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Inaugural Address.

Delivered by the Mayor, HON. GEORGE E. HUTCHINS,

March 27, 1905.

Gentlemen of the City Council :

We are here to-day assembled in accordance with the provisions of our city charter to take the oath of office and assume the duties of our municipal administration. We should work together for the best interests of our city, and conduct its affairs on sound business principles. I invite you to carefully consider and examine these reports, hoping you may make such suggestions for improvements as may occur to you.

A question which demands our careful consideration is the financial condition of the city. We should be careful and keep within the limits of the appropriations.

I would recommend appropriations sufficient for the building of streets and sidewalks which are most needed.

A high standard has been maintained in our public school system. The loss of our high school building by fire makes it necessary for new buildings for schools. 1 would recommend the building of schoolhouses to accomodate our schools.

I would recommend a consideration of the report of Chief Engineer Kent. The first thing to consider is the supply of water, as it is not sufficient in case of fire. This department should be kept up to a high standard. I would recommend the purchase of a good steam fire engine.

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CITY OF BERLIN.

With the fine and useful public library building we now have—I recommend the appropriation be granted that the trustees have asked for.

Our Board of Health department is one that every citizen should be interested in and every taxpayer by looking well to the sanitary conditions of his property will increase its value and save doctor's bills for his tenants.

In conclusion, I desire to say and express to the citizens of Berlin my appreciation of the honor conferred upon me in my election as Mayor. I will endeavor to be cautious and conservative in the performance of my duties.

Section 1. No minor under sixteen years of age shall, without a good excuse, be allowed to remain on the streets of said Berlin after eight o'clock at night, unless accompanied by parent or guardian.

Section 2. Any minor violating this ordinance shall be fined not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00.)

The following pages are submitted for the purpose of showing when the various irregularities in the accounts of Winborn A. Boothby, Treasurer of the City of Berlin, occurred, with reference to certain periods of time, viz :

> First, September 1, 1902, to October 18, 1902. Second, October 18, 1902, to April 2, 1903. Third, April 2, 1903, to May 4, 1904. Fourth, May 4, 1904, to May 1, 1905. Fifth, May 1, 1905, to August 7, 1905.

Each specific variation is shown by its date, the number of the check drawn at the time on City National Bank of Berlin, the amount of the voncher, where there was any, its absence being noted by stars.

The variation between the cash receipts and the money deposited in the City National Bank of Berlin, is also shown.

In the second period the variation is shown as between the receipts per cash book and deposits; in the third, fourth and fifth periods the variation is shown between receipts that were *not* entered in cash book in some cases, together with those that were entered; the sinking fund interest being the only items not entered on cash book, amounting to \$112.50. Report of City Solicitor.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1906.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

At the time of my last annual report the following cases were pending in court:

> Cyril Brooks vs. City of Berlin. (2) John B. Gagné vs. City of Berlin, Nels Nelson vs. City of Berlin. Evan Johnson vs. City of Berlin. Martin Rasmason vs. City of Berlin. Emily C. Paine vs. City of Berlin. Mary B. Barton vs. City of Berlin. J. Bred Bell vs. City of Berlin.

Every one of the above cases, except these of Evan Johnson and Emily C. Paine, were either tried or settled out of court by mutual agreement of parties and with the advice and consent of the City Council.

Cyril Brooks was paid \$515 for damages by surface water to his property on Granite street.

John B. Gagné was also allowed \$150 in full settlement of his claim for the same cause.

In the Barton and Bell suits, the latter was paid \$250 for the loss of his horse and damage to carriage resulting from a runaway accident in Berlin Mills Village, alleged to have been caused by a dangerous embankment defectively railed at that point on Main street which adjoins the Murray estate; Mrs. Barton waiving all claims against the City on account of the same in consideration of the above settlement.

The Paine suit will be in order for hearing before the County Commissioners at the next April term of our Superior Court; as will also be the petition of Evan Johnson.

The only suit brought against the City during the past year was that of Gustave Halverson who claimed his premises in Berlin Mills village were damaged by surface water and sewage. This case was [36] entered at the April term, 1905, and was continued to the April term, 1906, at the request of plaintiff's counsel.

The action of Martin Rasmason and Nels Nelson were heard at the last September term and verdicts were rendered in favor of the plaintiffs for \$105 and \$15 respectively. The Rasmason claim, as originally filed with the City, amounted to \$254.55, and the Nelson claim to \$25.20, both claims being for damages by surface water to personal property and real estate at Berlin Mills Village.

While the City has lost both actions the result attained is a gratiifying one and will serve as a guide in future actions of the same nature, which, I believe, was the object sought by the Council in ordering the claims to be fought, so as to make a test case of the hiability of the City under the same conditions.

The verdicts clearly show that claimants, in presenting their claims for damages arising from any breach of official duty on the part of the City, are frequently disposed to present much larger accounts than they can maintain when submitted to legal investigation.

The evidence submitted by the plaintiffs has also developed the fact that in the past, certain Street Commissioners have assumed too much authority in the discharge of their official duties, and so long as the city is held responsible for any and all of their acts detrimental to its citizens, as well as for their negligence in constructing and repairing streets and sewers, your honorable body may perhaps check future litigation by limiting the powers of such officers or at least by compelling them to submit monthly reports of their doings to the City Council.

Repairs on streets that have not been laid out should not be allowed to be made, unless the abutters, whether owners of real estate or not, shall waive all future claims for damages arising out of such repairs.

In this connection I might suggest further that no streets be laid out that the Council does not intend to build, for such action might throw the City into useless litigation and possibly render it liable to indictment for not building the streets so laid out.

The suit of Cyril Brooks for the rental for school purposes of the Salvation Army Barraeks, so-called, situated on Pleasant street, and for damages to the building, was also tried at the September Term and judgment rendered in favor of the plaintiff for \$166.98 and taxable costs. This was a matter entirely within the control of the School Board, and it appeared from the evidence that the premises were abandoned without any notice to the landlord and nobody seemed to know very much about it, nor in whose possession the

keys to the building had been left. The damages assessed against the City for the destruction of a chimney were collectible by virtue of very strange stipulations on the part of the city contained in the first lease taken by it of the premises.

The litigation carried on in behalf of the City during the past year was rendered necessary by the defalcation of its Treasurer, and by the selection by the School Board of a new location for the High School building, two important events which deserve more than a cursory mention here.

The Boothby Suits.

On August 7, 1905, Winborn A. Boothby who had held since October 7, 1902, the office of City Treasurer, together with the office of City Clerk, tendered his resignation in both capacities as the result of various irregularities discovered in his Treasurer's accounts after an expert examination of the same at the request of a selfappointed committee of city officials. The total apparent cash shortage reported to the City Council, on September 2, 1905, by Public Accountant Franklin Hall, of Boston, Mass., amounted to \$16,194.78, and with reference to the different periods representing Boothby's successive terms in office, was made up as follows:—

First: Sept. 1, 1902, to Oct. 18, 1902,	\$ 178.62

To protect itself against this loss the City held four surety bonds, in the sum of \$15,000 each, three of which were issued by the United States Fidelity & Guaranty Company, of Baltimore, Md., for the years 1903-4, 1904-5, 1905-6, and the fourth one by the Fidelity & Deposit Company of Maryland for the year 1902-3. The absence of a bond to cover any deficiency occurring during the first period of Boothby's office tenure was due to the fact that, from September 1, 1902, to the time of his election by the City Council (October 7, 1902), he simply took charge of the Treasurer's books and performed all the duties of the office for L. H. Veilleux, then City Treasurer, and also to the fact that the first bond furnished by the latter's successor did not, for some reason or other, begin to run before eleven days after he qualified in office. Thus the aggregate liability of the Surety Companies on the Boothby bonds was reduced to \$16,016.16. Due notice of the shortage was served without delay upon the sureties involved, and suit brought against both to recover the amount of their respective liability as shown above. The defendant Companies at first opposed the City's claim upon separate and independent grounds.

The United States Fidelity & Guaranty Company set up as a defense: 1. That, in every case, before issuing a bond for the benefit of the City of Berlin, they had secured from its Auditor a statement certifying to the correctness of the Treasurer's accounts; 2 That the bond for 1903–4 was not in existence and therefore no liability attached thereon, even if the Company were otherwise liable.

The Fidelity & Deposit Company, on its part, claimed that its contract with the City had become void because the shortage "did not occur and was not discovered during the continuance of the bond, nor within six months thereafter, nor within six months after the resignation of Boothby as Treasurer, the same not having been accepted prior to the expiration of the bond," all of which were conditions precedent to a recovery on the bond, as stipulated by its express terms and conditions.

The City's answer to the above objections was briefly : 1, That no statement of its Auditor regarding the condition of the Treasurer's accounts could be binding upon it unless the same was furnished with its knowledge and full assent and authority; 2. That it was not essential to the right of recovery by the City against the U.S. Fidelity and Guaranty Company to produce the bond of 1903-4, if it were lost, provided it could establish otherwise the existence of the contract, and that the City held the Company's receipt for the premium paid thereon; 3. That the bond of the Fidelity & Deposit Company, not having been issued in accordance with the requirements of our Public Statutes, must be ignored entirely and the Company presumed to have contracted with the City in the manner and form prescribed by law, which would obviate all restriction imposed upon the City under the former's bond in its present form.

These questions had never been decided in this state and the decisions in other states appeared to be conflicting. So that there was considerable doubt on both sides as to the amount recoverable under the various bonds in issue.

