# Town Warrant

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Ipswich in the County  
of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town  
Affairs

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You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said New Ipswich on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred and twenty dollars (\$2520) for the Maintenance of the State Road.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) for Memorial Day.
5. To see if the Town will vote to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
6. To choose two members of the Electric Light Committee, one for two years, and one for three years.
7. To choose one member of the Trust Funds for three years, also to have this same committee serve as Trustees of the Spaulding School Fund.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise one thousand dollars for street lighting.
9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1200) to retain our resident physician.
10. To see what action the Town will take in regard to disbanding the old fire companies and organizing a new company.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) to build a dam for a small reservoir in back of Abbie Phelps' buildings. If this is done Mrs. Phelps will give a right of way to said reservoir.

12. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen take money from our permanent improvement fund to repair and oil the road from Appleton Hotel to Ilmer Aho's, known as Town Hill.

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred twenty-four dollars (\$524) for State Aid Construction.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for White Pine Blister Control.

15. To see if the Town will vote to straighten the road near the property owned by Mrs. Stowell known as the Hudson Place, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

16. To see if the Town will extend the Electric Light line from Matti Kangas' place to Gustavo Gronfros' place and raise and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the Town will vote to extend the Electric Light line from the residence of Joseph Sorel to August Millimäki, and raise and appropriate money for the same. August Millimäki, August Polyos Maki, John Nyman and John Koski agree to give one week's work if line is built.

18. To see if the Town will vote to extend the Electric Light line from the Gibson Four Corners to the following residences of Matti Matson, Albert Mansfield, Victor Lehtonen, Jani Nykanen, Pavvo Ratitainen, Charles Nelson, Edward Davis, Frank Raitanen, and John Kangas at Ashby Line, and raise and appropriate money to defray the expense. If said line is built the above mentioned persons will each give one week's work.

19. To see if the Town will vote to extend the Electric Light line from the residence of Dr. Norris to the residence of Leon R. Willard, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

20. To see if the Town will vote to extend the Electric Light line from the residence of William Patterson to the residences of John Kurtti, Isaac Aho, Matti Aho, Alfred Parhiala, Thomas Parhiala and Selma Kesti, and raise and appropriate money for the same. If said line is built the above mentioned persons each agree to give six days' work.

21. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to extend the Electric Light line from Mansfield Corner to the residence of Alexandra Rosandra, John Siren, J. E. Kangas, and Geo. R. Jaquith. If said line is built the above named persons will each give six days' work.

22. To see if the Town will vote to extend the Electric Light line from the Smithville Schoolhouse to the residences of John Keurulainen, Matti Heinonen, John Heinonen, John Herskanen, August Hagelberg, John Neimi, John Siltanen and William Hakkinen and raise and appropriate money for the same. If said line is built, each of the above named persons will give six days' work.

23. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used by the Cemetery Committee to drain the swamp part of the Center Cemetery, or take any action thereon.

24. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Electric Light Committee to deposit in the Town Treasury all money in excess of five thousand dollars, (\$5,000). Said money to be used by the Selectmen to reduce the tax rate, or take any action thereon.

The town has had no cases of contagious diseases during the last year, and with every school child vaccinated the town is fortunate. Dr. Donald Clark is a member of the Board of Health.

The very successful Child Health Conference of 1926 was followed by another equally successful conference this last year, the report of which follows:

26 children were examined.

19 children found with defects.

33 defects found.

6 defects have been cared for.

4 children placed under treatment.

The conference was held under the direction of the State Board of Health division Maternity Infancy and Child Hygiene in co-operation with the P. T. Association and Town's people.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF NEW IPSWICH:

I submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

### TEACHERS AND PUPILS

Three of last year's teachers are with us again this year, Mrs. Corthell and Miss Steele at the Village School and Mrs. Smith at Number Six. This is the first time in my experience that we have been able to have the same teacher at the latter school a second year and this is very much to the advantage of the children there. At the Junior High School we have Miss Mabel A. Whittemore, a graduate of the Plymouth Normal School last June; at Number Four the new teacher is Miss Florence M. Sturtevant who has had several years' experience in other places in New Hampshire; and at Number Five we have Miss Cora E. Stacy who is a graduate of the Keene Normal School last June. These three teachers have taken hold in a way that has shown some fine results already and the interest of the children in their work is very satisfactory. At the Highbridge School we had to change teachers at the Christmas vacation and we were fortunate to find at that time of year a teacher of experience. Miss Margaret Ward has taught a number of years in the state and there seems to be no question of her ability to control the school and that is the first essential to successful teaching.

