TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Newton on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear reports of Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or through Old Age Assistance; or any other property of the Town not used for public purposes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the Fire Chief's salary from Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) annually and appropriate money for same.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Two Hundred Seventy-five (\$275.00) to pay for fuel for heating Newton Junction Fire Station.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the 1947 Ford 1000-gallon Tank Truck from the Newton Volunteer Firemen.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the 1948 Chevrolet 750-gallon Tank Truck from the Newton Junction Firemen's Association.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$5,750.00) which is the Town's share of the cost of reconstructing bridge at entrance to Wilder's Grove. The State will match this sum and supervise the construction.
- 11. On petition of the Cemetery Trustees and ten legal voters of Newton: To see if the Town will vote to accept the Report of the Special Committee (page 73) appointed by the Moderator at the last Town Meeting and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) to carry out the same.
- 12. On petition of the Cemetery Trustees and ten legal voters of Newton: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Trust Fund to be known as the Highland Cemetery Fund, to be created by the sales of all future graves or lots in the said Cemetery; the interest accruing thereon to be used for the care and improvement of this named Cemetery.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$850.00) to bulldoze town-owned land between the end of Country Pond Road and land of the Haverhill Boys' Club in order to provide a parking area; and also to widen the Beach to the width of town-owned land.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of five to obtain estimates for lowering and replacing ceiling and repairing and repainting interior of Town Hall. Estimates to be in the form of an article for next year's Town Warrant.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING NEWTON, N. H.

MARCH 12, 1957

The meeting was called to order at 10:20 p.m. by the moderator, Clifford R. Bryer, who called on the Rev. Elmer Young to open the meeting with prayer.

Article 1. The moderator read the results of the balloting. On motion of Everett Coombs for the Finance Committee, it was voted that all Town Officers not elected by ballot be appointed by the Board of Selectmen.

The number of votes cast was questioned, and a recheck of the tally sheets corrected this.

Article 2. Everett Coombs, for the Finance Committee, made the motion that we accept the list of estimated expenditures for the ensuing year of 1957, appearing on page 11 of the 1956 Town Report, (excluding the item of School Taxes) as the Town Budget for the year 1957; and moved the raising and appropriation of an amount necessary to cover the same. The Finance Committee also offered the following amendment: That the appropriation for Libraries be set at \$700., the same amount as the previous year. There was discussion, and an explanation that the additional amount asked for the Libraries is to make a lawn, which conditions make necessary, at an estimated \$100. The amendment to reduce the item in the budget for Libraries from \$800. to \$700. was put to vote, and was lost. The vote on the original motion to accept the Budget, with the exception of School Taxes, was passed.

Article 3. To hear reports of Town Officers: The committee on street lighting was called on to report. Thomas Mahan reported, and made the following motion:

That a street lighting committee be established, with the following conditions: a. To be comprised of three legal residents of the town. b. To be appointed by the Moderator, subject to the approval of the selectmen. c. To be set up on a rotating membership basis, that is: (1) The first member to be appointed as chairman and to serve for a three year term; (2) the second member to be appointed for a two year term; (3) and the third member to be appointed for a one year term; then, (4) at the completion of the terms of the members above, new members, or the same members, to be appointed to three year terms. d. To perform the following services: (1) To evaluate requests for the addition of street lights and make recommendations upon the same; (2) to make a more complete survey and try to establish a long-range street lighting service plan for the town; (3) to report back with their recommendations at the Town Meetings. It was a vote. The moderator appointed to this committee:

Thomas Mahan, Chairman for three years Stanley Cheney, for 2 years Third member, to be appointed

Article 4. On motion of Fred Cust, it was voted that the Town authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. It was voted that the Town authorize the selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or through Old Age Assistance: or any other property of the Town not used for public purposes.

Article 6. This article was explained by Kenneth Field. It was voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the completion of the new fire house being constructed on land acquired by the Town from Wilbur Sargent.

