TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the several highways and bridges.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to be used with the special appropriation by the State of \$2,400.00 for the improvement of the Kingston Road.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow paths.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in improving the cemeteries.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town.

10. To see how much of the Parsonage funds the Town will vote to spend for preaching for the year ensuing.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's Deeds.

12. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally.

13. On petition of James Dimond and others: To see if the town will vote to adopt the system known as "Australian Ballot" for the election of all town officers, and to fix the hours which the polling booths are to be kept open.

14. On petition of Richard H. Dickinson and others: To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to employ an outside foreman from the State to build the State Aid Roads.

15. On petition as above: To see if the town will vote to adopt the eight-hour day for all town work.

16. On petition as above: To see if the town will vote to fix the rate of all unskilled labor at forty cents per hour.

17. On petition as above: To see if the town will vote to elect the police by ballot.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Danville:

I herewith submit my seventh annual report. Your consideration of the following topics is solicited:

OUR OBJECTIVES

Amidst the most trying period in our nation's history I make bold to declare our objectives in education. It should be of interest to you that your schools are endeavoring to reach the goals now common to the educational world and that definite progress is being accomplished.

Some of the objectives follow:

1. To perfect the education of the whole child.
2. To create an interest in the child in his inschool and out activities so that he may be a useful citizen all his life.
3. To bring about an interest on the part of parents in the modern program so that better understanding of the school may be had.
4. To release some of the traditional, inefficient methods of instruction so that better methods may result in increased knowledge and power.

Our program deals not only with the mental but as well with the physical and social side of the child. Much individual attention has brought about desirable gains in the mental. Directed and supervised group activities in play and dramatizations have attained the results needed for physical and social development. Our children must learn cooperation and self control in order to meet the demands of society. These are probably best taught through play and games. I hope our schools are meeting this problem.

More and more interest in current affairs is being manifested in our children. They are eager and anxious to know the workings of our government and society. Our upper grades promote lively discussions of these topics in almost every school day.

Parents are keen to help and often consult the teachers to know the best ways to help their children. They are ready to co-operate and promote educational welfare. I cannot recommend too highly the effectiveness of the Parent-Teacher movement. We hope for still greater emphasis in this respect.

Many subjects formerly conducted as elaborate memory tests have now been succeeded by planned adjustments to fit the individual needs of the child. We have come to realize that every child has a definite need and that not everyone can be "pushed through the same mill." Each pupil has a certain mental capacity. Our aim is to reach his maximum and not beyond his power of accomplishment.

In attaining these aims and objectives, an enthusiastic and well trained teaching staff is essential. When once obtained every inducement toward retention should be offered.

THE EDUCATIONAL CRISIS

There is an educational crisis. Thousands of our nation's children are now deprived of even the rudiments of an education. School terms have been shortened by one week to six months in many states and communities. Some schools expect to operate only three months of the year. Teachers' salaries have dropped to new lows—even lower than the minimums allowed to unskilled workers under the codes. Our nation's schools are faced with more children and less money. Never has it been so difficult to meet these demands.

But what has this to do with our local situation? Much, in that modern means of communication have made us a whole rather than a group of separate communities. That

which effects one part has a depressing effect upon the rest. We of New Hampshire have been extremely fortunate because we have succeeded in continuing our schools without very severe retrenchments. I hope it may be our ambition to keep our present establishments intact from harmful influences. Further retrenchments may be necessary but let us examine the essentials and make sure that first things come first.

SCHOOL COSTS

The above discussion leads naturally into local costs and some comparisons with those of your neighbors. Please remember that these are offered only in a spirit of helpfulness that you may from them draw your own conclusions. Changes in number of pupils have a decided influence upon the averages, especially in the smaller districts. All the figures used are from the most recent releases of the State Board of Education.

PERSONNEL

Again we have the same capable staff of teachers working in your schools. Successive years of experience in the same school mean continuity of progress for your children.

IMPROVEMENTS

Some improvements to the buildings have been suggested and plans made to make them possible through the application of CWA funds. But the difficulty of obtaining money for the purchase of materials has made it necessary to withhold direct application for these funds. It has been hoped that the schools might be painted, the Eaton school shingled, and some landscaping and grading be done. A project to install sanitary toilets at the Eaton School was initiated but met with equally unsuccessful results. The material expense is too great to be borne by either CWA or district funds at present.

APPRECIATION

Anything which may be done to evaluate the work of the schools might lead to disastrous results. I am deeply grateful to the many parents and citizens who have so faithfully helped in interpreting the schools to the general public. They have given freely of their time and ability. To the School Board and teachers I would especially be grateful for their co-operative efforts for without them I would not be able to report a successful year notwithstanding the most restless in recent history.
