## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of The Town of Tilton in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk and Town Treasurer for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, two Auditors for the year ensuing, and one member of the Park Commission for the term of two years.

2. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day expense.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Cemeteries.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the use of Hospitals for the ensuing year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$86.27 to obtain Town Road Aid from the State, the State to contribute the sum of \$575.16.

6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of Municipal Accounting and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 323.00 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for use of the Information Booth for the 1953 season.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for Civilian Defense purposes.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to the Winnisquam Fire Department for the purpose of maintenance and operation of the Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 to provide a suitable Memorial for the Veterans of World War Two. (A similar article to appear in the Northfield Warrant.)

12. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a public road, approximately 6/10 of a mile of road, from the Johns-Manville road north-easterly along present roadway.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a public road, said lane, now owned by Burt W. Smith, extending from the D. W. Highway adjacent to the old ice pond known as Lockwoods Pond, approximately 550 feet in a northerly direction. Same is necessary to provide fire protection for houses within the precinct. 14. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early paid taxes.

15. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen as agents of the Town to administer or dispose of any property acquired by Tax Deed.

16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for all purposes for the year ensuing.

17. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents.

18. To choose any other officers or agents for the ensuing year.

19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

THE POLLS SHALL BE CLOSED NOT EARLIER THAN 6 O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING. THE BUSI-NESS MEETING WILL BE HELD AT 8 O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING.

There were 165 new and 382 repeat cases that were admitted to the nursing service and 56 new and 164 repeat cases under Health Service.

April and December were the busiest months and August and November were the quietest in the Nursing Service.

Mrs. Jean Sawin, R.N. substituted for two weeks in August and Mrs. Carrie Dorman, R.N. of Franklin the other two weeks while the District Nurse was on her vacation.

Toxoid Clinics and Preschool conferences were held in April, May, June, and December. Dr. Kathleen Robinson was the attending physician with Mrs. Joanna Carter, R.N., the State Preschool Nurse assisting. These clinics are in cooperation with the State Board of Health. A total of 73 received a complete treatment for immunization from Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, and Tetanus and 79 others who did not complete the series of three injections. Fifty-one were vaccinated. Fifteen were examined.

Twenty-five trips were made transporting patients to clinics, hospitals, and specialists.

During the first week in June the District Nursing Ass'n sponsored the state mobile X-ray unit for the two towns. A total of 1,200 persons were listed as having chest X-rays during the two day period the unit was in town. This number did not include any school child or any one under 16 years of age. We appreciated the cooperation of the canvassers and clerical workers who helped to make this a success.

The District Nurse devoted considerable time in organizing workers for the Bloodmobile when it came to Tilton.

Mrs. Lurline McCook, R.N., the School Nurse and the District Nurse wrapped and distributed gifts to sixty children of the two towns at Christmas. These gifts were given by the Rotary, Business, and Professional Clubs, Hi-Y, and the Liberty Chapter of the D.A.R. The Rotary Club also gave a sum of money to buy extra gifts.

The American Legion, Odd Fellows, Elks, Hi-Y, and Salvation Army generously gave Christmas dinners this year.

The District Nurse has office hours from 3-4 p.m. Monday through Friday excepting Wednesday or by appointment and is in the office from 8:30-9 a.m. when calls may be taken. Office telephone 241; home telephone 228.

The cooperation, generosity, and good will of the District Nursing Association, the Doctors, and the residents of Tilton and Northfield have been sincerely appreciated.

10. To see what action the District will vote to take in regard to the purchase of a Fire Truck to replace the Seagrave Truck and raise money for same. 11. To see what action the District will vote to take in regard to extending line, installing pipe and hydrant to within 500 ft. of residence of Burt Smith, and raise money for same.

12. To see what action the District will vote to take regarding payment of administration, Firemen, new equipment and other incidental expenses in the sum of \$7,987.48.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

H. HOWARD ALIEFF, ROY A. JORDAN, GEORGE E. PLUMMER, Firewards To the Inhabitants of Tilton and Northfield:

In closing the records of the Tilton-Northfield Fire District, we take pleasure in presenting to the citizens of the Precinct a summary of what has been accomplished during the past year.

All expenditures are clearly defined in the following report, whereby the voters can follow through all items with complete understanding.

Several new pieces of equipment have been purchased, which will be of great benefit to the Department, one piece of equipment being a Scott-Pack smoke mask, the latest and best type available.

This mask has a self contained oxygen tank which will enable the firefighter to enter and remain for a longer period with greater safety.

Another radio unit has been added, which gives the Department nearly complete coverage.

Two new alarm boxes have replaced two of the older boxes and new wire has been purchased to renew a certain amount of the lines. With the installation of the Red Telephones at three important points, the Department will be in a position to receive and respond to the calls with much less delay, than was before possible with the old method.

These telephones are located at Isabelle's Garage, at the residence of Forrest Boynton and at residence of Roy A. Jordan, Chief of the Department, the number being, Tilton 441.

One phone is located at the Fire House and is used for incoming calls only, the fact that no outgoing calls are made over this line, it is always open to receive the calls coming in. Under article 10 in the warrant will be noticed, the article requesting action in regard to the purchase of a unit to replace the Seagrave Pumper and an explanation of this request is considered necessary so that the voters may have a better understanding, as to why the change is proposed.

The Seagrave unit has been in use for nearly twentyfive years, has seen plenty of hard service, and is to be expected, has reached point where it can be considered a liability, due to the fact that it is equipped with two wheel brakes, and lacks the necessary stopping power.

