WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday the 11th day of March next to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk and Treasurer for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, two Auditors for the Year ensuing, and one member of the Park Commission for the term of two years.

2. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day expense.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the use of Hospitals for the ensuing year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$86.70 to obtain Town Road Aid from the State, the State to contribute the sum of \$578.01.

7. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an Audit made by the division of Municipal Accounting and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$298.00 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lake Region.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the use of the Information Booth for the 1952 season.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for Civilian Defense Purposes.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1250.00 to the Winnisquam Fire Department toward the purchase of a new fire truck, provided one or more towns in the Winnisquam area shall raise the same amount. (This same article is being included in the warrants of the Towns of Belmont and Sanbornton.)

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to the Winnisquam Fire Department for the purpose of maintenance and operation of the Department.

13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt for its March Elections, 1953, the Non-partisan Ballot, in accordance with Section 112 of Chapter 34 of the Revised Statutes of New Hampshire.

14. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to negotiate a lease with the U. S. Postal Depart-

ment, for Post Office quarters, should the occasion arise.

15. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early paid taxes.

16. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen as agents of the Town to administer or dispose of any property acquired by Tax Deed.

17. To see if the Town will vote to remove the Elm trees growing directly in front of 200 and 202 on Main Street on the Southerly side of said street, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

18. To see if the Town will vote to install three additional street lights in the Lochmere Section of the Town as follows, one at Floyd Sanborn's corner, one at Union Bridge at lower end of Church Street, and one at Cozy Corner.

19. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for all purposes for the year ensuing.

20. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports for the ensuing year.

21. To choose any other officers or agents for the ensuing year.

22. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

There were 237 new cases, 467 repeat cases.

March was the busiest month. October the quietest.

Many trips were made transporting patients to clinics, hospitals and specialists.

Mrs. Hortense Isabelle, R.N., substituted during the month of August for the District Nurse while she was on her vacation.

Toxoid Clinics under the direction of the State Board of Health were held in April, May and June. In April and May they were held at Dr. Grevior's office with Dr. Grevior the attending physician. In June at the District Nurses' office with Dr. Kathleen Robinson attending. A total of only 27 received Toxoid. Seven completed the inoculations, 4 were vaccinated and 5 received a physical check up. This number showed a decided drop from the past two-year total. Our decision was that the greater number of pre-school youngsters were inoculated. These clinics were not held during the Fall months as usual because the State Department of Health cancelled all clinics while Polio was prevalent. It is hoped we can begin them again in the Spring.

The District Nurse has office hours from 3 to 4 p. m., on Monday through Friday or by appointment and she is in the office from 8:30 to 9:00 a. m., when calls can be taken for the day. The telephone number is 241 at the District Nurse office and 228 is the home number.

This nursing service is available to the citizens of Tilton and Northfield and can be a great factor in not only giving care for sick people but can in many ways aid them in keeping well.

A store closet of crutches and nursing utensils such as hot water bottles, rubber rings, etc., are on hand to loan out.

The Rotary and B.P.W. Clubs remembered many children with gifts at Christmas. Each Rotarian brought a gift to their December meeting, appropriate for some lucky youngster. The B.P.W. Club gave \$10.00 toward this project. The District Nurse and School Nurse

wrapped and distributed them where needed.

The Elks, Odd Fellows and Salvation Army were again generous in giving Christmas dinners in Tilton and Northfield. Altogether there were 23 remembered with dinners and over 25 youngsters given gifts. This indeed shows a spirit of friendliness towards our fellow men at Christmas.

It is a privilege to be so closely connected with the people of the two towns and to be ready to help them in any way possible.

At this time please accept my sincere thanks for the ever ready cooperation, friendliness and good will given me by the Doctors, District Nursing Board and the citizens of Tilton and Northfield.

Firewards

To the Inhabitants of Northfield and Tilton:

In closing the records of the Fire Precinct, we take pleasure in submitting this summary of the accomplishments of the past year.

In compiling the report for the past year all expenditures are itemized so that the taxpayers may easily determine exactly how the funds have been expended.

The new portable lighting outfits are installed on the trucks in a manner that permits them to be quickly detached and moved to any position at a fire, and the strong light that these units provide will increase the efficiency of the firemen.

Two all-metal ladders of the latest type have been added to replace two of the wooden ladders which for some time have been considered unsafe, also a radio unit was purchased that enables the department to contact the nearby fire departments, wherein previous to installing the equipment it was necessary to depend on the telephone, often with considerable delay.