On November 10, 1905, the following offer of a compromise was made in writing to the City, through its attorneys, in behalf of the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company by its legal representative, M. Barrett Walker, Esq., of Baltimore, who had come

to this City for the special purpose of making a personal investigation of the facts in this case :

BERLIN, N. H., NOVEMBER 10, 1905.

Messrs. Goss & Tardivel,

Attorneys for the City,

Berlin, N. H.

Gentlemen :---

In the matter of the suit of the City of Berlin v. The U. S. Fidelity and Guaranty Company of Baltimore, Md., claim is made on behalf of said City of Berlin on a bond executed by said Company as surety for Winborn A. Boothby, late City Treasurer for the year beginning in May, 1904, for \$7114.56. Claim is also made on a renewal of said bond for \$2598.50, to which has been recently added a newly discovered item of \$436.12.

Claim is also made for \$4948.07 upon a bond alleged to have been executed by said Company on behalf of Boothby for the year beginning April, 1903. No bond is produced and the declaration which has been filed does not recite the contents of any bond executed by said Company, and the Company denies all liability for this item.

I now desire, subject to the following conditions, on behalf of my client, the United States Fidelity & Guaranty Company, to tender to you as the legal representatives of the City of Berlin, the sum of ten thousand dollars to cover the entire liability claimed under the bond which is in existence and its renewal, and also for an additional amount which the Company is willing to pay in full settlement in order to be rid of the litigation against it.

The Company is willing, in addition to the above payment of ten thousand dollars to relinquish whatever rights it may have acquired in the suit recently instituted against the property of Mr. and Mrs. Boothby and the Weston Press.

If above offer is not accepted, the Company will feel obliged, in order to protect itself, to remove the case now pending against it to the United States Courts and there contest the same to the Court of last resort. To avoid the necessity and expense of said litigation this offer is made.

This tender is made subject to the condition that nothing herein stated, in the event the offer is not accepted, shall hereafter be taken as any admission on the part of my client or myself of any liability whatever for any item set out in the suit now pending; and subject to the further condition that an item of \$266, and an item of \$213.85 which are included in the claim under the last renewal shall be deducted from said ten thousand dollars, if it shall appear upon an examination, to be immediately made, that no duplicate

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checks have been issued for these items as is now claimed by the City.

This tender is also subject to the condition that the items of \$700 and \$289.40 alleged to have been paid by Winborn A. Boothby, City Clerk, to himself as City Treasurer, were actually so paid.

These four items can doubtless be satisfactorily explained within a day or two.

If all these items shall be found to be included properly and this tender is accepted, upon the delivery to you of the check for ten thousand dollars and a release of the litigations against the Boothbys, you will deliver to the Company's local attorney a full release from the City of Berlin.

The City Council, to which the above offer was submitted for consideration, rejected it the same day by a unanimous vote. A committee of three was thereupon appointed to press the collection of these bond claims and as a result Herbert 1. Goss, Esq., started for Baltimore a few days later for the purpose of taking depositions. The City's representative had not proceeded very far in his task when the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company offered to settle for \$12,500, which offer was finally accepted. In addition to the payment of the latter amount, the Company agreed to release any and all rights which it might have acquired in the Boothby property by attachment and otherwise and more especially in the printing plant operated in Berlin by the former Treasurer and others under the corporate name of "The Weston Press." This would enable the city to make up a considerable part, if not the whole, of the discrepancy between the sum received in settlement from the defendant Company and the amount actually charged against the latter as its share of the total bond liability. In pursuance of the above agreement, the property of the Weston Press was put in the hands of Councilman Frederick Barrows as a receiver, who is now closing it up under the authority and according to instructions from the Superior Court.

The claim against the Fidelity and Deposit Company was also adjusted by the payment of \$750 in full discharge of its bond in behalf of the City, and judgment entered in both cases at the last December Term of our Superior Court for the agreed amounts, thus disposing in a most satisfactory manner of one of the most complicated pieces of litigation in which the City has ever been involved.

The New High School Location.

After the fire of December 16th, 1904, which totally destroyed the High School building located on School street, on the exact spot where the Burgess School now stands, the Board of Education, after much care and attention given to the matter of the selection of a location for the new High School building soon to be erected, informally decided to use the old High School site for other than High School purposes; and with the cooperation of a committee of the City Council, the Board began to negotiate for the purchase of a new site in the most convenient location.

Meanwhile the law of 1897 (Chapter 65, Section 1) which vested in school boards of cities the sole power to select and purchase land for school house lots was amended (Laws 1905, Ch. 20) so that hereafter the location of any High School established by a vote of a town cannot be changed except by the Superior Court on petition of the School Board of the town in which it is located, after such notice as the Court may order if it shall appear that the educational interests of the School District require such a change.

Believing that this new law did not apply to the Berlin School District the Board of Education selected a new site known as the Hodgdon Lots for the erection of the new High School building. This action aroused a strong opposition which culminated in an attempt to lay the matter before the County Commissioners. It was found however, that the Superior Court had exclusive jurisdiction in the matter. The Board of Education thereupon filed the necessary petition at Lancaster alleging that the educational interests of the Berlin School District required a change in the location of its new High School building for among other potent reasons the following :

That the old location was needed for the building thereon of a smaller school to accommodate smaller pupils living in Ward 3; that the erection of the new High School building on the old lot would disable the Board to provide such additional school accommodation for smaller pupils in Ward 3, because no suitable lot of land for such purpose was known to be available to the Board in Ward 3 other than the site formerly occupied by the old High School building; that if, at the time the old High School building was erected (1884), the old location was the geographical center of the School District when there were few or no houses standing west of the main line of the Grand Trunk Railroad, none east of the Androscoggin river, none north of Emery street, and none south of the site occupied by the old Glen Mills corporation, this geographical center must have changed when those places are now populous and the population was increased from 2,400 to about 12,000 souls; that the enrollment of the High School pupils in May, 1905, together with the classes that were to enter within the following two years, showed that at least 78 per cent of these pupils lived nearer the site on Hillside Avenue than to the old site on School street; that the tendency of this City is to grow south, east and west rather than north, owing to the construction of new mills, thus making the Hodgdon Lots more and more of a central location.

The petitioners were granted a public hearing at Berlin June 6, 1905, before Robert G. Pike, George F. Rich, Esq., appearing for the remonstrants and the City Solicitor for the Board of Education. The petition was granted.

In addition to the above litigation, there has been the usual amount of legal work to be attended to daily in the Police Court and at the regular and special meetings of the City Council, besides numerous opinions which I was called upon to submit in writing for the information and guidance of the different departments of the City, making in the whole of the past year the busiest one of all since I have assumed the duties of the office of Solicitor.

Assessors' Report.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15th, 1906.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

We have but little to remark upon in this report except to rehearse some of our old troubles, such as the negligence of the tax-payers i 1 making returns of their inventories at the time specified by law:—

Bank stock which is claimed to be pledged; the transfer of Real Estate, especially vacant lots. Now in the case of the return of inventory, we would recommend if the party fails to make returns before the first day of May, according to law, such party shall not be entitled to a hearing before the assessors after May 1st, except in case of error on the part of assessors.


We would suggest that the assessors notify by letter the holders of bank stock claimed to be pledged not later than April 15th, that unless their stock is taken care of by May 1st, same shall be taxed to them without any further chance of hearing. We would further recommend the passing of an ordinance by your Honorable Body compelling a notification of all transfers of ownership of real estate at the City Clerk's Office and that a book be kept for that purpose so a complete and perfect record of ownership may always be on file and at the disposal of the assessors.

We found quite an increase in new property the past year and predict for the coming year a still greater increase, as there have been about 250 houses built in 1905.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1906.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

In accordance with the law governing this department, I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report for the year ending February 15th, 1906, giving in detail the list of fires, the amount of insurance paid, and the amount of loss.

There have been 27 alarms during the last year, 7 false and 20 fires as follows :---

The new fire station now being completed sufficiently for occupancy it is to be hoped, in order to be fully prepared for efficient service, that the station will be thoroughly equipped with every kind of modern apparatus necessary. I, therefore, recommend that one extra horse be purchased to be placed in the station as spare horse being ready to take the place of any other, should one be disabled. I also recommend that a hard wood floor be laid throughout the large room thus preventing the water running through ; also, shutters or blinds be put on the windows in the rear of the building as the hay rests against them and should the adjoining buildings burn it would prevent the fire from entering.

It now being understood that one team shall work on the streets, I recommend that a cart be purchased for this purpose.

While we have nearly a complete alarm system I find it very essential that one more box be placed at some point near Western Avenue; also, one directly in front of W. W. Burlingame's office on Main Street, to complete the protection in these vicinities. Also new wiring should be done in different parts throughout the City where needed. The above recommendations have been made from a desire to be able to render as efficient service as it is possible.

It undoubtedly was the purpose of the City, in making this enormous expenditure for its safety, to equip the station with necessary appliances, and I assure you, I have no other motive than the safety and welfare of the City in making these recommendations.

Department of City Poor.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1906.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen: — I herewith submit my report as Overseer of City Poor for the year ending February 15th, 1906, which I trust will meet with your approval.

The appropriation made for this purpose at the beginning of the year was 2,000.

The total expenditure, including the salary of the office, is \$1,460.10, leaving a balance unexpended, of \$539.90.

I have no particular suggestion to make at this time, as the work of this department varies but little from year to year, but for the benefit of those who perhaps may think that this is the extent of the pauper work in the City, I desire to say that this is but a part of it, and only shows that which is directly chargeable to the City.