Article 7. On motion of Ralph Bowen, it was voted that the Town instruct the Moderator to appoint a committee of three to work with the Selectmen and Fire Chief in regard to the matter of purchasing a Combination Fire Truck, not necessarily a new one, to replace the Reo at Newton Junction which is thirty-two years old. The moderator appointed the following committee:

Nathaniel Sawyer Gordon Cheney Philip Webber Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum, not to exceed \$4000. to paint the exterior of the Town Hall. Ralph Marden reported for the committee. A motion was made by Stanley Cheney that we table this article until after Article 14 has been completed. A hand vote resulted in the motion being lost. 41 yes, 52 no. On motion of E. Atwood, it was voted that this article be passed over until the next regular Town meeting.

Article 9. A substitute motion for the one printed in the warrant was offered by A. Mabelle Warner — that a committee of five be appointed by the Moderator to make a study and to report its recommendations and the costs of each item at a special Town Meeting on the following items pertinent to Highland Cemetery. 1. Furnish a sketch showing all land sold and unsold in the New Section. 2. Furnish a sketch or plan of Roadway through the central portion of this New Section and show how traffic arriving at the East End will be diverted back to Highland Street. 3. Submit the cost of removing turf and installing a gravel base for this road. 4. Submit the amount of cost for adjacent land that would be necessary to purchase in order to return traffic back to Highland Street. 5. To ascertain the cost of fence to enclose the New Section. 6. That no more lots be sold in the New Section until the above named committee has submitted its report to a Town Meeting.

Mr. Atwood offered an amendment that the report of said committee, if said committee be appointed, be offered at the regular Town Meeting. The vote on the amendment was lost. The original motion was put to vote, and that was also lost.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote a policy of segregation for town meeting. Eligible voters to be segregated from non-voters with verification by check list upon entering the meeting. A motion was made that the article be accepted as read. An amendment was made that the article be defeated, and the amendment was a vote. This automatically cancels the original motion. The vote was

questioned, and on a show of hands, those in favor of defeating the motion to accept the article as written — 79 yes, 11 no, and Article 10 was defeated.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to fill the office of Fire Chief by popular vote, rather than by appointment. The Fire Department is a Volunteer Department under bylaws which say "the Chief shall be appointed by Fire Wards from a list of nominations submitted by the Department." The Selectmen got a ruling in regard to this article from the town counsel, and the moderator ruled that action on Article 11 may not be taken because of its illegality.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to make the offices of Constable and Chief of Police one elected office. The moderator read the findings of the town counsel on this, that these are two distinct and separate offices and there is no authority to take such action. Therefore the moderator ruled that this is also illegal and action is not necessary.

Article 13. S. Clark made a motion that the article be accepted as read. An amendment by Ralph Bean was made that the wording of this motion be "That the Town vote to have the two-way radio, now owned by the Town, installed in the car of the Chief of Police each year." The amendment was voted on and passed. Then the original motion as amended — a hand vote being called for — resulted in 53 yes, 32 no, and the vote was passed.

K. Briggs made the motion that the cost of installing the radio be taken out of the Police Dept. budget. The motion was lost.

K. Field made a motion that the Selectmen find the money to transfer the radio to the Police Chief's car, and it was a vote.

Article 14. On motion of F. Cust it was voted to hold Town Meetings in two sessions. First session: Article one (1) Election of Officers on second Tuesday in March as prescribed by law. Second session: Article two (2) and all

subsequent articles to be held the following evening starting at 8:00 P.M., second Wednesday in March.

Article 15. On motion of A. Mabelle Warner, cemetery trustee, it was voted "That a committee of five be appointed, etc." as quoted under Article 9 — the report to be given at the regular Town Meeting. The moderator appointed the following committee:

Miss A. Mabelle Warner, Chairman

William F. Halliday

Carl Shaw

Mrs. Ella Yates

One other to be appointed, (Harry Merrifield appointed.)

On motion of Stanley Cheney it was voted that the selectmen and two citizens of their choice be a committee of five to investigate the feasibility of covering the Town Hall with asbestos shingles, or other suitable type of siding, and report to be made with several bids and appropriation in an article in warrant of next Town Meeting. Mr. Atwood made an amendment to include treating and painting the trim. The amendment was passed, and the original motion as amended was a vote.

The Moderator re-appointed all retiring members of the Finance Committee and member of the Board of Appeals.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:50 a.m.

