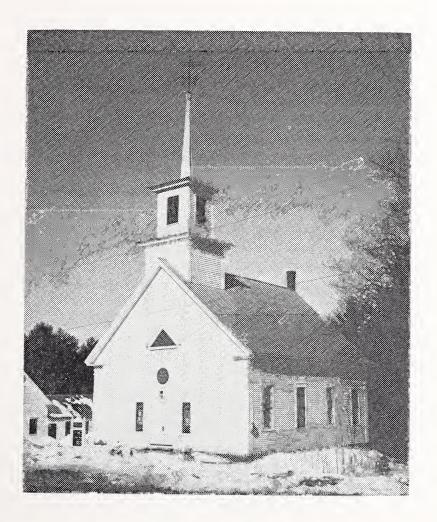
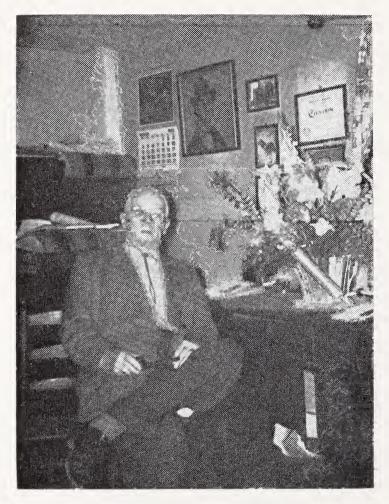

You are hereby notified to meet in the Kenneth A. Brett School in Tamworth on Tuesday, March twelfth next. The meeting will be in two parts:

I. In order that the following article may be legally voted on by Australian ballot, you are hereby notified that the polls will be open for this purpose at 2 P. M. of the clock on said Tuesday, March 12.

Article 21. To see if the Town of Tamworth will vote to participate in the Urban Planning Assistance Program and appropriate \$4000.00 as the Town's share of the total cost.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to improve the road and widen such parts as necessary near the Voris Farm to Myrtle Walker's Homestead.

To see what action the Town will take to improve the so called Ned Johnson Hill, and raise such money as necessary.

To see if the Town will take any action to repair Huckins Hill Road near Huckins Barn and raise and appropriate such sums of money as necessary.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to finish the fence at the Riverside Cemetery.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to enforce the restraining Law on Dogs. For all Dogs to be kept at home and not out at Large at any time unless on leash. On complaint owners will be notified by Dog Officer (once only). If not kept restrained after Dog Officers Notice legal action should be taken at once by said Dog Officer.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to grant permission to the Selectmen to obtain a representative from the State Tax Commission or some one qualified to reappraise the Ski & Beach Club holdings in accordance with other properties of the town, and the same for tax payers who have bought land in that area also, and to pay for such work out of general funds.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be used for the purpose of checking water pollution according to Bill No. 111 passed in the last legislature, and for the Selectmen to appoint a man for this job.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

After several successive years of drought, the rains of 1967 came as a welcome change. Our record of the past fire season is good. Our thanks to all who contributed to achieve this good record. Continued improvement in the matter of accurate, prompt detection and rapid effective suppression action can help to maintain this good, worthwhile record even though we do not have an abundance of rain as in the fire season of 1967.

It will help if we follow these simple suggestions:

- 1. No burning of debris and waste between the hours of 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. and then only with a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.
- 2. Take debris and waste to the town dump.
- 3. Maintain a clean, safe dump.
- 4. Keep matches away from young children.
- 5. Be sure matches and smoking material are dead out when we discard them.
- 6. Set a good example for others in fire prevention.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board meets, and has met, on the last Thursday of every month. These meetings take place in the Selectmens' Office, and the meetings are open to anyone who wishes to attend.

As almost everyone knows, the results of our attempts to secure a beach for Tamworth residents at White Lake came to nothing. Correspondence which we had with the Governor and Mr. Robertson (of the Governor's Council) led us to believe that our plan to set aside a certain portion of the west side of White Lake was highly satisfactory to the State. Many meetings were held with State representatives, the depth of the lake was measured at various good spots, a roadway was measured and contracted for, a parking space was laid out, and everything seemed to be arranged. At the last minute, however, the State reneged, and offered us what we thought was free use of the public beach instead. After a great deal of bargaining, the upshot was that the Town of Tamworth was to pay \$500.00 for the use of the beach, but that this would not include any summer residents. The Planning Committee recommended to the Selectmen to refuse this highly one-sided set-up, which they did.

The Planning Board met subsequently with a representative of the owners of the East side of Chocorua Lake, with the idea of acquiring a strip of land there for the Town. After going over the ground very carefully, and choosing what appeared a very good spot, the other owners apparently did not approve of the idea. The \$2500.00 appropriated for the purpose of getting a beach went back into General Funds.

For two months this winter, various members of the Planning Board have attended the regional planning meetings held at the Brett School. These meet-

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ings were most instructive, and we were able to learn the problems besetting the State and its Towns as a result of the tremendous growth in population. Even those of us to whom a Town Plan had seemed superfluous, realized how serious and urgent the situation has become. Last month Mr. David Scott of the Laconia Planning Committee, met with us and brought maps and other material showing what had been done in Laconia—and though it was quite obvious that Tamworth does not need so detailed a plan as theirs, it was easy to see that the time has come for us to implement here what our Mapping Committee has already accomplished.

TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The seven members of the Tamworth Conservation Commission have continued to meet regularly once a month during the year. The selectmen were invited to attend the September 29th meeting so that we might bring them up to date and acquaint them with our plans for the future. All three were present. We are grateful for their suggestions and for their interest.