The experience of the past year shows still more conclusively that additional money expended to secure and retain good teachers is money well spent.

The statistical report following shows a decrease of 20 in the total enrollment from the school year 1925-1926, but the average membership for the school year was slightly higher than that of the previous year which indicates a rather more stable school population. The per cent of attendance was slightly lower but remained very close to the state average. Tardiness showed an increase, but the increase was almost entirely at the Highbridge School and has been checked this year. The enrollment for the current year is practically the same as last year.

### SUPERVISION

The statistical report shows 154 supervisory visits as compared with 142 last year. The testing program described in last

year's report was followed in about the same manner through the school year 1926-'27. This year two additional types of testing are being used, one giving particular attention to oral reading in the first three grades and to silent reading in grades three to six. The other new feature is the use of Standard Achievement Tests covering three phases of silent reading, both the computation and the problem sides of arithmetic, language, spelling, and general information in science and history. Some of the results of this group of tests were published in the school paper "Souhegan Spirit" last month, and in the list of pupils there given whose composite scores exceeded the standards of the second grade above their own will be found the names of three New Ipswich pupils, which is a rather small proportion considering the number of pupils in New Ipswich as compared with the other towns. This group of tests will be repeated near the close of the year and will furnish a more accurate measure of progress through the year than any other data except the teacher's own daily records; consequently the results will be given considerable weight in determining promotions at the close of the year. Progress in reading in the first three grades will be considered particularly in determining promotions as it has been demonstrated that most of the failures in the higher grades are due to deficiencies in reading which should have been thoroughly mastered in the primary grades.

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#### SILENT READING

The most important subject taught in school through the entire period of school attendance is Reading. Reading is the key that unlocks for the pupil the door to every other subject taught, as well as the doors to many of the activities and experiences of adult life. The aim of the school is to train all pupils to read effectively and to establish strong motives for and permanent interests in reading.

While mastery of the mechanics of reading is the chief aim of the teaching in the first three grades and instruction for this purpose is necessarily very largely oral, by far the larger part of a child's later reading and practically all of an adult's reading is done silently. Not enough has been known about the best methods of teaching the economical and effective habits and skills necessary in silent reading, and consequently not enough emphasis has been given to the teaching of silent read-

ing, either in the first three grades or in the higher grades where definite instruction is also needed.

Following a general discussion of reading methods at a teachers' meeting last October a set of textbooks especially prepared for teaching silent reading was placed in the hands of all the teachers of grades four, five, and six. Since then systematic work has been going forward, and at the end of the fall term brief reports from the teachers showed that some progress had been made and that at least the consciousness of the need for such instruction was well established in the minds of the teachers and pupils. In their answers to the question as to what real gains could be seen in their classes, the following are typical phrases: more interest, better understanding, more use of the dictionary, greater independence, more thoughtful reading, more careful observation, clearer thinking, more concentration, interest in the meaning of unfamiliar words, greater speed and accuracy, overcoming the habit of moving the lips, and a desire to read more.

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#### CHARACTER EDUCATION

Mention was made in my last report of a special program of Character Education. This program is now in use in all of the schools and a special teachers' meeting was held early in October to discuss methods in character training. Space will not permit an adequate outline of this program but I will mention some of the salient points.

The highest type of conduct, both theoretically and according to our American ideals, is free conduct. But freedom is not license or irresponsibility. The teaching of conduct must be free and not a slavish following of outlines. The whole content of the school curriculum must be seen and presented as moral in essence and purpose. The teacher must know the principles of conduct and practice them in daily life or there will be no effective building of character. She must herself be all she expects her pupils to be. She must know the individual child and his home and community environment and must have a sympathetic understanding of the behavior of children. She must also have quickened her personal and social ideals, her moral vision, and sense of social justice.

The methods used must be varied in their appeal and in their application. She must constantly keep in mind that it is more

important to teach boys and girls than it is to teach subjects.

With younger children the most useful medium for teaching character is the story. G. Stanley Hall says, "Of all the things that the teacher should know how to do the most important without exception, is to tell a story." The child lives the experiences of the stories he hears, suffers with the evil doer and is rewarded with the virtuous, and his character is lastingly affected because he is strongly moved. The stories selected should contain a lesson, and they should be strong and true to life. Much harm may be done through stories with low ideals and also through stories of unusually good children.