The following were sworn in by the town clerk: James Marden, Kenneth Briggs, Augusta Kimball, Everett O. Kelly, Harry Merrifield, Carl Shaw, Ella Yates, and Earl Morse.

(Omitted above) On motion of Ralph Bowen, it was voted that a moment of silent prayer be observed in memory of Augustus E. Locke who passed away March 27, 1956.

REPORT OF THE GALE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

This past year, the Gale Library has continued its program of book purchasing by providing novels, light fiction, nonfiction and magazines for the older readers by selecting biographies, plays, and fiction for the high school students; and by adding to the factual and reading stories for the young children. This is in accordance with the general practice of libraries to buy new books and discharge the old battered ones.

However, these past two years we have been dealing with two new situations. First, our high school students have been requesting more and more material for book reports. These books must meet the requirements of the several high schools, and are picked from the reading lists of these schools. Our high school group is larger each year. Second, we have young readers now in the Village School. Over a period of years, we had been working to maintain modern science, historical, biographical, and reference ma-

terial for the grammar grades. The older the student, the more books and reference material must be provided. When the grammar grades moved to the Memorial School, and the elementary grades began using the library services, we had to make a new beginning. The demand for books for that age level had not been much. The Library sectioned off a corner, added bookshelves, and furniture of the proper size. Books for that section were next. We started off with stacks of Golden Books, the Thornton Burgess nature stories, the Disney True-Life books, and the famous Landmark Series. Again, books are selected to go along with the school work as well as to entertain. We still have a long way to go.

At the P. T. A. meeting in January, the Gale Library presented the speaker, Mrs. Rachel Sanborn of the State Library Extension Service. The subject was indeed timely —the importance of books to children, and parents, along with a table display of the latest books.

The Library is rich in friends. We wish to thank the Garden Club for the colorful arrangements; and we also wish to thank the patrons who so thoughtfully donated books and magazines.

To those interested in the progress of the library lawn, please be advised that the lawn has been raised by applications of loam, fertilized, leveled, and rolled. The seeding has been deferred until the coming spring because of the long drought, and unfavorable conditions this past summer and fall. The aforementioned loam, five generous loads, were supplied by Mr. Ward Brown of Newton Junction who volunteered to furnish and transport free of charge all the loam needed. Such public spirit is indeed heartening.

In closing, please be reminded that the Gale Library is open Wednesdays from 2:00 to 7:30; the branch at the home of Mrs. Ella Yates on Whittier Street is open Tuesdays.

CIVILIAN DEFENSE REPORT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Newton:

The Civil Defense Director submits herewith, the report of the activities of the Civil Defense Agency for the year ending December 31, 1957.

Your Civil Defense Agency has been as active this past year as money and time could permit. We have taken part in all alerts and warnings transmitted to us by the State Civil Defense Agency in Concord. We have had the fullest cooperation of all town officials, departments, and citizens.

We have in our set-up 22 wardens — men and women. These wardens are placed as strategically throughout the town as possible. They have all subscribed to the oath as directed by the State Civil Defense Agency. They are ready for any emergency. They do need more equipment than we have been able to obtain with limited funds.

The Town of Plaistow has initiated an Emergency Police Reserve Training School, in Plaistow. This is for the training of units of Plaistow and surrounding communities. There are 7 men, as of now, from Newton attending this school every Wednesday evening. When they have become an organized unit and have completed this school, they will be trained men, available for any emergency that may arise in this town or surrounding communities. They will be an asset to the town and a unit that the Citizens of Newton can take pride in having. They need the support of all of us. All other men interested are urged to take advantage of this school.

Through Federal Government Surplus Commodities, and State Civil Defense Agency we have been able to obtain merchandise useful to the town at greatly reduced cost.

The following items have been purchased. The chart shows the original cost and the cost under Civil Defense to the town. We had to pay the shipping charges. These are shown for each item or group.

- 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 4. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies.
- 5. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
 - 6. To see what sum, not to exceed \$2,100 the district

will vote to raise and appropriate to partition an additional classroom at the Newton Memorial School.

