SUMMARY OF ACTION TAKEN ON ARTICLES IN

1977 TOWN WARRANT

The 1977 Town Meeting was opened by Moderator Robert Johnson at 10 A.M. on Saturday, March 12, 1977. The meeting was held at Coe-Brown Northwood Academy.

1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,000. for an incinerator, or another method of refuse disposal, together with the necessary building and associated equipment and authorize the issuance of notes upon the credit of the Town for all of the sum so raised and appropriated. The note term to be five years, with annual payments of \$30,000. plus interest.

Harold Lester amended the Article to read "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$80,000 dollars for the purpose of producing a solid waste disposal program, \$2,000. to be used together with the Towns of Stratham, Greenland, Newfields, Newmarket, Newington, Madbury, Lee, Durham, Barrington and University of New Hampshire for a feasibility study, \$3,000. to be used to equip a recycling program and the remaining \$75,000. to be placed in a savings account until a final method of disposal is approved by the Town of Northwood.

A hand vote on the amendment gave 156 in favor; 0 not in favor. Amended Article passed.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

A motion was made and seconded that the sum of \$86,615.00 be raised and appropriated. Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for interest on same.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,425.00 for the Northwood Public Libraries.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,400.00 for Recreation, Parks and Playgrounds.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00 for the care of Cemeteries.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Highways.

Motion made and seconded to raise the sum of \$58,500.00; \$30,000.00 for summer maintenance, \$25,000.00 for winter maintenance and \$3,500.00 for general expenses of Highway Department. Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

8. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify that section of Bow Street between the residence of Mrs. Dorothy Pease and the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Reckard, from a Class 6 highway to a Class 5 highway. (By Petition)

Article adopted by hand vote: Yes - 90 No - 0.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the repair of that section of Bow Street between the residence of Mrs. Dorothy Pease and the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Reckard, that sum to be spent on the relocation of the road within the right-of-way, including drainage and the reconstruction of the bridge within that distance. (By Petition)

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the gravel road leading from the Northerly side of Route 202 to the land of Mrs. Helen Pierce (Priest). The road has been built according to town regulations. It is 50' wide and properly guttered and needs no work done to it at the present time. (By Petition)

Motion made by Eleanor Pinkham to indefinitely postpone this Article was defeated by hand vote: Yes - 4 No - 70. Article was passed as written by affirmative voice vote.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 for the purpose of Street Lighting.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$670.45 for the purpose of Town Road Aid, the State's share to be \$4,469.65.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$648.00 for the Concord Hospital.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,250.00 for Ambulance Service, to be paid to the Center Barnstead Fire Department.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,490.75 for the Town's per capita share of the Rural District Health Council.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of increasing the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

17. To see if the Town will vote to establish a home separation program wherein glass, cans, newsprint, cardboard, metal and other refuse will be deposited in separate containers at the Town Disposal Area.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

18. To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$1,000.00 from the revenue of the Municipal Court to a Capital Reserve Fund for replacement of Highway Safety Equipment.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for maintenance of the Town Dump.

A motion to amend the sum of money to \$6,000.00 was defeated by a vote of Yes - 23 No - 59. A motion to amend the sum of money to \$8,000.00 was passed by a vote of Yes - 60 No - 25. Amended Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to purchase a Police Radar Unit, the State to contribute the sum of \$1,000.00 from their Crime Prevention Program. (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.)

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 for the Northwood Rescue Squad.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for pick-up appraisals by the State of New Hampshire.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay the salary and expense of the Supervisor of the Summer Program for Economically Disadvantaged Youths (S.P.E.D.Y.).

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

24. To see if the Town will vote to receive and spend up to \$4,000.00 from Rockingham-Strafford Manpower Administration for the S.P.E.D.Y. Program.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the continuing treatment of the Berry Elm for Dutch Elm Disease and perform any necessary tree surgery.

Article adopted by a hand vote of Yes - 58 No - 44.

26. To see if the Town will vote to join the Strafford Regional Planning Commission and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,818.00 for dues.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of supporting the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center.

Article adopted by a hand vote: Yes - 56 No - 22.

28. To see if the Town will vote to spend the remainder of the appropriated monies of the Northwood American Revolutionary Bicentennial Committee and other unspent funds of the Committee (totaling \$152.67) to plant additional maple trees on the Town Parade, selection and planting to be under the supervision of the County Forester.

Article was amended by Donald Post to read "... maple or other variety of trees as recommended by the County Forester", and Marion Knox added "... if additional funds should be needed, that they come from the 1973 Northwood Bicentennial Trust Fund income". Twice amended article was adopted by affirmative voice vote. Walter Fiander presented Robert A. Low with the unexpended funds of the Northwood American Revolutionary Bicentennial Committee.

29. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for projects of the Northwood Conservation Commission, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to initiate this fund.

Ellis Ring moved to indefinitely postpone this article as the Conservation Commission does not want to establish the fund at this time. Article postponed by voice vote.

30. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Northwood Conservation Fund under the provisions of R.S.A. 36-A, as amended, to receive monies given to the Town for conservation purposes and the residues of each succeeding year's Conservation Commission budgetary allowances as provided therein, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

31. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to appoint an individual to the position of Working Public Works Supervisor on a part-time basis as work demands necessitate. (By Petition)

Robert Bailey moved that this article be indefinitely postponed. Article postponed by voice vote.

32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make tests for sewage pollution in the lakes and ponds of Northwood and make corrective recommendations to the State Water Pollution Board. (By Petition)

Article postponed indefinitely by voice vote.

33. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$4,993.12 for the Preservation of Town Records including a Reader-Printer, and authorize the withdrawal of \$4,993.12 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

34. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$1,654.00 for a copier and authorize the withdrawal of \$1,654.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

35. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$12,000.00 for an addition to the Ridge Fire House and authorize the withdrawal of \$12,000.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property of the Town acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds as a result of Tax Sale.

Article adopted by affirmative voice vote.

37. To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

Because people had trouble hearing, it was requested that the public address system be put in proper working order prior to next year's Town Meeting.

There being no other business the meeting was adjourned as of 3:30 P.M.

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Northwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Coe-Brown Northwood Academy in said Northwood on Saturday the 18th day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 for an incinerator, or another method of solid waste disposal, together with the necessary building and associated equipment and authorize the issuance of notes upon the credit of the Town for all of the sum so raised and appropriated. The note term to be fifteen (15) years, with annual payments of \$7,541.00 plus interest.

2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into the agreement attached to the end of this Warrant entitled, "Agreement for Formation of Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative" for the purpose of disposing of the solid waste generated by the cooperating towns and for the recovery of energy in the most economical and efficient manner. The agreement set forth herein is intended to provide, under state statute, for the joining of towns in a cooperative effort for the disposal of solid waste in a manner that will meet Federal and State requirements.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,835.00 as its 1978 share of the capital costs with interest for the construction of an incinerator and energy recovery facilities as set forth in Article 2, and to take such other actions as may be necessary as shall be in the best interest of all members of the Cooperative, and to allow the Selectmen to accept Federal or State and other grants that may be available to the Town in providing its share in the project.

