It gives us pleasure to say that the management of the farm and the almshouse for the past two years under the care of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Meloon, meets our hearty approval. We have secured their services for the ensuing year, greatly to the satisfaction, as we believe, of the inmates, who appreciate the kind treatment they have received from them.

In regard to county finances we are able to make a most gratifying showing. We have paid all the county bonds, which comprised all the debt, and have the sum of \$1,046.40 available to pay coming expenses. Ten years ago the county was owing over one hundred thousand dollars. Since then a sys-

tem of water works has been put in which gives the almshouse plenty of water for fire and other purposes, and steam heat introduced, all of which has been paid for, together with the Pitman farm purchased last year.

It will take about \$8,000.00 to run the county from January 1 to October term of Court, when the tax of 1897 will be due.

We recommend that our delegation should raise the amount of twenty thousand dollars to defray the expenses of the county yearly for the next two years. This amount will pay all the expenses of the county and leave about \$8,000.00 in the treasury to run the county until the taxes of the following year are due.

## SOLICITOR'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF CARROLL COUNTY:

I hereby submit my report as Solicitor for the year ending December 31, 1896.

During the year the Grand Jury has found twenty-four indictments, as follows:

## APRIL TERM, 1896.

Larceny (2 respdts),	1

At the April term there was no criminal jury trial. In one case the two respondents were given sentence of four months and fine of one dollar and costs, each; one case of two respondents, on plea of *nolo*, was marked: not to go forward *nisi*; four cases were continued, the respondents being without the State. In the liquor cases, respondents were sentenced in four cases, fines and costs paid; one case continued, respondents being sick; in three cases, *nolle prosequi* was entered. One appeal for assault was entered and continued.

At the October term, Paul Wentworth acting Solicitor, there was no criminal jury trial. In one case respondent was given sentence of two years, *mittimus* not to issue till called for by Solicitor; in one case respondent was given sentence of one year and one day; one case was continued: in one case respondent was given sentence of five years, the other two cases against him being marked, on plea of *nolo*, not to go forward *nisi*. In the liquor cases, respondents were sentenced in two

cases, fines and costs paid; one case was continued; in the other, *nolle prosequi* was entered.

Of the continued docket, at the April term, in one case the respondent, taken on requisition papers from Maine, was given sentence of five years at hard labor; one case was marked: on payment of costs not to go forward, costs paid; in two cases, *nolle prosequi* was entered; five cases were marked: not to go forward *nisi*, the respondents being without the State; the other five continued.

Of the continued docket, at the October term, four cases were marked: not to go forward *nisi*, the respondents being without the State; one, an appeal case, marked: not to go forward *nisi*; the other six cases continued.

The county has been a party in one civil case only, for the removal of paupers without the State, in which the county prevailed.

It is suggested that Sec. 26, Chap. 112, P. S., be so amended that a respondent convicted under Sec. 14, Chap. 264, P. S., may not escape the penalty of his crime, by the provisions of said Sec. 26, the costs thus being thrown upon the complainant; and with greater reason, when the respondent discloses that his purchase was made without the State, as often occurs, so that no benefit accrues to the public.
