

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING

March 9, 1965

A meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton qualified to vote in town affairs and held in the Elementary School Building in said town, the alphabetical list of voters having been posted and subscribed on the back thereof by the Supervisors of the Checklist, was called to order at one o'clock in the afternoon on Tuesday, March 9, 1965 by the Moderator, James F. Leavitt, who declared the Polls open, the business meeting to be held at 7:30 p.m. and polls not to close before 7:30 p.m. On motion of Martin W. Whenal it was voted that the polls remain open long enough after the business meeting to give everyone an opportunity to vote.

At 7:30 p.m. Moderator Leavitt declared the meeting open and announced that the Polls would remain open long enough after the close of the business meeting to give everyone an opportunity to vote.

Moderator Leavitt asked Reverend Martin Johnson to give the invocation, and read the Town Warrant for 1965.

Article 1. Officers elected from the floor.

Overseers of the Poor.

Raymond O. Hobbs moved and it was so voted that the Selectmen continue as Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.

Fence Viewer.

Lillian Rogers moved and it was so voted that Raymond O. Hobbs serve as Fence Viewer for the ensuing year.

Sealer of Weights and Measures.

William P. Fowler moved and it was voted that D.

Morris Lamprey serve as Sealer of Weights and Measures for the ensuing year.

Public Weighers.

On motion of William P. Fowler it was voted that D. Morris Lamprey, Charles A. Lamprey and David J. Lamprey serve as Public Weighers for the ensuing year.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.

On motion of William P. Fowler it was voted that Raymond O. Hobbs, Richard T. Goss and Forrest B. Knowles, Sr. serve in this capacity for the ensuing year.

Article 2. Barbara G. Luther moved that this article be passed over until all other articles had been given consideration. Motion was carried.

Article 3. William P. Fowler moved, and it was so voted, that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Article 4. Lawrence W. Guptill moved to amend this article by inserting the words "or other suitable deed" after the words "by tax sale." Motion was carried. Dean E. Stevens moved to further amend the article by striking out the word "either" and the last three words, "or private sale." Motion was carried. Article 4 as amended reads "To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen, or a majority of them, to sell and convey the real property acquired by the Town by tax sale, or other suitable deed, to be sold at public auction. The article was accepted as amended.

Article 5. Maurice E. Kierstead moved that the Town vote to establish Capital Reserve Fund #6 for the purpose of purchasing a new cruiser for the Police Department and to appropriate for deposit in said Fund all fees received by the Police Department for preparation of accident reports, monies received as the Town's share of the revenue from the Hampton District Court and such other fees, gifts, or other unanticipated receipts as the Board of Selectmen may deem appropriate for deposit in said Fund. Motion was carried.

Article 6. Edward Fritz, Jr. moved, and it was so voted, that this article be accepted as read.

Forest B. Griffin and Edward W. Lloyd were appointed by the Moderator as tellers for the evening.

Article 7. Maurice E. Kierstead explained the reasons for this article. After lengthy discussion, Edward Fritz, Jr. moved the acceptance of this article. Moderator Leavitt stated that this vote is only an expression of opinion. Vote was by count of hands. Total vote: 161. Yes: 84 — No:77. Motion was carried, and vote showed a majority in favor of taxation at 100% of assessed valuation.

Article 8. Charles Pearson moved that the Town pay the attendant at the Town Dump Forty or Forty-five (\$40.00 or \$45.00) Dollars a week and that the attendant have exclusive rights to anything he finds salvagable. Motion was carried.

Article 9. Earl L. Spear moved, and it was so voted, that the Board of Selectmen, or a majority of them, be authorized and empowered to sell and convey certain land owned by the Town at the Greenland Town Line on Post Road to the abutting owners.

Article 2. Barbara G. Luther presented the 1965 Town Budget as recommended by the Budget Committee, One Hundred Twenty-Six Thousand Thirty Dollars and fifty-three cents (\$126,030.53) which included the One Hundred Thirty-five (\$135.00) Dollars voted in Article 6. Maurice Kierstead offered an amendment to add an additional Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars for operation of the police cruiser and Seven Hundred (\$700.00) Dollars for a third policeman, part-time. Amendment was accepted. William Fowler moved that Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars be added to the budget for the purpose of advertising with the Seacoast Regional Association. Motion was defeated. Maurice E. Kierstead moved the adoption of the 1965 Town Budget, as amended, One Hundred Twenty-Seven Thousand Thirty Dollars and fifty-three cents. (\$127,030.53) to defrav Town expenses for the ensuing year. Motion was carried.