- 7. To see if the school district will adopt as its school check-list the Town check-list, as provided in RSA 197;12a, as inserted by Laws of 1957, chapter 57; this provision to be effective for the 1959 and subsequent annual district meetings.
- 8. To see if the school district will raise and appropriate \$1,000 to gravel an area for parking and a truck entrance to the kitchen door from the rear of the Memorial School.
- 9. To see what sum the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of assisting the Parent-Teacher Association in carrying on the School Lunch Program.
- 10. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

Records of Annual School Meeting of the School District of the Town of Newton, March 21, 1957

The meeting was opened at 6:00 P.M. by the Moderator, Clifford R. Bryer, for balloting. The polls were closed at 8:00 P.M. and the business meeting was opened at 8:30 P.M.

Article 1: By Australian Ballot the following officers were elected: Moderator, Ella M. Yates; Clerk, Barbara R. Morse; Treasurer, Otis R. Rowell; School Board Member for three years, Ellen F. Bean; Auditors, Everett E. Coombs and Everett O. Kelly.

Article 2: "To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto." On motion of Clifford R. Bryer the reports were accepted as printed in the Town Report.

Article 3: On motion of Carl Shaw it was voted that this Article be taken up at the end of this meeting.

Article 4: On motion of Clifford Bryer the School Board was authorized to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies.

Article 5: On motion of Everett E. Coombs, for the Finance Committee, the budget was accepted as printed in the Town Report, with the exception of Item 6, Salaries of Teachers and Principals; this item to be acted upon separately. Motion was made by Everett E. Coombs, for the Finance Committee, that Budget Item 6, Salaries of Teachers and Prinicpals, be adjusted to conform to an increase in salary over the previous year of \$150.00 for each of the six regular teachers now employed. Ellery Atwood moved

that this motion be amended to read \$300.00. A paper ballot was requested with the following result: 77 votes cast, 42 Yes, 35 No. The motion, as amended was then accepted by a hand vote 49 Yes, 1 No.

Article 6: Motion was made by Curtis S. Bates that the district raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$6,000.00 to provide and equip an additional classroom at the Memorial School, including a teacher's salary. A paper ballot was requested with the following result: 79 votes cast, 35 Yes and 44 No. (The motion was not carried.)

Article 7: On motion of Ellery Atwood the School Board was authorized to adopt a plan for extending to the school custodian and the school lunch workers, the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act, etc., and voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$62.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

Article 8: On motion of Curtis Bates it was voted to raise and appropriate \$1,130.00 for the purpose of assisting the Parent-Teacher Association in carrying on the School Lunch Program.

Article 9: Motion by John Swasey "that a sum not to exceed \$2,000.00 be raised and appropriated for widening and hot-topping the driveway at the Memorial School and make an area for parking and a truck entrance to the Kitchen door from the rear of the building". The Finance Committee made the following amendment, "that the amount to be raised and appropriated under this article be reduced to not more than \$1,000.00 and that the work to be done include widening circular driveway at Memorial School, so that two cars can pass at all points, raising road grade to improve drainage, constructing dry well or other drainage near main entrance". After considerable discussion, both the amendment and the main motion were defeated.

Article 10: Motion by Ellery Atwood that a sum, not to exceed \$500.00 be raised and appropriated to hot-top an apron in front of the entrance to the Rowe's Corner School and to gravel the area behind the Village School. An

amendment by the Finance Committee to substitute gravel for hot-top at the Rowe's Corner School was lost, and the main motion was thereupon carried.

Article 11: On motion of John Fenn the School Board was authorized to spend an amount not to exceed \$600.00 of unanticipated tuition receipts toward current expenses for 1956-7.

Article 12: On motion of Thomas Mahan, amended by Ellery Atwood, this article "to see if the district will vote to petition the State Board of Education to become a part of a cooperative school district for the education of the secondary school children, etc., was voted to be laid on the table until the next regular school meeting.

Article 13: Action on this article was unnecessary, by reason of the vote on Article 12.

Article 3: It was voted that the School Board appoint as needed any Agents, Auditors and Committees not previously elected.