The County work here among those who have never gained a pauper settlement, is directed and paid for by the County direct, and is principally among the transient class.

This shows a slight yearly increase, owing in a large measure to our enterprise and growth as a City, which attracts a large number of people from other places.

It is not an unusual occurrence for a man with a large family of eight or more children, to move in here, and ask for aid within two weeks. These cases are usually returned to their former home by the County, for, as a rule, a person who is a pauper when he arrives will continue to remain an undesirable estizen.

The Couture House at Berlin Mills is in my hands, and although considerable of a care, continues to provide funds to support Mrs. Francois Couture. The revenue—when the rents are full—amounts to \$15 per month and the amount paid for Mrs. Couture's board and eare is \$12 per month.

All bills are paid to February 5th, and 1 have in cash on hand \$25.68 from this source.

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The first of this month the property was slightly damaged by fire and although at this date the loss has not been adjusted, the insurance company has received a proper notice.

I would recommend for the coming year, the same appropriation for the Poor Department, as last. This amount I believe, if prudently handled, will be sufficient.

The account has never been over run, but has always returned a balance.

The various departments from whom I have had occasion during the year to seek assistance have always shown a willingness and promptness to aid me, and by so doing have greatly assisted me in the discharge of the duties of the office. And I desire to extend to them, and to all citziens my thanks for the courtesies shown me.

There is a steadily growing interest in charitable work in Berlin, which is commendable and should be encouraged.

Many families were made happy at Christmas time, and over two hundred poor children were entertained by the good hearted women of our City.

Report of Building Inspector.

BERLIN, N. H., February 6, 1906.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Bertin:

Gentlemen: — The work of Building Inspector, during the past year, has been carried on under the same disadvantages as previously, owing to the incomplete and defective ordinances which deal with building operations.

I have, in the past, at different times called your attention to this state of affairs and to the necessity, as it appears to me, of having these ordinances properly revised and so framed that the penalties of violating the ordinances can be enforced. Any intelligent citizen taking the position of inspector and having the interests of the city at heart, can but feel that he is not given the power to bring about results of any value as long as violators of the ordinances are able to evade the law without punishment. It does not seem reasonable to believe that the city has no remedy by law by means of which illegal work on a building can be stopped immediately.

Notwithstanding my previous recommendations, your body has apparently not considered the matter of sufficient importance for action.

This has been a matter of regret to me as I feel that the time to act is now, before any further number of undesirable buildings shall have been erected in the city. I recommended that measures be taken to restrict the class of buildings in section between Green and Exchange Streets and the Grand Trunk Railroad. No action was taken and since that time large tenement houses have been erected, greatly increasing the fire risk.

General inspections have been made throughout the city and less trouble from violations has been encountered.

Many inspections have been made of the Albert Theatre building during its construction, I found Mr. Croteau very willing to carry [50]

out suggestions, even at much expense to himself, and which under your ordinances, he could not have been compelled to do. Had he been inclined to stand by the letter of the ordinances the city would have a much inferior structure to what it is. Reports were put in circulation by some parties, questioning the safety of the building, which, in my judgment were incorrect and made solely with malicious intent.

I feel obliged to resign as Inspector owing to the pressure of other duties and to the fact, that in my opinion, it is of little benefit to the city or the Inspector to attempt to better conditions without adequate ordinances.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15th, 1906.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

We beg to submit the ninth annual report of the Board of Health of the City of Berlin, N. H., for the year ending February 15, 1906.

Water Supply.

During the year several samples of water have been taken from the various supplies of the city (both public and private). The results of the examinations by the State Board of Health have been satisfactory, with the exception of one containing Typhoid infection and one animal matter. These sources of supply have since been abandoned. There still remain some on the East Side to be investigated.

Plumbing.

The Plumbing for the past year has, on the whole, been very satisfactory, in fact it has met, so far as we know, with the requirements of most of the rules for Plumbing Inspection in other cities within the State.

Sewers.

For the past four years, the Board of Health has made recommendations regarding the placing of sewers. It has not as yet had any effect on the laying out of sewers. There is no department which is better informed regarding the need of sewers than this Board. We are very strongly of the opinion that the Sewer Commissioner should be a member of the Board of Health.

Fourth Avenue and the upper end of High street (above Portland [52]

street) should have sewer connections, as they are very much in need of sewer drainage. Also some time a sewer should be put in on Goebel street on the East Side.

Rubbish.

In the past year we have been obliged to find a new place for the dumping of rubbish. Several attempts were made to purchase land on the river for this purpose, but these were failures either because of price or location. Later by the kindness of Mr. John Stewart we were allowed to use a lot of land known as the Bog, near the Small Pox Hospital. The expense of maintaining this place has been somewhat more than that of the old place. During a year's time a great deal of rubbish must be taken care of and we would recommend that the city purchase or lease a suitable piece of land to take care of such waste for several years.

The Spitting Nuisance.

In the past year there has not been the usual amount of precaution taken to prevent the spitting on sidewalks and public places as there has in previous years. Tuberculosis (or Consumption) is a much dreaded disease and should meet with opposition from every possible source. One of the most dangerous sources of the disease is streets and public places. With only this point in view this law should be strongly enforced.

Contagious Diseases.

In the past year we have been entirely free from Small Pox. There has been more Diphtheria during the past year than for several years previous. Most cases have been in different parts of the city. The Board has been obliged to furnish Antitoxin in most of the cases, which has added to the expense of the Department. The expense of watchmen, nurses, etc., in cases without means has added a great deal to the expense of the department.

Milk Inspection.

During the year the milk from the different sources of supply in the city has been analyzed by the State Board of Health. The reports have been favorable with the exception of one case.

Pure Food Law.

The State Board of Health has in the past year been making a rigid examination and analysis of different food stuffs. This city has been obliged to do her part and has sent different samples of

food stuff, such as oysters, etc., for examination. A great many were found to be below the standard and in consequence one will find several things on the shelves of the grocer without the pure label on the package. This is very important work and is doing a great deal of good for the general public.

Health Officer.

This city is of such population that it requires the greater part of one man's time in looking after the Sanitary conditions of the city in the warmer months of the year. We would very strongly advise that the City Board of Health appoint a Health Officer and that he should be a member of the Board of Health. This we think would be a saving in expense and a better service.

We wish to thank the Mayor and Council for their co-operation for the past year.

Report of City Engineer.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1906.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to submit the annual report of the City Engineer's Department.

The amount of work done in this department during the past year compares favorably with that of previous years. The survey of the property lying within the "fire-district" is nearing completion and to this is being added the established grades of the streets. The street grades are of utmost importance to the property owners in determining the proper elevation of the first floor in the erection of new buildings.

I am in hopes these surveys may be extended each year so as to finally encompass the whole city, as they are of great benefit to the public, and also of assistance to the assessors, showing the exact amount of land owned by each person, so that assessments can be properly placed on the value of all property within the city limits.

Grade lines were located on the following streets for the building of the concrete walks: -- Oak, Pleasant, Mason, Green, Hemlock, Church and Main Streets; the east line of Church street from Pleasant to School was determined and the street widened to its legal width.

Plans were made of the Burgess School lot, and the new lots purchased for the High School. Plan and deed were also made of the Fire Station lot.

Street lines were established at Third and Fourth streets, Berlin Mills; Mason and Granite streets; School and First streets; Willard, Emery and Washington streets; and survey made at Pleasant street to settle lines in controversy.

The side lines of Strafford street were established, and plan of same placed on record. This was the only new street laid out by the City last year.

Surveys were made of the sewers built on Denmark and Eighth streets, and the branch from Norwegian to Main streets, Berlin Mills. Also the new Burgess street sewer, and the line laid adjacent to the Revere House property.

Plans showing the location of the law-suits against the originate made, under the direction of the City Solicitor, in the Brooks, Halverson, Johnson and Rasmussen cases. In the Johnson and Halverson suits it was of importance to determine the flowage lines of the River adjoining upper Main street, Berlin Mills; and the different elevations of the water for the past few years were taken into consideration and records made of the various heights to which the river has been raised. These elevations were verified by property owners in the vicinity and may be at any time re-established.

A partial survey of the side lines of Western Avenue was started, and should be completed this spring. The old record of Western Avenue has a very indefinite starting point, and parts of the street have been laid out in three different widths. A complete plan should be made of the property abutting on each side and the limits of the street definitely located and established. There are a good many streets in the city where the location of the bounds are more or less indefinite, and it is most urgent that, wherever it is possible, permanent monuments of stone should be placed, in order to avoid future litigation and annoyance.

The widening of Main street to fifty feet above Mason street has already proved itself of great value to the city, and it is here recommended that the street be widened and straightened from Mason street to Post Office Square to a similar width, and that the bounds be properly placed.

The new sidewalks which were built last year were very much needed, and it is expected that a good many more will have to be built the coming season. The streets on which new walks are to be built should be those that would prove most beneficial to the public in general. The building of walks on side streets by the request of adjoining property owners has not, in some cases, turned out to be just what was intended, at the time the request was made. The most advantageous method would be to select the most needed locations, in the spring, and then to strictly adhere to those streets and to no others.

A general plan for the establishing of a surface water drainage should be made in the near future as it becomes more important each year to take care of the drainage from the streets. A survey should show all the grades of the principal streets, and this to form

a nucleus for determining size of pipe, locations of catch basins, etc.