Article 10. Curtis Marston moved that the Selectmen and Fire Chief and three others appointed by the Selectmen, serve as a committee to report at the next Town Meeting estimates for town buildings and firefighting equipment. Motion was carried.

Kenneth Vernon moved, and it was so voted, that the 1965 Town Meeting be adjourned.

The meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Selectmen met in regular or special meetings in 1965 — 80 times. They attended Budget Meetings, Tax Commission Meetings (5), N. H. Assessors (2), Municipal Association (2), and various Court Cases. There has also been one or more Selectmen in attendance at Planning Board Meetings on the Master Plan, Water Pollution, County Meetings and Seacoast Regional Development.

The Selectmen have engaged an engineer to up-date the Town Map and tentative date of publication is mid-April.

Property Inventory Blanks will be distributed on or before March 20, 1966. Veteran exemption blanks will be distributed at the same time along with the Property Inventories for those veterans who were eligible in 1965.

Mrs. Barbara Luther, Secretary to the Board of Selectmen is in the Selectmens Office to assist the Selectmen and Towns People Tuesdays and Fridays 9:00 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday morning 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon.

We, the Board of Selectmen of the Town of North Hampton, N. H. register our deep appreciation for the dedicated services to the Town of George G. Carter and Raymond O. Hobbs.

The Selectmen have appreciated the cooperation and supply of information given them by James F. Leavitt, Representative to the General Court.

The Selectmen wish to thank those who have served on various committees.

#### REPORT OF THE TOWN BUILDING COMMITTEE

It was voted at the 1965 Town Meeting that a Building Committee be formed and asked to report at the 1966 Meeting on plans for new or renovated buildings. Serving on this committee are the Selectmen — Messrs. Kierstead, Chairman; Rogers, and Whenal — and Messrs. Paul Hobbs, Curtis Marston, Bruce Dow, and Allen King. This committee has met several times alone, and once with the Planning Board, Library Trustees, and the consultant from Klunder's Planning firm.

General agreement has been reached that the Town Center should be in the vicinity of the Town Hall, and that the primary needs are a new Fire Departmentment building, a new Library, the present Library renovated for use by all Town Officers, and an expanded Police Department in the quarters now used by the Fire Department and Selectmen's offices.

The area between the Town Hall and Library is the most suitable site for a new Fire Department building. A preliminary sketch of this building has been made, and an architect consulted as to cost and type of architecture — colonial preferred. The building should be large enough to handle the needs of the Town for the next 20 years.

The site of a new Library will be decided after careful consideration of the area to the west of the present Library and that behind the present Town buildings, in a proposed civic center. New quarters in the present Library for Selectmen, Town Clerk, Treasurer, and Tax Collector would be available after the new Library was built. Under consideration is a central heating unit for the 4 present and proposed Town buildings.

The Town Hall eventually might well stand alone, with the present additions removed and replaced by a separate Police Department building. The Building Committee will cooperate in the Comprehensive Plan which is now in the process of development.

## REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The Trustees appreciate the gifts of books and magazines received during the past year. Local clubs have continued such projects as providing plants and flowers, Christmas decorations and programs throughout National Library Week.

In addition to their regular monthly work-meetings and Library Week projects the Friends of the Library raised funds for a typewriter. Members attended a district banquet in Derry and a statewide meeting in Concord where we were proud to see Mrs. Herbert Bridges installed as the first State Chairman of the newly organized "Friends of N. H. Libraries."

Our Library was one of the first to be accepted as an Affiliated Library of the Statewide Library Development Program and as such received eight volumes of valuable reference books, including an unabridged Webster's New International Dictionary. Other advantages afforded us have been the bimonthly book - selection meetings, each of which the librarian and trustees have attended; the opportunity to purchase our books through the State Library at an advantageous discount and the preparation of our catalog cards by State Library personnel.

A close examination of modern fiction was made at the fall workshop, sponsored by the New Hampshire Library Association, which was attended by the librarian and trustees.

During the past year, Mrs. Sanborn, the District Library Consultant, spent four days with the librarian and with some assistance from trustees and Friends, succeeded in "weeding" the entire adult book collection. She also gave some instruction on book-cataloging.