4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for interest on same.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,550.00 for the Northwood Public Libraries.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,700.00 for Parks and Playgrounds.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,885.00 for the care of Cemeteries.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Highways.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,800.00 for the purpose of Street Lighting.
11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,563.83 for the purpose of Town Road Aid, the State's share to be \$3,968.55 and the Town's share to be \$595.28.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$541.00 for the Concord Hospital.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$375.00 for Northwood Conservation Commission expenses.
25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Northwood Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1977 appropriation (\$240.)

said funds to be placed in a special Northwood Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5.

26. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for addition to the special Northwood Conservation Fund in accordance with the RSA 36-A:5.

27. To see if the Town will vote to remove the so-called Deslaurier Lot on Saddleback Mountain, of 31.2 acres, more or less, bounded and described as follows: southerly by the Town of Deerfield line, easterly by land now or formerly of E. Davis, Northerly by land now or formerly of Inland Acres, Inc., and westerly by land now or formerly of R. C. Batchelder, now on the Selectmen's list of Town-owned lands to be sold for taxes, so that it no longer shall be upon said list, but to be held for Town purposes, including recreation, wildlife, conservation and timber-growing purposes, still under control of the Board of Selectmen, or take any other action relative thereto. (By Petition)

28. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Administration Study Committee composed of seven (7) members, one to be selected by the Moderator, one by the Selectmen, one by the Budget Committee, one by the School Committee, one by the Planning Board, one by the Conservation Commission and one by the Variance Board, all to be selected by April 1, 1978, to elect their own chairman and secretary from among themselves, to determine whether the Town should utilize an administrator assistant or a shared administrator assistant, recommend any other changes in the existing Town organization they determine of benefit to the Town, hold hearings and information meetings or combinations thereof to inform the voters on these subjects, and render a written report with their recommendations to the Selectmen by October 1, 1978 who shall in turn prepare any recommended Article for the 1979 Warrant, or take any other action relative thereto. (By Petition)

29. To see if the Town will vote to limit the pay of the Selectmen to one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) annually and limit the pay of the Chairman of the Board to fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) annually, or take any other action relative thereto. (By Petition)

33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the repair of that section of Upper Deerfield Road between the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Christopher Mello and the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Grondin. (By Petition)

34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to support the Family Center and Children's Village. (By Petition)

35. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 for the purpose of modifying the Town Hall to satisfy fire and insurance regulations as well as provide office space for town officers, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

36. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the purpose of constructing a parking lot at the Elementary School and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

37. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purpose of installing acoustical tile in the Elementary School gymnasium and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

38. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing communications equipment for the Northwood Fire Department, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

39. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of installing new storm windows and insulation at the Northwood Narrows and East Northwood Fire Houses, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

40. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of purchasing communications equipment for the Northwood Rescue Squad, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

41. We petition the Town of Northwood to continue maintaining the roads involved in said area, better known as Cole's development. In the definition of maintaining roads, let it be brought to the attention of the Road Maintenance Department, that summer grading and hole filling etc., can and will be accomplished by the signers of this petition. The main object is snow plowing and when necessary sanding, which must be brought to your attention, that in spite of a rough winter, sanding was only necessary twice. I, for one would not have put my life's savings, to

make a home here if I had not been led to believe that I would be plowed. I, and I am sure all of the people involved, believe that getting no other service for our taxes, should at least get plowed. The irony of this situation is that a percentage of our tax money is allotted to fire department and police department, etc., how, if ever the need arises, can we receive any help from services if they cannot get into the area. We believe that three miles of snow plowing is a good investment by the town.

42. To see if the Town will vote to require the Selectmen to establish a policy of publicly advertising in at least two (2) local newspapers, and obtaining a minimum of three (3) bids in writing, for all services, materials, and equipment needed by the Town which cost in excess of \$200.00. Also, to establish a policy that local businesses providing such services, materials, and equipment be directly notified and to have first consideration.
 (By Petition)

43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the town sander and loader to the highest bidder.

44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property of the Town acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds as a result of Tax Sale.

45. To see if the Town will vote to recess the Town Meeting to reconvene at the call of the Selectmen for the purpose of taking whatever action is necessary or indicated by the Rockingham County Solid Waste Study to enable the Town to meet its solid waste disposal needs in conformity with existing laws and regulations.

46. To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

If the above articles have not been completely acted upon by 5 P.M. on March 18, 1978, the meeting will be adjourned to 10 A.M. on March 25, 1978.

The following "Agreement for Formation of Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative" is the agreement referred to in Article 2.

AGREEMENT FOR FORMATION OF LAMPREY REGIONAL
SOLID WASTE COOPERATIVE

WHEREAS, the municipalities to this Agreement have the duty to provide for the disposal of solid waste generated within their respective territories; and

WHEREAS, the municipalities to this Agreement have determined that it will be a more efficient use of their powers and to their mutual advantage to enter into this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the municipalities to this Agreement are authorized to enter into said Agreement pursuant to the New Hampshire Intergovernmental Agreements Act, RSA 53-A;

NOW, THEREFORE, the municipalities of Barrington, Durham, Greenland, Lee, Madbury, Newfields, Newington, Newmarket, Northwood, Rollinsford, Stræfford and Stratham for and in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements hereinafter stated and the performance therefor, do hereby promise and agree as follows:

ARTICLE I

PURPOSES

The purposes of this Agreement are to provide for the efficient and economic disposal of solid waste generated within the territories of the municipalities joining in this Agreement, to provide for the recovery and sale of energy, and to provide for the recovery and sale of by-products from the disposal of solid waste.

ARTICLE II

ORGANIZATION

The municipalities joining in this Agreement do hereby associate together for the purpose of forming the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative to administer and operate a solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility.

ARTICLE III

ADOPTION OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall not take effect with respect to the municipalities signing this Agreement unless all of the following occur:

A. The terms of this Agreement conform to the specific requests of the Attorney General, provided that the failure of the Attorney General to approve of this Agreement within thirty days of its submission for review shall constitute approval thereof as provided in RSA 53-A:3V.

B. This Agreement has been filed with the Clerk of each municipality voting to approve it and with the Office of the Secretary of State.

C. The combined capital authorization of the municipalities voting to adopt this Agreement at the 1978 annual meeting amounts to \$2,420,000; provided that the vote of each municipality to adopt this Agreement and appropriate a pro-rata share of the initial capital investment shall be deemed to continue until July 1, 1978.