Through the efforts of the Fire Wards and with the cooperation of Mr. Edward Cedarholm of the Public

Service Co. of N. H. our Main Street is now lighted with the latest type mercury vapor lamps, location of the lights being determined by engineers of the Public Service Co. to afford a most efficient coverage.

Included are three additional lights on West Main St., at the intersection of Main and Winter Sts., improving the approach to the business section of the town. The additional cost of this improved lighting, including these three extra units, will be twenty-nine dollars per year, over present cost of lighting.

The Department is very proud of the record of the past year, as fewer calls were made than for many years, indicating a greater fire consciousness on the part of the home owners in complying with recommendations of the fire inspectors, and warnings sent out by the office of Fire Wards.

We extend our appreciation to the firemen for what they have accomplished during the past year in responding to the alarms and for their wholehearted cooperation with the Fire Wards.

The firemen are also to be commended for their work in completing their club room and paying for it from their own funds.

In the future we plan to install an improved telephone system by which it will be possible to reach the Fire Department at all times.

In conclusion we take this opportunity to thank the citizens and town officers of Tilton and Northfield for their support during the past year.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Union School district in the town of Tilton-Northfield qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tilton-Northfield High School in said district on the 12th day of March 1952, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation

of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see whether the district will authorize the School Board to transfer any balance from item to item in the 1952-1953 school budget, providing the school appropriation is not exceeded.

10. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to apply for and accept in the name of the district any Federal and/or State funds which may be made available for plan preparation, building alterations, building construction, and/or equipment, at no cost to the district.

11. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF TILTON-NORTHFIELD SCHOOL BOARD

It is with regret that we announce the resignation of Donald P. Mattoon as Superintendent of Schools in the Tilton-Northfield Union School District, which became effective on October 15, 1951. Mr. Mattoon came here in November of 1940 and he did a great deal to improve our school system. His work with the Union School was especially commendable and has gained a state-wide reputation. Mr. Mattoon has dedicated his life to the field of education and to that end he has accepted the position of Principal of the Laboratory School at Willimantic State Teachers College in Willimantic, Connecticut.

We are sorry to announce the resignation of Helen E. Martin on December 1, 1951. She came here from Belmont High School in September of 1945 as an English teacher. In September of 1949, Miss Martin was made Director of Instruction for this Union and she was very capable in this position. She has accepted a similar position with the Laconia School system.

New Superintendent of Schools

On December 1, 1951, Gordon L. Fox became the Superintendent of Schools for the Tilton and Northfield Union School District, No. 59.

Mr. Fox comes here with an exceptionally fine background of education and experience. He was graduated from the University of New Hampshire with a B.S. degree in 1922, previous to which he served in the United States Army as a Second Lieutenant in World War I.

He received his Masters Degree from Columbia University in 1931, and has studied toward his doctorate at Boston University, Harvard University and New York University.

Mr. Fox was teacher-coach from 1922 to 1926 at Proctor Academy in Andover, New Hampshire, and Clarke School in Hanover, New Hampshire. He became the Headmaster at Peterborough High School, in Peterborough, New Hampshire in 1926 and held that position until 1929 when he became Superintendent of Schools in Schoharie, New York which position he held until 1939. Mr. Fox became Superintendent of Schools in Dover, New Hampshire from 1939 to 1950. He was granted a leave of absence from 1943 to 1945 to enter the United States Naval Reserve as a Lieutenant Commander in the Navy College and Vocational Training Program. He was stationed at the University of Ohio, Iowa State College and the University of South Dakota in this capacity. He returned to Dover in 1945 and in 1950 he became Superintendent of Schools in the Penacook, New Hampshire School District, coming here from Penacook last December.

Mr. Fox served at President of the New Hampshire Superintendents' Association in 1942 and again in 1951. He has been an active member of the American Legion since that organization was started. He has been an active member of Rotary and is a past president of the Dover, New Hampshire Rotary Club.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board:

This report will be brief because my duties as superintendent of schools commenced on November 1, 1951, and more time is needed for evaluation. Materials of this report will consist chiefly of historical items.