Paving Main street will undoubtedly be started this next year and it is generally acknowledged that a pavement must be selected that will prove most durable with the least amount of noise. Post Office Square and Main street as far as Mason should be paved with a bituminous macadam pavement, as this seems to be the kind most fitting to the conditions here. This is a smooth yet not slippery pavement, combining the foothold of macadam with the advantages of being water proof and of similar solidity to asphalt. It is being highly recommended as to its utility and economy.

I respectfully tender my acknowledgments to the Mayor, also to the various Committees of the City Council, for the support they have given me.

Receipts.

The regular meetings of the Board of Trustees have been held, with few exceptions, every month throughout the year. The officers elected at the first meeting in April were as follows: Rufus C. Flagg, Chairman; Alice G. Mason, Secretary; John B. Noyes, Treasurer.

In September, Dr. Flagg left Berlin and the work for the remainder of the year has been done by the other two members of the Board.

Full reports have been kept of all doings connected with the administration of the library and with the aid of the Librarians the books have been selected with care. Owing to an unavoidable delay the last bill for books does not appear in this year's financial report.

The basement of the building has been utilized this past year by the Board of Education as a recitation room but it is earnestly hoped that another year the Board will be financially able to fit it up with furniture appropriate and necessary to the convenience of the many small clubs that have been organized for the purpose of studying Literature, Art, History, etc.

The trustees have endeavored to conduct the financial affairs of the Library prudently and the Treasurer's report shows a good balance on hand. Now it is our express desire and wish that the Honorable Mayor and Council will give us a most generous appropriation in order that, with this balance, we may be able to bring about the long desired and long felt need of a catalogue of the library. The trustees have always plead poverty whenever the librarian has mentioned the subject of a new catalogue, but now with a \$2,000 appropriation the trustees will be able and more than glad to provide this necessary convenience.

We wish that we might impress upon your minds the absolute necessity for a catalogue. The books and magazines increase from year to year and the librarian's work is therefore augmented more and more, as the resources of the library are, to a great extent, made known solely through the knowledge of what is to be found in the books on the shelves. To issue a catalogue would doubtless cost \$300, and provisions would have to be made for the extra bulletins necessary as new books were added from month to month. The benefit to the patrons would well warrant the money expended. The interior of the library has been beautified and adorned by pictures and busts donated by Mr. Wm. W. Brown, by two pair of artistic wrought iron andirons given respectively by Mrs. Charles S. Clarke and Mrs. H. J. Brown and a beautiful clock by Hon. H. F. Marston. The Board wish to acknowledge with gratitude the

receipt of these gifts, not alone for their intrinsic merit and suitableness but for the highminded and large hearted generosity that prompted the gifts.

In closing we wish to thank the librarian and the assistant librarians for their faithfulness to duty and their interest in the welfare of the library at all times.

Magazines and papers have been given by Mrs. Irving Humphrey (McClure's and Everybody's), Mrs. Park Hancock (Munsey), Mrs. W. F. Swan (20th Century Home), Miss Hattie L. Johnson (Modern Women), Mrs. Wm. Simpson (Pennsylvania Grit). The St. Cecilia Club, a most flourishing club of the city composed of the pupils of Miss Agnes E. Pike, have very recently given a subscription for the coming year, to *The Etude*, a high grade magazine for all music lovers. Back numbers of miscellaneous magazines and papers have been given by Mrs. J. D. Holt, Mrs. Geo. H. Fowler, Miss Irma H. Lavin and Dr. Lavallee.

During the past year, the library has made marked progress in the aesthetic line, as well as in that of pure literature. In July Mr. W. W. Brown gave us a choice selection of pictures, all masterpieces, and classic in subject as well as in execution, if the term classic may be applied in this way. These are replicas of famous paintings, etchings by recognized artists, with the addition of busts, life size, of those who in ancient and modern times, have done the most to

uplift the human race, and lead thought in the highest planes. The collection of pictures numbers seventeen etchings, photographic reproductions, etc., some large and others smaller. They have been placed on the walls in the reading rooms and are a helpful influence in the right direction. They include the works of such artists as Alma Tadema, Munkacsy, Cabanel and Wille. The Twelfth Night Club have presented a life size bust of Shakespeare, and the Alpha Art Club have given a similar one of Michelangelo. With those given by Mr. Brown, we now have a collection of eleven busts in the library.

Other gifts during the year include a library clock of the famous Howard make, given by Hon. H. F. Marston; two pairs of wrought iron andirons of artistic patterns, given respectively by Mrs. Charles S. Clarke and Mrs. Herbert J. Brown. These add much to the homelike appearance of the rooms, and to their attractiveness and in that way contribute directly to their usefulness. An unattractive, uninviting reading room would miss half or more than half its possibilities for good.

We have devoted much time and energy to furthering the usefulness of this part of the library this year. We felt it our duty so to do, as the possession of these rooms was one of the chief desiderata in the old library, and the lack there was always felt to be a drawback to our growth. We take this opportunity to extend our cordial thanks to those who by their gifts have given us such practical assistance in this direction. They have given the reading room work an impetus which has enabled us to accomplish in one year, that which, without their aid, might never have been done, or, at least, not for many years. The influence is already felt. We easily note an evident feeling that the room is for reading or study. A year ago, there seemed to be a notion that it was a legitimate and convenient place for holding social club meetings - a feeling which is fast disappearing, and we feel that the room is "coming into its own," so to speak. Less " police work " is required on the part of the librarian and the staff-it is becoming a reading room in the true sense, and who will say that the silent influence of the artistic decorations has had nothing to do in this directiou?

But there is still much that is lacking in this portion of our library. We need more of the standard periodicals. Some adequate provision should be made whereby the reading room will become a permanent subscriber to such publications as the Nation, Outlook, N. Y. Tribune, Boston Transcript, Springfield Republican, one leading Western paper and one from the South, to say nothing of the standard magazines. The above periodicals are needed as much

for future reference, as for present use, and would be filed away for that purpose. They are all indexed, or at least most of them are, so that their contents are instantly available, provided we have Poole's Index. Students and others desirous of information on a particular topic of today, would generally or always find what they wanted in this list. I hope your Honorable Board will give this matter careful consideration, and make some arrangement, or, at least, a beginning, so that we may be doing something in this department of reference work. At present, little is done, and that chiefly in odds and ends. We have scattered numbers of newspapers-uothing continuous for more than a year now and then. and, of course, the articles wanted are generally in the numbers we do not have and cannot obtain. We have received voluntary gifts of subscriptions, but such gifts, while they are gratefully received, are seldom or never renewed at the end of the year, and we cannot well expect a private individual to agree to assess himself an annual tax of five or six dollars for several years, for the benefit of a public library, for which he is already taxed. The High School pupils are struggling to maintain a debating society, the Baracca Club of the Baptist church also hold debates on current topics. One of their obstacles is lack of materials from which to get ideas on up-to-date questions. A file of the Outlook, or of the Republican, Nation, etc., would be of invaluable assistance to these boys, as well as to others who are constantly inquiring at the desk for information on questions of the day. Not long ago, a person was heard to remark that "there is little or nothing in this library on events that have happened within five years," and while the remark was not true, or, at least, was a great exaggeration, still there was some reason for the complaint. The history of today is contained almost exclusively in current periodicals, and they are as important an acquisition, as ten-volume sets of works detailing the deeds of the middle ages, or of Napoleon the Great. I am afraid that too little attention has been paid to current events, and too much to those of past ages. A judicious division between the two is better, and neither should be excluded in favor of the other. We have never been satisfied with the amount of reference work done in the library, outside of what is required by the schools and the clubs. There should be more done by individuals, in a city of the size of Berlin. One reason for this is because of this very lack of material on topics of the day. The average Berlin reader is less interested in events of a century ago than in those of today. Railroad rebates, Phillippine independence, the war on the trusts, etc., appeal to him more than Mary Stuart's claim to the English throne, or the struggle between the

Vatican and the temporal power in the time of Hildebrand. Thus, while the library has enough material on the latter subjects, as it ought to have, there is little or nothing on the former class of topics, because one must rely on periodicals-these subjects are too recent to be well treated in books as yet. We still want back numbers of magazines- we always are very glad to get them, and they fill a want that it would be very hard to fill by purchase, perhaps impossible. The back numbers that we already have, that have been bound, are kept on the shelves in the reading room. The unbound numbers are as carefully arranged and as easily accessible for reference on the shelves in the basement as are the books in the main stack room. But patrons have a right to depend on the library for certain standard periodicals,-certain newspapers of national reputation for truth and judgment, and certain magazines of similar standing. At present, the library is not sure of any of the great newspapers from year to year. We have dwelt at some length on this subject, as we consider it the weak point in our system at present, and we do not remember calling your attention to it before. We hope you will realize its importance and make a generous allowance of funds for the coming year.

Our children's room seems to be an unquestioned success. We have had our trials here, but we have also had great encouragementin most practical form, from people who recognized our work and came forward to help us. Miss Lavin, who had charge of this department when it was opened in September, 1904, resigned in August, 1905. She was faithful and efficient, and we were sorry to lose the services of one who was with the work from its beginning. Miss Edna Jackson was appointed temporarily and held the position until her duties as teacher in the High School made it impossible for her to fill both positions. She resigned in October, and Miss Frances Boothby was appointed to the place. Miss Boothby is from Radeliffe College, is well adapted to the work in every way, and has taken it up con amore. She appreciates the responsibilities and difficulties of her position and meets them with tact and foresight, and is fast making herself an indispensable adjunct in the institution. On the children's librarian rests largely the task of forming a good literary taste. When the school teaches a child to read, it gives him a power that may become a blessing or a curse. The one who can help a child to form a liking for wholesome reading, is doing a grand work. Then, there is a tendency to rapid, careless reading. If the librarian talks with the child about the book he has just read, this trouble will be remedied; he will read his books more slowly and carefully, if he is liable to be asked concerning the story.

