of \$5.00 per thousand of previous years was lowered to \$4.00 reducing the income as compared with last year \$386.11. As we had no breaks or freezes we were able to retire \$1,500 of bonds, pay the interest on our bonded debt and interest on notes, and all current bills.

In connection with the National Emergency, all reasonable precautions have been taken against sabotage and attack by air, without expenditure of large sums.

Report of the Milton Mills Fire Commissioners

Because of rapidly increasing prices and scarcity of materials for the manufacture of fire hose the commissioners ordered, in September, 150 feet of $2^{1}/_{2}$ -inch double-jacket hose, which was paid for from the treasury. This will make a total of 1,000 feet of $2^{1}/_{2}$ -inch hose purchased new within the last two years, and dependable for use under pressure.

The commissioners recommend the purchase of 400 feet more of $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch hose. This will give the greatest length of hose at the least expense; also will make possible the use of two lines of hose at a greater distance from the source of water.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Milton:

I have the honor to make my eighth annual report. As usual the statistics are for the school year, 1940-1941, while my remarks include comments on the work of the present school year. The report of the Headmaster of Nute High School deserves your careful reading. If you refer to the statistical table you will note a slight increase in the enrollment. This is due to the admission of approximately twenty-five tuition pupils from Lebanon.

The teaching force remains the same with the addition of Miss Margaret M. Mathews, who devotes half of her time to teaching music in all the schools, going to Nute Ridge and Milton Mills each one-half day every two weeks. The remainder of the time is given to teaching in grade four. This arrangement is giving the Milton pupils good training in music and the salary paid is only about fifty dollars more than is collected from tuition pupils. Miss Mathews is a graduate of a four years' training at Lowell Teachers' College specializing in music.

Your teachers continue to show fine professional spirit. All elementary teachers and three from Nute High School have just completed a course of sixteen lectures on Remedial Reading, given by Dr. Donald Durrell of Harvard-Boston University Extension. This was given at Rochester High School. Your superintendent also took the course and we all found it very practical and helpful. I am sure that Milton pupils will be better readers because of better teaching. Your teachers have attended the meeting of the Strafford County Teachers' Association, two meetings of the teachers of this Union, No. 56, and the meeting of the

State Teachers' Association. Your superintendent also attended the meeting of the National Association of School Administrators held at Atlantic City in February, 1941, and the meeting of the National Teachers' Association held in Boston in July.

The tests used last year were the Metropolitan Achievement tests, given in January to all grades above the third. In late May the pupils of the eighth grade were given the Stanford Achievement tests. The teachers now begin to look forward to these standard tests as they prove to be helpful and usually encourage both pupil and teacher. Weak spots in teaching are discovered early in the year and time is devoted to eliminating the weaknesses.

A survey made of the graduates of Nute High School showed that every one of the boys who have graduated in the last two years from the so-called "Shop Course" or Trades and Industries has found employment for which this course had fitted him.

When Mr. Luther M. Preston decided not to return to Nute High we found it almost impossible to secure a qualified teacher since industry and the defense program were demanding them all at high wages. Just as we were about to despair Laconia decided to release one of its teachers owing to a decreased enrollment and we immediately secured his services. Mr. Laurent D. Bosse has continued the good work of his predecessors and we hope that he will continue with us. Mr. Bosse now devotes his whole time, six hours a day to teaching in the shop.

Miss Lurlene A. Gordon, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, was added to the staff as a science teacher. We believe that we have at Nute a school which is meeting the modern needs of the young citizens. We have not as yet materialized any plans for courses for adults or for use of the shop outside of school hours.

This year we are conducting the experiment of providing hot lunches at cost and this cost is very small. There are no facilities at the Grammar school for preparing cooked food so the preparation is done at the home of Mr. Samuel Blaisdell by Mrs. Bean. The WPA pays the entire expense of preparation and Mrs. Bean is given careful supervision from that office. The only stipulation is that the School District shall expend at least one-fifth as much as is paid for preparation and that those who cannot afford to pay for the lunch will be served free. The use of surplus products from the Surplus Commodities Distribution permits us to make the cost very low. Eight servings cost twenty-five cents.

The fire at the Grammar school could have been much worse. The loss would have been greater but for the good work of your firemen. Especial praise should be given to your janitor, Mr. Samuel Blaisdell. This man has used his car to run errands, to bring the hot lunch, and in many other ways helped us to save running up bills. Nobody but "Sam" can keep the old heating equipment doing its duty.

It is the dream of some of us to some day see the Grammar school enlarged so that the Manual Training and Home Economics with a modern set-up could be installed. This would also give added class room space and facilities for serving hot dishes prepared at the school. School lunches have probably entered the school to stay. If we cannot enlarge our present building a plan has been suggested whereby a kitchen can be installed in the basement of the present building and provision made for preparing lunches there. We advance this plan for your consideration.

We are doing what we can to improve the health conditions of our pupils but the results of the army tests for this war show us that still more must be done of we want sound minds in sound bodies. I have made no mention of the war but the schools are feeling the stress and strain of the times. The National Education Commission on the Defense of Democracy Through Education and a like committee of the National Association of Manufacturers, in joint meeting on December 5, 1941, adopted unanimously the following resolution which I quote, hoping that it may help you to keep your schools properly financed.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the administration and conduct of public education is an essential public service; that its reasonable financial support constitutes a necessary claim upon our American society to which other public services of lesser value should be subordinated.

Report of the Headmaster of Nute High School

To the Superintendent of Schools and Members of the Board of Trustees:

I hereby submit my third annual report of the Nute High School which opened its fifty-first year September 3, 1941, with an enrollment of 105 pupils. Eleven have withdrawn for the following reasons: 3 moved to another school district: 4 were not adapted to high school work; 3 went to work; and 1 because of poor health. Our membership of 94 on this date is divided as follows: post graduate, 1; seniors, 17; juniors, 20; sophomores, 24; freshmen, 32. Records show that during the years of World War I many pupils withdrew from schools before completing their secondary work. We in the school hope that this will not be condoned now, but on the other hand that our young people will be encouraged to remain in school to prepare themselves to be better qualified to serve their communities and country.

There has been one change and one addition to our teaching staff. Mr. Laurent Bosse, who teaches Trades and Industries, replaced Mr. Luther Preston; and Miss Lurlene Gordon was added to teach all the sciences and Latin. Enrollment in our Trades and Industries courses increased to such an extent that it became necessary to employ a full-time teacher for those courses alone, whereas in the previous years a part-time teacher was adequate.

The following new subjects have been added to this year's program of studies: General Science, Human Behavior, and Consumer Buying. Otherwise, the approved program is the same as last, except the following alternates are substituted: Physics for Chemistry, Geometry for Trigonometry nd Advanced Mathematics, Economic Problems for Sociology, the Home for the Family, Automotive Shop and Cabinet Making for Practical Mechanics, French II for French I, Latin I for Latin II. We are offering Art courses by correspondence from the University of Nebraska. Those pupils studying these courses under teacher supervision find them very much worth while and interesting. It is possible through this medium to add to our program at a reasonable cost many of those subjects for which special teachers are often necessary.

New equipment purchased this year includes: complete equipment for Automotive Shop, 1 Burroughs Adding Machine, 1 portable sanding machine, 1 microscope, additional Physics laboratory equipment, stapler, and supply of Philgas. New text books were purchased for the following classes: Bookkeeping, Junior Business Training, General Science, Human Behavior, Consumer Buying. Due to the increased enrollment of most of our classes it was necessary to purchase new books for nearly every class.

We are again this year taking advantage of the help offered by the National Youth Administration to aid needy pupils in school.

The results of the State tests are as follows: 1 test above the State average, 1 at the State average, and 1 test below the State average.

We are continuing our daily activities period. As this program progresses it becomes increasingly evident that our facilities are inadequate. We hope that after this period of world conflict or even during it that arrangements can be made to offer a complete program of health and physical education.

During the summer vacation and early in the fall the following improvements were made in the school: new rubber matting was laid on the stairs, new electrical switches were installed for all the lights in the building, new shades were hung where needed on all the windows, and an office was constructed in the hallway on the second floor.

The girls in the Home Economics classes are continuing to serve hot noon lunches. We are making use of supplies from the Surplus Marketing Administration.

At present we are making a survey of the town and the surrounding school districts which this school serves to determine the feasibility of offering out-of-school youths National Defense training classes to be given in the evenings. It is possible to offer four such classes, one at a time—woodworking, metal work, automotive and electrical.

Athletics have been self-supporting and it is hoped that there will be a surplus to purchase baseball uniforms for the boys and softball uniforms for the girls. We were admitted a member of the Southeastern League at its meeting last October. It is hoped that the rules of good sportsmanship and clean playing and the opportunity of making friends with the young people of other schools will prove a benefit to our boys and girls.

We in the school appreciate the helpful suggestions of our superintendent, Mr. Howard L. Winslow, and for the splendid cooperation we have received from the members of the Board of Trustees.
