SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Our annual report is not designed to be pessimistic in tone; however, we do wish to emphasize to all voters the necessity for careful consideration of all expenditures.

Our school and county taxes have risen way out of proportion as compared with those assessed to maintain town services. We have no control over county taxes, which will amount to \$15,800.00 in 1964. We believe, however, that it is necessary for voters and taxpayers to attend both school and town meetings in order to understand the expenditures that account for the tax rate. We cannot stress the point too strongly that a minority of the taxpayers have shown interest while a majority have stayed home and then complained about their taxes,

Your selectmen, recognizing the need for prudent spending, have not asked for anything but the bare necessities to run our office, for a number of years. Due to the growth of our town and the increased work load, we are going to ask for a sum of money to expand our office facilities, in order to expedite our bookkeeping and other town business and to meet with the general public in a more efficient manner.

Under the article to raise money for our Police Department we are going to ask that enough money be appropriated to add a full time officer to the department. This is necessitated by the fact that our Chief of Police is over-burdened by an extra heavy work load. At the present time it is impossible to maintain any road patrol because of investigative work, criminal and otherwise, and accidents and other duties.

The officers of our Fire Department feel that the time has come when we should consider full time coverage of the firehouse during the daytime. This has been discussed at some length and will probably be presented to you at next year's town meeting. We feel that a solution to this problem can be worked out by the combined efforts of both police and fire department officials.

Another article that should arouse more than passing interest is an article to re-open old abandoned roads that were legally closed at our 1962 town meeting. We believe some very fundamental questions

should be asked in the consideration of this article. Will the rehabilitation of these roads serve any purpose to the majority of the town? Will they be an asset to our road system? Will the cost of rehabilitation be prohibitive? Do they meet the requirements as set up by the planning board and selectmen for the acceptance of streets?

The annual school meeting is being held on Thursday, March 5 and is an evening meeting. The election will be held Tuesday, March 10, but articles in the town warrant will be acted upon the following evening. Again we urge all to attend these meetings.

We wish to extend our sincere thanks to Mrs. Rose C. Boda for the many years she served as tax collector. Her resignation was accepted with regret on December 31, 1963.

We wish to thank the members of our planning board and board of adjustment for their interest and endeavor. It should be pointed out that they serve without pay.

We appreciatively acknowledge the co-operation of all town officials, without which our job would be much more difficult.

We are inserting, after this report, the proposed zoning changes, for your information.

They will be on the ballot on March 10 but will not appear in detail.

SHALL THE ZONING ORDINANCES AND AMENDMENTS AS PROPOSED BY THE PLANNING AND ZONING BOARD BE ADOPTED FOR THIS TOWN?

QUESTION 1:

Amend Article II Section 1 by deleting the present Section 1 and inserting in place thereof the following: Lots in Zone A intended for permanent residential purposes shall contain at least 30,000 square feet in area for each family unit and shall have a minimum width of 150 feet at the 30 foot setback line.

Amend Article II Section 2 by deleting 25 feet and inserting in place thereof 30 feet.

Amend Article II Section 3 by deleting the present Section 3 and inserting in place thereof the following: Buildings intended for permanent dwellings shall have a minimum ground floor area of 600 square feet per family unit. Buildings intended for seasonal occupancy shall have a minimum ground floor area of 400 square feet per family unit. This section does not apply to transient accommodations but they shall comply with state laws relating to same.

QUESTION 2:

Amend Article V Section 2 by deleting the present Section 2 and inserting in place thereof the following: A permit will be required for the erection of any type of outdoor advertising sign. Only persons who conduct business within this town shall be allowed to erect these signs.

Such persons, businesses or corporations shall be allowed 4 advertising signs, 2 of which may be located off the premises from which the business is conducted. One additional sign may be painted on or supported by the building. Property owners shall be allowed 1 sign for each building or tract of land for sale, lease or rent. No sign shall be placed in such a position as to endanger traffic on a street by obscuring a clear view or by confusion with official street signs or signals. Every sign permitted shall be constructed of durable materials, and shall be maintained in good condition and repair at all times.

QUESTION 3:

Amend Article V Section 5 by deleting the present Section 5 and inserting in place thereof the following: Uses other than residential in Zones B and C are permitted, provided that the following specifica-

tions are complied with: Approval of the planning and zoning board as to size of lot, parking space available and setback distance from front line. Smoke emitted by any stack shall not equal or exceed in density Ringleman #2 for periods aggregating more than 4 minutes in any half hour period. Noise outside of lot lines does not exceed in intensity that of average traffic on the adjacent street so as not to be objectionable due to intermittance, beat frequency or shrillness and no objectionable, obnoxious or dangerous concentrations or quantities of odor, dust, fly ash, gases or fumes are emitted and no excess vibration is caused. Farm buildings used for farm purposes are excluded from these restrictions.

