TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Goshen, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Goshen on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To hear the reports of Selectmen and other Town Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for repairs of Highways and Bridges.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to apply for State Aid and raise and appropriate the necessary money therefor.

ARTICLE 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Library.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Poor and Old Age Assistance.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to sand roads and raise and appropriate the money therefor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for First Aid and buying Fire Equipment.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24.00 in cooperation with other Towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

ARTICLE 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Snow Removal.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for control of white pine blister rust.

ARTICLE 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote and appropriate for further construction of road leading from Brook Road to Rands Pond.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to place adequate signs, bearing the name of the Town, at the proper entrances to the Town and appropriate the money therefor.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the necessary money to complete the Brook Road (so-called) to the Sunapee-Goshen Line.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town Clerk receive the bids and award the contract for setting up and taking down the Snow Fence.

ARTICLE 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

In these days of rationing, a timely slogan should be: "Use your library more; it is free!" With this in mind, the Library Board has tried in many ways to make your library a more interesting and up-to-date center of community interests.

For the younger generation, a fine low table and small chairs have been provided in the hope and expectation that more children will use and enjoy the excellent new books provided for them. These books range from very simple books for pre-school and primary children up through the intermediate and junior high school ages. Also the splendid children's magazine, "Child Life," has been ordered.

For adults, many of the newer books have been purchased, including some of the current best sellers. "National Geographic" and "Good Housekeeping" are the adult magazines to be found in the library.

This year, although no program was presented by the schools in observance of National Book Week, posters were made depicting the value of books, and a small collection of book reports and high grade school papers was exhibited at the library. Every effort is made to stress the value of reading as a means of self-education.

We are fortunate in our librarian who takes a real and vital interest in the library; and it is most gratifying to a librarian in a town such as this to have the patrons appreciative and whole-heartedly cooperative in any and all constructive programs.

The Bookmobile appears regularly, and this service is greatly appreciated, especially in the schools, as it brings a wealth of splendid reading material within easy reach of every one. The Library State Commission has given several outstanding books for children to our library, and thirty volumes for adults were contributed by Miss Luella Dunbar.

In the death of Mrs. Smart, the Library Board lost a faithful and honored member. Mrs. Bernard Richardson was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The last effort of the year has been the Victory Book Drive for our Soldiers.

The recent circulation of books on Saturdays has been between seventy and ninety-eight. It is hoped more people will avail themselves of the helpful diversion of reading during this trying period of unrest, and make 1942 a most successful library year.