In the event the voters consider it advisable to use the present library building for other town purposes, the board is studying sites for a new library. Conferences have been held with the Extension Librarian, the State Librarian, the Town Building Committee and the Planning Board to learn the extent and way of applying for federal aid for library construction and to determine the future needs of the library.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the School Building on Atlantic Avenue in said North Hampton on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, 1966, at one o'clock in the afternoon; Business meeting to begin at 7:30 p.m.; Polls not to close before 7:30 p.m.; To act upon the following subjects.

ARTICLE I. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE III. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE IV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen, or a majority of them, to sell and convey the real property acquired by the Town by tax sale, to be sold at public auction.

ARTICLE V. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the construction of a fire station on a lot of land consisting of 0.93 acres situated on Atlantic Avenue and belonging to the Town of North Hampton, in accordnce with certain plans and specifications as prepared by Maurice E. Witmer Associates, Architects, at a total cost of \$80,000.00 including architect fees, interest on loan, construction and other costs.

ARTICLE VI. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (20,000.00) Dollars from the principal and accumulated interest of the Capital Reserve Fund No. 3 for the Construction of Town Buildings and to Reserve Fund No. 3 to the Treasurer of the Town in such amounts and at such times as the Board of Selectmen may direct.

ARTICLE VII. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow a sum not exceeding Sixty Thousand (\$60,000.00) Dollars in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 33 of the Revised Statutes Annotated and other pertinent provisions, to be payable in such amounts and on such terms as the Board of Selectmen may approve.

(Without recommendation of the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE VIII. On petition of Albert C. Asselin and nineteen other legal voters:

To see if the Town will vote to extend for fire protection purposes the existing water main of the Hampton Water Works Company from the existing line on Post Road near Sylvan Road in a Southeasterly direction a distance of approximately 2,650 feet and install two hydrants spaced at distances consistent with standard hydrant spaces in the balance of the Town.

ARTICLE IX. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow a sum not exceeding Fifteen Thousand (\$15,0000.00) Dollars for the purposes of the previous article and to issue notes of the Town of North Hampton in the principal amount not exceeding Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 33 of the Revised Statutes Annotated and other pertinent provisions, to be payable in such amounts and on such terms as the Board of Selectmen may aprove.

(With recommendation of the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE X. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thirty -Five (\$135.00) Dollars to install a fire hydrant on Chapel Road between the residences of Margaret and Vivian Brown and the Robert Palmers.

(With recommendation of the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XI On petition of Gertrude Lamprey and twelve other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Conservation Committee in accordance with provisions of RSA 36-A.

ARTICLE XII Upon petition of Robert Palmer and nine other legal voters:

To see if the Town will vote to set aside and reserve twenty-five (25) parking spaces in the parking area at North Beach for the exclusive use of the residents of North Hampton.

ARTICLE XIII. On petition of Maurine Preston and eighty - five other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the Town will vote to introduce flourides into the North Hampton Water System.

(This question appears on th Official Ballot of the Town in accordance with the provisions of RSA 31-17-a).

ARTICLE XIV. To transact such other business as may legally come before the meeting.

Many fine gifts of books and magazines were gratefully received by the library this past year, and we are especially fortunate in receiving unusual memorial books, many of the type the library could not afford.

Our National Library Week activities, sponsored by the North Hampton Friends of the Library, won us the top award for the best long-range program, in particular the Book Review Lecture by Mrs. Marion Rudkin, which has become an anticipated part of our program. For all our efforts, we received as the prize, the 1964 ten-volume set of the Book of Popular Science Encyclopedia, which is used constantly by the children. Thirty-nine boys and girls completed the Reading Legion of Honor summer reading club this summer. Each received a Golden Nature Guide for reading the required number of books, and the first and second grades are looking forward to grade three when they can join the older reading group.

The Statewide Library System with which we are affiliated is sponsoring extension courses in Library Techniques, and your Librarian attended the course in Cataloging, held in Manchester this fall. Other library courses will be given, and these will all be credited (when completed) toward the certification for Librarians.

The Southeast District Advisory Council (our area) met in Derry and in Manchester four times this past year, and the Planning Committee, of which I am a member, met in the spring and fall in Derry. The Advisory Council meetings are important, because each delegate represents a library vote, and so helps to guide the various decisions. Mrs. Martin Whenal is the alternate delegate. The Book Selection meetings are held at least every two months, and in libraries, when possible, which gives us an opportunity to visit our neighboring libraries, as well as to benefit by the excellent selection of new books which the State Library provides for our inspection. It might be of interest to know that this Library borrowed 1,687 books from the State Bookmobile in 1965.

#### REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

The year of 1965 showed a marked decrease in fire losses over previous years. The department was called out 49 times for emergency assistance for various causes and of these calls 6 were Mutual Aid Calls to other towns - Hampton; Hampton Beach, Hampton Falls, Stratham, and Exeter.

During Fire Prevention Week I conducted a school inspection and called an unannounced fire drill. The children vacated the building in a very orderly manner. Smokey the Bear was present and observed the drill and he gave the children and teachers great credit for the way the drill was carried out. After the drill he gave a fire prevention talk.

On May 5th we experienced a 75 acre woods and grass fire in the South and Mill road area. With Mutual Aid from 8 area towns and our own department this fire was brought under control with only a small amount of property loss and no loss of homes. I want to thank each and everyone for helping to bring this fire under control.

The control burning at our town dump has improved our fire condition in that area.

Plans are underway for the building of an adequate Fire Station and the replacing of our obsolete pumper. Our present water supply and proposed new building will help maintain our present Fire Insurance rate.

In this report to the voters of the Town it is my duty to inform you of the adequate conditions that exist and I recommend that the voters act favorably on the article in the Warrant.

No outside burning is permitted unless a permit has been issued. These may be obtained at the Fire Station upon request if weather condition's permit.

Outside incinerators must be inspected before a seasonal permit is issued. To report a fire call 964-8282 and for any other business including Police call 964-8621.

## NORTH HAMPTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

The calender year 1965 has seen the North Hampton Police Department increase its efficiency over previous years. With traffic counts higher in 1965 than 1964, the comparitive statistics show a positive correlation between accidents and court cases.

There has been a substantial increase in the number of court cases, resulting in a marked decrease in traffic accidents together with no 1965 accident fatalities. This record is accomplished by strict enforcement of the Motor Vehicle Code. Continued cooperation on the part of Town residents is also a factor in these improved statistics.

Also there has been an increase in ambulance service calls to the town, provided by your department.

The juvenile problem was reasonably low this past year and we hope for continued cooperation from both home and school. As we proceed into 1966, continued betterment of your department is seen. Keeping abreast of current law enforcement policies is met through membership and participation in state and local associations.

Maximum protection for the citizens of our town will be provided through our continual efforts and mutual aid from its citizens and other law enforcement agencies.

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REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

To The Board of Selectmen and Residents of The Town of North Hampton:

During the year 1965 the new air horn for the Fire and Civil Defense Alarm was purchased from The Gamewell Fire Alarm Company and installed. The horn it replaced was rebuilt by The Gamewell Company. This year Civil Defense Authorities have proposed the purchase of a new storage tank with a capacity of 165 pounds enabling the installation of both horns. The figure given the budget committee for this purpose is six hundred dollars (\$600).

In 1965 the Board of Selectmen and the writer were required to sign and place on file with The State Civil Defense Agency an Assurance of Compliance with the Department of Defense and Office of Civil Defense Regulations under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 which means that there will be no discrimination in our Civil Defense Program.

Proposals made for construction of a new fire station are worthy of your serious consideration. Keeping in mind that when this building is completed it can be used as a shelter in any serious disaster. Present building is inadequate and does not meet requirements for purchase of equipment on a matching fund basis with Civil Defense.

## REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board was comparatively inactive during the first part of 1965. There were very few items to come up on the agenda, several divisions of plats and one preliminary sub-division plan which did not go through to the final plan.

Your Planning Board felt that we should wait for the completion of the Master Plan before making any important recommendations to the various department heads of the town. Due to the fact that the State Department of Economic Development was under staffed the Federal Government did not advance funds until late in the year. Our first meeting with our Planning Consultant was held with a State representative present in November. These meetings will be held monthly until January 1967, when the plan will be completed. There are eighteen related items that we will study and discuss during the coming year. All of these items are vital to the future development of North Hampton.

The problem of Town Buildings was brought to our attention, as a matter that needed early consideration. A meeting was held with the Building Committee to discuss this problem. It is the hope of the Planning Board that construction of Town Building over a period of years will result in a Town Center which the people can well be proud of.

After the Master Plan is completed there will be many important items to be considered viz., revision of Zoning Ordinances and Sub-division regulations, the establishment of a Building Code and other ordinances. According to a survey made in 1964 there is a definite need to zone part of the town for industrial and commercial developments.