D. In the event the combined capital authorization of the municipalities voting to approve of this Agreement at the 1978 annual meetings does not amount to \$2,420,000. this Agreement shall be adopted as follows:

1. The Boards of Selectmen of the municipalities voting to adopt this Agreement and voting to appropriate a pro-rata share of the capital cost of the facility, shall each appoint a director to serve on a provisional board which shall exist until no later than July 1, 1978.

The provisional board shall have the limited authority to

(a) solicit the membership of additional municipalities to the Cooperative;

(b) to determine the pro-rata capital contribution and net operating contribution of new members; and

(c) to assess municipalities a pro-rata share of the legal, administrative, and consulting costs associated with the formation of the Cooperative even though the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility is not constructed.

2. A municipality or municipalities shall be invited to join the Cooperative subject to such terms and conditions as decided by a majority of the provisional board.

3. If this Agreement is approved by a majority vote of the legislative body of the municipality seeking admission to the Cooperative, said municipality shall become a member of the Cooperative subject to all the provisions of this Agreement, any amendments thereto and such further conditions as imposed by the provisional board.

4. As soon as the combined capital authorization of the municipalities approving this Agreement no later than July 1, 1978 amounts to \$2,420,000, then an organizational meeting of the directors of the respective municipalities shall be convened and the process of financing the cost of construction and the cost of operation of the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility shall be implemented as provided in Articles VI and VII hereof.

ARTICLE IV

ADMINISTRATION

The powers, duties and responsibilities of the Cooperative shall be vested in and exercised by a joint board. Each municipality joining in this Agreement shall be represented by one director who, in the first instance, shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen of the respective municipality. Each director shall have one vote.

The terms of office of the directors representing the respective municipalities approving this Agreement shall be fixed as follows:

Phase I. The directors for the towns of Barrington, Durham, Greenland and Lee shall have an initial term of one year. Subsequent directors representing said municipalities shall be appointed by the Boards of Selectmen and shall serve for terms of three years.

Phase II. The directors for the towns of Mæbury, Newfields, Newington and Newmarket shall serve an initial term of two years. Subsequent directors representing said municipalities shall be appointed by the Boards of Selectmen and shall serve for terms of three years.

Phase III. The directors for the towns of Northwood, Rollinsford, Strafford and Stratham shall serve an initial term of three years. Subsequent directors representing said municipalities shall be appointed by the Boards of Selectmen and shall serve for terms of three years.

In the event of resignation, incapacity or death of a director, the Board of Selectmen of the municipality so affected shall appoint an interim director to fill the unexpired portion of the vacant office.

Any director may be removed from office by the municipality which he represents for any reason which would justify the removal of a public official under the law of New Hampshire.

Upon the effective date of this Agreement, or as soon thereafter as possible, the directors shall hold an organizational meeting to elect officers, to appoint an operational committee and to appoint such other committees as the joint board shall deem necessary. The joint board shall at its annual meeting, elect officers to serve for a term of one year. The terms of committee members shall be for such periods as fixed by the joint board.

The joint board shall choose a chairman by ballot from its membership. It shall appoint a secretary and treasurer who may be the same person, but who need not be members of the joint board. The treasurer shall receive and take charge of all money belonging to the Cooperative and shall pay any bill of the Cooperative which has been approved by the joint board. In the event the Treasurer is not a member of the joint board he shall serve at the pleasure of the board, otherwise he shall serve for a term of one year. The treasurer may by vote of the joint board be compensated for his services.

The directors shall appoint from their membership an operational committee consisting of three members. This committee shall have the responsi-

bility of making recommendations to the joint board with regard to the ordinary operation and maintenance of the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility.

The joint board shall meet at least bi-monthly. A special meeting of the joint board may be called by the chairman or by any three directors. Unless otherwise provided by this Agreement, all questions decided by the joint board shall be approved by a majority vote of the directors representing all of the municipalities belonging to the Cooperative. A quorum for any meeting of the joint board shall consist of one more than one-half of the directors representing all of the municipalities belonging to the Cooperative.

The joint board may adopt by-laws for the conduct of business as long as said by-laws do not conflict with the terms of this Agreement or the provisions of RSA 53-A.

ARTICLE V

POWERS

The Cooperative shall have the following powers and duties:

I. To sue and be sued, but only to the extent and upon the same conditions that a city or town may be sued.

II. To hold, purchase, convey or lease real or personal property for the lawful purposes of the Cooperative and to plan, construct, equip and operate a solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility for the benefit of the member municipalities and to make any necessary contracts in relation thereto.

III. To receive and disburse funds for any lawful purpose for which the Cooperative was formed.

IV. To assess member municipalities for any expenses incurred for the purposes for which the Cooperative was formed.

V. To create a reserve fund for operation from any surplus remaining on hand at the end of any fiscal year, provided that the amount transferred to said fund shall not in any one year exceed five percent (5%) of the operating budget of the Cooperative for the prior year.

VI. To create a capital reserve fund from any surplus remaining at the end of any fiscal year provided that the amount transferred to said fund shall not exceed one percent (1%) of the last year assessed valuation of the municipalities belonging to the Cooperative.

VII. To engage legal counsel.

VIII. To submit an annual report to each of the member municipalities containing a detailed financial statement and a statement showing a method by which the annual charges assessed against each municipality were computed.

IX. To engage employees and consultants to operate the Cooperative.

X. To enter into contracts for solid waste disposal with persons, corporations, non-member municipalities and any other lawful political entities.

XI. To engage in any lawful act or activity for which a "legal or administrative entity" as defined by RSA 53-A:3(II) (b) may be organized and to do any and all of the acts herein set forth or implied and such other acts as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the objects and purposes of the Cooperative.

ARTICLE VI

CAPITAL COST

A. The capital cost for the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility, including equipment, construction, engineering and startup expense, has been estimated at \$2,420,000 which includes a ten percent (10%) overrun allowance.

B. The solid waste generated by the municipalities listed in this paragraph for the year 1977 has been estimated by the consulting firm of Camp, Dresser and McKee, Inc. and set out on page 9 of a certain Final Report entitled "Feasibility Study of Regional Solid Waste Incineration Plant for Durham, New Hampshire (Lamprey River) Region, dated December 27, 1977. Said estimates are hereby ratified and affirmed by the municipalities executing this Agreement. Based upon said estimates the capital cost of the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility, including a ten percent (10%) overrun allowance shall be apportioned as follows:

* The pro-rata capital contributions of the municipalities of Strafford and Rollinsford have been determined as follows:

The solid waste generated by Strafford and Rollinsford in the year 1977 has been estimated by employing the same method used by Camp, Dresser and McKee, Inc. to estimate the solid waste generated by the municipalities listed on page 9 of said Final Report. The resulting estimates were divided by the total estimate for the municipalities listed on page 9 of said Final Report

(385 tons per week). These percentages were multiplied by the figure of \$2,420,000 to arrive at the respective pro-rata capital contribution of Strafford and Rollinsford.