Miss Boothby's work is no sinceure.

We are still working according to the theory enunciated in our last report—that a library should meet its patrons more than half way. We hope to keep the fire station well supplied with books, as we do the police station, and the various schools. This year, from a small beginning, a distributing branch library has practically been in operation at the home of Mrs. Frank Lord, on the road to Milan. This scheme conveniences a large number of people in that neighborhood, who would not otherwise reach the library. Mrs. Lord keeps a careful record of books loaned, and thus far the plan has worked well. That Mrs. Lord is willing to set aside an hour a day for this work, without compensation of any kind other than the thanks of those concerned, is evidence of her practical public spirit and philanthrophy. Everybody knows what a busy woman Mrs. Lord is. We appreciate her work in this direction.

The Story Hour, which was inaugurated last year, has been continued this year. But it has been put on a firmer basis. Last year, we depended upon volunteers. Often it was impossible to find anyone who was ready, or could spare the time for preparation, and the children would assemble only to be disappointed. A few experiences like this would have killed the project. In this emergency, Messrs. John B. Gilbert, O. B. Brown and A. M. Stahl came forward subscribing enough money to make it possible to engage the services of Miss Vena Frost as story-teller for the rest of the fiscal year. Miss Frost has talent in this direction, and her hours with the children are profitable. Her talks are not pointless, or simply time-killing stories, but are either famous legends, that have lived through centuries, handed down to us from ages before Christ, classics that should be familiar to every one, or they deal with historic characters, whose lives point a moral for those who come after The Hour, which is set for Saturdays, at 2.30, is well them. patronized, and through it, the library reaches a class of patrons at an age when they are most impressionable, and can be reached in no other way. We hope that the importance of this exercise will not be underrated, and that provision can be made for its continuance.

The various literary clubs make good use of their opportunities in the library. The Alpha Art Club hold their meetings regularly in the history alcove, and make use of the books, picture collection and other resources which deal with their work. The Dickens club meet regularly for the study of Dickens and his works, and use the alcove for the purpose. They are accomplishing much along their chosen line. The various teachers, particularly in the higher grades, still

send their classes here for research and study. It is due to both teachers and pupils to say that, with few exceptions, the latter conduct themselves with proper sense of their surroundings, and no one has ever had occasion to take exception to their presence.

Thanking you for the uniform consideration which I have received at your hands during the past year, and hoping for a continuance of our hitherto friendly relations, and the same forbearance which you have always exercised toward my many shortcomings, I remain, Yours respectfully

REPORT OF SEWER COMMISSIONER.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1906.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—In submitting my annual report as Commissioner of Sewers I will state briefly what work has been accomplished during the past year.

The amount of work done in this department has been much greater than in previous years. New sewers have been constructed during the year as follows :

On Nadeau street 100 feet of six inch pipe at a cost of \$54.75.

From Union street across to Green street, 232 teet of twenty-four inch pipe at a cost of \$401.14.

This was to take care of the large amount of water which caused the damage to the New Revere House property, the pipe already in place there being too small to take care of heavy rains.

Extension of Second Avenue, 104 feet of 8 inch pipe at a cost of \$63.14.

School street, 520 feet of eight inch pipe. This work was done with the Berlin Water Co., they standing part of the expense of exeavating and filling. The cost to the eity was \$178.28.

Burgess street, East side of the river, 1,500 feet of eight inch pipe. The work was done with the Berlin Water Co., the city's part being \$762.94.

Denmark and Seventh streets, Berlin Mills, 128 feet of six inch pipe, at a cost of \$80.64.

Denmark and Eighth streets, Berlin Mills, 500 feet of eight inch pipe at a cost of \$311.41.

Madigan street, 438 feet of ten inch pipe. This was through ledge. The Committee agreeing to pay the Berlin Water Company

\$100 for excavating, the cost to the city was \$231.15.

Third avenue, 100 feet of six inch pipe at a cost of \$45.50.

Surface sewer at Berlin Mills, Seventh street to Norwegian street, 422 feet of twenty inch pipe at a cost of 628.34. This job was expensive as part of it was through solid ledge, and was done to take eare of a large amount of surface water which has caused the city a great deal of trouble and expense for damage cases in that location.

Houley street, 140 feet of six inch pipe at a cost of \$58,80.

Burgess school house sewer, 240 feet of six inch pipe at a cost of \$96.39.

Jolbert street, 118 feet of six inch pipe at a cost of \$91.55.

High street, this was laid 100 feet with ten inch, and 400 feet with eight inch pipe. This work was done with the Berlin Water Company, the city paying one-half and Water Co. one-half. The City's part was \$668.93. This was all ledge and a very expensive job to do.

On Mason and Main streets, 187 feet of eight inch pipe. This is an outlet for the sewer from the New Albert Theatre. The cost of same was \$175.69.

Norwegian street, Berlin Mills, 174 feet of six inch pipe at a cost of \$73.08.

Johnson sewer, Berlin Mills, 434 feet of eight inch pipe at a cost of \$303.80. This sewer runs through the property of H. C. Johnson to furnish an outlet for a number of houses back of Johnson's on Norwegian street.

Success stfeet sewer was extended 95 feet with six inch pipe at a cost of \$49,90.

All of the sewers have been laid to a depth of five feet and in many places we had to go deeper to get the grade. Thus far we have had no trouble on account of their freezing or stopping up.

Besides this work already mentioned much other work has been done by the sewer department; many of the old sewers were laid with small pipe and not more than a foot or two below the surface of the ground causing them to freeze and much time and moncy had to be expended in thawing them out last spring. Many of these have been dug up and laid deeper with larger pipe.

The totals are: 1,700 feet of six inch, 3,200 feet of eight inch, 540 feet of ten inch, 475 feet of twenty inch and 232 feet of twenty-four inch pipe. Total length laid 1905, 6,174 feet. House and building connections, 64.

In conclusion I desire to return my thanks to His Honor, the Mayor, the City Council, and the Committee on Sewers, for their courtesies and consideration in dealing with matters relating to the sewer department.

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Department of Highways.

REPORT OF HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1906.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

Gentlemen:—It becomes my duty as Highway Commissioner to submit a report of the work done under my supervision during the past year.

All work done by this department has been of a permanent nature, repairs being made with crushed stone and the steam roller used wherever practicable. A large amount of this macadamizing was found necessary to be done; the stone crusher was started in June and ran until late in the fall, with the exception of a few days.

A large amount of work was done on Main street, Berlin Mills. Commencing at Cote's drug store and continuing up Main street as far as Third street, the whole width of the street was excavated to a depth of two feet, and filled in with crushed stone, the work being benefited by use of steam roller in rolling the stone while it was being put in place in layers. The work resulted in a good piece of macadam road, being of great improvement to the street.

Mason street was rebuilt with crushed stone, from Main street to the Boston & Maine Railroad. This street has a very large amount of travel and has formerly been repaired with coal ashes, etc. By excavating and removing the surface to a good foundation and then refilling with good material, thoroughly rolled and compacted, the result has been a much needed stretch of good road.

A portion of Green street was raised, and crushed stone put in place of old material, and thoroughly rolled. Hillside Avenue from High to Church street was repaired with crushed stone, the street rounded up, and side ditches put in shape for surface water drainage.

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REPORT OF HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER.

It was found necessary to raise a portion of Main street, from Gerrish's to Stahl's, owing to a bad washout, and the work was accomplished by use of crushed stone and steam roller. All repairs throughout the city were made as permanent as possible by use of crushed stone instead of gravel, and hundreds of loads were used on different streets. On the East side, Burgess street was improved by filling in hollows with coal ashes, and regrading.

Owing to a good many hard rain storms last Spring, there was a large number of washouts, especially on the side-hill streets. Prospect street, for instance, was washed out several times owing to the lack of proper facilities for carrying away the surface water. A large pipe drain should be built up High street to some point above Hillside Avenue, provided with eatch basins at all street intersections. By laying a pipe of at least 24 inches in diameter and branches extended up the side streets, a large amount of moncy used in repairs each year would be saved. The cost to the city for constantly repairing the ravages caused by surface water each spring is very large, and a system of surface drainage is a most imperative necessity.

All suburban roads have had more or less repairs made, and when found inadequate the old plank culverts were replaced with stone or pipe. The road machine has been called into use on these outlying roads and the ditches have been cleared and surfaces regraded.

Upper Main street, Berlin Mills, has been in **b**ad shape the last few years, owing to the overflowing of the river, and the street will need to be raised from Fifth street to Eighth street this Spring. It will be policy to build the street of crushed stone and to use the steam roller and to properly provide for the exit of water from the upper side. There was a temporary plank walk built on this portion of the street, to accommodate the residents this Spring, and this should be replaced with a good high concrete walk. By building that portion of Norwegian street laid out by the city several years ago, the stone crusher would be provided with enough material to supply the needs for raising the street as above suggested.

It was found necessary to replank a number of the bridges about the city; this was done with three-inch plank and each bridge was thoroughly overhauled and strengthened. The iron bridges leading to the Boston & Maine depot, Mason street, were carefully examined by a competent bridge builder and it was recommended that certain repairs be made. The plates on each abuttment were re-inforced with new plates and rivets, and floor beams adjusted. All tie rods, nuts, bolts, etc., were tightened, and the iron work thoroughly scraped and painted. The total cost for this job was \$903,50.

