



COUNTY CONVENTION.



EXTRACTS FROM THE GENERAL LAWS OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

The County Convention shall consist of the representatives of the towns of the county. They shall meet on the second Wednesday of the January session of the General Court or other day in the same week, shall choose a chairman and clerk, and may adjourn as they see cause.

The county Convention shall appoint two auditors biennially, one each from the two leading political parties, for the two years next following, whose duty it shall be to examine the accounts of the County Commissioners and County Treas-

urer, etc.

The County Commissioners shall furnish said Auditors all the aid and information required by them in the performance of their duties, and shall recommend to the County Convention the sum necessary to be raised for the county for each of the two years, ensuing, stating in detail the objects and purposes for which the money is to be appropriated and applied.


The County Convention for each county, shall, during the session of the legislature, raise or grant a county tax for its county for two years; but the tax for each year shall be voted separately for that year, and shall be collected for the year in

which it was voted.

The sheriff, the jailer, the physician, the clerk of the court, the solicitor, the treasurer, the county commissioners, and the superintendent of the county farm, of each county, shall make up their reports separately, to May first, annually, and the same shall be printed together in pamphlet form, in said month of May, and said reports shall be distributed as now provided by law.

The reports of the several officers named shall contain a summarized account of all their transactions which concern the county, for the current year-ending as aforesaid, and the report of the superintendent of the county farm shall contain, in addition, a list of the paupers actually supported at the farm, and the number of weeks each was so supported; and also a statement of the average cost per week for each pauper, with an explanation of the basis upon which said calculation was made.

It shall be the duty of the County Commissioners of each county to publish attested copies of the proceedings of the County Convention, with the printed reports of the county officers for the year in which such proceedings shall have occurred.



PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY CONVENTION.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE,

ROCKINGHAM, SS.

EXETER, N. H., May 20, 1890.

The members of the Rockingham County Legislative Convention are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Exeter, on Monday, June 16th, 1890, at 12 o'clock M., to see if said convention will reconsider so much of the resolution passed by said convention at a meeting held in Portsmouth on the 5th day of August, 1889, as empowers the committee then chosen to locate the new county building to be erected in Exeter for the county records, and take such action as may be necessary regarding the location of said building.

Pursuant to the above notice the members of the Rocking-ham County Legislative Convention met in Exeter, at the Town Hall, on Jan. 16th, 1890, at twelve o'clock, M., and were called to order by the chairman of the Convention, Mr. George E. Hodgdon of Portsmouth, who read the above call for the convention, and in the absence of the clerk, Mr. Ilsley of Exeter was chosen to act as clerk pro tem, but declined to serve, where upon Mr. Lane of Hampton was elected to act in that position.

The roll of members being called it was found that thirty-

eight were present out of a total number of forty-eight.

Mr. Marston of Exeter moved that liberty be given any person to make any statement in regard to the business of the convention, viz: the location of the new county buildings at Exeter, which permission was given by the chairman, no voto being taken.

The chairman read a statement of the proceedings of the Convention in regard to the erection of the new county buildings up to the present time.

The following resolution was then offered by Mr. Marston

of Exeter:

Resolved, That the matter of the selection of a lot for the new county building in Exeter, and the price to be paid therefor, be left to the county commissioners, and that the said commissioners be and are hereby authorized and empowered to sell the present county lot in Exeter, upon the best possible terms, either at public auction or private sale, provided in their judgment it is expedient to do so; and that so much of the vote of this convention passed at a meeting holden at Portsmouth, on the 5th day of August, 1889, as is inconsistent with the present vote be, and hereby is rescinded.

Debate on the resolution ensued.

Mr. Marston of Exeter moved that an adjournment be taken

until 1.45 o'clock, which motion was rejected.

Mr. Marston of Exeter offered an amendment to his resolution by inserting the following words: "And provided that said new lot shall not cost the county more than fifteen hundred dollars in addition to what can be obtained for the old lot," and to strike out the words "or private sale," so as to make the resolution, as amended, read as follows:

Resolved. That the matter of the selection of a lot for the new county building at Exeter and the price to be paid therefor be left to the county commissioners, and that said commissioners be and hereby are authorized and empowered to sell the present county lot in Exeter upon the best possible terms at public auction, provided that in their judgment it is expedient so to do; and also provided that said new lot shall not cost the county more than fifteen hundred dollars in addition to what can be obtained for the old lot; and that so much of the vote of this convention passed at a meeting holden at Portsmouth on the 5th day of August, 1889, as is inconsistent with the present vote be, and hereby is rescinded.

The above amendments were then adopted.

