AUGUSTUS E. LOCKE

1895 - 1956

The Town of Newton, on March 27, 1956, lost another former town official, Augustus E. Locke, who passed away after a long illness.

Gus, as he was known to all, was born in Newton, N. H., May 22, 1895. Married Alice L. Marshall. They had two daughters, Mrs. Geraldine Merceron, Groton, Conn., and Mrs. Arlene Williams of Newton, N. H., a son, Capt. Orville C. Locke, USMC, and a stepson, Russell Hunt.

He was very active in Police circles, having served as Police Chief of Newton, N. H., for 33 years. He had been turnkey at the Rockingham County House of Correction in Brentwood. Served as night police officer at Hampton Beach. Also as Selectman for five years.

At one time he owned and operated a garage at Newton Jct., N. H. For the past 13 years he conducted a real estate business from his home.

He was a Past Councilor of the Kingston and Newton Jr. O.U.-A.M.; a member of Twilight Lodge, I.O.O.F.; Granite State Grange; Newton Junction Firemen's Association and the Rockingham County Law Enforcement Association.

Gus was a good and faithful servant to all. He was always ready to help and assist those in need of knowledge in Town affairs and Police work. Therefore, to this public citizen who dedicated his life of service to Town and County, we are all most grateful for what he has accomplished. To his family this should make them feel it was not all in vain. May his soul rest in peace for a job well done.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Newton on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear reports of Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or through Old Age Assistance; or any other property of the Town not used for public purposes.
6. On petition of the Newton Volunteer Fire Company and ten legal voters of Newton: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the completion of the new fire house being constructed on land acquired by the Town from Wilbur Sargent.

7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint a committee of three to work with the Selectmen and Fire Chief in regard to the matter of purchasing a Combination Fire Truck, not necessarily a new one, to replace the Reo at Newton Junction which is thirty-two years old.

8. On recommendation of the Committee appointed by the Moderator in regard to painting the Town Hall: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum, not to exceed \$4,000.00, to paint the exterior of the Town Hall.

9. On petition of A. Mabelle Warner and ten legal voters of Newton: To see if the Town will vote to have a committee of five voters, appointed by the Moderator, to survey and lay out the burial lots in the new part of Highland Cemetery and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thirty-five Dollars (\$135.00) to cover the cost of same.

10. On petition of ten or more legal voters of Newton: To see if the Town will vote a policy of segregation for town meeting. Eligible voters to be segregated from non-voters with verification by check list upon entering the meeting.

11. On petition of ten or more legal voters of Newton: To see if the Town will vote to fill the office of Fire Chief by popular vote, rather than by appointment.

12. On petition of ten or more legal voters of Newton: To see if the Town will vote to make the offices of Constable and Chief of Police one elected office.

13. On petition of ten or more legal voters of Newton: To see if the Town will vote to have a two-way radio, purchased with the Harris Fund for the Police Dept., installed in the car of the Chief of Police each year.

14. On petition of ten or more legal voters of Newton: To see if the Town will vote to hold Town Meetings in two sessions. First session: Article one (1) Election of Officers on second Tuesday in March as prescribed by law. Second session: Article two (2) and all subsequent articles to be

held the following evening starting at 8:00 P.M., second Wednesday in March.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING

NEWTON, N. H.

March 13, 1956

The meeting was called to order at 8:15 p.m. by the moderator, Clifford R. Bryer. He called on the Rev. Robert Aspinwall to open the meeting with prayer. It was moved that we observe a moment of silence in memory of Hayden E. Cheney, and A. Ralph Estabrook, who had passed away during the last year, and this was done.

Article 1: To choose the necessary town officers for the year ensuing — The moderator read the results of the balloting.

It was then voted that all officers not elected by ballot be appointed by the board of selectmen.

Article 2: On motion of Everett Coombs, for the Finance Committee, it was voted to accept the list of estimated expenditures for the ensuing year 1956, appearing on page 10 of the 1955 Town Report, excluding the item of School Taxes — as the Town Budget for the year 1956; and the raising and appropriation of an amount necessary to cover the same.

Article 3: The moderator called for a report of the committee appointed to obtain estimates on painting the Town Hall. The following report was read by Ralph Marden — “We received two estimates from the following: Hoyt Decorating Service of Amesbury & Merrimac, Mass., \$1600. Albert Roy of Amesbury, Mass., \$4600. The above estimates are for outside painting only. The committee feels that it would not be practical to paint the inside until the ceiling has been repaired.”

