TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the (L. S.) County of Cheshire in said State qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town hall in said town on Tuesday the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one or more Road Agents, who under the direction of the Selectmen shall have the same power and perform the same duties as the Road Agents elected by the town.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairing of highways and bridges.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,106.00 for State Aid Construction.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,075.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient for the continuance of the plowing out the Hinsdale road so called, by tractor, for vehicle traffic, enabling the doctors to reach town by the shortest route from Hinsdale.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to purchase additional snow fences needed by the various districts of the town, and raise money for same or act thereon.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of poor.
- 10. To see if the voters will appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the repair of the Gulf Road, so called, in said town, and, if so, will authorize and instruct the Selectmen to enter into a contract for the performance of said repair work.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to buy or lease one or more parcels of land to be used for public dumps, and raise money for same.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the town library in addition to what is reuired by law.
- 13. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 to fight Pine Blister Rust.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home day and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$600.00 for Trunk Line snow removal.

- 18. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to investigate the merits of a town forest and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to accept in perpetual trust the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Walden L. Laskey trust fund, the income therefrom to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery association for the care and maintenance of the burial lot in the said Association's cemetery in which the said Walden L. Laskey is buried. And it is hereby agreed by the parties in interest that the income from the principal sum shall be added to the same, and the whole remain in the care of the town till the same is properly authorized to use the money in the manner specified.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the John W. Davis trust fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery association for the care and improvement of the Davis-Hutchins burial lot.
- 21. To transact any other business that legally comes before said meeting.

TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1928

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, called at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, March 13, 1928.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Louis D. Herrick, at 9 a. m., and the warrant read by the Town Clerk.

A notice to the voters of the Presidential Primary was read by the Moderator, Louis D. Herrick. The ballot clerks, Clarence E. Savage, John Mansley, William Davis and George Tuttle took the oath of office before the Moderator. On motion of Charles A. Post, it was voted to close the ballot box at 3 o'clock p. m.

The articles of the warrant were then disposed of as follows:

- Article 1. Election of Town Clerk. Voted that the Moderator be instructed to cast one ballot for Imogene L. Chickering for Town Clerk and she was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.
- Article 2. Election of Selectman for 3 years. Voted that the Moderator be instructed to cast one ballot for Fred E. Atherton for Selectman for 3 years and he was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 3. Election of other town officers.
Election of Road Agent at Spofford. Whole number of

votes cast 83, necessary for choice 42. Nelson Ball had 1, Emroy Carey 1, Mr. Willet 2, Willet 1, Walter Post 3, Walter J. Post 75. Walter J. Post having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Election of Road Agent at West Village. Whole number of votes cast 112, necessary for choice 57. Mortimer Spring had 1, Angelo M. Spring 25, Clifford E. Chickering 86. Clifford E. Chickering having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Election of Road Agent at the Center. Whole number of votes cast 100, necessary for choice 51, Emroy G. Carey had 18, Frank M. Holman 82. Frank M. Holman having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Then Walter J. Post, Clifford E. Chickering, and Frank M. Holman, Road Agents, took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Town Treasurer. Voted that the Moderator be instructed to east one ballot for Harold E. Foster for Town Treasurer and he was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Auditors. Merle W. Cobleigh and Harry E. Winn were elected by voice vote to serve as Auditors and both took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Constables. William D. Pierce, Harlan Streeter and Charles H. Spaulding were elected by voice vote to serve as constables and William D. Pierce and Charles H. Spaulding took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Trustee of Town Library. Fred O. C. Farr was elected Trustee of the Town Library for 3 years by a voice vote and he took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Fence Viewers. Fred O. C. Farr, Walter Dunbar, and Olin E. Butler were elected Fence Viewers by a voice vote and Fred O. C. Farr took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Trustees of Trust Funds. Merle W. Cobleigh was elected Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years by voice vote and Clarence E. Savage was elected by voice vote to fill out the unexpired term of George W. Bevis who had resigned. Both took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Elections of Sextons. Byron Davis, Percy Rowe, Fred E. Atherton, Harlan Streeter, Charles J. Paro, and Charles A. Tuttle were elected by voice vote to serve as sextons and Percy Rowe, Byron Davis, Fred E. Atherton, and Charles A. Tuttle took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. Moses H. Chickering, Frank M. Holman, and Earl Walston were elected by a voice vote to serve as Surveyors of Wood and Lumber and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Assessors. Voted that the Selectmen act as Assessors and Albert L. Post, Chester M. Burnham, and Fred E. Atherton, Selectmen, took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 4. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