Upon the adoption of the resolution, as amended, the question was put by the chairman and declared lost, but Mr. Marston of Exeter called for a division, which resulted in eighteen voting in favor and sixteen against. Mr. Oliver G. Woodbury of Salem called for the yeas and nays, and the clerk proceeded to call the roll with the following result: twenty-two

gentlemen voted in the affirmative, viz: Greenough, Rowe, Darbe, Wheeler, Pike, Marston, Fellows, Martin, Lane, Healey, Austin, Brewer, Robie, Rowell, Lamprey, Holmes, Cronin, Russell, Rand, Hoyt, Eaton of South Hampton, Neal.

Sixteen gentlemen voted in the negative, viz: Eaton of Auburn, Turner, Hill, Cilley, Learnard, Ilsley, Packer, Pickering, Stoddard, Treadwell, Casey, Hodgdon, Conlon, Brown,

Oliver G. Woodbury of Salem, Scammon.

And the resolution as amended, was passed and was so de-

clared by the chairman.

Upon motion of Mr. Marston of Exeter the convention adjourned sine die.

CONCORD, N. H., Dec. 3, 1890.

Rockingham County Convention assembled in Sergeant-at-Arms' room at 2 P. M., and was called to order by George E. Hodgdon, chairman.

The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Learnard

of Derry:

Whereas, The Commissioners of the County of Rockingham were directed and empowered by this convention to procure plans and specifications for the construction of a court house, jail and county building, submitting the same for the approval of your committee, selected to act instead of this convention, which duty has been performed in part only, to wit: Submitting plans and specifications for the erection of a court house, which plans have been rejected by uranimous vote of the members present at the meeting of the committee, also submitting a plan and specifications for a jail and jailer's residence, which plan was adopted by vote of your committee on condition that the jail and jailer's residence should not exceed in cost the sum of twenty-seven thousand dollars, and neglecting to submit plans with specifications for county building to be erected at Exeter.

Resolved, That so much of the resolution passed by this convention at Portsmouth, August 5, 1889, which authorized the commissioners of Rockingham County to procure plans and specifications for the construction of a court house and jail in the city of Portsmouth, and a building to contain the county records in the town of Exeter, be and is hereby rescinded, and

that said committee is hereby directed to procure plans and specifications for said buildings forthwith, and when so selected they shall deliver the same to the said commissioners, who are hereby directed to immediately call for the bids for the erection of said buildings, according to said plans and specifications, and on or before the 20th of Dec., 1890, submit the same for approval of said committee, proceed to construct said buildings as soon as practicable.

On motion of Mr. Hall it was voted that the resolution be

laid upon the table.

The following resolution was introduced by Mr. Rowe of

Brentwood:

Resolved, That the committee appointed by the convention to select suitable lots for the erection of a court house and jail in the city of Portsmouth, and for a building in the town of Exeter to contain the county records, to approve the plans and specifications and contracts for the construction of said buildings, be paid by the county commissioners for their services as follows:

For each day's attendance at the meetings of said committee, three (\$3) dollars each, and mileage at ten cents each way per mile from the place of residence of each member to the place of meeting, the same to be verified by the chairman of said committee.

On motion the resolution was adopted.

On motion of Mr. Treadwell it was voted that the convention adjourn, to meet in Sergeant-at-Arms' room at 2 o'clock P. M., Dec. 4, 1890, and that the clerk be instructed to notify the county commissioners to be present at said meeting.

In accordance with the requirements of the statutes of the state of New Hampshire, the representatives of the towns of Rockingham County met in convention on Wednesday, Jan. 14, 1891.

In the absence of the clerk of the convention, William D. Eaton, the meeting was called to order by George E. Hodgdon of Portsmouth at two o'clock P. M. Charles P. Berry of Portsmouth was chosen chairman, and John E. Pickering of Newington was chosen clerk.

On motion of George E. Hodgdon of Portsmouth, it was voted that the chair appoint a committee of five to take into consideration the report of the County Commissioners.

The chair appointed the following committee to serve in that

capacity:

Dana C. Healy of Raymond, Howell C. Russell of Portsmouth, John H. Brown of Exeter, Harrison Rowe of Kensington, Ira N. Blake of Northwood.

On motion of Howell C. Russell of Portsmouth it was voted that a committee of five be appointed to act in conjunction with aforementioned committee to visit County Farm. The following were appointed to constitute the committee, the chairman of the convention being invited to join:

John D. Lyman of Exeter, John E. Locke of Portsmouth, Moses B. Dow of Plaistow, Henry Moore of Candia, Melvin Hall of Auburn

On motion of Mr. Russell of Portsmouth, the following named gentlemen were appointed Auditors: Timothy F. Cronin of Portsmouth, and Charles Philbrick of Hampton.