Amend Article V by adding a new section to be designated as Section 7, as follows: The following uses are specifically prohibited in all zones: acetylene gas manufacture, ammonia, bleaching powder or chlorine manufacture, animal fertilizer manufacture, asphalt manufacture or refining, assaying other than gold or silver, auto wrecking yard, blast furnace, brick terra cotta or tile manufacturing. candle manufacturing, celluloid treatment, storage or manufacturing. coke manufacturing, cremation excepting a cemetery, creosote treatment manufacturing, dye stuff manufacturing, gunpowder, fireworks or explosives manufacturer, emery cloth or sandpaper manufacture. enamel, japan laquer, oil, paint, shellac, turpentine or varnish manufacture, shoe or stove blackening, cleaning or polish manufacturing. importing for slaughter or slaughtering of animals or fowls on a commercial basis, smelting of ores, soap manufacturing, soda and soda compounds manufacturing, stockyards, tanning or curing of rawhides or skins or japaning of leather, tar distillation or manufacturing, manufacturing of tar roofing or tar waterproofing materials, yeast manufacturing.

QUESTION 4:

Amend Article V by adding a new section to be numbered Section 8 as follows: Buildings for business or industrial use may occupy no more than 50 per cent of the lot upon which they are located. All other building uses in all zones shall occupy no more than 30 per cent of the lot upon which they may be located.

QUESTION 5:

Amend Article II by adding a new section to be numbered as

Section 8 as follows: Buildings on lots in Zone A that do not meet the requirements of Section 1 of this Article shall not be used for year-round dwellings, but may be used for seasonal dwellings only. A certificate of occupancy shall be required to change the use or occupancy of any building in Zone A. However, before this certificate will be issued, the requirements of the building code and health department regulations must be complied with.

FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention, however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience -- a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

- Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
- 2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump it's safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
 - 3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.
- 4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Let's all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

The primary purpose of the Board of Health in Windham has been, and will continue to be, watch dogging of the Class A and Class B lakes and ponds in the town. Any letup in this area will result in an increased tax rate for the townspeople. A constant surveillance of the land area surrounding Cobbetts Pond is a must. Any break through of sewage should be reported to this department by anyone who finds or suspects that this condition exists.

In recent months there have been some cases of rabid wild animals in the northern districts. I would like to take this opportunity to advise all parents to warn their children to stay away from any animals that they may find sick. A bite from these animals could be extremely dangerous. There have been no known cases in this area, and this is inserted in this report only as a warning and a means of contact.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Board of Selectmen Windham, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Windham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustee of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1962 - December 31, 1963: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1962 and December 31, 1963, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus decreased by \$7,040.24, from \$27,252.45 to \$20,212.21, in 1963. Inasmuch as there were no outstanding long term notes or bonds on December 31, 1963, the Balance Sheet Surplus represents the Current Surplus on that date.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures -

Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$11,523,20. less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$4,964.18, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$6,559.02.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1963, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Bookbalances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any change which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Surety Bond of Town Clerk:

The surety bond of the Town Clerk should be increased from \$2,000.00 to \$3,000.00 in order that the amount of the bond may be more proportional to the amount of funds received.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (Letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Windham for their assistance during the course of the audit.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the school district in the town of Windham, New Hampshire, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Center School on the 5th day of March, 1964 in said district at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following:

By vote of the School Board the polls for this meeting will remain open from 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon to 8:30 o'clock in the afternoon and as much longer as the voters of the district may direct at the opening of the meeting.

Articles of the warrant not covered by ballot to be acted upon at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 7. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.
- 8. To see if the district will authorize the school board to accept gifts in the name of and in behalf of the district and pass any vote relating thereto.

- 9. To see if the district will authorize the school board to arrange for the annual audit of school accounts by the Municipal Accounting Division of the New Hampshire State Tax Commission and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 10. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase land for building needs, said amount to include closing and legal fees.
- 11. To see if the district will authorize the school board to use the \$600.00 appropriated in 1963 for grading and surfacing basketball court at Searles School, to grade and surface basketball court at Center School.
- 12. To see if the school district will elect to approve of the inclusion of its employees in the Employees Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire as provided for by Chapter 27-A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by Chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945 and as provided by Chapter 201 of the laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto and to see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for this purpose.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1964-65, a sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) to be made available to the school district prior to July 1, 1964, in order to meet unanticipated obligations caused by, additional teacher, furniture and necessary alterations to accommodate a new first grade.
- 14. To see if the district will authorize the school board to enter into contractual agreements with other schools / or school districts to provide for the secondary school education of Windham pupils and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the district will authorize the school board to withdraw monies and accumulated interest in the hands of the trustees of trust funds for the pointing of the Searles tower and roof repairs.
- 16. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to point the tower and repair tower roof at Searles School.
- 17. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate, said sum to be placed with the trustees of trust funds until sufficient monies are accumulated to repoint the Tower section of the Searles School and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 18. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate to finish grading and surfacing the area at the front of the Center School.