- Article 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for the repairing of highways and bridges.
- Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,750.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance.
- Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for suspension bridge traffic plates as the town's portion of same.
- Article 33. Voted to take up Article 33 next. Motion made and carried that the sum of \$1.000.00 already appropriated for a physician be applied on the \$2,842.84 for repairs on town highways if that vote prevails. If not that it be applied to the General Fund.
- Article 8. Voted to raise the sum of \$2,842.84 for repairs on town highways, the amount being required by law in order to receive State Flood Aid.
- Article 9. Voted for continued application for Trunk Line Construction in 1928 and that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow in 1928 on notes to pay for same, to complete in 1928 the uncompleted sections of highways known as "Clay Hill Section" and "Suspension Bridge Hill Section," thereby completing the entire Chesterfield State Road between Brattleboro and Keene in so far as it is incumbent on the Town of Chesterfield to do so.
- Article 10. Voted that the sum of \$150.00 be deducted from the amount raised for roads in the Center part of the town and used for plowing out the Hinsdale-Chesterfield road by tractor for vehicle traffic, enabling the doctors to reach town by the shortest route.

- Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for purchasing snow fence to be used by the Road Agents on town roads in their districts.
- Article 12. Voted to pass over this article concerning the abandonment of a section of the old State Highway, near the home of Henry Chickering in Chesterfield.
- Article 13. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the poor.
- Article 14. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for the support of the Town Library in addition to what is required by law.
- Article 15. Voted to continue the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.
- Article 16. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of fighting Pine Blister Rust.
- Article 17. Voted to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for same. A committee consisting of Chester M. Burnham, Morris Friedsam, Fred E. Atherton, Rupert B. Telfer, Clarence K. Lewis, and Katherine Post was elected by voice vote to have charge of same.
- Article 18. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- Article 19. Voted to pass over the article concerning the patrolling of the Lake Spofford Section.
- Article 20. Voted to pass over this article concerning the signing of orders by the Selectmen.

- Article 21. Voted to pass over this article concerning the removing of signs along the State Highway.
- Article 22. Voted to leave the matter of the monthly meetings of the Selectmen to the discretion of the Selectmen.
- Article 23. Voted to pass over this article concerning the installing of a light near the residence of Frank Guyette.
- Article 24. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to put in culverts and gravel a section of highway situated in the west part of Chesterfield, beginning at the four corners between the farm of Chester M. Burnham and the residence of Thomas L. Chatfield and improve said road towards schoolhouse No. 1 as far as the money will permit.
- Article 25. Voted that the Trustees of Cemetery West Association be appointed agents to sell a certain piece of the real estate of the late Melvin Smith estate and the proceeds be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds.
- Article 26. Voted to accept in perpetual trust the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Elizabeth D. Smith fund, and the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the care and maintenance of the burial lot in said Association's Cemetery in which the said Elizabeth D. Smith and her husband are buried, also Anson Hosley and wife.
- Article 27. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Helen Farr Burnham Trust Fund, said sum to be held in trust by said town forever and the income therefrom to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the care and maintenance of the burial lot in said Association's Cemetery in which the said Helen Farr Burnham and her husband are buried, also Worcester Farr and wife.