Article 14: On motion of Ellery Atwood it was voted to adjourn at about 11:00 P.M.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

January 20, 1958

To the School Board and Citizens of Newton:

I am presenting herewith my Second Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Newton. This report deals briefly with the following subjects: Personnel; Housing; Curriculum; and Community Organizations. Reports of the individual school activities, School Nurse, Music Supervisor, and statistical reports are also included.

PERSONNEL

Since the beginning of the year two teachers are new to their respective positions. They are Mrs. Adeline Bowen, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, with twelve years of experience—grades 5-6 at the Memorial School; Mrs. Harriet Jennings, a graduate of Boston College with one year experience—grades 3-4 at the Village School.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional teachers organizations and have attempted to keep abreast of modern practices by attendance at local and state teachers meetings and by taking courses when possible. Three of them have just completed a course entitled Language Arts under the auspices of the University of New Hampshire.

Although teachers salaries have increased in Newton, we are noticeably under the New Hampshire average for elementary teachers and New Hampshire is substantially below the national average paid all teachers. Even though New Hampshire increased teachers salaries last by the largest average in history, the state fell still farther behind the national average. It is necessary to have adequate

salaries to attract the more qualified teachers, and I urge the Town of Newton to support a good salary schedule.

HOUSING

Your School Board has continued to improve and maintain the physical condition of all the schools. Important improvements made since the last annual report have included painting at the Rowe's Corner and Village Schools, an installation of a new pump and water tank at the Rowe's Corner School, hot topping at the Rowe's Corner and Village Schools, the installation of a flag pole and dug well at the Memorial School and repairs to the exterior of the Village School, including a new front door. Additional painting at the Village School this year will complete present plans.

Regarding the proposed completion of the Memorial School; as the townspeople know we are badly in need of more classroom space. Enrollments have increased during the past year increasing our class size which has been excessive and making double grades a necessity. The bad effects of large classes and double grades are bringing to light reading difficulties and parents are becoming more concerned. Improvements can be made if the class size is reduced. Therefore it seems expedient that we utilize the third room at the Memorial School as an additional classroom.

It is expected that Newton will be eligible again for State Aid this coming year. Newton received a State Aid check for \$19,407.96 this past year.

The 1957 State Legislature increased state contributions toward costs of construction from 20% to 30% of its annual payment toward capital expenditures. This means they will pay an additional 10% on the principal bond payments for the construction of the Memorial School.

CURRICULUM

The Newton children are equipped with textbooks as good as are available. Basal series have been instigated

in all subjects and completed in most grades. Emphasis has been placed on reading and a complete testing program under the guidance of Robert Dolph, Helping Teacher, is in operation. Evaluation of all achievement tests has helped materially with proper grouping. Mr. Dolph is available to give helpful advice, counsel and assistance to teachers, pupils and parents as a contructive means of improving the educational growth and development of children. His work includes solving pupil problems of retardation and maladjustment, adopting the program of studies to meet the needs of the children and the community, bringing resources outside the school to classroom teachers, pupils, parents and community and in general acting as a consultant to the entire staff and community in the fields of curriculum, testing, in-service training of teachers and grade placement.

Mr. Dolph and your Superintendent have met each month with the principals and head teachers in the Union to stress important trends in education and to give all an opportunity to exchange valuable ideas and techniques.

It is the opinion of your Superintendent that we should continue to stress the basic fundamentals that lead to a balanced liberal education and not be unduly alarmed over what other countries are doing. Overspecialization can be as harmful as neglect of specialization. The problem is how to strike a balance between the two.

Educational Television is becoming more of a reality. Daytime programs for participating schools will start this spring from Channel 2 in Boston. Next fall a fuller program will be in effect. All school districts should investigate the feasibility of installing television sets in the schools.

Remedial reading instruction is being carried on in certain districts to help remove reading difficulties. Some school districts in the future will be running a four-weeks summer session for pupils on a voluntary basis. It is our responsibility to keep abreast of all major educational trends.

Report of Principal and Head Teachers

MEMORIAL SCHOOL

Most of our athletic activities with the surrounding towns seem to center around baseball. Last year's team, under the coaching of Mr. Michitson, had a very successful season. All of the games played with Plaistow, Kingston and Atkinson were won by the Newton team. In recognition of this success the P.T.A. sponsored a victory banquet for the boys at the Memorial School at the close of the baseball season.

