TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town's Meeting House in said Henniker on Tuesday, the Eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing and to elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention to be holden in Concord, on the second Wednesday of May 1938.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
3. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds and other committees.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.

5. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Public Health Nursing Association, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate, to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, in addition to that required by law, for the support of Tucker Free Library.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishing of fires.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the town buildings and town trucks.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward paying its indebtedness.

13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see what action the town will vote to take to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister Rust, raise money for the same or take any action relative thereto.

15. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of the Warner road, so called, and raise and appropriate or set aside for the purpose the sum of \$2,073.00; or will accept State Aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside the sum of \$1,020.33.

16. To see if the town will approve the appointment of an advisory town planning board of five or seven members as may be determined by the meeting, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 55 of the Public Laws of 1935, to study and promote the development of the town.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the town planning board if the town votes to appoint such board under article 16.

18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the celebration of the anniversary of the ratification of the federal constitution by the state, June 21, 1938, said sum to be expended under the direction of the selectmen, or to take any action relative thereto.

19. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Australian ballot system in the election of its town officers, or take any action relative thereto.

20. To see what action the town will take toward renewing its contract with the Public Service Co. of New Hampshire for street lighting, or take any action relative thereto.

21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the painting of Academy hall and the old iron bridge at West Henniker, or take any action relative thereto.

22. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting and raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the same.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be applied toward the payment of the services of a probation officer or take any action relative thereto.

REPORT OF HENNIKER
PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICE

To the Selectmen and Citizens:

I hereby submit my annual report covering the period from Feb. 1, 1937 to Feb. 1, 1938.

Due to the fact that the town has had a great deal of sickness the past year which extended well into the summer months, a great deal of time has been given especially to bedside care and making instructive visits.

The schools have been unfortunate by having the following communicable diseases visit them during the past year.

Measles	81 cases
German Measles	16 cases
Chicken Pox	30 cases
Whooping Cough	30 cases
Mumps	9 cases
Scarlet Fever	1 case

The following figures give some idea of the extent and variety of work for the past year.

General Visiting Service

34	Maternity visits

- 4 All night calls
- 1 Patient accompanied to County Hospital
- 3 Patients taken to Margaret Pillsbury
- 1 Patient taken to Doctor at Concord
- 96 Hours spent on Sunday calls

A first Aid class was held during the month of March at Central School. Sixteen hours were required for the course so the class met two evenings a week for two hour classes. The class consisted of 8 men (6 Firemen) and 3 women. All 11 starting the course, completed it, and received certificates from the National Red Cross.

From the above table the following may be noted :

1. Each school had full 360 half days sessions,—an improvement over the previous year. No time was lost.

2. The average membership and number of pupils remain about the same.

3. The number of cases of tardiness has increased. Every effort should be made to reduce this figure.

4. The number of visits by citizens and members of the school board is larger.

5. The total unrepeatd registration was 318. Of these 4 were elementary tuition pupils at Quaker Street, and 3 high school tuition pupils from other districts. The number of pupils residing in the district and attending its public schools was therefore 311.

6. The percent of attendance remains low partly on account of the prevalence of chicken pox and mumps.

An account of the health work in the schools will be found in the accompanying report of the district nurse, Miss Ruth Nichols. Good progress has been made in the correction of defects.

At the Central school building there is great need of new toilets for both boys and girls. Those now in use are old and in poor condition. There is also need to lower the black boards in the rooms occupied by

grades I and II so that the pupils can easily reach them. The boards at present are about 36 inches from the floor as designed for the use of high school pupils. The plastering in the ceiling of the front hall is loose and may fall. Provision should be made to repair this before next year.

Altogether there is need of an entirely new building to house the elementary schools of the district. A large sum of money might be spent in repairing the old building and it would still be unable to meet the requirements of a modern school. It is earnestly to be hoped that the district or some public spirited citizen with wealth should equip the elementary pupils of the town with a modern school building comparable with that enjoyed by the high school pupils.

During the year parents, teachers, and school board have cooperated in an effort to secure and maintain the best possible conditions for the advancement of the pupils in educational work. It has been a great pleasure to me to have the privilege of working with them.
