

Commissioners' Report.

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

Again we present to the tax payers of the county, our annual report in accordance with the New Hampshire statutes, also the reports of the Superintendent of the County Farm, Physician, Chaplain, Treasurer, Solicitor, Sheriff, Jailor, Clerk of the Supreme Court and Auditors:

The finances of the county are in good condition, and we are glad to report a decrease in the debt during the year of \$4,247.40 leaving the net debt January 1, 1897, \$13,889.20.

Permanent improvements made the past year include two additional silos, bath room, fixtures for dwelling house, and enlarged the ice house and built an addition for store room, finished two cold storage rooms, one for meat and the other for butter, making it possible now for the farm to supply the meat used at the institution in the summer as well as in winter which could not be done without cold storage facilities.

Also paid Bo-ton & Maine railroad, \$288.86 for material furnished and laying side track for use of county farm, thereby saving the labor and expense of drawing supplies for the farm from North Haverhill or Woodsville. The expense for side track is not charged to permanent improvements.

The change made one year ago from fattening steers to keeping a larger number of cows has proved fairly satisfactory and the herd has been increased so that it numbers 70 cows for milking and fattening purposes and 20 head of young cattle. Twenty-five thousand pounds of milk was delivered to the North Haverhill creamery in the month of December.

Owing to the depression in business and the inability of many to obtain employment, our pauper bills off the farm show a slight increase over last year with the prospect before us of having to assist a larger number off the farm the present winter as well as at the farm.

A large share of the inmates are either by mental or physical disability incapable of performing but a small amount of labor, which necessitates an increase of cost for labor at the farm.

We deem it a duty to express our appreciation for the kind treatment of the Superintendent, Matron, and their assistants, to the inmates and the interest shown in making their lot, whether in sickness or health, as pleasant and as comfortable as possible.

We desire to call your notice to Chapter 27, Sections 9, 10, 11, and Chapter 85, Sections 1, 2, 4, 5, 14 and 15 of the Public Statutes, and inform you that no bills will be PAID for more than thirty days' support previous to the proper affidavits being furnished us according to the requirements of these statutes. The evidence as to the settlement must show the name, age, place of present or former residence of the applicant since 1880; the amount of property owned by and taxed to them in any place since Jan. 1, 1880; whether married or single; if married, when and to whom; if under the age of thirty years, the name and place and residence and parents; the amount of property owned by and taxed to either of them; if they have received any aid, when and by whom; where they have lived since 1880, and any other material facts bearing upon the matter.

We also call your attention to chapter 58, Section 1,

Pamphlet laws of 1883, entitled, "An act for the punishment of parents who neglect to provide for the support of their minor children," and to report any such case at once to the commissioners, so that such delinquents may be compelled to perform their duty to their legitimate offspring.

We would also call your attention to Chapter 84, Sections 9, 10 and 11, Public Statutes, in relation to aid furnished to indigent soldiers, and providing for entrance to the Soldiers' Home in certain cases, and request you to see that the provisions of said statutes are complied with before furnishing aid at the expense of the County.

You are requested to present to the County Commissioners during the first week of each term of Court all legal claims which said town has against said county for the support of county paupers.

You are also requested to look after the interests of said paupers, and be SURE that each pauper gets a dollar's worth of goods for a dollar, and settle no bills that are not particularly itemized as regards weight, quantity, and price.

In accordance with Chapter 30, Section 1, Public Statutes, the Superintendent of the County Farm shall make up his report to January 1st, annually, and also Sec. 2 of said chapter requires that the superintendent's report shall contain, in addition, a list of the paupers actually supported at the Farm, and the number of weeks each was so supported, also a statement of the average cost per week for each pau-

per, with an explanation of the basis upon which said calculations were made.

The whole number of persons supported and partially supported for the year ending December 31, 1896 was (133) one hundred and thirty-three.

The number of weeks' board is ascertained by taking the number of days between the day of admittance and the day of departure of each individual, and dividing that number by seven, it gives the number of weeks each individual has been so supported.

The whole cost of supporting paupers at the farm for the year ending December 31, 1896, is \$8,035.25, and this sum divided by the whole number of weeks board furnished, viz: 5,856 gives \$1.37 ås the price per week.

Physician's Report.

To the Honorable Commissioners of Grafton County:

In rendering a report as attending physician at County Farm for the year 1896, I find little to be said other than has been said before. The sickness of the inmates has been considerably more than during the previous year and the death rate a little larger.

An epidemic of Scarlet Fever broke out the latter part of March which made it necessary to keep the entire institution under quarentine about forty days.

Those infected, which numbered only four, were isolated in attic rooms with a nurse to attend to their several needs. The source of the first infection could not be traced to any definite point. The fact so few suffered from the disease gives much credit to those in charge.

As usual constant improvements are being made which add much to the material comfort of the inmates. All are well fed and clothed and the general laws of health are observed in all the departments.
