

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the thirteenth (13th) day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear the report of agents and auditors and take any action thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote for snow removal and sanding on either class 5 or 6 roads or take any other action relating thereto, raise and appropriate money for the same.

5. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue or discontinue subject to gates and bars, or petition the Superior Court for the discontinuance or discontinuance subject to gates and bars or take any other action relating thereto to all or any part of the following mentioned roads:

1. The road leading from the Glebe road near the residence of C. W. Messer past the Alfred Lawrence place socalled to the Glebe road near the Mulligan land so-called.

2. The road leading from, the above mentioned road past the Pat Berry place so-called.

3. The road leading from the Warner J. Holden barn past the Gurnsey place so-called to the town line.

4. The road leading from Route 63 near the residence of Belle Whitaker past the Hartwell mill so-called to Route 63 near Partridge Brook.

5. The road leading from the C. J. Leach place socalled to Route 63 near the house owned by Mina S. Albee; also the road leading from this road past the Daggett place so-called over what is known as Nims hill to the road leading past the Edgar French place.

6. The road leading from the Mary Popruk buildings towards Route 12 near the Charles Wyman place so-called.

7. The road leading from the London road so-called towards Surry line and known as the Turnpike road.

8. The road leading from the cottage on the Emma Jenkins land to the intersection of the road leading from Route 12 past P. O. Thompson's and known as Beebe hill road.

9. The road leading from the Earl Brennan place to the intersection of the road leading from Route 12 to the Nettie Cummings place.

10. The road leading from the barn to Dexter Chamberlain to Route 12 and known as the Rogers Crossing road.

11. The road leading from Route 63 to the Ephriam Hunt place so-called.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to rebuild the abutments and bridge on the Glebe road between the Village and the South Village cemetery or take any action relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to apply calcium chloride or any other dust laying material to any of the gravel sections of the class 5 roads and raise and appropriate money for the same.

8. To see if the Town will vote for class V assistance for class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$495.49. (State contribution to be \$1,981.97.) 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to what is required by law for highways and bridges.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to straighten and widen the bend on the Spofford road near Robert Perry's.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the embankment near the E. J. Goodnow mill so-called.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow fence.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for completing the town historical papers.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to finish the town line between Westmoreland and Walpole and establish a marker at the river bank.

15. To see what disposition the Town will make relative to the William French place, and take any action thereto.

16. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jotham Lord fund.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$130.00 for the support of the library.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for the upkeep of cemeteries.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of establishing a capital reserve fund to be used for the construction of a fire-proof building in which to keep some of the Town, records.

23. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

24. To see if the Town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

25. To transact any other business which may come before the meeting.

#### TOWN MEETING, MARCH 14, 1944

The meeting was called to order by the moderator who read the warrant.

Since Article XII concerned the town officers, it was voted to postpone Article I until Article XII had been voted upon.

Art. II. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,791.00 for general government to be apportioned as follows:

Art. III. This article was open for the entire meeting.

Art. IV. It was voted to accept the Town Report as printed.

Art. V. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 for snow removal and sanding.

Art. VI. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,650.00 for calcium chloride and tar for class 5 roads.

Art. VII. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 for highways and bridges, said sum to include what is required by law. The sum of \$300.00 was voted to be raised and appropriated for general road expenses.

Art. VIII and Art. IX. These two articles were taken up jointly. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$247.40 to be used for class 5 assistance for class 5 roads. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$846.00 for State Aid for State Road Contsruction, said sum to be set aside for a post war project.

Art. X. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for the up-keep of cemeteries.

Art. XI. This article was passed over by vote.

Art. XII. This article was passed over by vote, 50 votes to pass over, 23 not to pass over.

Art. I. Was opened until the close of the meeting.

Art. XIII. It was voted to pass over the article.

Art. VIV. It was voted to pass over the article.

Art. V. It was voted to pass over the article.

Art VI. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for providing an exit, and fire escape on the exterior of the Town Hall, also flame proofing the stage accessories.

Art. XVII. The article was discussed and it was voted to use the snow plow in question.

Art.XVIII. It was voted that the income from the Jotham Lord fund be used for the support of the library.

Art. XIX. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$80.00 for the support of the Library.

Art. XX. It was voted that the selectmen have the power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes to be collected.

Art. XXI. The sum of \$59.00 was voted to be raised and appropriated to the use of the Monadnock Region Association.

Art. XXII. This article was passed over by vote.

Art. XXIII. This article was passed over by vote.

Art. XXIV. The need of street lights in East Westmoreland was brought to the attention of the meeting. It was voted that the Town instruct the selectmen to have six street lights installed in East Westmoreland when available. The selectment were instructed to finance said installation of street lights from unexpended money in the treasury.

The present committee on the Town History were empowered to proceed with the publication in book form.

The election officers then counted the ballots with the following results. Total ballots cast 149.

Town clerk. Ruth E. Burt had 131 votes and was declared elected.

Selectman for three years. George Aldrich had 22 votes. Walter Dunn had 60 votes. Lawrence Leach had 63 votes and was declared elected.

Town treasurer. Charles T. Aldrich had 137 votes and was declared elected.

Tax collector. Ruth E. Burt had 136 votes and was declared elected. River road agent. Leon E. McClenning had 133 votes and was declared elected.

South Village road agent. Charles M. Messer had 131 votes and was declared elected.

East Westmoreland road agent. Fletcher B. Fredette had 50 votes. Charles M. Moore had 73 votes and was declared elected. Robert L. Blood had 4 votes. George Martin and L. W. Churchill each had 1 vote.