During the past year a large number of sidewalks were built, new curbing set, and crossings laid. The streets selected were those upon which there was a large amount of travel, and all work done by contract under the direction of the Committee on Roads and Bridges. Pleasant and Green streets had a large amount of walk built, these being two of the oldest and most travelled side streets in the city. Church street was widened ten feet and a walk laid, from School to Pleasant. In front of St. Anne's Cathedral an eight-foot walk was also built, which has been of great convenience to the large number of persons having occasion to pass that vicinity. Other streets which were benefited are High, Oak, Willard, Hemlock and Main streets. Total number of yards built, 4,361; number of feet of curbing, 2,452.

On Mason street, leading to Boston & Maine tracks from Main street, a contract was made with Ward & Doring for a cement walk. This walk was more or less of an experiment as to its utility, and was found to be altogether practicable for some locations. On Main street, at the location of the old canal from No. 3 Mill, it was found necessary to take up the old wooden girders and rebuild the foundations for the sidewalk with a concrete base. This makes a permanent job of a formerly bad condition. On High street a temporary plank walk was laid this winter to relieve the property owners during the spring. These planks are to be taken up and used in the repair of culverts, etc. A new concrete walk needs to be built in this vicinity, as the west side of the street is low and consequently very bad for travel during wet weather. High street is one of the most important of our residential streets, and should be macadamized and regraded at the same time the surface sewer and sidewalks are built.

The selection for new sidewalks for the coming year should be made by the Committee in charge at the earliest possible date; then the curbing could be set and the grades established before the arrival of the contractors for doing the work. If all petitions were received at the same time for the new work, the selections could be decided on and the work accomplished much more advantageously. All the streets must eventually have walks built on them, and it is imperative that those most in use should have the first work done.

An earth walk was built up Prospect street and along School street. Owing to the amount of travel on School street it is recommended that the street be thoroughly regraded, widened, and a concrete walk built from High street to Burgess School, and from there to Third street. It was intended to build a walk on Third street from Main to School, but owing to the trouble in getting the full width of the street it was deemed advisable to build the street to its proper limits and to place the walk in a permanent location this spring.

Western Avenue is in much need of fixing up, and should have a general going over the whole length. This street was laid out down to the Cascades, and accepted by the city, and no work has been done upon it. The demands for a suitable highway for the residents at the Cascades cannot be overlooked, and the street must be finished and graded this coming year.

On the East Side of the River there are but few streets owned by the eity. Hutehins street, laid out in 1897, is in bad condition during the spring and needs filling in with crushed stone and rolled with steam roller. There has been quite a large number of new residences built along this street and more are in progress, and it is but right that the street be put into first-class shape.

Goebél street, which was laid out in 1904, was built this past year and the stone crusher furnished with material from the ledges that had to be blasted out. The grading of this street was all done with crushed stone and is very near its completion.

Strafford street, the only new street laid out this year, was opened up and needs but little more work to be done upon it.

Out of the appropriation for this department, there was taken \$2,032 for the land damage awarded to the abutters on Main street for widening the street to fifty feet; this sum is mentioned as pertaining to the amount spent under my direction, and should not be considered as spent in repairs, etc.

It has been advocated for many years that Main street be permanently built with some sort of pavement. The amount of repairs each year put upon this street is very large, and it seems now that the city could well afford to do some work in this line, Post Office Square to be done first, and then the work extended as far as the appropriation will permit. The large amount of travel which will always be found on this street will wear away each year any but the most permanent material, and it is hereby recommended that this work be attended to and accomplished, at least partially, during the next administration.

I believe that a suitable pavement should be selected that would do for a long period and that the work be done with a view to its utility as well as economy.

In closing I will say the amount of work found to be needed in this department is increasing every year, and wherever it is possible, what work is done should be done once and for all. In this way there will be in a few years a marked improvement over the existing

conditions, and will, eventually, make the most noticeable parts of the city much more prosperous looking and satisfactory to all citizens and property owners.

In conclusion I desire to extend my thanks to His Honor, the Mayor, and to the Committee on Streets and Sidewalks, for their courteous and considerate treatment in their dealings with matters relating to this department.


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Report of Board of Education.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1906.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

The Board of Education of the City of Berlin submit the following as their twenty-first annual report of the work and condition of the department under their direction.

General Condition.

At the opening of the financial year in February, 1905, this department found itself in a very difficult position owing to the loss of the High school building two months previously. This had necessitated the use of temporary quarters for the High school pupils and, owing to the fact that suitable provisions for their accommodation were not available, it was found necessary to make use of such quarters as could be obtained and these proved far from satisfactory. As a result the school was obl ged to work under many disadvantages with resultant loss in the efficiency of the work accomplished. The Board feel, however, that the best possible was done under the circumstances and only regret that enforced conditions made it impossible to place the school in such environment as to demand from both teachers and pupils the best and the highest grade of school work.

The delay in providing new quarters by the erection of such building or buildings as would accommodate the pupils left houseless by the burning of the High school will not be discussed here as it is fully covered in the report of the City Solicitor which may be found on page 42 of this report.

The work in the grade schools has been very satisfactory throughout the year. Of course it has been a slow process to adjust all of the schools, especially those of the higher grades to the improved methods of instruction which are being introduced, but the advance

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in this direction, considering all the adverse conditions which have been encountered in the way of lack of accommodations, lack of sufficient funds to supply all the equipment needed, and the amount of work that the Superintendent has been obliged to devote to the work of providing quarters for schools, due to fires and increased attendance, has been highly satisfactory. The teachers, as a whole, have shown a disposition to do their best and have, almost without exception, worked hard and faithfully, in some cases under very difficult conditions.

At the opening of the present term in January all of the grade schools were well housed and were doing a high grade of school work.

Of course some of them are now working under adverse conditions owing to the destruction of the Marston school by fire, but it is hoped that this will be only for the remainder of the present school year. A further treatment of this subject with recommendations will be found elsewhere in this report.

New High School Building.

As soon as possible after the adjustment of the matters that delayed the work of replacing the loss of the High school building the

Board took measures looking towards the erection of such a building as should be of an up-to-date design, well equipped and snitable for the needs of the school for several years to come. This last provision was especially forced home by the rapid growth of the city and the even more rapid growth of the schools. Many buildings were personally visited by members of the Board and several architects were consulted as to their ideas of the sort of a building that would best fill Berlin's needs.

When it was finally possible to take definite action it became at once apparent that a building could not be completed in time for the use of the school until well towards the end of the present school year and so it was thought best to take ample time in handling the matter and make plans to have the new building ready for occupancy at the opening of the next school year in September, 1906.

At this point the matter of the city's finances began to play a prominent part as the City Council found that the expenses of the past year had been very heavy and the erection of the Burgess school and the new Central Fire Station had made large additions to the bonded indebtedness. Provision was, however, made and the work proceeded with.

The selection of a lot for the building has already been covered in the report of City Solicitor Tardivel. These lots were purchased at a cost of \$5,300, including two houses which were situated upon them. One of these houses was sold and removed, while the other still remains and is rented, its situation upon one corner of the lots not interfering with the erection of the school building.

The drawing of the plans was awarded to A. I. Lawrence — who had just completed the plans for the Burgess school. The contract for the general construction was awarded to Russell & Craigue whose figures were considerably lower than any others — namely \$32,650. The heating, plumbing and ventilating contract was awarded to the C. H. Goss Co. of St. Johnsbury, Vermont, for \$5,226. This makes the total contract price \$37,876. These figures are somewhat less than the original estimate as it was at first thought that the building would cost \$40,000.

The structure is of brick of an extra good quality laid in black mortar with brown stone trimmings and gives a very pleasing effect. It is erected upon a prominent elevation facing Hillside avenue and commanding a beautiful outlook down the valley and over the entire lower portion of the city. The lot is 180 by 215 feet and extends through from Hillside avenue to Pine street.

The interior of the building is designed to ultimately accommodate about three hundred High school pupils. As the High school

will probably have about one hundred and fifty at the opening of the next fall term it is the plan of the Board to utilize two, or possibly three, rooms temporarily for grade schools, until such time as they are needed for High school purposes. Plans of the first and second floors are reproduced on accompanying pages of this report. These show that four school rooms are provided on the first floor together with a large study room at the rear between the two back entrances, besides teachers' room, principal's office and library.

On the second floor at the westerly end are the book-keeping, commercial and typewriting rooms. On the easterly end, extending the entire width of the building are the rooms devoted to the physical and chemical departments, consisting of a laboratory for each department, a lecture room, dark room and storage closets. The plan of this section was developed with especial care and is believed to be the best obtainable for our needs.

The heating and ventilating systems will be of up-to-date designs and the entire building will be equipped with the best that the finances of the city will permit. In any case only approved materials will be used.


Taken all in all the Board feel that Berlin will have in this new High school building as thoroughly modern and well-equipped a building as can be found in Northern New England, and one that will satisfy the needs of the city for its High school for many years to come.

It has been especially the purpose of the Board in the erection of this building—and the Burgess school as well—to look into the future and provide for several years hence, even at a sacrifice of the immediate needs. *Permanency* has been the watchword in all the work of erection that has been carried on and it is believed that future developments will show the wisdom of the course pursued.

The joint building committee having in charge the erection of this building consists of Mayor George E. Hutchins and Councilman F. W. Farrington selected by the City Council, and Messrs Orton B. Brown and O. H. Tootbaker, members of the Board of Education.

The High School.