C. In the event the Cooperative is established by the process contained in Article III, Paragraph D, the capital cost for the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility, including equipment, construction, engineering and startup expense, plus ten percent (10%) allowance for overrun shall be apportioned as follows:

For those municipalities approving this Agreement at the 1978 annual meeting, the joint board shall determine the solid waste generated by said municipalities in 1977 by using the Camp, Dresser and McKee, Inc. figures set out on page 9 of said Final Report. For those municipalities adopting this Agreement between the 1978 annual meeting and July 1, 1978, the joint board shall determine the solid waste generated by said municipalities for the year 1977 by employing the same method of estimation used by Camp, Dresser and McKee, Inc. in said Final Report.

The resulting figures shall be divided by the total figure for all the municipalities approving this Agreement. The estimated percent of solid waste generated by each municipality shall be multiplied by the figure of \$2,420,000. The resulting figures shall be the capital contribution of each municipality for the initial year.

In the event the solid waste generated by any municipality in the first full year of operation exceeds or is less than the amount estimated by either Camp, Dresser and McKee, Inc. or the joint board for the year 1977, there shall be no reapportionment of the capital contribution of any municipality made during the first year of operation of the facility.

ARTICLE VII

COST OF OPERATION

A. The term "net cost of operation" or "net operating cost" shall mean all costs and expenses of the Cooperative relating to the operation and maintenance of the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility, including without limitation, all costs of accepting, processing, storing and disposing of waste, labor, utilities and all costs associated with spare parts, equipment, insurance, maintenance of equipment and facilities, cleaning services, general outside accounting service, consulting services and legal services, and all costs and expenses relating to the payment of any bond or indebtedness, including principal, interest and bonding charges, whether incurred by one municipality or two or more municipalities for the benefit of the Cooperative, minus any revenues received by the Cooperative in exchange for the sale of energy or from the sale of by-products recovered from the processing of said waste.

Provided, further, that the costs incurred by the individual municipalities for transporting solid waste to the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility shall not be considered in determining the net operating cost.

B. The net cost of operating said facility for the first year shall be apportioned as follows:

*The pro-rata contribution of the municipalities of Strafford and Rollinsford to be "net cost of operation" of the Cooperative for the first year has been determined as follows:

The solid waste generated by Strafford and Rollinsford in the year 1977 has been estimated by employing the same method used by Camp, Dresser and McKee, Inc. to estimate the solid waste generated by the municipalities listed on page 9 of said Final Report. The resulting estimates were divided by the total estimate for the municipalities listed on page 9 of said Final Report (385 tons per week). These percentages shall be the pro-rata contributions of the municipalities of Strafford and Rollinsford toward the net operating cost of the facility for the first year of operation.

C. The net cost of operating the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility during the following years shall be computed as follows:

The joint board shall determine the solid waste actually processed for each municipality in the preceding year from records maintained at the facility. The resulting figures shall be divided by the whole figure of solid waste generated by all the municipalities. This percent of solid waste generated by each municipality shall be multiplied by an estimate of the net cost of operation for the next year as determined by the joint board.

The resulting figures shall be the mandatory annual operational fee for each municipality.

D. The success of the Cooperative is premised upon the assumption that each municipality shall process a minimum percentage of the total solid waste processed at the facility each year. The failure of the Cooperative to receive a guaranteed percentage from each municipality during the term of this contract will result in a loss of revenue from the sale of energy and by-products and will produce a corresponding increase in the cost of operating the facility. Accordingly, after the second full year of membership in the Cooperative, each municipality approving this Agreement guarantees to process annually a minimum percentage of the entire solid waste processed at the facility which percentage shall equal the average of the percentages processed by it during the first and second years of membership.

In the event a municipality fails to process its guaranteed percentage of the total amount of solid waste processed at the facility, the joint board shall, nevertheless, assess said municipality its mandatory pro-rata operational fee based upon said guaranteed percentage.

Furthermore, the joint board shall be permitted to assign that portion of the guaranteed percentage which any municipality fails to meet, to a member of the Cooperative or to a non-member municipality upon such terms and conditions as the joint board deems advisable. Any solid waste collected and processed pursuant to such an assignment shall not be credited to the municipality which fails to meet its guaranteed percentage.

E. Each member of the Cooperative shall be guaranteed that during the term of this Agreement it shall be permitted to process a certain percentage of the total solid waste processed at the facility in any one year, which percentage shall at least be equal to the average of the percentage processed by it during the first and second years of membership in the Cooperative.

F. Notwithstanding any provisions in this Agreement, the Cooperative may, by a two-thirds majority vote of the joint board, decide to adjust the relative pro-rata shares of the members in regard to initial capitalization, net operating fees and guaranteed percentages.

ARTICLE VIII

OPERATING AGREEMENT

It is anticipated that the Cooperative may enter into an operating agreement with the University of New Hampshire for the operation and maintenance of the solid waste disposal and energy recovery facility. Each municipality joining the Cooperative agrees that it will be bound by the terms and provisions of the operating agreement relating to, but not necessarily limited to, such subjects as vehicular regulations, liability for processing of hazardous waste, hours of operation and health and safety regulations.

ARTICLE IX

PREPARATION OF ANNUAL BUDGET

Each year the joint board shall determine the amounts necessary to be raised to maintain and operate the Cooperative during the next calendar year and the amounts required for payment of debt and interest incurred by the Cooperative that will be due in the next calendar year. The joint board shall prepare a budget and make a preliminary apportionment of the amount so determined among the member municipalities in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. Prior to December 31st the joint board shall hold at least one public hearing at some convenient place in the Cooperative on the amounts required in the budget and the preliminary apportionment of the amounts listed in the budget. At least seven days notice of the meeting shall be given by publication of the budget and apportionment in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation within the Cooperative and by posting a copy of the budget and apportionment in a public place in each municipality in the Cooperative.

After the hearing the joint board shall adopt a budget and make a final determination of the apportionment among the member municipalities. After the joint board has adopted the budget and determined the apportionment of the expenses, the Cooperative treasurer shall certify to the Boards of Selectmen of the member municipalities in the Cooperative the amount of money assessed each municipality. The selectmen of each municipality shall seasonably assess the taxes to be raised to pay the apportionments. The municipality treasurer shall pay to the Cooperative the amount so apportioned in quarterly installments each year.

The joint board shall cause a certified public accountant licensed to practice in either the State of New Hampshire or the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to conduct an annual audit of the accounts and records of the Cooperative.

ARTICLE X

ADMISSION OF NEW MEMBERS

After initial adoption of this Agreement, municipalities may be admitted to the Cooperative by a majority vote of the legislative body of the municipality seeking admission and upon such terms and conditions as established by a majority vote of the joint board of the Cooperative. New members shall agree to all of the provisions of the Agreement and any amendments thereto, and any other conditions of admittance imposed by the joint board.