The future of North Hampton twenty years hence will depend on what the voters do within the next few years. This is the essence of Planning. Your Planning Board hopes that after the Master Plan is completed and recommendations made that all departments will cooperate to make the town a better place to live in. GORDON S. DOW

4. Replacement of 210 feet of eight in. on Ocean Blvd. from Bunny's Restaurant north to Sea rd. and 400 feet of eight in. Main crossing Sea Rd.


5. 650 feet of eight in. main on South Rd. from Lafayette Rd. west to the Hutchinson property.

6. 2,900' of 8" C.I. in Chapel Road, between the existing dead-ends in Chapel Road (near the Philbrick Property) and Maple Road.

7. 1625' of 8" C.I. in Locke Road, between Chapel Road and the existing dead-end in Locke Road (near the Pollard Propetry.)

A petition was presented to the Commission for extending the Water Main on Post Rd. from Sylvan Rd. southeasterly toward the Hampton townline. A public Hearing was held Dec. 9, 1965 on the Petition. The majority of those present were in favor of the extension. An article in the Town Warrant will give the voters of the Town an opportunity to vote on this extension.

# State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School District of the Town of North Hampton, in the county of Rockingham, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote on District Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the North Hampton Elementary School Auditorium on Atlantic Avenue in said District on Friday the Twelfth of March at Four O'Clock in the afternoon, and cast ballots from that hour until at least Nine O'Clock in the evening of said day for candidates for the following district offices:

- Moderator for the ensuing year. James F. Leavitt -90 votes; Forest Griffin - 1 vote; Martin Whenal -1 vote; John White - 2 votes; and Carroll Fogg -2 votes.
- 2. Clerk for the ensuing year Judith H. Batchelder 103 votes.
- 3. A member of the School Board for the ensuing three years Robert S. Barber 99 votes; Shirley B. Carter 1 vote, Barbara Luther 1 vote; and Sumner Claverie -1 vote.
- 4. A Treasurer for the ensuing year Ada M. Fogg 100 votes.

And you are also notified to meet at the same place at 7:30 O'Clock in the evening to act on the following subjects:

5. Two auditors for the ensuing year - James F. Leavitt - 99 votes; Philip T. Boothby - 103 votes.

Maurice E. Kierstead made a motion that the moderator must repeat the motions so that they can be properly recorded by the Clerk in the minutes of the meeting. Seconded - hand vote - passed. Mr. Robert S. Barber made a motion that article 5 be accepted as printed in the town report. Second- - hand vote - passed.

6. Mr. John McMahon made the following motion stating beforehand that this is a legal procedure to have the motion on the floor before discussion: "I move that the District authorize the construction, and equipping of additions to the North Hampton Elementary School, so called, and alterations to the existing plant thereby providing additional educational facilities for use by the District and such construction and alterations to be substantially in accordance with "Scheme III", socalled, prepared by Irving Hersey Associates of Durham, New Hampshire, and further, that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of "three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,00)" for such purposes, such sum to be raised through the issuance of serial notes and / or bonds upon the credit of the District, and to authorize the School Board to negotiate, and issue such notes and bonds, and to fix the rate of interest and all other terms thereof, and to take such other action as may be required to effectuate the purpose of this vote in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act R. S. A. Chapter 33 and any amendments relating thereto and that the District authrize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all

grants or offers for educational purpose which may now, or hereafter, be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and / or the United States Government or any agencies thereof.

Mr. Barber spoke for some time regarding this item - projections were shown.

Mr. Robert S. Barber seconded this motion.

Mr. William Fowler made the motion that if the \$300,00 amount fails to carry the necessary 2/3 majority; vote on other plans.

Seconded by Percy C. Rogers - no vote.

The Chairman reserves the right to present the lesser figure if the 2/3 vote fails to carry. (Mr James Leavitt)

Mr. John McMahon suggested a recess before voting - 9:20 - 9:30.

Mr. Maurice E. Kierstead made a motion that the checklist be used in voting on the above article. Seconded - hand vote - passed.

Article number 6 - as motioned by Mr. McMahon - voted on by checklist - results - 130 yes, 38 no - motion passed as read.