Annually the American Legion sponsors an essay contest for members of the graduating classes of Plaistow, Hampstead, Atkinson and Newton. We were again honored when James Foy received honorable mention for his essay on the "Four Freedoms".

Late in May, children of grades 5-8, under the direction of their respective teachers, made an educational tour of Boston. Points of interest visited were the Towle Silversmiths, the Museum of Fine Arts, Logan Airport, U.S.S. Constitution, Science Museum and the Boston Garden. The trip was climaxed by seeing the Red Sox play at Fenway Park. Miss Curtis, school nurse-teacher and many parents accompanied the groups.

The development of communication was the theme selected for our Graduation Exercises which were held at the Town Hall June 17th. Of the thirteen graduates, four are enrolled at Haverhill High School, one at Amesbury High and eight at Sanborn Seminary.

The Good Citizenship Medal, awarded annually by the Sons of the American Revolution to a member of the graduating class, was won by Patricia Case. The exemplification of the principles of good citizenship in the opinion of teachers and classmates determines the winner of the award.

We are fortunate enough to have the continued services of the bookmobile, an extension service of the New Hampshire State Library. An exchange of books is made every second month throughout the school year to supplement our respective school libraries.

Seasonal "Junior Gardening" and nature lectures as well as demonstrations, under the able chairmanship of Mrs. Gordon Cheney are presented monthly. This project is sponsored by the Kingston-Newton Garden Club. The interest thus created in the study of nature is indicative of the fine work being done by Mrs. Cheney and her co-workers.

Pupil participation in the purchasing of Savings Stamps is splendid. Not only is the program serving its primary purpose of selling stamps to as many pupils as possible but it is also helping to promote the concept of thrift and systematic savings.

Children regularly make contributions to the Junior Red Cross, March of Dimes and the Crippled Children's Association.

We are constantly using visual aids to enrich or supplement our classroom teaching. Films on safety, social studies, music, writing and health have been found most generally useful. Visual Aids, planned objectively, are an integral part of our teaching.

Many weeks such as Fire Prevention, American Education and Book Weeks along with special days are regularly observed with appropriate programs. On occasions such as Valentine's Day, Hallowe'en and Christmas, class parties are usually enjoyed.

On September 30th the lunch program was resumed for the current school year. Well planned and balanced meals are served daily by Mrs. Marion Hatch and her helper Mrs. Rowell. Recently the P.T.A. purchased a twelve cubic foot Hotpoint refrigerator for use in the kitchen.

Newton shared in the National observance of American Education Week by having "Open House" Thursday, November 14th. Many parents availed themselves of this opportunity by observing classes in operation, becoming acquainted with the physical structure of our school building and meeting the teachers.

As a part of a program to help build international understanding, Mrs. Strand, Chairman of the Exeter Chapter of the Junior Red Cross presented the Newton Schools a "book box" of forty-five books. It has made a substantial and wholesome contribution to our school library. These books represent a gift from the American Red Cross Children's Fund, which is supported by contributions of Junior Members of the American Red Cross.

VILLAGE SCHOOL

During the year the regular teaching and classroom activities have been carried on but individual help, since September, has been at a minimum due to the large classes and double grades. Some additional activities have been as follows: a field trip to the Science Museum and the Circus—Grade 4; a field trip to Kingston State Park—Grade 3; observance of special days and National Education Week; enrollment in the Junior Red Cross; and participation in the instrumental music program.

The safety of the children has been greatly improved by repairs to the fire escape and fire escape doors and filling in the old well.

The telephone has been a great convenience and time saver in contacting parents, bus driver, janitor, other schools and the Superintendent's office.

ROWE'S CORNER SCHOOL

Children in the Primary Grades always look forward to special days such as Hallowe'en, Thanksgiving, Christmas and Valentine's Day. A great deal can be accomplished in getting little things ready for the party or program. The simple manners that are taught help to develop courtesy and thoughtfulness.

American Education Week was observed in November with parents having usual interest in visiting. "The Evening for Education" was also well attended.