- 19. To see if the district will authorize the school board to use monies not expended on grading at Searles School to grade and improve playground at Center School.
- 20. To see if the district will vote to instruct the School District Moderator to appoint a School Building Committee. Said Committee to submit a written report and recommendations to the School Board not later than May 7, 1964.
- 21. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to construct a new addition to the present Windham Center School and to authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary and proper or advisable in connection with the construction and equipping of an addition and authorize the school board to issue bonds or notes, in the amount voted, for the purpose of financing such construction.
- 22. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the initial interest payment on the bond issue for the addition to the Windham Center School.
- 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SPECIAL SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT

The special school committee appointed to work with the School Board on current problems spent several meetings studying the need of more school housing in Windham. We toured both Searles and Center Schools covering everything from classrooms to school play area. We studied maintenance figures at Searles School and got estimates on pointing the tower and roofing the building. We found that a bad situation already exists at Center School with the use of a basement room for a regular classroom. Also, the remedial reading teacher, now teaching five mornings a week, is holding her classes in a makeshift corner of the library. The office, teachers' and nurse's rooms will have to be converted into a classroom in September, 1964.

We studied census figures taken early in 1963 and found that from now on over the next five years we will have to plan on having at least two first grades entering each year. With this information in hand, this committee recommends the following:

- 1. To keep and maintain Searles School. We feel this cost will not be too much for the value the school is to the Windham School District.
- 2. To add eight new classrooms on to Center School for the following reasons:
- a. The present new section was built in anticipation of more rooms being added, the boiler being capable of having more units added.
- b. The office, teachers' room and nurse's room should be returned to its present use because of its need and strategic location.
 - c. The class housed in the basement room should be moved.
- d. The remedial reading classes should have a permanent room to be set up in.
- e. This number of rooms should take care of the housing for the next five years if our present rate of growth does not increase by too great an amount in this period of time.
- 3. To take immediate steps to obtain more land for school play area all of which will be gone with the building of more classrooms.
- 4. To appoint a building committee at the School District Meeting in March.
- 5. To recess the School District Meeting until June at which time the building committee could report.
- 6. To appropriate a sum of money to build an addition to the Center School.
- a. This to assure the School District of having classrooms ready for use by September, 1965 and avoid overcrowding for more than one year.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and citizens of Windham, New Hampshire:

This is my first report as Superintendent of Schools in Windham. The report is divided into the headings of personnel, housing, curriculum, and appreciations. The more specific details will be contained in the Principal's Report, the School-Nurse Teacher's Report and the statistical information at the end of these reports.

PERSONNEL

The expansion of services in the Physical Education-Principal area brought a new teacher into the Center School. Mr. James Burns, grade 5 teacher, moved to the grade 6 position vacated by the teaching principal. Mrs. Jane Dearborn of Windham, N. H., a graduate of Cornell University, was employed to teach grade 5.

The anticipated heavy first grade enrollment prompted the School Board to make plans for two first grades and we were indeed fortunate to employ a master teacher for the additional grade 1. Mrs. Maria Webber of Windham, N. H., a graduate of Keene State College, with teaching experience in Derry and Nashua, was signed for the position.

The Principal, Mr. Arnold Wilcox, resigned in August to return to a position in Michigan. It was felt that it would be unfair to any other system to seek and hire a principal at the beginning of school, so Mr. James Burns was asked to serve as acting principal and grade 6 teacher for a period of time. Mrs. Barbara Fellows was employed to be the school secretary to help with the many duties and tasks that would have prevented Mr. Burns from being with his class full time. This arrangement was in effect until the new Principal, Mr. William Murphy, was employed. Mr. Murphy was graduated from Arnold College with a Masters Degree from Boston University and a Certificate of Advanced Standing from the University of Connecticut. He most recently was a principal in Union, Conn. He has also had teaching experience in Haverhill, Mass.

Mr. Murphy will carry on a formal physical education program with each grade in both schools as well as his administrative and supervisory duties.

HOUSING

The School Board and School Housing Committee under the Chairmanship of Mr. Leonard Littlefield have been meeting and analyzing the census reports. The results indicate a need for additional space. Next September the extra grade will be Grade 2 and it will be housed in the present office, nurse's and teachers' room area once the partition has been removed. This means that all available space will be in use

and we will still have one grade in the basement area.