Trustee of Library for three years. Elizabeth Shaw had 1 vote. Edith F. Bridgeman had 126 votes and was declared elected.

Auditors. Oscar W. Billings had 127 votes and was declared elected. Roger L. Bridgeman had 120 votes and was declared elected.

Trustee of trust funds for three years. Nellie F. C. Aldrich had 125 votes and was declared elected. Ruth H. Burt and Mrs. Frank Aldrich each had 1 vote.

Constable. Walter C. Taylor had 123 votes and was declared elected. Donald R. Blood had 2 votes. D. Paine had 4 votes. Morris Willey had 1 vote.

Surveyors of wood and lumber. Perley O. Thompson had 120 votes and was declared elected. William S. Starkey had 117 votes and was declared elected. Donald A. Paine had 113 votes and was declared elected. Robert Blood, Frank Little and M. Spring each had 1 vote.

Fence viewers. Selden B. Lund had 119 votes and was declared elected. Lawrence A. Leach had 117 votes and was declared elected. Russell H. Wellington had 123 votes and was declared elected. George Aldrich had 1 vote.

Briggs fund committee. Helen P. Terry had 122 votes and was declared elected. Olive E. Nims had 120 votes and was declared elected. Annie Shelley had 1 vote.

The result of the election was read after which the meeting was adjourned.

# **REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

#### ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

Only one change was made on the teaching staff this year. Miss Arlene Farnsworth was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. Marjorie Russell. Miss Farnsworth is a graduate of Keene Teachers College and has had one year of previous experience.

Our schools continue to be affected by war conditions. The shortage of teachers grows more acute in rural districts. What teachers are available seek positions first in larger communities or in consolidated schools where pay is better, where work is in single grades or subjects, and where transportation facilities are available. Many schools in the state opened this year with substitute teachers. Many others have lost teachers during the school year, replacing them only with great difficulty. The situation facing us for another year will be even more serious.

Westmoreland has been very fortunate in retaining the services of excellent teachers for its three one-room rural schools. However, the prospect of filling vacancies in these schools is not encouraging. It is now practically impossible to find a person who is willing to teach all eight grades in a one-room rural school. It is very doubtful if this situation will ever improve. The supply of capable rural teachers has fast dwindled and none have been or are being trained for this type of work.

The time has come when the Westmoreland School District must give immediate and very serious consideration to ways of meeting the possibility of an unfilled vacancy in one or all of its rural schools. The situation in Westmoreland is more complicated by the fact that the state has already withheld state aid approval on the salary of one teacher.

Since the total enrollment in the schools of the district could be handled by three teachers in a centralized school, it is entirely possible that further reduction in state aid for salaries may be made.

The state will, however, continue to provide funds for transportation of pupils provided such transportation contributes to a more economical distribution of the teacher load.

Because of the situation which has evolved with respect to the one-room schools, I recommend that consideration be given to the possibility of altering the village school to provide for a modern three teacher centralized school to serve the whole town.

A school of this type with modern facilities would, I believe, be adequate, economical, and satisfactory. It would provide for an expanding community and would promote civic interest and pride.

#### ENROLLMENT, JANUARY 15, 1945

The various programs of studies recommended for the elementary schools of the state are in the process of revision. The first of this series, Arithmetic, has been completed and is now in use in our schools. The development of this program has been a cooperative undertaking combining the suggestions of the elementary teachers with the results of research and recommendations of specialists in the field of education. The result of this effort is the development of an outline of work better suited to the maturity of children at the various grade levels.

The distributions of operations in the fundamental processes is indicated on a grade placement chart. Recommendations are made for time allotment and the application of fundamental processes to number experiences and problem solving.

Suggestions are made for constructing diagnostic tests in all grades and for the development of remedial work in the four fundamental operations with integers and fractions.

The teaching of some of the more difficult abstract processes is delayed and the instruction during the initial period progresses from the concrete to the abstract form.

The program provides for individual differences in abilities of children and for the enrichment of work for gifted children.

One section of the new program is devoted to suggestions for using the common activities of the home, school, and community in developing number concept and arithmetic experience.

After a brief period of adjustment, this program will develop as standard, thus unifying the work in arithmetic in all of our schools according to the new state standards.

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#### BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

The following repairs and improvements were made at the schools during the year:

The desk tops in all school rooms were sanded and varnished. At the Depot school the water pipe below the pump was boxed and a lower valve trap was installed. The trap door approach to the attic was enlarged. Repairs were made on the screens.

The window screens at the Corner school were repaired and the glass was set in some of the windows. At the East Westmoreland school, the cupboard was painted and several repairs of a minor nature were attended to as needed.

A new teeter board was built for the Village school.

Twenty-five pupils attended high school as follows: Walpole High School, 13; Keene High School, 11; Brattleboro High School, 1.

The number of tardinesses listed above does not include instances of tardiness due to late school busses. However, state regulations require that cases of tardiness due to delayed school busses must be marked in the school register and included in all attendance records to the state department. It should also be noted that, under this regulation, all tardinesses due to delayed busses or otherwise, are recorded against the permanent attendance record of the pupils affected.

The Parent Teacher Association's contribution of money and food for the hot lunch program in some of the schools has been appreciated. The P.-T. A. at the Village school furnished some instruments for the rhythm band.

I wish to thank the members of the School Board, teachers, parents, and pupils for their cooperation during the year.






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## ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

- 1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
- Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
- 3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
- 4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
- 5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