ARTICLE XI

DURATION OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall continue in force for a term of fifteen years. No municipality approving this Agreement may withdraw from the Cooperative for any reason during the term of this Agreement.

Each municipality approving this Agreement hereby agrees to pay its full pro-rata share of net operating costs of the facility as defined by Article VII hereof.

ARTICLE XII

BREACH OF AGREEMENT

A municipality shall be deemed to be in breach of this Agreement if it fails to appropriate or make timely payment of its share of capital cost and mandatory operating costs or if it fails to perform or comply with any of the terms, provisions, or conditions of this Agreement. The joint board shall give a municipality written notice of specific acts or omissions which constitute breach. The municipality so notified shall have seven days to conform. If the municipality fails to conform within the above mentioned time period, then the joint board shall have the power to exclude the solid waste generated by said municipality from processing at the solid waste disposal facility. No such exclusion shall render the Cooperative liable for damages or relieve the municipality deemed to be in breach from performance of its obligations hereunder and the Cooperative reserves the right to insist upon specific performance by the municipality deemed to be in breach of its ob-

ligations under this Agreement or to claim money damages. Any municipality found to be in breach of this Agreement by a court of law shall be responsible to the Cooperative for its reasonable attorney's fees and expenses incurred in respect to said breach.

ARTICLE XIII

DISTRIBUTION OF ASSETS

Assets of the Cooperative remaining at the time of termination of this Agreement shall be divided among the municipalities according to their proportionate payments or contributions to the capital construction and improvement of the Cooperative during the full term of this Agreement.

ARTICLE XIV

AMENDMENT

This Agreement may be amended only in the following manner:

The director representing any member municipality on the joint board may propose amendments. Any amendment must be the subject of at least one public hearing called in a convenient place within the Cooperative. At least seven days notice of the time, place and subject of the hearing shall be published in a paper or papers of general circulation within the Cooperative and posted in a public place in each member municipality. After the hearing, the joint board may adopt the amendment and certify it to the Board of Selectmen in each municipality. The adoption of any amendment shall require approval by at least two-thirds of the Boards of Selectmen of the member municipalities.

ARTICLE XV

SEPARABILITY

In case any one or more of the provisions contained in this Agreement be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, the validity, legality and enforceability of the remaining provisions contained herein shall not in any way be affected or impaired thereby.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the municipalities of Barrington, Durham, Greenland, Lee, Madbury, Newfields, Newington, Newmarket, Northwood, Rollinsford, Strafford, and Stratham have caused this Agreement to be signed by a majority of their Boards of Selectmen as of the dates hereinafter written.

1977 Conservation Commission Report

During 1977 the Northwood Conservation Commission made progress in the acquisition of copies of existing State maps of the Town, and purchased an enlargement to the same scale as the State maps (1000'/1") of the 1957 Soils Survey map of the Soils Conservation Service (SCS). A series of soils maps is to be prepared from this, with very wet and moderately wet soils areas of the town completed already. Arrangements have been made with the SCS for a Wetlands map to be prepared on the same scale.

It was with much pleasure that the Commission received and accepted, with the Board of Selectmen, the first gift (\$25.00) to the Northwood Conservation Fund, presented by the Harvey Lake Woman's Club.

The Commission recommended purchase of the Fernald Lot, abutting the town-owned School Lot off Lucas Pond Road, but the recommendation was not accepted by the Budget Committee. The Federal Government would have paid approximately one-half of the purchase price, where the land was to be kept as an open space and recreation area, with timber growing permitted.

Town-owned lands generally have been unmarked on the land. During the summer permanent bounds were placed at corners of the Personage Lot on Saddleback Mountain, and the northern section of the School Lot, and the boundaries flagged, in preparation for a natural resource survey by the State Forester.

The Commission had been given management responsibility for the Personage Lot and the unleased areas of the School Lot by the Selectmen. Permanent bounds were also placed on the Town land on Jenness Pond abutting Route 107.

The Commission, charged with coordinating conservation activities in the town, convened a meeting of interested groups, and the schools, and sponsored an Arbor Day poster contest in the Elementary School (under Mrs. Eleanor Byrne and Mrs. Carroll Bassett); in addition, three sugar maple trees provided by the Coe-Brown Chapter of FFA under Mr. Karl Polson, were planted on the Town Parade (fertilizer provided in part by Johnson's Dairy Farm), and a white birch donated by Mr. Roy Flister, was also planted there. The planting was done by Northwood Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, the FFA and the Harvey Lake Women's Club.

Further, sixty seedling shrubs of value to wildlife were planted in a nursery area at the Elementary School by the 6th Grade students under Mr. John Bresnahan, science teacher, for study and further growth.

In observance of Reforestation Week, 200 white pine seedlings were planted at the north (Mountain Road) end of the Personage Lot by Cadet Girl Scout Troop 347 under Mrs. Elaine Stimpson, Leader.

As preparation for these plantings, trees on the Town Parade, and the Elementary School grounds, were mapped for site selection and record. An

enlarged contour map of the Parsonage Lot (250'/1") was prepared for study and development planning.

The Commission acted as an Ad Hoc Committee representing the town at Title V, Rural Development Act of 1972 (USA) meetings, in the interests of the Planning Board; and at Commissioners' meetings (Rockingham County) on mosquito control studies in the county.

Under RSA-483-A the Commission approved two dredge and fill permits.

This year the Conservation Commission pays special tribute to one of its members. Charles Frary's interest in nature and belief in conservation cause him to be an invaluable commissioner. His initiative and devotion to the duties of this board has given it new purpose. Hats off to you, Charlie.

ANNUAL REPORT - 1977

RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL, INC.

The Rural District Health Council, Inc. has experienced another year of growth and expansion of staff.

The skilled nursing remains as the priority service within the agency. The agency's staff also conducts adult health screenings weekly to member towns. This year a new program has been established in New Durham at the elementary school the first Wednesday of each month; the second Wednesday in Farmington Town Hall, the third Wednesday at the Northwood Town Hall, and the fourth Wednesday at the Milton Health Center.

The number of patients enrolled within this program being 429 with an average of 79 patients seen each month. This service is partly funded by the State Council on Aging, Title III and the Rural District Health Council. This program has become a very active one and the Council looks forward to increasing the type of screening in the new year.

The Referral Coordinator at Frisbie Memorial, Mrs. Marie Dexter, R.N. has seen an increase in referrals being made to other Home Health Agencies. With the increase in service and cost of the program the agency looks to other sources for financial help. Mrs. Marie Dexter, R.N. is on the State Discharge Planning Committee.

The agency also participates in the After Care Program in cooperation with the Strafford Guidance, and Seacoast Counseling Centers.

