

REPORT OF THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

In conformity with the laws of the state, the County Commissioners of Hillsborough county herewith submit the following report of the expenditures of the county, over which they have any control, for the year ending Dec. 31, 1877-8.

The general good health of the inmates of the aimshouse during the past year, and the reduced number of deaths from the year 1876, although the number supported and partially supported was much larger, is cause for congratulation. We will add that the small death rate and freedom from sickness speaks well for the sanitary care and cleanly manner with which the institution is managed.

There was expended during the year 1877 at the County Farm the sum of \$1,201.28 for improvements, the principal of which was the construction of a new barn 45 x 36 feet and 20 feet posted. This barn has long been needed. It contains a tie-up for young cattle raised upon the farm, calving pens, a new and well arranged hen house, and ample scaffold room for hay and grain; much of the work upon it was performed by inmates of the institution, and part of the material being on hand the cost of construction was thereby greatly reduced. The hog houses under the barns have been remodeled. New and substantial pens have been constructed with floors so raised as to keep the occupants dry and clean, with swing doors and fixed troughs; in fact they are every way suitable for the purpose designed. This work was also done by inmates and consequently the expense [was very small.

A pasture near the buildings, so rocky and [barren that the feed was of no account, has been reclaimed, the rocks blasted and

drawn off or sunk beneath the surface; much of the stone was used in building a substantial wall around the piece; the roots and bushes have been taken out, the sod turned over, and a fine field of 8 or 9 acres has been made of what was heretofore a useless piece of land. When fully under cultivation it will be as valuable a field as there is on the farm, owing to its close proximity to the buildings and the easy roads to it.

Extensive repairs have been made upon the water works, a new flume put in, house built over the ram pits, leaks stopped, and everything about the works put in complete order, thus insuring a sufficient supply of water for present requirements. In this connexion the commissioners would represent the necessity of certain repairs that will absolutely be required the coming season.

The main building occupied by the inmates requires painting, it should have been done last year, and the two barns and woodshed will have to be shingled, and perhaps some of the other buildings will require slight repairs.

As will be seen by the table contained in the report, the crops upon the farm have been abundant, the hay this year being 30 tons in excess of last year, and the yield of potatoes being 1000 bushels larger than in 1876; the corn crop was satisfactory, and other articles in good quantity.

The system of careful breeding, and raising the best calves to supply the place of cows worn out by age and use, is working well, and there are quite a number of valuable young animals now at the farm, the result of this system.

Attention has been called in former reports to the fact that the wood upon the farm is not sufficient to supply the demands for heating and cooking purposes, and eventually coal will take the place of wood in making steam. Last year we were obliged to buy 225 cords and shall be compelled to purchase as much or more every succeeding year.

The distance of the farm from railroads, causes at least \$1,000 per year, extra cost to be added to running expenses in the cost of transporting paupers, prisoners and provisions which might be saved if the institution was located at some more accessible point. In the event of its being permanently fixed here the buildings will have to be enlarged or new ones erected for the accommodation of inmates and other necessary purposes, as the number of paupers increases year by year.

It will be observed by a comparison of the reports for this year and last, that a reduction of the amount of bills has been made as follows: In the jail expenses for the year, a reduction of \$542.09; in miscellaneous expenses, \$339.09; in stationery and printing, \$63.84; in bills at the reform school, \$278.74, and at the insane asylum, \$1,173.26. The reduction of bills at the reform school is owing to the reduction in price of board at that institution, and the decrease at the asylum is owing to the removal of harmless insane patients from that institution to the county almshouse.

Upon referring to the table in the body of the report, it will be seen that the expense of supporting paupers off the farm was for the year 1876, \$19,641.13, and for 1877, was \$18,334.70. This amount may seem large, but upon consideration can be satisfactorily accounted for. In the year 1875, the legislature passed a bill abolishing certain town settlements, thus throwing upon the county for support a large number of persons previously supported by towns; included in this number were many old people, and it was deemed in their cases cruel and hard to remove them to the county farm and sunder the association of a life time of residence in one place, consequently contracts with towns and individuals were made for the support of these persons where they had been accustomed to live. It will be seen that the expense was reduced over \$1,300 from the cost of supporting paupers off the farm in 1876. It is fair to suppose this reduction may be further increased as this class of persons pass away. Another cause of the expense of paupers off the farm being so heavy is the fact that a large number of people have asked for aid owing to inability to obtain the usual amount of work, and amounts varying from one dollar to three or four dollars per month have been allowed them in groceries, fuel, etc., as their wants and necessities have seemed to demand. This aid has been temporary, and has been more economical for the county than to have sent whole families to the county farm for the winter or longer. A reduction in the expenses attending this class will take place when business revives and work starts up.