As was stated at the commencement of this report, the High school began the winter term in January, 1905, under most adverse conditions and, owing to the delay in settling the matter of new buildings, the school is still without adequate accommodations. Up to the end of the school year in June the school was housed largely in the Tucker block on Main street, although for a time a part of the work was carried on in the Whitney Opera house block

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on Mechanic street. Neither of these locations, for reasons that are abundantly obvious to any one acquainted with them, was found to be satisfactory and during the early part of the summer efforts were made to secure better quarters. It was found impossible to obtain any rooms that would meet the needs among the business blocks of the city and finally the idea was hit upon of utilizing the new Central Fire station, then in process of erection. The matter was taken up with the City Council and the authorities of the Fire Department and consent was kindly given to use nearly the entire second floor of this building for school purposes. In order to make use of these rooms some few changes were necessary from the original plans, but these were made at a very moderate expense. It was also found necessary to defer the opening of the fall term four weeks as the Fire Station was not completed in season to open on the regular date.

These rooms, while they have been far from ideal and have hampered the work of the school in many ways, were the only accommodations available and have served the purpose as well as 'most any improvised and temporary quarters could be expected to do. The thanks of the Board are due the authorities of the Fire Department for the use of the building. Appreciation should also be extended to the members of the department for their attitude in the case.

Of course first-class work has been impossible under the conditions that have obtained for the past year and as a result the school has gradually lost ground in the matter of scholarship, although a steady and rapid increase in membership has been recorded.

At the end of the fall term in last December, Prin. F. B. Wight, who has had the direction of the school for three and one-half years decided that his withdrawal from the principalship would be advisable and consequently handed in his resignation to take effect at once. This brought up the problem of securing a new principal in the middle of the year and an investigation of the availabilities for such a position soon revealed the futility of attempting to fill the position on such short notice. The result was the selection of the present temporary principal, Mr. Arthur S. Todd of New Bedford, Mass. Mr. Todd was chosen for the present term only, as it was planned to make arrangements for securing a permanent principal for the opening of the spring term about the first of April. Several reasons, however, developed which made it seem advisable to retain Mr. Todd's services for the remainder of the school year, one of the most potent of these being the fact that such good work,

considering the environment and the previous condition of the school, has been accomplished during his incumbency.

In the meanwhile the field of possibilities has been thoroughly canvassed for such a man as the Board could feel sure would fill the position with satisfaction to the pupils, the parents and the school authorities and it was finally decided to invite Prin. Fred S. Libbey of the Simonds Free High school, Warner, N. H., to come to Berlin and meet the Board. Last month Mr. Libby visited this city and the result was his selection for the position to begin his duties at the opening of the next school year in September.

Mr. Libbey is recognized as a strong teacher and it is believed that he will be able, if properly backed by parents and school officials, to place the Berlin High school upon the high plane which it should occupy. The school certainly contains a class of scholars that are at least up to the average in ability and, with proper direction in their work and good accommodations and equipment such as they are expected to have at the beginning of next year, there is no reason why the school should not establish and maintain a high standard of scholarship.

At the opening of the winter term in January of this year it was deemed advisable to increase the teaching force and Miss Jessie Stevenson was engaged to teach for a portion of each day, thus relieving the principal for a part of the time to allow more opportunity for his personal supervision of the work and the general excentive management of the school. This has been found to be a wise move.

The course of study has been constantly changing during the past few years owing to the calls for the introduction of subjects that have come through the demands for college preparation. These changes have developed a course which needs much readjustment to meet the demands for the greatest good to the greatest number and it is now proposed to plan an entire new course which shall be in accordance with the course recommended by the state department of public instruction, thus harmonizing with the college entrance requirements, and which shall, at the same time, offer abundant opportunities for the pupil who does not plan to attend college to obtain the most thorough general education possible in a four years' High school course. It is hoped that this course may be fully prepared and put in printed form early this spring so that it may go into full working effect at the opening of the school year in September.

A further discussion of High school conditions, in which the Board heartily concur, may be found in the report of the Superintendent, on a later page in this report.

The George E. Burgess School.

As soon as the decision of the court was rendered granting the change in location of the High school as prayed for in the petition of the Board, steps were taken to hasten the completion of the new buildings. It was decided that the interests of the city would be best subserved by the immediate erection of a four-room grade school on the old High school lot on School street and efforts were put forth to have this building completed in time for the opening of the winter term in January, 1906. Members of the Board and the superintendent made careful investigation regarding the needs at this point and also regarding the best and most approved style of building and equipment. The plans were drawn by A. I. Lawrence of Berlin and Gorham.

A joint building committee of four members—two appointed by the City Council and two by the Board of Education—was appointed as follows: By the City Council, Mayor George E. Hutchins and Councilman E. M. Cross; by the Board of Education, John A. Burbank, a member of the Board, and Superintendent George II. Whiteher.

There were several bids received for the construction of the building, and also for the heating, ventilating and plumbing, these being called for separately. The lowest bid for the building was received from Russell & Craigue and for the heating, plumbing and ventilating from Berlin Mills Co., and these two firms were accordingly awarded the contracts. The total contract figures were \$14,999.93, just seven cents less than the appropriation called for.

In order to expedite matters the contractors were asked to begin work upon the building and, relying upon the informal statement of the members of the Council, that the appropriation would be made, they commenced work August 14. A resolution making the necessary amount—\$15,000—available was passed September 5. The building was occupied January 15, 1906, the four schools having quarters there being the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades from the northern or Berlin Mills section of the city. The winter vacation for the grade schools was made one week longer than would have otherwise been the case to allow as much time as possible to get the building in readiness.

The Board feel that the city has in this structure a thoroughly up-to-date school house. It contains several features that are new to this section and, to a certain extent, were experiments, as but little really definite information could be obtained as to their working under elimatic conditions that prevail here.

The building is provided throughout with a double run of sash


thus aiding in the matter of keeping it warm in winter, and also in ventilating in warm weather, by permitting a circulation of air without the attendant direct drafts that are so dangerous to health in buildings that are provided with single windows only. The heating is by a combined direct and indirect system, the latter carrying the gravity system of ventilation. It has been satisfactorily demonstrated that the ventilation system is working in a thoroughly satisfactory manner and the pupils are having an abundance of pure, fresh air at all times. Another noticeable feature is the curtains which are so arranged as to allow shutting off the sunlight from any part of the room without darkening an entire window as is sometimes necessary with the ordinary curtains. Still another innovation is the dust-chutes which extend from the hall on each floor into a fire-proof vault in the basement, thus obviating the necessity of carrying waste paper and rubbish about the building and also reducing to a minimum the danger from fire from this cause. All in all the Board feel that the City has a first-class building and that the construction price was very reasonable. It has been decided to name this school "The George E. Burgess School," in consideration of the interest taken by Mr. Burgess and his immediate family in the school affairs of Berlin.


The Marston Fire.

The work of the schools which were housed in the Marston building will be seriously hampered by the necessity of their occupying temporary quarters owing to the destruction of that building by fire. This occurred on the morning of Friday, February 2, 1906. School had just commenced when the fire was discovered and there were nearly four hundred scholars in the building at the time. In spite of the loss of the structure, which was a first-class building, the city has much to be thankful for that not one of the pupils or teachers was injured to any extent in escaping.

Every precaution had been taken to make this building safe and the only solution of the origin of the fire is that gas formed in the furnace and blew hot coals down through the grates and out the door in the front underneath, and across the furnace room to the partition of the coal bunker about eight feet distant.

The building was insured for \$14,900 and the contents for \$900, making a total of \$15,800. While this does not cover the actual value of all that was lost it was as much as could be consistently carried. The claims are in process of settlement and it is expected that remittance for the full amount will be in the hands of the City Treasurer by the time this report is published.





The Board is now engaged in arranging for plans for a new building and it is hoped that the Council will be able to provide the necessary funds so that work can be commenced not later than April first in order that the structure may be completed in time for the opening of the fall term. We recommend that the same policy of permanency and up-to-dateness be carried out that has been followed in the Burgess and High school buildings.

Financial.

The expenditures for the financial year covered by this report have been greatly increased by the necessity of purchasing new books, supplies, and furniture consequent upon the losses by fire. Besides these additional outlays there has been increased cost for running expenses for the fitting up of temporary quarters and for cartage of desks and other school equipment as well as a considerable bill for rent.

The total outlay has been \$24,235.88.

This is \$1,797.50 less than the expense of running this department during the year ending February 15, 1905, and is \$235.12 less than the amount asked for by the Board in its recommendations of last February.

For the next financial year we feel that as generous an appropriation as possible should be made for the schools as there were many needs that we could not meet during the past year owing to a lack of funds. This hampers the success of the work that should be accomplished and lessens the efficiency of the schools to a considerable degree. The Board feel that the money expended has been well invested and that much care has been taken to maintain an economical administration.

For the year just beginning the teachers' salaries will show an increase and there will be considerable expense involved in suitably fitting up the new buildings, which should be provided for. There will be a considerable bill for books and supplies to replace those lost in the Marston fire.

These special items should be provided for by an increase in the appropriation. In order to carry out the work in reasonably good shape a total of \$25,000 should be available for the use of the Board. This is only \$529 more than was recommended last year. A less amount than this will seriously hamper the efficiency of the work.

During the past year the average cost per pupil has been \$22.98. The average cost per pupil for books and supplies has been \$2.13, but this includes the cost of all the books purchased to replace those burned in the High school fire and is nearly double what would have the cost under normal conditions.

Suggestions.