The moderator then called for a report of the committee appointed to investigate conditions in the cemeteries. The following report was given: “Insofar as we can find, all sales of lots in the Cemeteries are recorded in the books of the Cemetery Trustees. The lot which was under ques-

tion was paid for, the money turned in to the Town Treasurer. This money was turned back, by action of a previous Town Meeting to the Cemetery Trustees. From what we can find out we think that the Cemetery Trustees should tighten up on their organization and work closer together."

This committee presented a motion that "To all that have purchased lots and the purchase recorded, or to those who can show receipts for purchase of lots not recorded, shall be given deeds to the said lots". After discussion this motion was not carried, and on motion of F. Cust it was voted that we lay it on the table indefinitely.

The second motion made by the committee was "That the Cemetery Trustees shall from now on be the only ones to sell lots and receive money for said lots. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of the same by one designated member of the Cemetery Trustees." This was a vote.

On motion of E. Coombs for the Finance Committee, it was voted that reports of Town Officers be accepted as printed in the Town Report.

Article 4: On motion of W. Nyberg it was voted to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5: It was voted to authorize the selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or through Old Age Assistance; or any other property of the Town not used for public purposes.

Article 6: On a motion made by the Finance Committee it was voted to rescind the action taken on articles six and seven at the Town Meeting of March 8, 1955, in regard to a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Building Code and Safety Ordinance as recommended by the committee appointed for that purpose. Carl Shaw explained parts of the code drawn up as presented in the booklet sent out to each voter. He made a motion that we accept this report of the committee on Building Code and Safety

Ordinances, as read and presented in the booklet. The motion was seconded, and after discussion the moderator called for the vote by show of hands, and it was a vote.

Article 8: It was voted to install a street light and maintain same near the residence of Ada Fowler.

A letter was read from Mr. Webber to the Town Clerk in regard to the street lighting survey for last year.

Article 9: On motion of N. Sawyer it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500. for the construction of a new fire house, on land acquired by the Town from Wilbur Sargent.

Article 10: Regarding permitting Beano — this has already been acted upon in the polling.

Article 11: To see if the Town will grant the use of the Town Hall to any organization within the Town, in either the upper or lower hall without charge, etc.: W. Nyberg made a motion that this article be accepted as printed, and the motion was seconded.

W. Nyberg then made an amendment to the motion "To see if the Town will grant the free use of the Town Hall for rehearsals only to any organization within the Town in either the upper or lower hall." The amendment was not passed. After discussion, the original motion was put to vote, but was not passed.

Article 12: On motion of Lloyd Ingalls it was voted that the committee on painting the Town Hall be reappointed.

On motion of Mr. Mahan it was voted that the moderator appoint a new committee to investigate lighting in the Town.

The moderator thanked committees he appointed for the fine work done. At 10:40 p.m. it was voted to adjourn.

The following officers were sworn in by the Town Clerk: Lloyd Ingalls, Kenneth Briggs, Augusta Kimball, N. Sawyer, E. O. Kelly, Ralph Bowen, and Mabelle Warner.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Newton qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the twenty-first day of March 1957, at six o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary School District Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies.

5. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

6. To see what sum, not to exceed \$6,000, the district will vote to raise and appropriate to provide and equip an

additional classroom at the Memorial School, including a teacher's salary.

7. To see if the district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to the school custodian and the school lunch workers, the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$62.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

8. To see what sum the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of assisting the Parent-Teacher Association in carrying on the School Lunch Program.

9. To see what sum, not to exceed \$2,000, the district will vote to raise and appropriate for widening and hot-topping the driveway at the Memorial School and make an area for parking and a truck entrance to the kitchen door from the rear of the building.

10. To see what sum, not to exceed \$500, the district will vote to raise and appropriate to hot-top an apron in front of the entrance to the Rowe's Corner School and to gravel the area behind the Village School.

11. To see if the district will authorize the school board to spend an amount not to exceed \$600 of unanticipated tuition receipts toward current expenses for 1956-57.

12. To see if the district will vote to petition the State Board of Education to become a part of a cooperative school district for the education of the secondary school children (grades seven through twelve) with other districts in the area, including the districts of Kingston, Plaistow, Danville, Brentwood, or any two of the districts in addition to the school district of Newton.