Article 28. Voted to accept in perpetual trust the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Ransom C. Farr trust fund, the income therefrom to be paid to the ChesterfieldWest Cemetery Association for the care and maintenance of the burial lot in the said Association's Cemetery in which the said Ransom C. Farr is buried. And it is hereby agreed by the parties in interest that the income from the principal sum shall be added to the same, and the whole remain in the care of the town till the same is properly authorized to use the money in the manner specified.

Article 29. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Arthur M. Davis Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Arthur M. Davis burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 30. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Martha L. and Bertha L. Davis lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 31. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Fred C. Harris trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the John Harris burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 32. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Mary Smith trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Mary Smith burial lot.

Article 34. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, the income to be used for the care of the Emma V. Winn burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 35. No other business appearing, it was voted to adjourn without date at 2.30 p.m.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I hereby submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The excellent organization developed by Superintendent Slade has greatly facilitated the process of "getting acquainted" with the work.

TEACHERS

The beginning of the school year found two new teachers in the Chesterfield schools: Miss Eleanor Clark teaches in the Spofford Advanced school, and Miss Pearl Hale in the Spofford Primary school.

BUILDINGS

The buildings in general are in good condition. During the summer electric lights were installed in all the schools. These greatly improve conditions, especially during the dark days of the winter season.

One side of the roof at the Spofford school, which was found to be leaking, has been shingled. New doors have been hung at the Spofford school.

At the West Chesterfield school the entrance to the toilets has been altered according to specifications of the State Department. The chimney at this school was retopped and cleaned.

New locks, which permit the doors to be opened at all times from the inside, have been installed in all the buildings. The school law requires this type of lock for all two room schools.

NEW EQUIPMENT

Sets of Johnston's school maps have been purchased for the Spofford and Chesterfield schools. Each of the sets consists of seven maps, contained in a convenient spring roller case. As a similar set had previously been purchased for the West Chesterfield school, all the schools are now satisfactorily equipped in this respect.

New clocks have been supplied to the Spofford Advanced school and the West Chesterfield school.

In regard to new equipment now needed, I would recommend the following: Shades for all the schools, replacement of the old blackboards at the Spofford school. The desks at the Spofford school are in poor condition. The district might well consider replacing these with the chair type desk units.

HEALTH

Good results have attended the health supervision work. In this very valuable phase of the school system, all have cooperated. A summary of the health conditions, and of the results of the tonsil and dental clinics, will be found under the report of the School Nurse.

An appropriation in the budget makes it possible to continue the hot lunches in the schools during the winter term.

I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation of the parents, members of the School Board, and teachers.

I respectfully submit the following report as school nurse:

- 84 pupils were examined.
- 23 pupils were underweight.
- 48 pupils were in need of dental care.
 - 3 pupils were unvaccinated.
- 12 pupils showed defective vision uncorrected.
 - 5 pupils showed defective hearing.
- 13 pupils showed some orthopedic defect.
- 24 pupils had enlarged or diseased tonsils.
- 13 pupils had enlarged glands.
- 99 visits were made and health conditions talked over with parents.

Two tonsil clinics were held at the Elliot Community Hospital, Keene, N. H., nine children were treated.

A Dental Clinic was held October 3rd, and 10th, 1928 with work done as follows:

Total number treated,	21
Total number receiving complete care,	14
Total number having teeth cleaned,	17
Total number silver and porcelain fillings,	80
Total number extractions,	28
Total number operations,	125

The clinic rates were as follows: Cleaning .75c, extractions .50c, silver and cement filling \$1.00, porcelain filling \$1.25.

The total bill for this work was ninety-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$99.50), paid for by the parents of the children having work done. As this work was done for half the regular charges there was a saving of one hundred and two dollars (\$102.00).

2 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

1 pupil had special eye examination and defect corrected.

2 underweight clinics were held at which 32 pupils were examined by Dr. Robert Kerr of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

I wish to express the appreciation of the district to the Kurn Hatten Home, Westminster, Vt., for the loan of their dental chair.

Also to the local chapter of the Red Cross for financial assistance.

I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation of the parents in the work accomplished in the past year.