The Council continues Home Health Aide services through the contract with the Strafford County Home Maker, Home Health Aide Association, and also with the two Home Health Aides within the Agency; Gail LaRosa who covers the areas of Farmington, Milton, Middleton, New Durham and Barrington, and Roberta LaFreniere covering the Northwood, Nottingham, Deerfield and Strafford areas. This enables a better utilization of the professional staff while continuing to provide quality care.

The Child Health Program has seen an increase in service within the past year. Miss Arlene Thorne, R.N., coordinator of the program, has been appointed as a member for the State Child Health Conference Committee. This program offers physical examinations, immunizations, teaching and counseling for ages 0-6 years. This is funded in part by the U. S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare, N. H. Division of Public Health, Bureau of Maternal and Child Health Grant and the Rural District Health Council. This program has an enrollment of 835 children from 0-6 years of age. This is a costly program as services are provided without charge to the residents. It does provide a needed service to the member towns as transportation is a problem and the services are provided in the areas. The Child Health program also provides home visits when necessary to assure continuity of care. Within this program there is a Dental program provided by the Division of Public Health, Bureau of Dental Health which provides cleaning and fluoride treatment every six months for children ages 3-6 years.

The State has joined forces with the Federal Government to implement an ongoing immunization program for all children ages 0-school. The agency is represented on this Task Force by Ardala Houle, R.N.

Because transportation is a problem in the areas covered by the agency, the Council offered space for the Strafford County Prenatal and Family Planning Clinic to hold a satellite program once a month at the office, the first one taking place on July 26, 1977. The program is providing a need and sees an increase in service. Throughout the year we have provided home visits to the patients of Strafford County Prenatal and Family Planning Program and the Exeter Area Family Planning Program.

The continued success of the program lies in the dedication of the Agency's personnel, and the capable professional staff assures the availability of quality care. Because of the growth of the agency and the many services provided, it was necessary to appoint Marie Dexter, R.N. as Nursing Supervisor, and Referral Coordinator, and Arlene Thorne, R.N., Maternal and Child Health Coordinator covering all member towns; nurses being Barbara Drew, R.N. Ferrington, Mary Timmons, R.N. Milton, Middleton, New Durham, Joanne Pearson, R.N. B.S.N. Northwood, Nottingham, Deerfield. The Council is very fortunate to have Elizabeth Coons, R.N. on the staff covering Barrington and Strafford. Myrtle Walsh, R.N. and Alice Ziegler, R.N. B.S.N. cover when needed. Kathleen Hansen, RPT and Carl Scholls, RPT cover for Physical Therapy.

The office duties are efficiently handled by Eleanor Eaton and June Chase.

With the adoption of a new position and the salaries increased equal to the area, the Council is seeing a marked increase in the budget. The Council finds it necessary to increase the per capita request from each Town to \$1.50 in order to continue to provide these greatly needed services.

During the past year the Council has made 402 Skilled Nursing Visits, 160 Home Health Aide Visits, 56 Physical Therapy Visits, and 77 Child Health Visits with a grant total of 695 for the Town of Northwood.

OPEN LETTER TO NORTHWOOD RESIDENTS:

The Northwood Fire Department is facing a problem of notifying fire-fighters of emergencies in a reliable and efficient manner. This could result in needless loss of property as well as possible life.

To rectify the problem, the department has done much research into alternative methods of notifying firefighters of emergencies. We recommend a Central Dispatch System as the best solution. A Central Dispatch System will provide the most protection for the least cost.

The following report describes the system and why we need Central Dispatch so that we may better protect you. Please take the few minutes to read it. If you have any questions please contact me.

I hope you will support your Fire Department in this endeavor so that we may better protect your life and property. Your support at Town Meeting will be greatly appreciated.

A REPORT TO THE PEOPLE OF NORTHWOOD

The Northwood Volunteer Fire Department requests your support so that we may provide the level of fire protection that you should expect and demand. The Fire Department consists of twenty-five to thirty dedicated active members, who provide fire protection by volunteering freely of their time not only at times of emergencies, but also numerous hours of training, maintaining equipment, and working on special projects. The sole reason for the dedication of these men is to benefit you and the town.

Recent years have seen many changes within your Fire Department, including an organized training program as well as an upgrading of equipment. The Town has generously provided us with equipment through our operating budget as well as through support of our Annual Raffle.

The Department faces a problem of effective notification of firefighters of an emergency. After a study of the problem and possible solutions, the best solution would be a modern Central Radio Dispatch System. The implementation of this system would enable us to cut our response time to emergencies as well as assuring that someone would respond 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

The Department is presently using the outdated Red Phone System to alert the Department of an emergency. To illustrate how this system works, lets study a hypothetical fire on Blakes Hill Road using the Red Phone System. The call would come in on phones located in eight locations in Town simultaneously. Those who hear the call, answer and listen to the caller describe the problem. A serious problem exists on weekends and during the day when often only 2 or 3 are able to answer. Another problem is that you could be working in your garden or in the yard when the call comes in and not hear the phone.

Those that do receive the call must then call lists of firefighters repeating the message over and over until the firefighters are notified. If only 2 or 3 people are making the calls, a considerable amount of time can elapse before the entire department is notified. It is also becoming increasingly more difficult to assure that someone will be on the Red Phone since many wives are working.

Once notified of the fire and upon arrival at the scene, if the fire is of sufficient size to warrant additional help, it is necessary to radio back to the station (assuming someone is at the station, and often no one is until several minutes after the initial call) and specify which towns are needed. It is then necessary to individually telephone each town.

This entire process can take many minutes - critical minutes - which are vitally important in effective firefighting. These minutes can cause needless loss of property and life.

Many area towns have seen the need for a more effective system of communications both for alerting firefighters to calls and for Mutual Aid. These towns are centrally dispatched out of Concord on a 24 hour a day, 7 day a week basis. The group is known as the Capital Area Mutual Aid Compact.

To explain this system, let us use the same hypothetical fire on Blakes Hill Road. The caller will dial a Concord phone number, which will be answered by a professional dispatcher who is trained in fire-fighting dispatching. The dispatcher will obtain all necessary information such as name of caller, location of emergency, type of emergency, and any special problems or additional information. All of this information is recorded on tape at the time of the call, which may be played back instantly.

After this information is obtained, the dispatcher presses a button on his console which activates a receiver at the home, or in the car of each firefighter. The dispatcher will then broadcast the call to call Northwood Firefighters simultaneously. An alert for our hypothetical fire might sound like this:

FIRE ALARM TO ALL NORTHWOOD RECEIVERS. YOU HAVE A REPORTED STRUCTURAL FIRE ON BLAKES HILL ROAD AT THE JOHN DOE RESIDENCE. BE ADVISED THIS IS THE THIRD HOUSE ON THE LEFT. BLAKES HILL ROAD RUNS SOUTH FROM ROUTE 4 OPPOSITE SHERMAN'S GARAGE. BE ADVISED THAT THERE IS AN INVALID IN THE UPSTAIRS BACK BEDROOM. YOUR TIME OUT IS 11:25.