13. If the preceding article is adopted, to see if the district will elect two representatives to serve on an interim committee who shall prepare a financial budget for the operation of the proposed cooperative school district, and to include in the organization warrant an article calling for an

appropriation for the proposed cooperative school district during the first year and such other items of business as need to be acted upon at the organization meeting.

14. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

**Records of Special School Meeting of the School District
of the Town of Newton, April 2, 1955**

The meeting was opened at 8:00 P.M. by the Moderator, Clifford R. Bryer, and the special school warrant was read.

Asbra Harmon read a letter he had received from the Attorney General's Office, in Concord, New Hampshire, as to the legal rights of the moderator in stating at the previous school meeting that he would not accept a motion to pass over the article on the new school building. Mr. Harmon also quoted Atty. George R. Scammon, town counsel, to the effect that if seven voters, one after another, made a motion to pass over the article, and the moderator refused to accept any of these motions, it would be illegal. The moderator stated that any moderator of a meeting has a right to state his policy at the beginning of the meeting, and then it can be put up to a vote of the legal voters if any disagree with him.

After further discussion, a motion was made by Ellery Atwood that the body of voters reconsider first the action taken on Article 11 at the Annual School Meeting. The moderator stated that according to rules, the sponsor of such a motion must have been in favor of the original motion. Mr. Atwood did not state whether or not he had been in favor of the motion but said he had a right to make the motion.

William Foley made a motion that we vote by ballot to reconsider the previous Article 11, but withdrew this motion upon request from the moderator.

After further discussion, the motion made by Ellery Atwood was put to a vote by a verbal "yes" and "no". The moderator then stated that as there seemed to be a question as to which vote had won, that the motion would be

put to a paper ballot. The results of the paper ballot were: Number of votes cast — 106; Yes 49, No 56, Mismarked 1, and this motion was defeated.

The Moderator then proceeded to go on to Article 1 of the Special School Warrant.

1. "To determine the preferred site of the voters of the district, as to the location of the new school."

The meeting was then thrown open to discussion. Stanley Cheney asked if the people who had signed the petition would state their reasons for so doing. Several of the signers spoke, giving their reasons.

Many of the voters stated their ideas on the different lots of land, with questions addressed to the School Board being answered by John Fenn, Chairman. Mr. Fenn stated that the Colby land had been withdrawn by the owner.

A letter was read from the State Department of Health and Sanitation, by John Fenn, concerning the water on the different lots of land in question.

William Halliday asked the School Board if there had been any other bids on the building of the school other than Currier, that he thought it customary to put the building out for bids. John Fenn replied that the School Board had not done this because they had checked the schools built by Currier in Sandown and Kensington and found the price reasonable; that by using the plans already drawn they saved on the Architect's fees; and that they doubted if any other firm would be able to underbid Currier.

Ellery Atwood stated that he had a letter from Mr. Simonds to A. Pasquale & Sons, Haverhill, concerning the building of the school, saying, "We are not letting anyone figure it because the ground was still full of frost". Mr. Atwood asked if the reason Simonds did not want Pasquale to figure it was because the School Board would not let it out for bid. On being asked to show the letter and read it, Mr. Atwood stated that he would have to get it from Pasquale in Haverhill.

After further discussion John Fenn made a motion that the voters vote by ballot for the four sites not including the Colby land that appear on the ballot, and that this vote shall be taken until a majority be reached. This motion was put to a vote with the following results: Number of votes cast — 102; Mismarked 3, Adams 6, Kershaw 36, Nichols 1, Webster 56, with the result that the Webster land in Newton Junction was chosen.

Motion made by Robert Rowe and seconded that the meeting be adjourned at 10:55 P.M.

The meeting was opened at 6:00 P.M. by the Moderator, Clifford R. Bryer, for balloting. The polls were closed at 8:00 P.M. and the business meeting was opened with the invocation offered by the Rev. Robert Aspinwall of the First Christian Church at 8:30 P.M.

Article 1: By Australian Ballot the following officers were elected: Moderator, Clifford R. Bryer; Clerk, Barbara R. Morse; Treasurer, Otis R. Rowell; School Board Member for three years, John F. Swasey, Jr.; School Board Member for one year, John A. Fenn; Auditors, Everett E. Coombs and Everett O. Kelly.

Article 2: "To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto." John Fenn reported that the minutes of the Special Meeting of April 2, 1955 had been left out of the Town Report by error. He read the minutes of this

meeting and made a motion that they should appear in the next Town Report. It was so voted.

On motion of Everett E. Coombs all other reports were accepted as printed in the Town Report.