The committee will make its recommendations in a special report of its own following the regular reports. We must have plans for more classrooms and playground development by one-year from now at the latest.

The change of grade placement brought the two first grades to the Searles School. The children and teachers seem happy in their new environment and the playground and building is quite adequate for them. This move enabled the 7th and 8th grades to take advantage of the gymnasium without having to be transported back and forth from the Searles School.

CURRICULUM

One of the most important developments in the curriculum area is that of employing a remedial reading teacher. Mrs. Barbara Dreisel of Salem, N. H., a graduate of Lowell State Teachers College with teaching experience in Haverhill, Mass., was employed to aid pupils at all levels in all grades, in reading. She also has been a source of guidance in the reading area for the teachers.

The textbook study led to the adoption of new texts in the areas of English, social studies, arithmetic, spelling and reading. We hope to continue the program until all grades have up to date books. Many inservice meetings have been held for the teachers and more will be held in the future.

APPRECIATIONS

I wish to sincerely thank the School Board and citizens of Windham for their cooperation and help in bringing good education to the children.

I also wish to thank the P. T. O. for the many gifts for the school, particularly the library books. The aid and help of other organizations is much appreciated also.

The teachers, parents, pupils, nurse-teacher and bus operators have been most helpful and cooperative and progress is possible when we are all working together. A thank-you also to Mrs. Barbara Fellows for her aid and to Mr. William Nagle for maintaining our schools in a noteworthy manner.

REPORT OF ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

It is my pleasure to present this report to the citizens of Windham for the year ending June 30, 1963.

It appears to me that Windham and its surrounding areas must start making plans for a very interesting, challenging and rapidly changing period of growth. With proper planning and foresight this can work to the advantage of our educational system.

The mechanics and report of such a study are an actuality and progress has been made by your committee appointed last year at the School Meeting. It appears that such a committee or study group would be a necessity for the foreseeable future. Above all, the thoughts from, and the advice of, our total population is needed in terms of their desires for education.

The housing situation, as it now stands, is getting tight and is soon destined to be critical.

In the several areas of curriculum which need strengthening, reading is progressing as is indicated elsewhere in your report. There does, however, seem to be a need for expanding this area to include our grades 7 and 8.

Modern math should be gradually implemented to make it more possible for our children to compete in secondary school.

The world of competition in education is changing and intensifying so rapidly that it is almost impossible for our young people. In terms of easing these pressures we must, considering all things, and to the best of our ability, try to improve their chances of success in competition for education, jobs and even survival.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the people of Windham, the School Board, Mr. Dolph and members of the faculty and staff for making this a very pleasant year.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

A good school health program is the result of the combined efforts of the entire staff and community. The teacher continues to be the key person in the establishment of healthy classroom environment. Good health habits are gained by constant usage and imitable patterns. Cooperation between home and school is the greatest asset in maintaining a good health program.

Vision and hearing tests were done on all children during the year. Of the 206 visual tests done, 11 children were referred for eye examinations by their own doctor. Of the 204 hearing tests 4 were referred for further examination.

Mrs. Marjorie Plaisted, state dental hygienist, visits the classrooms twice during the year. She orients the teachers in planning and securing materials in conjunction with the dental health program.

The tuberculin patch testing program was conducted during the month of May. 77 children in grades 1, 3, 5 and 8, whose parents so desired, received the patch test. The portable X-ray unit was set up at Grinnell School, where 1 child who had a positive reaction received a chest X-ray.

The pre-school registration clinic was held in May for all children entering school in September. At this time each child receives a vision, hearing and motor coordination test. The dental hygienist is present to conduct dental examinations and make necessary recommendations. The nurse also gets a complete medical history on each child. 29 children were registered at the clinic.

A speech clinic was held in Derry with the purpose of determining the need of a speech therapist in this area. 4 children referred for therapy certainly indicated that such a need exists.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1962 and June 30, 1963, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$6,311.41 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963. Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1963, is indicated in Exhibit F. Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit G)

A statement of outstanding bonded indebtedness as of June 30, 1963, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Windham is presented in Exhibit H. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1963, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1962-63 School Tax, less prepayment of 1962-63 School Tax of \$6,600.00 received during fiscal year ended June 30, 1962, plus a deficiency appropriation of \$9,800.00, which was made at the annual district meeting in March, 1963, and an advance on the 1963-64 School Tax of \$4,944.09. The amount of the advance is shown as a liability account in the Balance Sheet (Sheet A).

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus or (Deficit):

It is noted that the current financial condition of the School District changed from a current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) of \$2,917.89 to a current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) of \$5,770.70, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, as shown herewith:




