To the Inhabitants of the Town of Clarksville in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Clarksville on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.
5. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of T. R. A. roads and if so, raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00.
6. To see if the town will vote to have two road districts and two road agents instead of three.

7. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Clarksville School District:

Foreword

Children are shaped by the entire community. Within the neighborhood or community are hundreds of forces which impinge upon them. Some of these forces are controlled and approved but many are not. There are, in every community of any size, blind spots so far as constructive control and influence are concerned which if neglected can only result in continuing delinquency.

The greater the need for concentrating on the battle front, the greater the necessity of strengthening here at home all that justifies its sacrifice. The more war disrupts our lives, the more responsibility we have to those upon whom its burden falls most heavily. These include not only the men and women plunged into military service or uprooted from their homes to serve in war industries but also the children.

The prevention of juvenile delinquency is one of our home front problems. The home, the school and the community each have a responsibility. Neglect along this line is resulting in too many of our youth being crippled in mind and heart-tragic casualties of war time living.

Yet these are the citizens of tomorrow. And tomorrows soon come. In our hands, as parents and citizens of today, rests the obligation to see that on the home front, the foundations of morality, religion and culture are strengthened, not weakened.

Teachers

The teachers for this year are Pearl Hawes, Prin-

cipal, Grades 1-4 and Doris Chappell Grades 5-8 and Music.

Notes on the Budget

The school building is in good condition. The spring seems to be functioning normally again. At the present time we have on order a new Kaustine Unit to replace the broken one.

Enrollment and Attendance

There are now 26 enrolled in the two rooms. This is an increase of 6 over the preceeding year. The percentage of attendance for last year was 90.25. There were 134 cases of tardiness. One pupil, Pearl Beauchemin, was not absent or tardy for the entire school year.

Tuition

There are five pupils attending school outside the district, four at Pittsburg High and one at Canaan High. This represents a decrease of three from last year and since two are Seniors a still further decrease is expected for another year. We have but one in the 8th grade.

Statistics

The total equalized valuation of any district is made up of the Assessed Evaluation, Savings Bank Interest, Railroad Tax and Soldiers Exemptions. The equalized valuation of Clarksville School District is \$545,608.00. Current costs of public education per \$1,000.00 to the local district are \$6.90 and the latest per pupil elementary price cost is \$214.63.

Health

A brief report of the work of the school nurse between February 1, 1944, and February 1, 1945, follows:

School inspections 234, home calls 12, treatments at school 11; physical defects: teeth 12 corrections 2, tonsils 4 corrections 2, vision 6 corrections 3; skin diseases 3, contagious diseases 13, anemia 2.

Conclusion

The schools are the community's opportunity for reaching all the children of all the people. It is our duty to provide their education, not education merely in terms of books, credits and diplomas, but education in terms of preparation for living and earning.

I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the members of the school board, parents, teachers and citizens for their support in our common effort to maintain good schools.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