The Commissioners would extend their thanks to Hon. H. T. Morrill, Rev. Mrs. Lincoln, Mrs. Dea. Livermore, Miss Emily Dascomb and Miss Fay of Boston, for bound books, magazines,

newspapers and periodicals furnished gratuitously by them from time to time for the use of inmates, and which were highly appreciated by them. The books and papers sent by Miss Fay through Rev. Mr. Mellen, her agent in many benevolent works, were particularly suited for children and the younger inmates, and gave much pleasure to them.

The Catholic portion of the inmates of the institution are ministered to by clergymen of their own faith, and beneficial results are evident from their visits. Rev. Father Millette of Nashua and Rev. Father Buckle of Peterborough are the priests who make alternate monthly visits to the almshouse.

Rev. I. S. Lincoln of Wilton Centre, the venerable and faithful clergyman who acts as chaplain of the institution, has performed his duties with regularity and great acceptance; he has attended all funerals and held services at stated intervals.

The ladies and gentlemen of the choir who have furnished so acceptable music on every occasion when opportunity offered have the thanks of the Superintendent and Matron.

It will be observed that the death rate is much lower than last year, and we are entirely satisfied that the good health is owing very much to the care and close attention paid to the inmates by Dr. Fleeman, the physician of the institution.

The school attached to the almshouse has been for the past few months under the charge of Miss Nettie M. Geddings, a teacher who has earned an enviable reputation in several districts in this and surrounding towns. The school numbers at this time 34 pupils, and as many of them are now in a school room for the first time in their lives, and others of them are incapacitated for learning readily owing to the blunted and enfeebled condition of their intellect, it might be supposed that little progress would be made, but we are happy to say the evidences of improvement are marked and encouraging.

We can only reiterate our previously expressed opinion regarding the efficiency and good management of Mr. and Mrs. Bumpus, the Superintendent and Matron. We consider that to their good judgment, executive ability and experience is to be attributed the successful working of the institution, both as to economy, health, cleanliness, etc. We extend to the employes of the institution our thanks for their ready co-operation and aid to the Superintendent at all times.

In closing we desire to say that considering the unusually hard times, the depression in many kinds of business, the lack of work at fair wages, the large number of persons wholly dependent, or partially dependent upon charity for support, and the other unfavorable circumstances which have added to our burden of needy ones, we consider that the institutions under our charge have been managed with rigid economy, and that the outside relief furnished to paupers off the farm, has been kept within the smallest limits compatible with anything like a fair amount of relief, such as intended by law.

The number of weeks board furnished to inmates (not including hired help) for the year ending Dec. 31, 1877, was 10,901,—dividing that number into \$18,571.53, the amount paid from the County Treasury,—the cost of board will average \$1.70 per week. Taking the amount \$18,571.53, deducting \$1,201.28, the amount paid for building new barn, repairs, etc., the result is \$17,370.25, dividing that amount by 10,901, the number of weeks' board, it will average a cost of about \$1.59 per week.

Gentlemen: - Another year has passed away, and it reminds me of my duty to report to the Honorable Board the sanitary condition of the inmates of the Hillsborough County Almshouse. Whole number cared for during the past year is 502. The health of the inmates, considering the large number which has been cared for during the past year, has been remarkably good. Although considerable sickness has occurred, so many of them being old and infirm, and many of all classes which are brought to the institution sick and broken down in health, of course enlarges the sick list, still no particular disease has invaded the premises. Prompt attention and cleanliness of all the wards does much to induce the health of the inmates. The insane have been very comfortable the past year, and their condition made as well for them as can be done. I tender my best respects to the Superintendent and Matron of the institution for their kind attention to the sick and all others under their care. To the commissioners I render many thanks for the courtesy I have always received from them, also commend them much for the interest they always manitest for the good of the institution. There has been the past year whole number of deaths, sixteen; births, six. All of which is respectfully submitted.