- 7. Mr. Robert S. Barber made the motion that the Chairman appoint an Advisory Building Committee of three member to be named by the moderator to work with the School Board in accomplishing the building project. Seconded - hand vote passed. The Moderator appointed the following: Mrs. Barbara Luther, Mr. Sumner Claverie, and Mr. Harlan Carter.
- 8. Mrs. Jane Palmer moved that the District create a cooperative school district planning committee

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which committee shall report at the next annual district meeting or sooner and further, that the District authorize the moderator to appoint three qualified voters, of whom at least one shall be a member of the School Board, to serve on the committee. Seconded - hand vote - passed. Committee to be announced later on.

- 9. Mrs. Barbara Luther presented the budget. Mr. Robert S. Barber moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$530,153.50 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Seconded - hand vote - passed.
- 10. Mr. William Fowler moved that the meeting be adjourned - seconded - hand vote - passed. Meeting adjourned - 10:10 P. M.

# REPORT OF THE SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING NOVEMBER 30, 1965 School District of North Hampton State of New Hampshire

You are hereby notified to meet at the North Hampton Elementary School on Atlantic Ave. in North Hampton, New Hampshire on Tuesday, November 30, 1965 at Seven Thirty O'Clock in the evening, Eastern Standard Time, to act upon the following subjects:

(This Meeting is held in accordance with a Decree of the Superior Court in and for the County of Rockingham dated November 8, 1965, which said Decree gives this Special School District Meeting of the Town of North Hampton the same authority as that of an Annual School District Meeting of the Town of North Hampton.

Article 2. Mr. Sumner Claverie read a statement of the Budget Committee indicating that the Budget Committee has approved Article II in order to make it possible for the voters of the School District to act on the article.

Mr. Miller showed a map of the location of the property and explained reasons for the purchase.

The Moderator, James F. Leavitt, accepted a motion which was duly seconded and it was voted unanimously to adopt Article II.

You are hereby notified to meet at the North Hampton Elementary School Auditorium on Atlantic Avenue, in said district on Friday, the eleventh of March, at four o'clock in the afternoon, and cast ballots from that hour until at least nine o'clock in the evening of said day for candidates for the following district offices:

1. Moderator for the ensuing year.

2. Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. A member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. A Treasurer for the ensuing year.

And you are also notified to meet at the same place at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act on the following subjects:

5. To see what action the District will take in relation to reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen.

6. To see if the District will vote to establish a Contingency Fund in accordance with the Revised Statutes Annotated 198:4-b, such contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year, and further to see if the District will appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for this purpose.

Note: During the past legislative session a law was passed allowing school districts to budget for a contingency fund not to exceed one per cent of the amount appropriated for school purposes, exclusive of capital expenditures and amortization of debt, during the preceding year. This Act allows money to be raised from taxes. However, the School Board proposes to continue to budget a contingency as income as well as expenditure; or, in other words, no money may be spent unless some is received from a source over and above the District assessment. The School Board feels that the contingency should be provided so that any additional monies received, within the maximum set limits, could be spent by the School Board. Since budgets are being planned 18 months in advance this article allows the School Board to accept and expend monies that were unforeseen during budget preparation such as a grant from a trust fund.

7. To see if the District will vote to accept the remainder of the grant of the Fuller Foundation, Inc., in the amount of \$14,000.00 plus earned interest in the the amount of \$700.00 and authorize an appropriation of \$14,700.00 for the puropses of restoring and equipping the school playground and for equipment and furnishings for a school library in accordance with the terms of the grant as set forth in a letter, dated, May 21, 1965, from Alvan T. Fuller, President of the Fuller Foundation, Inc., addressed to George G. Miller, Chairman of the North Hampton School Board.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

I welcome this opportunity to report to school officials and citizens of the District. In this my fifth report I wish to: (1) call attention to possible district consolidation; (2) summarize this school system's planning relative to Public Law 89-10, Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965; and (3) express some personal concerns regarding the possible misuse of achievement test data.

## **Study School District Consolidation**

Last year's report included a preliminary discussion of possible district consolidation for Hampton, Hampton Falls, and North Hampton and voters indicated their interest in studying the possibilities by authorizing the appointment of a Cooperative Planning Committee in each of the three districts. Moderators named interested citizens to each committee and the committees merged, according to the Revised Statutes Annotated, to form a Cooperative Planning Board.

The Cooperative Planning Board has organized to provide for a division of labor and an in-depth study is being conducted.

The Cooperative Planning Board has provided a report which I understand will be found elsewhere in this School District Report.