On motion of Mr. O'Keefe of Portsmouth, it was voted to adjourn to the call of the chairman

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS' ROOM, STATE HOUSE, CONCORD, N. H., Feb. 18, 1891.

Convention met at 2 o'clock, P. M., and was called to order by the chairman, Mr. Charles P. Berry.

The clerk being absent, Mr. Dana C. Healey of Raymond

was chosen lerk, pro tem.

House Bill No. 317, having been referred to this convention, was brought up, and read by the clerk. Said bill authorized the County Commissioners to issue bonds for (\$80,000) eighty thousand dollars, to defray expenses of erecting new county buildings, and said delegation voted to recommend the passage of the bill.

The County Commissioners stated that owing to the large sums already expended for sites for the new buildings, the appropriation of 1889 was inadequate for the construction of said buildings, and the convention voted to increase the appropriation to (\$90,000) ninety thousand dollars.

On motion of Mr. Dow of Plaistow, it was voted that the plans for the county buildings be left entirely in the hands of the County Commissioners to be accepted or rejected at their

pleasure.

The committee appointed to take into consideration the recommendations of the County Commissioners, offered the following resolution:

Resolved: That the County Commissioners raise by toxation the sum of (\$66,000) sixty-six thousand dollars for the year 1892-93, and (\$65,000) sixty-five thousand dollars for the expenses of 1893-94, and the sums so raised to be appropriated as follows:

The affairs at the County Farm and House of Correction have been under the management of Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Tucker, (whose services are engaged for the coming year), to the satisfaction of the commissioners. We are confident both superintendent and matron have endeavored to accomplish the end for which the institution was established—to furnish everything comfortable for the inmates, kindly caring for the sick and to perform all the duty to which the unfortunate poor are entitled, but in no way to encourage indolence and pauperism and fill the institution with those too mean to care for themselves.

The question of giving relief to those having no town settlement is a very important one, and good judgment should be used to ascertain whether those asking charity are deserving, for there is a class of people who solicit public charity and at the same time make no effort to help themselves.

There is an opinion manifest among the citizens and overseers of the poor, that those asking assistance can be supported in their own towns for the same price per week as at the almshouse, that it would be just as well for the county to do so, but our experience is that whenever such poor people become sick, their friends, as a general rule, soon realize it is not their duty to wear themselves out caring for them without ample compensation, sometimes amounting to ten or twelve dollars per week, whereas, were they at the farm the cost of their support would be no more than for any inmate, and at the same time they would receive better nursing, doctoring and accommodations every way, than before coming there to live.

The school, under the care of Miss Grace Tucker, has shown a marked improvement; the number of scholars has been less than usual, as we have been able to obtain good places for several of the children.

Drs. Mitchell and Spaulding have attended the sick and insane; the health of the inmates has been better, and the death rate not as large as for the preceding year.

Chaplain Jones has been unwearied in his exertions to present the truth in its simplest form and impressive manner. We hope much good may result.

There has been an ice house built, and a large refrigerator constructed in the basement of the almshouse, also the coal sheds at the farm have been repaired, from funds appropriated for general repairs; the remainder of the appropriation will be expended in painting the buildings the coming season.

We fail to see any advantage in the recent alteration of the coroner law of the State, whereby these officers can now hold inquests at their own option, whereas formerly it was left with the town or county authorities to order such when advisable. The new law tends to create costs, rather than deter crime or promote the public safety, so far as we have observed, and we

recommend a recurrence to the old plan.

The new court house and jail are in process, of erection at Portsmouth; plans and specifications have been accepted for the county record building at Exeter, and bids advertised for building the same.

Acknowledgem at are due all who have contributed books, papers, etc., for the inmates of the county farm.

We would once more extend the invitation to citizens of the county to visit, inspect and advise whenever and wherever they see cause.

Physicians' Report.

To the Commissioners of Rockingham County.

GENTLEMEN: In compliance with custom and duty, we would submit the twenty-first annual report of the medical department of the institution of charity and correction and insane asylum at Brentwood.

The general health of the inmates has been good. There has, however, been the usual amount of sickness peculiar to

the aged, infirm and crippled.

The visitation of the epidemic Influenza has for the most part been mild, due in a measure, without doubt, to the good sanitary condition and regular fumigation practiced there.

There have been no cases of illness of a nature to indicate a

violation of hygenic rules.

The changes for the better during the last few years have been such that about the last and only remaining objectionable feature is the old or lower asylum, which we are happy to say is to be replaced directly by a new building, better suited to present needs and ideas, we trust.