For the young child moral training is largely social adaptation. He must learn to work harmoniously in a group as either leader or follower. He must not be judged by the adult standard of right and wrong for he has to be taught the adult code of social and moral behavior just as he has to be taught other facts and his standards must be built up slowly. His failure to distinguish between truth and imagination or to appreciate the importance of ownership results from ignorance, not from badness.

With older children a more systematic teaching of the cardinal virtues may be attempted, not by lecturing and preaching but by story telling, illustration and actual practice on the part of the pupil. Plato centuries ago named the four cardinal virtues upon which is based our outline today:

1. WISDOM, which embraces the topics clear thinking, open-mindedness, reverence, appreciation, and health.
2. SELF-CONTROL, which we subdivide into obedience, reliability (honesty, punctuality, orderliness), and industry, (thrift, initiative, ambition, perseverance).
3. COURAGE, physical and moral courage, duty.
4. JUSTICE, including courtesy (kindness, co-operation, fair play, sympathy), service, loyalty, and patriotism.

In our high schools to a greater extent than in the elementary schools, intellectual attainment has been regarded as the chief aim. The success or failure of a pupil and the school has been judged by scholastic standing alone. This renewed emphasis on character training is an attempt to put in practice the conviction that all instruction has for its chief aim Character Formation.

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#### MEDICAL INSPECTION

The report of the medical inspection conducted by Dr. Pease with the co-operation of the nurse, Miss Frye, last September shows the following results:

The report of defects treated is probably inaccurate as it does not include treatments which the parents secured without the co-operation of the nurse. I would call particular attention to the number of children having defective teeth which is ten more than the previous year. Some more effective means should be found for taking care of these defects. Perhaps a dental clinic could be arranged in some way.

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#### FINANCES

A comparison of the Budget submitted for 1928-'29 with that of last year shows several increases which call for explanation. The estimate for flags and appurtenances is \$40 in place of \$20 to cover replacement of one or two flag poles. \$75 is found not to be enough for other expenses of instruction so the estimate is increased to \$100. For the same reason the estimate for janitors' supplies has been increased from \$65 to \$100; minor repairs from \$300 to \$350; and medical inspection from \$400 to \$450. The estimate for transportation is based upon the actual cost this year and includes the transportation of two children who are not near the routes covered by the former transportation teams. The estimated revenue from other sources than taxation remains about the same as last year with the omission of dog licenses, as we understand that this money will be used in the payment of damages caused by dogs this year. The estimated balance at the end of the current year is \$500 as compared with \$1000 last year. The increased expenditures mentioned above total about \$350 and the decrease in revenue will be over \$600 so the sum recommended to be raised by taxation is nearly a thousand dollars more than last year. The additional sums required for statutory requirements differ very little from the figures of last year but the estimate for new equipment is reduced by \$100; that for rental of a room at the Academy by \$25, and there is no allowance made for extraordinary repairs, so

that the sum of these items is reduced over \$300 and the total sum required for all purposes is \$650 more than last year.

School costs throughout the country have increased enormously in the past twenty-five years and especially in the past ten years. The costs in New Hampshire have increased in very nearly the same proportion as in other parts of the country. We have every reason to believe from the experience of the past two years that the peak has been reached and that we need expect very little change in the immediate future.

In closing I wish to express once more my hearty appreciation of the spirit of loyalty and co-operation which has been shown during the past year.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

TO THE CITIZENS OF NEW IPSWICH:

In making the annual report of the School Board we would first call attention to an article from the State Board of Education on the subject of Financial Economy in School Administration.

“New Hampshire enlarged school payments during the last twelve years, are due to the general increase in prices for labor and commodities, to a lengthened school year, for many districts, and uniform standards for all schools.”

It is largely the duty of the School Board to see that schools are in session three hundred and sixty half days, if that is the number paid for.

Some of our most northerly towns were actually in session three hundred and sixty half-days last year, with an average percent of attendance not less than ninety. Let us try to reach that standard.

We have been very fortunate until this week in having no interruptions due to severe weather or sickness.

Unfortunately Scarlet Fever has broken out obliging us to close the Center School three days before the week's vacation was to begin.

We wish to thank the Parent-Teacher Association for their ever ready co-operation, and to express our appreciation for their material aid towards the fund for playground equipment.

Referring to our school budget it will be noticed that we have no money this year from dog licenses.

We do not at present know of any extensive repairs to be made.