The Christmas Tree and Party is always looked forward to with great anticipation. The thoughtfulness of the

Newton Parent-Teacher Association in furnishing candy canes and ice cream for everyone was greatly appreciated.

School photographs were taken.

The School Lunch Program started on September 30th this year. We certainly wish to express our gratitude to the two women who voluntarily serve the lunch each day.

As in previous years all children belong to the Junior Red Cross. Boxes were filled for overseas before Christmas. Favors for hospitals and rest homes were made under the Junior Red Cross also.

Contributions were made to the March of Dimes and the New Hampshire Children's Aid Society.

Some field trips were made during the year as follows: a walk to see the "creche" at the First Christian Church; and a trip to Benson's Wild Animal Farm. The help of many mothers make these trips possible.

Some of the children participated in the Memorial Exercises on the Sunday prior to Memorial Day at the Soldiers' Lot, Newton Junction. The School Memorial Day Exercises were held at the Union Cemetery. The Police Department furnished an officer to march along with the children. The school also participated in the Civilian Defense Evacuation.

We are endeavoring to bring as many things as possible to the classrooms through filmstrips and other Audiovisual Aids. The little "Playmate" club continues to emphasize thoughtfulness toward others.

Pre-registration was well attended by parents with their children who would enter school in September. Mr. Robert Dolph, Helping Teacher for Union No. 55, and Mrs. Gwendolyn Curtis Banks were present.

Some improvements that have proved helpful are the cutting of the trees in the rear of the building, and the hottop apron.

Routine visits of the "Bookmobile", with office in Ex-

eter, New Hampshire, has added to the supplemental books and the enjoyment of the children.

Mrs. MacAskill and I completed a course called "Language Arts in the Elementary School" held at Hampstead, New Hampshire.

We thank you, the Board of Education, Helping Teacher, School Nurse-Teacher and Music Supervisor for help and cooperation.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE-TEACHER

Mrs. Gwendolyn Curtis Banks, School Nurse-teacher, reports that health exams were completed in grades 1-4-8 by Doctor Francis Harris and Mrs. Banks, R.N. All defects found were referred to parents and taken care of through the family doctor, clinics or nurse.

Some of the activities supervised by the nurse included vision and hearing examinations, tabulation of heights and weights and examination for color perception.

Mrs. Banks gave health talks, helped with the audiovisual program in reference to health. She helped plan preschool registrations, trips to the guidance clinics, took part in conferences and made many home visits

The Vollmer Patch Test was done this year with all negative reports.

REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR —

WARREN S. FREEMAN

I have the honor to submit a special report for the music program from September, 1957 through December, 1957 for the public schools of Newton, New Hampshire. This fall it his been our aim to develop the best possible music program for Newton in both the vocal and instrumental fields. We have offered vocal instruction for all pupils and instrumental music for pupils from grade 4 through 8. We have conducted instrumental music demonstrations this fall and contacted parents in regard to the instrumental program.

The instrument music program in Newton has moved ahead this year. It is being handled by Mr. Calvin Torrey, a teacher of wide experience who has had, in addition to his New England Conservatory training, special work in music education at the Boston Conservatory of Music and a number of years experience in teaching prior to this year. Mr. Torrey handles both the advanced and elementary groups in Newton. A number of new pupils have enrolled in the band this year and the group is growing and developing.

The vocal music in Newton is being handled by Miss Ann Treadway who makes a weekly visit to each of the rooms in Newton and develops a broad program for all of the pupils. One of the needs of the band at the present time is a group of background instruments such as tubas, baritone horns and the like in order to broaden the instrumentation of the band. It is recommended that this program be undertaken at the earliest possible moment in order to improve and further develop the band program.

At this time I would like to express my deep appreciation to the school committee, superintendent of schools and to each of the principals for their unfailing cooperation in making possible an effective program of instrumental music in the schools of Newton.

COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS

The Parent Teacher Association deserves much commendation for its positive support of the school programs and for continuing the Federally Aided School Lunch Program for the children. This year the school lunches were provided for an increased number of days which was more commendable. Appreciation is also expressed to the Garden Club and other civic groups for their continued support.

I wish to thank the School Board, teachers and children for their cooperation in making our work successful.