The entire Department is then able to respond. As soon as someone gets to one of the trucks, he notifies the dispatcher that he is responding. If no one contacts the dispatcher that he is responding, the message is rebroadcasted. If still no response, which although very unlikely, could happen, the nearest town is then dispatched. This assures a response on all emergencies.

It is also possible to arrange that on certain calls, such as Coe-Brown Northwood Academy, to notify not only Northwood Fire Department, but also Epsom and Nottingham at the same time. This is particularly important for high risk fire hazards. This puts men and equipment in service in a minimum of time.

Upon the arrival of the first truck a status report is transmitted to the dispatcher, which is heard by all receivers. This explains the disposition of the fire, for example: smoke showing, false alarm, under control, etc. If the officer in charge feels that Mutual Aid is required, the dispatcher will dispatch additional towns simultaneously, including a truck to cover the station in case of a second fire.

The whole time for this entire sequence of events would be 50% shorter than our present system assuming the Red Phones are fully manned. If only 1 or 2 people are on the Red Phones, the time difference is drastically longer.

I hope you agree with me that the yearly cost of approximately \$3,000. for this system, which provides around the clock dispatching, is inexpensive when compared with the possible loss of property or life caused by a single delayed response.

Although not a certainty at this time, it is very probable that within the next year this system will enable those people living from 3 to 5 miles from the stations to receive the same insurance reduction as presently enjoyed by those living within 3 miles.

The one time investment in radio equipment would be obtained from funds raised by the firefighters in our Annual Raffle, as well as from funds from our equipment fund in our operating budget.

The advantages I feel far outweigh the cost of this system and will allow us to better serve you in time of emergencies. I hope you will support the Fire Department at Town Meeting.

If you have any questions or desire additional information on Central Dispatching or the Capital Area Mutual Aid Compact, please contact one of your firefighters. If they are unable to answer your questions, they will refer you to one of the officers who can.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF

AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest fire control in New Hampshire is a joint state and town/city responsibility (RSA 224).

The Director, Division of Forests and Lands (State Forester) appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town/city upon the recommendation of local authorities.

The local forest fire warden is responsible for forest fire prevention and suppression activities in his town. He regulates the kindling of outside fires when the ground is not covered with snow by the issuance of written permits only when conditions are safe. He is responsible for suppression with the town/city and state sharing the cost. Suppression costs in excess of 1/4 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town are assumed by the state.

The state provides training for the local fire organization and helps coordinate activities between towns/cities. The state also supports local forces with backup personnel, equipment, and supplies for suppression and prevention.

This combination of state and local cooperation, started in 1893, works well, for New Hampshire has enjoyed one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 25 years.

WORK ACCOMPLISHED IN 1977

1. The area to the right of the entrance has been filled and graded, much improving the appearance of this area. The fill and grading program is beginning to greatly improve the entire cemetery and we look forward to the completion this year or next year.
2. We again are pleased with the appearance of the several cemeteries in the town. The mowing and trimming has been accomplished to the maximum extent possible with available funds. Loam was purchased again this year and used to repair and level many sunken graves. Some broken gravestones were also repaired, and many fallen stones were reset.

FUTURE PLANS

1. With the fill and grading program nearing completion we hope to be able to offer single gravesites along the right side of the right roadway as you enter the Pine Grove Cemetery. Many citizens have requested single gravesites in the past, but we have been unable to provide them. The single sites would also eliminate the present practice of selling 1/4 size lots. These 1/4 size lots cause difficulty in placing headstones and in maintenance of a neat orderly cemetery.

GENERAL COMMENT

1. The Trustees are pleased with the response citizens have made in placing their lots in perpetual care and in increasing trusts which had been inadequate. We encourage others who have been unable to do this in the past to give it consideration this year.
2. There are many abandoned lots in the several town cemeteries in which people have been interred, but due to many reasons were not placed in trust. Our caretakers have been caring for these lots without recompense. Should you find that you have funds that you want to put to good purpose, you may want to consider making a general trust fund for the care and maintenance of these abandoned gravesites.

1977 SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING REPORT

March 5, 1977

The School District Meeting was called to order at 2:15 P.M. at the Northwood Elementary School, by Moderator Robert Johnson. Mr. Johnson explained the error made in printing of the ballots for officers, explaining that Article 7, last year, to elect auditors for two year terms, starting with the election of 1977. The first year, one auditor will be elected for a one year term, one auditor for a two year term; thereafter, the District will elect one auditor each year for a two year term. New ballots will be printed and ready for Election Day, March 8, 1977. Mr. Johnson then read the School Warrant for this year.

Article 1 - To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

Mr. Carroll Bassett, Budget Committee Chairman, moved that the sum of \$850.00 be raised. A verbal vote was taken and the article was adopted by an affirmative vote.

Article 2 - To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Thomas Madson made a motion that this article be accepted. Seconded by Carroll Bassett. Article was adopted by an affirmative vote.

Article 3 - To choose agents and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Thomas Madson requested that this article be closed as no special committees were appointed. Verbal adoption.

Article 4 - To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

Thomas Madson asked to have this article temporarily postponed. This was seconded by Donald Post. This article will be brought up after Article 9.

Article 5 - To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive and expend, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now and/or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State agencies.

Mrs. Therese Herron moved that this article be adopted as read. This was seconded by Mr. Post. Verbally adopted.

Article 6 - To see if the District wishes to exclude from its Social Security plan service performed by election officials or election workers for each calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such services is less than \$50.00.

This was explained by Thomas Madson that this pertained to the Clerk, Moderator, etc., where the amount is so small. Mrs. Herron moved that this article be accepted as read. Seconded by Mr. Herron. A verbal adoption.

Article 7 - To see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) from the unencumbered balance at the end of the 1976-77 fiscal year. Said sum of money is to establish a capital reserve fund in accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. 35, for the purpose of replacing the heating system of the Northwood Elementary School.

Thomas Madson explained that the heating system was in need of major repairs, and this was very evident as the school was quite cold at the time of this meeting. John Lane recommended that this article be amended to include funds for a new furnace. Don Post made this a motion. This was seconded by Mr. Lane. Perry Richardson mentioned that Coe-Brown Academy had to have a new furnace recently, and the cost was about \$12,000.00. Moderator Johnson called for a short recess to discuss the issue with the School Board Members. After much discussion, Mr. Madson made an amendment. He moved that the Northwood School Board be instructed to encumber \$5,000.00 from the anticipated surplus of this budget as of June 30, 1977, and to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$10,000.00 for the purpose of repairing and for replacing the heating system of the Northwood Elementary School. A Yes - No vote was taken by show of hands. Yes - 58, No - 0.

