THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March, next, at Ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 4. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for Class 5 Roads and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for State Aid Roads and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to buy 200 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch hose and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to buy 200 feet of one and one-half inch hose and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 10. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of taxes.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept a certain sum of money from the Community Club of Bennington to be expended for recreational purposes by the Selectmen upon the approval of the Community Club Trustees, or take any action thereon.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to relay the present one-inch pipe on Old Peterboro road with six (6) inch pipe as far as the property of Doris M. Parker, put a hydrant at the end of the six-inch pipe, and continue from there with two and one-half $(2\frac{1}{2})$ inch pipe to a standpipe at the end of the present line, or to take any action thereon.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote of that part of Article 12, Warrant of 1937, requiring minor officers of the Town, who receive no salary. to pay \$1.00 filing fee, or take any action thereon.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to have the Vital Statistics printed in the Town Report, or take any action thereon.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Road Grader, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Sander, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to buy a fire-proof safe or install a fire-proof vault and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Evergreen Cemetery.
- 19. To see what action the Town will take relative to Flood control in the upper Contoocook Valley.
- 20. To see how much money the Town will raise for statutory requirements and to carry the articles and appropriations of the School District into effect.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

GENERAL DISCUSSION

The schools in Bennington opened last September with a registration of one hundred fifteen. Twenty of these are in the High school which consists of grades nine There was one change in our teaching staff. Mr. Stewart Thompson replaced the former principal of the high school. Every teacher is making a valuable contribution to the welfare of the school. changes have been made in the high school organization and curriculum during the past five years, all of which have been previously reported. A new course, namely economics, taught on a high school level has been added this year, as an elective course to make it possible for several pupils to take something else other than plane geometry, a subject which they either did not need, or cannot pursue successfully.

Under the leadership of the new principal a greater interest than ever has been stimulated in athletic activities and in clubs. not only among the boys but the girls.

Plays and public speaking are being encouraged by all the teachers. All of which activities teach children the worthy use of leisure time, which is one of the accepted cardinal principles of education at the present time.

I have kept in constant touch with the school system by my attendance at school board meetings, and by my inspection and supervision of the teachers' classroom work, as well as acting as purchasing agent of the school board, to furnish the necessary books and supplies necessary for the teachers and pupils.