Article 3: "To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant." John Fenn moved and it was so voted that all officers, etc., not elected, be appointed by the School Board as needed.

Article 4: On motion by Everett E. Coombs the School Board was authorized to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for the educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies.

Article 5: On motion by Everett E. Coombs the budget was accepted as printed in the Town Report, with the exception of Item 6, Teachers' Salaries; Item 16, Transportation; Item 20, Insurance; and Item 23, Equipment. These four items were acted on separately and individually as follows: Item 6, On motion of Ellery Atwood, accepted as printed. Item 16, On motion of Ralph Bean, accepted as printed. Paper ballots were requested with the following results: 40 yes, 24 no and 1 not marked. Item 20, On motion of Ellery Atwood, accepted as printed. Item 23, On motion of Ellery Atwood, accepted as printed.

Article 6: On motion of Everett E. Coombs the School Board was authorized to raise and appropriate \$425.00 for shingling the roof and making other repairs at the Village School.

Article 7: On motion of Ellery Atwood the School Board was authorized to raise and appropriate not more than \$2,000.00 for grading around the Newton Memorial School. In response to inquiry, John Fenn estimated \$2,000.00 would cover the cost of grading, spreading topsoil, grass seed, and hot-topping the driveway. John Fenn reported that Ralph Bean had offered to make and donate the flag pole for the school yard.

Article 8: On motion of Everett E. Coombs the School Board was authorized to raise and appropriate not more than \$750.00 to assist the Parent-Teachers Association in carrying on the School Lunch Program.

Article 9: It was voted to adjourn at 10:00 P.M.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

January, 1957

To the School Board and Citizens of Newton:

I am presenting herewith my First Annual Report as Superintendent of your schools. I would like to say that even though I have been on the job only a short time I have found a very friendly and cooperative school board, interested in the welfare of the children and anxious to provide a good school system.

You have experienced and capable teachers who are doing their work well. They have also been most friendly and helpful to me.

Speaking further about teachers, I can't emphasize too strongly the importance of good teachers in the classroom. It is most essential that we keep our good teachers and hire the best qualified teachers available when new teachers are added to the system. Progress in education is made because the pupil has a good teacher. It is essential that the salaries we pay our teachers keep pace with the average salary paid by comparable communities or the education of our children will suffer. Unfortunately there is a great shortage of teachers and the competition is keen. Naturally the towns who can pay and will pay better salaries will get the best candidates. The towns who will not face reality will get "second-rate" candidates.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional organizations and have attempted to keep abreast of modern practices by attendance at local and state teachers' meetings and by taking courses when possible.

Four teachers are currently taking the Child Growth and Development Course taught by Dr. Wylie from Har-

vard-BU Extension College. They are Miss Kalashian, Mrs. Knowles, Mrs. MacAskill and Mrs. Boyd.

Mr. Robert Dolph, the helping teacher for Supervisory Union No. 55, is acting as a consultant to the teachers of Newton and his work has proven most valuable. He is supervising the testing, evaluating the program and making recommendations for the books to be used in the classrooms. A new arithmetic series has been instigated and the new social studies series started last year has been continued. The basic reading series has been completed. This makes it possible for continuity of the same subject field in all grades, which is more advantageous.

Mr. Dolph has edited a teachers' handbook and a copy has been given to each teacher which has proven most helpful.

Major repair items this year have been the grading and the landscaping around the Memorial School and repairing the roof of the Village School.

Fire extinguishers have been added to all school buildings and telephones for all schools are now a reality.

This year for the first time transportation expenses were paid for all students under 14 years of age attending high school.

For next year it will be necessary to partition and equip the extra room in the Memorial building to provide for the increased enrollment. According to school enrollment figures there would be fifty-six pupils in grades 5 and 6 in Mr. Michitson's room and thirty-nine pupils in grades 7 and 8 in Miss Kalashian's room. This would be extremely unwise and by completing the extra room we would have three classes approximating thirty-three pupils in each room. This is a more workable and standard size for better results.

In order to have ready access to the kitchen of the Memorial building from the outside, to simplify the hot lunch program, some grading should be done to the rear of the building. This might allow also for an adequate parking area during school time and for evening affairs.

It is recommended also that the front drive be widened and hot-topped to complete the very fine building that you have erected.

It seems advisable to replace the water pump at the Rowe's Corner School because it is impossible to get clear water under the present conditions.