The School Board of a community has the task of trying to give the children the best possible education within the limits of the ability of the taxpayers to support the program. The School Board is the legislative branch of education, being responsible for the establishment of policies. It also is the judicial branch in determining how its voted policies have been placed in operation. The Superintendent of schools is the executive officer of the School Board and is responsible for the execution of policies. The superintendent has a clear obligation to continually recommend policies for the consideration of the Board. The principals are responsible for the administration, organization and supervision of their schools. The chief responsibility of the teachers is the teaching of the children. The superintendent has general supervision of the teaching of all schools.

The best situation is where the School Board, the administrators, the teachers, the parents, citizens, and pupils all work together democratically for the best solution of all problems.

The following points have been noted:

(1) The school census figures for September, 1951, show that additional space will be needed for elementary schools.

(2) Four elementary classrooms are now operated as follows: one at the girl scout headquarters, one in the assembly hall, one in the corridor and one at the high school.

(3) The state aid financial program is pitifully small.

(4) This area has not been classified as a defense area, and thus federal aid will not be received.

(5) The school lunch program, because of increased costs and reduction of federal aid, faces financial difficulties.

(6) There is a continued increase in the cost of textbooks and general school supplies.

(7) Transportation costs have increased.

(8) There is a definite need for new, modern books to replace obsolete or worn-out books.

(9) The Union School will need more repairs each year.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSING FOR THE SCHOOL YEAR 1950-51

During the school year 1950-51 all the children in our local schools were weighed and measured and all of those in our High School had a thorough medical inspection at the school. Some communities have recently inaugurated a system of having the school children inspected by their own family physician and the local board decided to try a similar method here, as an economic measure. With this idea in mind, notices were sent to the parents of all children in the Union School, requesting them to have their children inspected by the physician of their choice and to return the form provided by the school, filled out and signed by the doctor. In this way it was hoped that the children would be well served, the parents well pleased and the school health records complete.

The nurse gave vision tests to the pupils of both schools. Eighty-six showed some visual defect; thirty-nine of these appeared to be improved and thirty were fully corrected.

Hearing tests were given to 169, selected according to the apparent need, and 20 showed some hearing loss. The removal of tonsils and adenoids seemed to have improved the three extreme cases from the preceding year and no new cases warranted radical treatment. One child who is unable to attend school because of a hearing and speech difficulty continued to have weekly lip-reading lessons.

The annual dental inspection was made at Union School and this was followed by a dental clinic, con-

ducted by the two local dentists at their offices. The Woman's Club was responsible for sponsoring and underwriting the expense of this clinic and members of the Club gave a great deal of time and effort to the clinic. Of the 352 children who were inspected at the school 211 required no work at the clinic. Work was completed at the clinic for 107 children and 34 more were treated but time did not permit the completion of their work before the end of the school year. It is very gratifying to compare the dental needs of today with those of ten years ago when the school dental clinics were started.

A Preview of School was held in May for those children who were expected to enter school for the first time the following September. Unfortunately there was no adequate available space at the school building so the American Legion kindly consented to let us use their hall for the Preview. This did not give the children a chance to get acquainted with the school locale but it did give them an opportunity to get accustomed to being with some of the people whom they were to become associated with and made their entrance to school something to anticipate with pleasure instead of dread and fear. At the Preview members of the Parent-Teachers Association gave their services and tests were given for vision, hearing, muscle coordination and a dental inspection; in other words to determine the child's readiness for school. In that way parents had a chance to correct some of the things which might prevent the child from becoming a failure in his first school days. The visit of the parents with a school teacher and the school nurse also promotes better understanding between the home and the school, to the advantage of the child.

At the school inspection it was found that there were many who needed help with their muscular development. Consequently arrangements were made by Miss Mary Bullock, The State Physical Therapist to come and screen the cases, sending 19 to the Orthopedic Clinic in Laconia and giving exercises to 23 others at the High School. If those exercises are faithfully performed by the pupils, there is every reason to believe that faulty postures may all be overcome and prevent much future misery.

Besides the children who were transported for the monthly Orthopedic Clinics a few others were taken to Mental Hygiene and Tuberculosis Clinics and for eye examination. As usual considerable time was spent distributing food and clothing and Christmas toys to the needy. Regular office hours have been observed at the high school building so that any child with a health problem is able to confer with the school nurse. This time offers an opportunity to teach health when the pupil is most interested in that particular phase of health.

The nurse greatly appreciates the cooperation of all those who have been so understanding of the school health needs and of those who have given so generously of their time and skills to help make this program possible.
