

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Having attended to the duties to which I was elected, I beg leave to submit the following report of the schools of the town.

GENERAL STATUTES, CHAP. 81. SECT. 19 The school committee shall present to the town, at its annual meeting, a report stating the number of weeks the public schools have been kept in each district, in summer and winter, what portion by male and what by female teachers; the whole numbers of scholars that have attended each school, and the number attending to each study; the number of children between four and fourteen that have not attended school, and the number of persons in each district between the ages of fourteen and twenty-one years who cannot read and write, with such suggestions relative to the schools as they may think useful.

By the above quotation, it will be seen that my duty is to report the condition of the schools, and that I am not required to make personal criticisms upon the qualifications or success of the several teachers.—a thing I am glad to avoid as a useless and unpleasant service.

GENERAL REMARKS.

A common defect in alcour schools, not only in this town, but throughout the entire State, is that too large a share of the scholar's time and study is devoted to arithmetic, to the neglect of other equally important studies. Of course the knowledge of mathematics is important, and so is grammar, geography and bistory. Many, who are very good mathematicians, are shamefully deficient in these other branches. Even teachers ing cuschools are defective in these necessary studies. Writing is reduced to a heautiful system, and with the books now in use in our schools, the science should be taken up and taught systematically, and teachers should prepare themselves to teach it thus, and should be examined in the art of teaching it.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

This subject has been treated upon in almost every report for the last twenty years, and we trust some good has resulted but more needs to be done to make the school buildings throughout the town what they ought to be.

In No 3, they have done a praisworthy deed in repairing their edifice. Indeed if they had put a couple of coats of paint on the inside to hide the old boards, it would have been as good as a new house.

Then they should add a set of black-boards. Will they not inish up the well-begun work.

Dist. No. 8, would do to take trip down back of the mountains and get an inspiration that shall enable them to see how much they need to repair their old wreck, or build a new one.

At the last session of the legislature district No. 2, of Laconia was united to No. 13, of Gifford, throwing the whole village into one district, having six schools, as now arranged. The district now needs a general revolution.

First it should be incorporated and controlled by a board of education as the schools of Laconia now are.

Then the schools should be thoroughly graded. There should be, on each side of the river, a primary and an intermediate department. Then a grammer school and a high school should be made up from both sides of river.

A building is needed at one to accommodate these higher schools. This district has a golden opportunity now to start schools that shall do much to elevate the standard of education in the town, and to afford our talented young men and women opportunity to secure an education without going abroad to patronize other schools. A high school should be started there that shall draw in all the best talent of the town.

Some of the other districts should attend to the repair of their school buildings; especially is there need of reparing the blackboards. There is scarcely a board is town but needs repainting.

It would be well also to furnish the schools with thermometers. They are very much needed in the winter schools.

THE TEACHERS.

We have had a good corps of teachers who have generally labored hard and with good success.

In a few cases there has been a lack of discipline, and with some teachers a lack of system. Several of the teachers deserved very high credit for their ability and marked success, "and their works do follow them." On account of the sickness of the teacher in No. 3, the school closed a week sooner than was contemplated, consequently I had not an opportunity to visit the school, the second time, but have no doubt of the success of the school, for the teacher they had is sure to succeed.

All the other schools I visited twice or more each term, and conducted an examinations at the close. Most of these examinations were witnessed by parents and friends, which added much to the interest of the occasion. Will not parents make more effort to attend these examinations? It cheers both scholare and teachers, and enable the parents to judge of the success of the school.

EMPLOYMENT OF TEACHERS.

Too little effort is made frequently by our commttees to secure suitable teachers.

When one is chosen committee, he is to serve the district, and should not hire a teacher for friendship or relation's sake, but seek to secure a teacher that will have success. Do not hire because you can hire *cheap*. Some things are too cheap. A good teacher can scarcely be paid too much. A poor one always has too much. A poor teacher is a good deal worse than none.

Let your motto be, good teachers or none.
