### SITUATION

- Aeromedical Evacuation (AE) Technician (AET) is a special duty for Air Force medical technicians
- Current recruitment, accession, and retention processes have led to an undermanned force
- Retention process improvements are forthcoming though with few changes to recruitment and accession

### BACKGROUND

• Current process for creating an AET:

Time until completion of AE Formal Training = Approx. 3 Years						


- Challenges:
  - Low number of volunteers after completion of Upgrade Training (UGT) at first assignment
  - Clinical acumen from first assignment often does not meet desired level of skill

### ASSESSMENT

- Major roadblocks for direct accession of Non-Prior Service (NPS) airmen:
  - Identifying pool of capable candidates in technical training
  - Accomplishing flight physical during technical training
  - Accomplishing UGT at AE operational squadrons