# **Federal Legislation**

Public Law 89-10, Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, is viewed by most educators as evidence of a much greater interest on the part of the federal government in the quality of public school education. To some critics, this "increased interest' portends federal controls as something evil. Actually federal aid, or federal financial participation is not new for we have benefited over a period of years from the school lunch program. Impacted-area aid is certainly a most significant revenue item and the National Defense Education Act has been of help in strengthening science, mathematics and modern foreign language instruction.

Federal money is not "free money". It is obviously raised from federal tax sources rather than from property taxes. The local district may or may not chose to participate in the kind of projects which can be funded and does therefore have the final authority.

There are five titles or sections to public law 89-10 which are of particular importance to us and I will attempt to describe in very general terms the implications for Supervisory Union No. 21.

Title I makes available federal funds to expand and improve elementary and secondary school programs for educationally deprived children. Educationally deprived children are those whose achievement is below that normally expected of children of their age and grade. The term does include children who are handicapped by physical, mental, or emotional impairment.

Five districts, namely Seabrook, Hampton, North Hampton, Rye and Winnacunnet have authorized the use of federal funds to offer special instruction to the educationally deprived within these districts. It is expected that this program will be partially implemented by March 15, 1966. Small group instruction will be provided to correct educational weakness. The group will meet after school hours, occasionally during the school day, and during the summer months. Title II provides federal funds to supplement local spending for library books and materials. The books and materials will be offered on a loan basis to all schools within the Supervisory Union and special arrangements for the distribution of these materials is being planned under a Title III grant.

Title III designed to provide supplementary educational centers and services. In this section the United States Office of Education assumes the role primarily held by foundations and other private concerns of providing the financial incentive for creative proposals which seem to possess unusual promise of improved instruction.

The eight-member Advisory Committee which selected the grant winners reviewed 746 applications choosing only 69 projects to receive operational grants. Supervisory Union No. 21 was indeed fortunate to be one of the educational agencies selected. The grant will be used to provide effective instructional aids and equipment for the entire supervisory union as well as the related services offered by such a center.

### Achievement Test Scores Have Harmful Side Effects

The use of test results in education is somewhat similiar to the use of a drug, which use can result in harmful side effects. Sensitivity reactions may be as threatening to the patient as is the malady being treated.

Much has recently been written about the uses and abuses of achievement test results. In the State of California, for example, the General Assembly has twice debated the release of test data which emphasized the comparison of school districts and twice the General Assembly has voted to prohibit such release. In my mind the false conclusions implied should be treated in the same way that government agencies treat false advertising.

Within Union No. 21 there have been reports of par-

ents unwittingly comparing test scores of one child to those of another in the same family without demonstrating understanding and affection toward both children. There have been instances where comparisons between related pupils have resulted in setting one family against another, where parents and relatives use test results for self aggrandizement and where the peace and stability of a neighborhood has been lost because of gross misunderstandings as to the purpose and meaning of test data.

Our achievement tests in the elementary grades are used as diagnostic measures to evaluate the strength and weakness of the individual pupil. There are other, less important, uses of test results and this requires critical study and analysis by persons specifically trained for such work.

In Union No. 21 the achievement test results are made known to parents and parents are encourged to discuss the testing with the child's teacher. I suggest you, as a parent, be concerned with your child's strength and weaknesses, his academic progress, and be ever aware that no test yet invented has eliminated all errors of measurement. The teacher can give you much more information than can be learned from any single diagnostic test.

Pupils of today are learning more, they are learning at a faster rate, and they are being taught skills that will serve them for a longer period of time, than were the pupils of ten years ago, or even five.

One indication is the upgrading of norms or standards used to measure achievement of pupils across the nation. A change occurred in 1955, and again nine years later in 1964 a re-norming or re-standardization program was undertaken by the makers of the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills, used in our local testing program. Studies of test results enable the teachers to teach to the strength and weaknesses of individual pupils or groups of pupils that appear to have similar needs. As pupils across the nation show improvement, norms once again must be raised, but as each cycle is completed an ever improving educational program is provided.

The construction work is progressing much in keeping with expectation and the new facilities will certainly be ready for occupancy in September.

The experience to date indicates the \$300,000 bond issue will provide the necessary funds including approximately \$4,000 in reinvestment income. The reinvestment income will be needed to meet unforeseen expenditures such as the ledge removal required to complete the extension of the schools' sewerage system and several desirable changes in specifications regarding wall and floor covering.