On May 24th four sugar maples, about twenty feet in height, were planted in South Tamworth and Tamworth villages. Earle Remick donated the trees. Commission members John Damon and Elton Perkins were assisted by Jim O'Shaughnessy and also Paul Williams who gave services over and above his duties as the operator of the equipment used. Sixty-three dollars and thirty cents was spent of the one hundred dollars appropriated at last year's town meeting for the planting of trees.

At present a "truss" type foot bridge is being designed by an engineer. This bridge will cross Swift River and lead into the approximate one hundred and ten acres which the State is leasing to the Tamworth Conservation Commission. This tract which will be managed by the Commission, will remain a natural area uncut and unspoiled and the Commission plans to lay out a natural trail through part of it. Last spring at our request several additional acres were graciously added by the State when we discovered nearby interesting "terraces" formed by the River thousands of years ago. As they seemed unique we asked to have The State has now marked off our them included. The cost of the bridge is being met by a boundaries. most generous gift from The Wonalancet Associates. We would like to thank Mr. Theodore Natti, who is the Director, Division of Resources, and the Chief Forester of New Hampshire, for his cooperative spirit and for his sensible advice.

On December 9th two members of the Commission attended an all day meeting in Concord of conservation commissions from throughout the State. The value of such a conference lies in the information exchanged between the commissions and it was felt by both to have been a worth-while day.

The same two members have also done a bit of "leg-work" having tramped into two quite inaccessible locales which the Commission feels should perhaps be acquired to be left as is for nesting places and natural habitats for birds and other wild life.

We have started to draw up a general conservation plan for the Town and are receiving much appreciated help with this from the Cooperative Extension Service.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

September 6, 1967 found 152 pupils at the doors of Kenneth A. Brett School. There were 87 boys and 70 girls and since then four boys have enrolled and now the school has 157 students. Inside the school, the staff had some new members. Mrs. Pauline Merrill was in grade I. Mrs. Judith Goss in grade IV and Mrs. Barbara Benoit teaching English in grades VI, VII and VIII. The other assignments were: Mrs. Dorothy Remick, grade II; Mrs. Joyce Perkins, grade III; Mrs. Helen Davidson, grade IV; Mr. Roy Boon, Social Studies and Science in grades VI, VII and VIII; and Mr. Roger Person, Principal, Mathematics and Science in grades VI, VII and VIII. The part-time staff consisted of Mrs. Eleanor Taylor, French grades IV through VIII, and Mrs. Jean Fickett, Music Supervisor in grades I through VIII.

This year we have been fortunate to have the services of a Speech Therapist, Mrs. Joanne Knox, who has worked with about $\frac{1}{8}$ of our students already. The gains from the program have been seen already as some students have corrected their defects and new students have taken their places. Elementary guidance has been conducted this year under the direction of Mr. Ping C. Wu.

Reading still occupies much of our creative talent time and we are now embarking on a program of individualized reading, on a trial basis. This program is designed to stimulate interest in reading and to allow pupils to get a broader outlook on their world. The use of the library and, in turn, the needs of the library in terms of more books will be a result of the program. of course the real result, we hope, will be better readers at Tamworth. Our able non-professional staff is doing its jobs in the same efficient manner—Mrs. Ames and Mrs. Streeter as cooks and Mr. Davis as custodian.

This school year has been a smooth one so far and it no doubt is a result of the fine cooperation between the professional personnel, the School Board, the Supervisory Union staff and the many energetic people of Tamworth.

WHY SPEECH THERAPY?

A child sits silently in his first grade classroom day after day unable to communicate with the other children or the teacher because his speech has not developed as rapidly as the other children's speech. A girl in Kennett High School dreads being called on in class because her hesitant, stuttering speech makes talking so difficult for her. Across the hall another student is straining to catch all that the teacher is saying. This student is handicapped by a hearing loss.

These are just some of the cases in our school union which have been helped through speech therapy. A total of 125 students have been enrolled in this new remedial speech program. The following breakdown shows the number of students enrolled in speech therapy from each school:

Conway — 22	Tamworth — 20
Pine Tree — 10	Madison — 7
John Fuller — 24	Jackson — 3
Kennett — 12	Chatham — 2
Bartlett — 15	Freedom — 10

Defective speech can be defined as speech which calls attention to itself. When a child uses speech that is not normal or that calls attention to itself, a program of speech therapy is necessary. Our goal is to help the child with defective speech attain normal, acceptable speech.

To facilitate this end we are fortunate enough to have some very up-to-date equipment, including one item of special importance — a video tape recorder This machine is like a miniature T. V. camera in that a child's image can be recorded on tape along with his voice. We then play the tape back so the child can see and hear himself on the T. V. screen. This has proven invaluable in correcting some children's speech.

Speech difficulties are not something that occur only in other communities to other people's children. We have realized that fact here in School Union No. 9 and have set up an adequate program of speech therapy to help those children who need help in speech.

I feel that students should be exposed to the world of work, and should be helped to understand their own abilities and interests so that they can make realistic choices. Educational Guidance is closely related to Vocational Guidance and all other types of guidance, individual or group.

In addition to my personal contacts with students and consultations with teachers and parents, I give such tests as the Stanford Achievement Test, the Lorge-Thorndike I.Q. Test, and the State-Wide test for the eighth grades. These I evaluate and correlate in statistical form.

I am also trying to launch research on the effectiveness of the guidance program as regards its value to school children in their learning and developmental attitudes toward school.