Yard conditions at the Rowe's Corner School would be improved by the addition of a hot-top apron in front of the door. This would help during the muddy season.

Modern movable furniture should be provided in the grade 2 room at the Rowe's Corner School and one-half room at the first floor of the Village School and we then will have modern movable furniture in all our schools in all rooms.

Principals' reports to the Superintendent as of December 1956, summarize some of the more unusual and supplemental school activities for the past year as follows:

Miss Kalashian reports that the usual athletic activities of students were continued, several interesting field trips were taken and the visit of the state bookmobile was made at regular intervals.

Visual aids of all types were used to supplement the teaching.

Eighth grade graduation exercises were held at the Town Hall on June 18th. Twenty-one members of the 1956 class were graduated. This was the largest graduating class in the history of our school.

The Sons of the American Revolution awarded a Good Citizenship Medal to Gloria Torrey, a member of the 1956 graduating class. This award is made annually to one who, in the opinion of teachers and classmates, has best exemplified the principles of good citizenship.

Newton graduates were doubly honored when Carolyn Crowell and Gloria Torrey respectively won the first and second awards presented by the American Legion of Plaistow for the best essays written on "What the American

Flag Means to Me". Eighth grade pupils of Newton, Plaistow, Atkinson, Hampstead and Danville usually compete in this annual contest.

For the first time this year the Kingston and Newton children of grades 6-8 participated in a 4-H essay and poster contest. Again we were honored with the following awards. First and second prizes in the essay contest went to William Allen and James Foy. Likewise first and second awards in the poster contest were won by John Jameson and Gail Merrifield.

Mrs. Knowles reports for the Rowe's Corner School that the many and varied extra-curricular activities — including field trips and various projects sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Association, were carried on as usual.

She spoke of the cooperation of the fire department in demonstrating to the children how the fire engine worked and commented on the Savings Stamps program, bookmobile, hot lunches, milk program and the audio-visual program all having been successful.

Mrs. Boyd reports for the Village School that the usual field trips and extra-curricular activities were held. She commented on the fact that having single grades makes it possible to give more attention to the individual child.

She was pleased at the interest of the parents and friends who visited the school during American Education Week.

I am a firm believer in having "Open House" to allow the parents to visit school and talk with the teacher. There is no better way to help a child in school than to have occasionally a parental conference. This can be done also very effectively at Parent-Teacher meetings.

Miss Gwendolyn Curtis continues her excellent work as school nurse-teacher for Newton. I have found her very interested in the problems of the children and she is always willing to make a "home visit" and I know these visits are appreciated. Miss Curtis offers the following comments about her work:

"The School Health Program consists of a yearly medical examination of grades 1, 4, 8 and new students. Notice of defects found are sent to parents. A successful "follow-up" program has been carried out with the help of parents, clinics and the School Health Program. This year the Newton children received the Vollmer patch test from the T.B. nurse from Portsmouth.

"All children receive a hearing and visual test with the same cooperative "follow-up" work through the parents, school and organizations when needed. Cursory Examinations are done at the beginning of the school year and after each vacation period by the nurse-teacher. Each child is checked yearly with the "Wood Lamp" for scalp ring-worm as a precautionary measure. Color Perception Tests are done in the fifth grade yearly. Home visits, audio-visual programs, pre-school registrations, conferences with principals and teachers as well as parents are frequent during the year. The nurse attends teacher and nurse conferences and regional institutes during the year for a better health program.

"We wish to thank local organizations, who through their interest and cooperation, have contributed to the success of our school health program.

"I wish at this time to thank all those who helped me this past year and to extend my appreciation."

Mr. Warren Freeman, coordinator of music activity in Supervisory Union 55, has undertaken a new program of music in each of the four towns served. He makes the following comments:

"In Newton, Mrs. Joan White carries on a vocal program with weekly visits to each of the three schools. A regular program of instrumental instruction is to begin on Tuesday, January 8, under Mr. Robert Zeigner's direction. Instrumental lessons will be provided at no charge for pupils from grades five through eight.

"Plans for the balance of the year include the development of a spring music festival in each town which will

utilize most of the boys and girls in the vocal classes and the combined instrumental groups from each of the four towns in the union.”

I have prepared charts to cover the organization of Union No. 55, charts of the census, enrollment figures for elementary and high school and the school calendar.

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support and cooperation of the Newton Parent-Teachers Association, the Garden Club and other civic groups.

In closing I wish to thank the school board, teachers and children for their cooperation in making our work successful.