What success has followed our ministrations, has, as in previous years, been due in great part to the able and faithful manner in which our worthy superintendent Mr. Tucker and his estimable wife have assisted our efforts. We can but feel that they and all those in other positions of trust connected with the institution have not spared themselves, but first of all striven to prolong the days and relieve the distress of the unfortunate classes committed to their care.

To them all we are profoundly grateful.

There have been eleven deaths, the smallest number recorded in any previous year.

Josiah Mercier, admitted from Kingston May 1st, 1890, died July 10th, 1890, of consumption, aged 84 years.

Frank E. Quimby, admitted from Plaistow, Sept. 26, 1889; had fits, fell into the little pond and was drowned July 11, 1890, aged 23 years.

George P. Burleigh, admitted July 18, 1890, from North Hampton, died of typhoid fever, July 26th, aged 41 years.

Silas C. Everett, died Sept. 10, 1890, of dry gangrene, aged 75 years, admitted from Derry.

Mary Fife, of feeble mind, admitted from Deerfield, died Oct. 6th, 1890, of typhoid dysentery, aged 49 years.

Walter Whittier, born on the farm Aug. 1st, 1890, died Oct. 7th of marasmus, aged 2 mos. and 7 days.

Jerry Worthen, died of general debility Oct. 11, 1890, aged 54 years, admitted from Fremont on March 31st, 1890.

Mary Hunt, admitted from Portsmouth Oct. 14th, 1890, died Oct. 20, 1890, of general exhaustion, aged 55 years.

John Lamprey, insane, died Feb. 15, 1891, of gangrene, aged 71 years, admitted from Portsmouth Aug. 29th, 1890.

Albie Pierce, insane, admitted from Raymond June 10, 1890, died of general debility Feb. 17, 1891, aged 74 years.

Lizzie Janvrin, of feeble mind, admitted from Portsmouth May 3d, 1887, died March 13th, 1891, of scrofula, aged 43 years.

Mary J. Hall, died April 18th, 1891, of general debility, aged about 65, admitted from Nottingham, Oct. 14th, 1869.

Of this number, three were ill with their last sickness and passed but a short time in the institution.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners for Rockingham County.

GENTLEMEN:—I herewith present my fifth annual report. The year just closed has not been marked by anything unusual, either in the nature of the Chaplain's work, or its results.

The preaching services have been regularly observed, and all things considered, have been well attended, clearly showing there is no lack of interest on the part of the inmates in this provision for their good. We still continue our work of cheer and comfort among the sick and unfortunate, and are often cheered ourselves in return by their expressions of gratitude and appreciation. Nor are those who die, and receive burial in the Farm cemetery, overlooked, but a funeral service is held in the case of each one of this class.

The Sunday school has held its sessions regularly during the year, at 4 o'clock p. m. of each Sabbath, and all have been priviledged with attending its exercises.

The music, both vocal and instrumental, is still under the direction of Miss Grace Tucker (Superintendent's daughter), who cheerfully and kindly gives her services, to aid in this part of divine worship. Friends and visitors are with us quite often during chapel exercises.

We have endeavored also during the year to procure good reading matter for distribution among the inmates. In this we have been quite successful, furnishing what we could from our own stock, and adding thereto the contributions of generous friends. Everything of this kind is eagerly appropriated, and apparently highly appreciated.

On the whole, we think some good is being done. It cannot be that all the efforts put forth for the moral and spiritual elevation of these people are utterly lost. It is not in human nature, however perverse, to resist all good influences and divinely appointed instrumentalities. For God himself has declared that His word shall not return to Him void, but that it shall prosper, and prevail.

In closing, I would again mention with pleasure and gratitude the continued courtesy and kindness of Mr. and Mrs. Tucker. Thanks are due also to others connected with the institution for favors received.

The committals for drunkenness have been very much less the past year, as that class have mostly been sent to Brentwood; but for murder and high crimes this jail has been constantly stocked.

We have fortunately been successful in speedy arrests thereby rendering the costs much lighter.

On account of sickness we have been unable to have religious services since December last; and are under great obligations to the Young Men's Christian Association, John Sise, Ezra A. Winchester, Mark Wentworth, Col. William H. Sise, Misses Tuckerman, George W. Lord, and many others for their kindness in contributing reading matter for the prisoners.

For the sanitary condition of the jail I refer to the physician's report; also report of jailer at Exeter.

Portsmouth, April 30, 1891.

The amount of sickness at the jail during the past year has been considerable, yet the diseases have been of a mild, non-contageous nature and no deaths have occurred.

While the bad sanitary condition of the jail becomes each year more apparent, the cells and other portions of the building were invariably found in good condition.

The prisoners give evidence of having received proper care and attention and the general management reflects credit upon the officials in charge.