Article 8 - To see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) from the unencumbered balance at the end of the 1976-77 fiscal year. Said sum of money is to establish a capital reserve fund in accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. 35, for the purpose of financing all or part of the cost of new construction for the school district.

Mr. Madson made an amendment to this article: "that this money not be expended by the School Board without a direct vote of the Townspeople at a School District Meeting." This motion was made by Mr. Madson and seconded by Mrs. Post. A vote was taken by a show of hands. Yes - 53 No - 4
Motion prevails.

Article 9 - We the undersigned, do hereby request the District to accept responsibility of transporting high school students of Northwood to approved public or private institutions where 15 or more Northwood students attend and that the School Board determine appropriate charges to minimize cost to the District. (By Petition)

This article created much discussion, and Moderator Johnson felt he should step down from his post and swear in Selectmen True Chesley to serve as Moderator in order to avoid any possible conflict of interest, since he is so closely affiliated with Coe-Brown Northwood Academy. After extended debate, Mrs. Marion Knox made an amendment to this article that it be rewritten, by striking the words "15 or more students." The amendment was passed. Yes - 17 No - 14. Mr. Johnson asked for a vote of the article after it was rewritten. This was defeated by a vote of No - 47 Yes - 13.

Article 4 - This article was brought up again and Carroll Bassett, Chairman of the Budget Committee, read the line items of the recommended budget. Teachers' salaries were increased from the Budget Committee's recommendation of \$188,305.00 to \$190,611.00 in order to have a two day a week music program and a learning disability specialist. Mr. Madson purposed another increase in school salaries to \$194,607.00. This was defeated by a vote of Yes - 19, No - 23 (a show of hands).

Motion did not prevail. Student activity fund was increased \$940.00 (from \$2,200.00 to \$3,140.00), by a vote of hands Yes - 25, No - 9. The total Budget passed was \$553,746.00, up from the recommended \$540,500.00 by the Budget Committee, an increase of \$22,384.00 from last year's total appropriation.

Article 10 - To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Mrs. Joann Bailey made a motion that next year's annual meeting begin at 1:00 P.M. instead of 2:00 P.M. This motion was made and passed.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:10 P.M.

The Supervisory Union Office has undergone extensive reorganization this past year with the specific objective being the improvement of services available to the School District in Supervisory Union #44. Improvements in the bookkeeping procedures for Federal funds and re-structuring the secretarial staff are examples of this reorganization. Other changes include the selection by the Supervisory Union School Board of Mr. Bernard R. Davis as our new Assistant Superintendent effective July 25, 1977. The position of Special Education Coordinator was created for the first time this year and Miss Sally D. Butler was selected for this position effective August 1, 1977. Her duties include working with Special Education teachers in each School District, monitoring out-of-district pupil placements, serving as liaison with the Strafford Learning Center and as the Supervisory Union's contact person with the Special Education section in the State Department of Education. As I indicated in last year's report, Public Law 94-142 is and will continue to have far reaching impact on local School District budgets. Miss Butler's position has become necessary due to the voluminous paperwork mandated by this new Federal legislation.

This year a new teacher evaluations process was adopted by the Supervisory Union School Board. The development of this process represented many hours of effort by a sub-committee composed of teachers, administrators and a School Board representative. The development of this new process reflects the increased emphasis placed on evaluating the learning process throughout the Supervisory Union. During the 1975-76 school year 165 teacher evaluations were completed throughout the Union. Last year that figure increased to 209 evaluations and as of February 6, 1978, 207 evaluations have been completed.

In addition to increased emphasis on teacher evaluations many hours have been devoted by School Board members and administration to refining and updating school board policies in the individual districts. Northwood is no exception. Clearly stated board policies provide clear direction to the principal and staff concerning the operation of the school. I commend the Northwood School Board for accomplishing the task of updating the School Board policies in a thoughtful and productive fashion.

Curriculum development and refinement has been an objective of Mr. Conway's and the teachers this year. They have been working diligently in this area and have continued to improve the educational opportunities available to the children of Northwood. This effort represents a State-wide

trend to have local School District's identify meaningful guidelines to be used in developing on going processes which will: a) identify educational objectives, b) identify student outcome, c) identify curriculum modification and d) developing effective testing procedures.

In summary, we wish to express our appreciation to the members of the School Board, the teachers, pupils and citizens for the cooperation exhibited during the past year. We look forward to a long and productive relationship in which our mutual goal will continue to be the best possible education for our young people.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Northwood School Board and Citizens of Northwood:

We have made no serious changes in our curriculum this past year. If anything, we have maintained our desire to concentrate on the basics throughout the school. Along with this approach we have been able to add a federally-funded Title I Reading Supervisor who works with students that are having reading difficulties.

The new federal guidelines on the education of handicapped children will have a strong influence on our programming in future years. Presently, we have a Speech Clinician, Learning Disabilities Specialist, and a Special Education Teacher on our staff. Thus, we are able to educate all our children at our own school unless their disability is of a serious nature.

The present enrollment is as follows:

Grade 4 - 29	Grade 8 - 49

A total of 307 pupils.

We still have 14 full-time teachers, 1 full-time nurse, 2 full-time teacher aides, 1 part-time music teacher and 1 part-time art teacher. Mrs. Ann Grabowski, LD Specialist, and Mrs. Pamela Stagerwald, Speech Clinician, are again teaching part-time. New staff members added to our faculty this year are as follows:

Mrs. Laura Josish is the new Hot Lunch Manager, and with the help of Mrs. Kathleen Bernier and Mrs. Lorraine Colby, continue to serve nutritious lunches for only 35¢ per day.

Mr. Danilowski and Mr. Carpenter assumed the custodial duties as of January 1st and are doing a fine job. We wish to extend our thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Lovely for their work of the past and wish them good luck in their future.

We have maintained our extra-curriculum program in athletics and music. Presently, we have 45 girls and 65 boys involved in after-school athletic programs. Mr. Bragdon has extended his music program this year to include the entire student body.

Some improvements were made in the school building over the summer vacation. New carpeting was installed in some of the classrooms and in the upper hall. The auditorium has been dressed up with new draperies and stage

curtain. We had a new heating system installed throughout the school which is providing much improved heating this winter. The children are now able to enjoy their lunches in the cafetorium as we have purchased new collapsible cafeteria tables.

We were very pleased with the graduating class of 1977. This particular group scored well over the grade norms established for the S.R.A. Testing Program, and I find that many of them are excelling at the high schools that they attend.

In closing, may I again thank the citizens of Northwood for their continued support of education in the community. A special thanks goes to our Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Berry Clough, and to his Assistant, Mr. Bernard Davis, for their guidance and help over the past year. And finally, I wish to thank the Northwood School Board members who have worked diligently to supply quality education for the youngsters of the Town of Northwood.

During the school year I attended the following workshops: Child Abuse, Drug Education, Teacher Liability, Choking and Obstruction of Airway, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome.