Again North Hampton has planned and provided for the space needs of an expanding school population.

In closing I wish to express sincere appreciation for the support of education and for the many kindnesses shown me by school officials, school personnel and citizens generally.

## **Cooperative Planning Board**

Cooperative Planning Board Recommends Consolidation of Hampton, Hampton Falls, North Hampton

The school districts of Hampton, North Hampton and Hampton Falls each voted at the March 1965 School District Meeting to create a cooperative planning committee. The North Hampton moderator appointed Mr. Robert Barber, Mrs. George T. Prigge and Captain John F. Williams. Captain Williams has resigned because of a change in military assignment and has been replaced by Mr. Richard Jones. The Hampton moderator appointed Mr. C. Dean Shindledecker, Mrs. Lucille Batchelder and Mr. Theodore Scott, Jr. Hampton Falls committee members are Mr. John Robinson, Mrs. George Merrill and Mr. Robert Weaver. The three committees have joined together to form a Cooperative Planning Board and a study is being made of all aspects of a cooperative school system, Kindergarten through eight grade.

Working with a tentative target date of September, 1968, three sub - committees were formed; namely, Curriculum, Enrollment, Transportation and Building Needs, and Finance.

The recommendations of the Curriculum Sub-Committee include a Kindergarten for all pupils and further that the instruction provided for grades one through five include specialists in music, art, physical education and remedial instruction in reading, arithmetic and work study skills. The recommendations further indicate that grade six would be, for the most part, a contained classroom situation with some departmentalization of science and mathematics. The Committee favored a close relationship between teacher and pupil in the early grades with specialized instruction being required when the content becomes too sophisticated for the generalists. The Committee recommends that in grades seven and eight departmentalized instruction be provided to include home economics, shop, physical education, and the inclusion of a second foreign language. The Board emphasized the importance of a strong language arts program in all grades.

Carefully prepared enrollment projections have been studied to determine the building and transportation requirements for September, 1968. This sbu-commmittee believes there would be sufficient facilities to house all pupils at the time of consolidation -- should the growth rate be increased beyond present expectations it is apparent that additional space would be needed. Expansion of the curriculum would necessitate addiitonal transportation costs.

From the study to date, Board members are convinced that many academic benefits will be realized when the consolidation is accomplished. Especially important would be the continuity of curriculum for all pupils within the three - town area. In addition, staff members and facilities could be shared by the districts and some duplication of effort could be eliminated.

The Board does expect a better quality of education would be provided with local districts receiving addition-

al state aid as a result of the consolidation. Districts presently receive 30% of each principal payment as state aid and a three - town cooperative would receive 45%.

The Finance Committee is developing its report and voters will be informed as the study continues.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Board of North Hampton

I submit the following report of the school health program covering the time that I have been in North Hampton.

All pupils in all grades will be weighted, measured, have vision and hearing tests. Inspections of teeth, hair, posture, and general cleanliness will also be performed on all pupils. To date all grades except fifth and sixth have been checked by me. Five visual defects were found and have been corrected. The Hampton Lions Club assisted with financial aid for two cases. Nine pupils with hearing defects have been found and seven have been treated by physicians.

Tuberculin tests were administered to all school personnel who had not been X-rayed. The patch test for tuberculosis was used in the first grades. However, the Heaf test was introduced in the fourth and seventh grades. All tuberculin testing has been completed and the results were negative.

Flu vaccine was administered to all school personnel who wished to receive it.

Dr. Sidney Baker, school physician, has completed physicals on one first grade and boys participating in sports. Physical examinations will be done on pupils in all first, fourth, and seventh grade rooms.

The Speech Clinic started in September with Mrs. Roberto Vento, Speech Therapist from the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center in charge. A total of fifty-three pupils were evaluated for defects. At this time twentyfive pupils have received therapy.

#### 104 NORTH HAMPTON SCHOOL REPORT

A Medical Selp-Help Course has been initiated in the eighth grade health class. This course is designed to prepare pupils for an emergency situation when competent medical help may not be available for some time. The course will be completed the first week in February.

In the remaining months of the school year I plan to do some health teaching in the areas of dental health, nutrition, personal hygiene, and good grooming. Routine testing will also continue. Urinalysis will be done on pupils in grades one, four, and seven. A Pre-School Registration Day will be held in May.

To date 131 home contacts have been made by me.