In closing our report we wish to express our appreciation of the work of Superintendent Whitcher and our pleasure in knowing that his efforts are so heartily approved by no less an authority than our State Superintendent of Public Instruction who has made a very thorough examination of our school system.

Many of the teachers have labored under very trying conditions, yet, there has been harmony and an honest desire to give the best possible results to the pupils under their charge.

We appreciate the position of the Council in the matter

of finances and re-iterate our statements made so many times before you that our insistence upon the appropriations that we have asked for has been in every case prompted by a firm conviction that the need of the funds was imperative. We have given the situation very careful and thorough investigation in each instance and we are fully convinced that in a few years the wisdom of the course followed will be self apparent.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1906.

To the Board of Education :

Gentlemen:—The second annual report of the office of Superintendent of Schools will be short by reason of the pressure of duties incident to reorganization after the unfortunate loss, by fire, of the Marston School House.

I beg leave to state that in all essential respects the report of last year covers the line of effort in systematizing and modernizing the schools of this city.

The wisdom of the changes then suggested becomes evident as time permits results to follow.

That the high school entrance age was and now is from one and one-half to two years too great must be evident to all who have investigated the subject. It will require at least two years longer to reduce this age to a normal modern standard. The standing of those pupils who have already been admitted at a considerably lower age is such as to guarantee the ultimate success of the plan which, by the way, is generally recognized in the most progressive school centers.

There need be no halt or hesitation until pupils come to the high school at an average age of 13½ years. That the high school must slightly modify its first year's course to meet the new conditions is of course evident but it may safely be predicted that while the first year's work will be a little less advanced, and only a little, the superior power of the younger and more rationally trained pupil will more than make good this deficiency in the three last years so that at graduation from the public school system there will be a higher degree of efficiency than formerly.

The Course of Study.

There are two ways of presenting a course of study, one a mere skeletonized outline, such as was printed in last year's report. The other a detailed outline covering every subject grade by grade.

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Such an outline would make a book three times the size of the whole City Report and hence is not to be reproduced. Such an outline, however, is now completed for Arithmetic and Geography and next year will see the History and Language lines equally provided for.

The Arithmetic course is the result of five years of school room experience and embraces in condensed form the substance of the courses of lectures I have given on the subject at the Plymouth and Marthas Vinevard summer schools.

It replaces formal abstract number drill with concrete spontaneous thinking along number lines. The results fully meet all that can reasonably be expected but as time goes on and teachers become better prepared to present this work there will be a very large increase in its efficiency.

The young child cares nothing for abstractions, for rules or forms, but wants to exercise his brain as well as muscles in active doing; he must be impressed through his senses, the only avenues provided, before he can react in true number expression.

In Geography our schools are seen at their best. The study of man's great industries as now carried on by a true "laboratory" method has given results little short of phenomenal.

I only ask the public to visit the sixth, seventh and eighth grades and convince themselves of the value of this work.

To take grammar school pupils out into the great world of business affairs, to have them correspond with the greatest producers of manufactured articles of clothing, food, shelter and luxuries, to have them write to officials in Washington, to Consuls in foreign countries, to China, to Formosa, South America and Australia, as ours have done and then to receive long type written letters from these great offices is to make "the school a part of life" in fact. And more, it is also suggestive of cooperation in a broad sense when busy men devote time to painstaking minute replies to children's questions.

Our collections of samples of tea, cocoa, sugar, spices, etc., and of raw materials and fluished products in cotton, woolen and silk are of great value to the pupils and in time will constitute a geographic museum of large proportions.

Manual Training.

This department though temporarily closed for lack of an outfit will in a week or two be under way again.

We are demonstrating that manual training is not an expensive part of the scheme of education and it is gratifying to state that a

Massachusetts Superintendent after visiting the expensive rooms and outfits in several large cities and towns in his own State at last found in Berlin an inexpensive plant yet efficient, and here saw that which he believed would meet the needs of his town where only limited funds were available.

With larger and more expensive facilities we could indeed do more, but probably not better work. And from present indications I believe the time will soon come when one of two things must be done, either enlarge the facilities and take in the fifth and sixth grades, or establish a department of Household Science, sewing, cooking, etc., and make this available to the girls while the Sloyd is reserved for the boys. I believe the former the better solution but either is reasonable and would prove effective.

The High School.

Our high school is the one great problem now in process of solution. It will require the combined effort of the pupils, the home, the teachers and the school authorities to reorganize and place this part of our school system on a footing at all comparable with the grades.

That this is not a new individual opinion is well known to you not only from your own observations but from the comprehensive report of the State Superintendent who, at your request, made a careful inspection of our entire system. This report is a part of the records and open to public inspection by interested citizens.

Personally I cannot assume any of the blame for the unfortunate condition into which the high school has fallen because no opportunity for any of the responsibility for its management was open to me during the first year and a half of my labors here and because I did not care to accept this responsibility after that period, until certain adverse conditions could be changed; this having been accomplished I stand ready to assume the responsibility of placing this part of the system on a footing harmonizing with the grade work and suited to the needs of our city.

We may learn much concerning the high school of the near future from the writings of Pres. G. Stanley Hall and I am of the belief that no one has better put the case than he when he says:

"From this standpoint the high school should primarily fit for nothing, but should exploit and develop to the uttermost all the powers, for this alone is a liberal education."

"In view of all the facts, what should be the next step? I believe it should be the organization of the public high schools by themselves, or at least with as much care that their interest, predomin-

ate, as has been exercised in the various joint committees that the college predominate."


President Hall, quoting President Jordan says "*** if the publichigh school wants to fit for college, well and good, but that is not its object. If either bend to the other, the college should bend. The high school should say to it [the college], Here is our product, take it or leave it, we have done the best we are able at this stage."

Berlin needs a high school not for the benefit of any college but for the benefit of Berlin boys and girls, ninety per cent of whom will never enter college; it wants a high school in which the industrial, commercial, manual and scientific factors are given their true values and not side tracked until the college entrance train has monopolized all the best of the motive power and rolling stock. It wants a high school to round out its public school system so that its graduates shall have the *power* to do and be in the world.

Such a school Berlin can have and I believe will have in a very few years. And such a school *will fit for college* also.

Report of Building Committee of George E. Burgess School.

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1906.

To the Board of Education and City Council:

The joint Building Committee of George E. Burgess school submit the following report :

The Committee met at the office of A. 1. Lawrence, architect, on the evening of August 8th, and organized with His Honor, Mayor George E. Hutchins as Chairman and George H. Whitcher, Secretary. Bids were received and opened and it was found that the lowest bidder overrun the available sum by \$786.93. Before any of the figures were given out a list of possible alterations were submitted to each competitor with a request that each submit a set of figures naming the reductions that would be allowed in consideration of the changes. At an adjourned meeting these reductions were opened and the contract for the general construction was awarded to Russell & Craigue of Berlin and the heating, plumbing and ventilating to the Berlin Mills Co. Work was commenced Aug. 14th and in just five months the building was occupied by four schools, although certain parts of the building are not yet completed and cannot be until after the frost is out of the ground.

Your committee has held fourteen regular meetings and a record of all votes passed is open for the inspection of all citizens interested.

The Committee has spent considerable time in inspecting the work and feel justified in saying that a substantial, well planned thoroughly modern school house is the result. We recognize the fact that eight months instead of five would have been a better period of time, and that a better job could have been required with longer time but the interests of the school children demanded that the school be in readiness for the winter term. REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

We wish to call attention especially to the system of Heating and Ventilating made use of in this school house. A system by which the impure air is positively removed and an abundant supply of fresh warm air introduced. It has been fully demonstrated that the air in these rooms is as fresh at the close of a school session as it is at the opening because a sufficient amount is introduced to entirely replace all of the air in the rooms every fifteen to twenty minutes. The coal consumption thas been surprisingly small, a fact which is especially gratifying.

The George E. Burgess school is planned with the idea of making additions of two or four rooms at any time when the needs of this part of the city demand it.

The final act of turning the building over to the proper authorities cannot take place until warm weather permits the balance of the outside work to be satisfactorily done.

A small extra appropriation will be needed to provide for the architect fees and a few extras that were found to be absolutely necessary and that were not included in the original appropriation.

We beg leave to express the belief that Berlin has in this new building the best school house in Coos County and we urgently invite the public to thoroughly inspect it.

Report of High School Building Committee

BERLIN, N. H., February 15, 1906.

To the Board of Education and Cily Council:

The joint Building Committee for the erection of the new High school herewith submit a brief report of the work carried on under their direction with a statement of the expenditures up to February 15.

A description of the building and a statement of the contractors' figures are given in the report of the Board of Education.

Some few difficulties were encountered at the commencement of the work owing to an error in establishing the grade, but this was adjusted by calling in a disinterested engineer, Mr. H. S. Ferguson, who figured the variation that the placing of the building at the proper elevation would make from the original contract price and the work was proceeded with.

It was deemed advisable to place a permanent inspector upon the work and the services of Mr. George H. Ferguson of Glens Falls, N. Y., were obtained for this purpose.

In January Mr. Ferguson requested the committee to release him and his request was granted, his place being taken by Mr. Walter Hodgdon.

The work of the contractors under the direction of the inspectors has progressed in a very satisfactory manner and rapid progress has been made. No work has been done as yet by the C. H. Goss Co. other than the delivery of a portion of their materials upon the ground ready for installation.

The brick work is completed except for finishing out the stacks. The roof timbers are in place and the building will be closed in in a short time. It is expected that the work will be completed about the first of August, in ample time for the furnishing of the building before the opening of the fall term,