Two new street lights have been installed, during the past year, a Vapor light in front of the Church of the Assumption on Chestnut St., also one light on Clark Road, improving the lighting in these dark spots.

Another light has been relocated on West High St., having been moved from top of hill to near the brook, and has corrected a very bad condition in this spot.

We are pleased to report on the small number of fires during the past year, these being mostly chimney fires, with one exception, that of the residence of Frank Cross, Jr. in Northfield. Damage being estimated at \$3,000.00.

In conclusion we take this opportunity to thank the citizens, Town Officers and Firemen for their cooperation during the past year.

### SCHOOL WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Tilton-Northfield qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tilton-Northfield High School in said district on the eleventh day of March 1953, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3a. To choose a member of the school Board for three years to fill the vacancy arising from the expiration of the term of office of Archie Grevior, M.D.

3b. To choose a member of the School Board for three years to fill the vacancy arising from the expiration of the term of office of William F. Desmond.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District will vote to build and equip a new elementary school on the land now available adjacent to the Union School property.

10. To see what sum the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction, equipment and furnishing of such new elementary school, including architect's fees; and whether the district will vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes or bonds uopn the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, N. H. Revised Laws, Chapter 72, and any amendments thereto.

11. To see if the district will vote to allow the placing on the High School grounds a Memorial to Veterans of World War II should that location be chosen.

12. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting. Given under our hands at said Tilton-Northfield this tenth day of February 1953.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

#### To the Members of the School Board:

The school year 1951-52 has been marked by the following advances in improving education for the children of Tilton-Northfield with the School Board unanimously approving every decision:

#### Salary Schedule for Teachers:

Effective for September 1, 1952 the minimum salary became \$2500 for the first year, \$2700 for the second year, \$2900 for the third year and then \$100 annual increments to a maximum of \$3500. This salary schedule is among the best of New Hampshire towns.

#### Sick Leave

Beginning teachers were allowed five days non-cumulative sick leave with pay for the first two years. Teachers in their third, fourth and fifth years receive ten days each year cumulative to a total of thirty days. It is believed that this is one of the most liberal sick leave policies in New Hampshire.

#### **Auto Driving Car**

An auto driving car was obtained and four teachers assigned to auto driving instruction for High School youngsters. This was the first regular auto driving car provided for Tilton-Northfield pupils.

#### **Program of Summer Repairs**

During the summer months the following repairs were made at the Union School:

- (a) the modern painting of eight classrooms
- (b) the varnishing of woodwork of six classrooms

- (c) sealing floors of five classrooms and first corridor floor
- (d) painting floor of the Girl Scout room
- (e) painting and sealing of the Principal's office
- (f) installation and repair of drinking fountains.

At the High School the following repairs and improvements were made:

- (a) the high school gymnasium was given a floor refinishing and a new special floor finish to preserve the floor. This was the first time that this operation was done and is reflected in the improved appearance of the building.
- (b) a new modern bubbler replaced one that was inactive for several years in the gymnasium
- (c) Extensive repairs were made to the roof of the Union School and the High School
- (d) New desks were purchased for sixth grade classes assigned to the High School
- (e) Ten laboratory chairs were purchased for the High School laboratory.

#### **Program Development for Elementary School**

A complete testing program for all pupils for grades 1-6 inclusive was made by Mr. Paul McIntire, Director of Testing, University of New Hampshire, with the assistance of graduate students and Union School teachers.

Miss Madeline Bartell, Elementary Supervisor, State Department of Education, studied the results, visited the Union School, conferred with the School Board, and made recommendations concerning the elementary school system.

The chief recommendations were:

1. All placement of pupils on the basis of chronological age and general achievement

- 2. Promotions based on chronological age, achievement tests, physical and social factors
- 3. Children would not take over eight years to pass from the first grade to the seventh

This system would result in overage children being advanced to the Junior High School and would prevent a large accumulation of overage children in grades with much younger children.

The system of reading groups was retained to allow children to progress on their own reading scale.

### New Report Cards

The Union School and the High School developed new report cards under the direction of the Principal and teachers of each school. The cards were referred to parent groups for suggestions with the final card automatically approved by the School Board.

### High School Day at University of New Hampshire

A bus was provided to transport thirty-two High School pupils and faculty advisors to the first University of/New Hampshire High School Day on October 31, 1952. The pupils attended a special program to learn of the courses provided for University students.

#### **Progress Toward New School Facilities**

There has been steady progress toward improvement of the facilities for elementary pupils.

The first Building Committee recommended the construction of an eight room school. The second Building Committee recommended the construction of single units.

Commissioner Hilton C. Buley and State Education Department officials made an extended study of the school facilities and recommended the construction of a ten room building. The report showed that six classrooms are necessary for September, 1953.

It is hoped that the citizens will back the efforts of the School Board to secure much needed classroom space for the elementary schools.

#### **Textbooks and School Supplies**

The School District expended \$2,893.40 for books, \$5,156.79 for supplies and \$672.04 for other educational expenses for the school year 1951-52 to improve the textbook and reference book opportunities for children.

The School District is spending for the 1952-53 year \$3,060.00 for books, \$4,710.00 for supplies and \$1,200.00 for other educational improvements that are all directly linked with instruction.

The Tilton-Northfield School Board has held regular monthly meetings plus many special meetings during each month of the entire year to study school policies, problems and opportunities for improving the schools. The School Board and the Building Committee have worked on the problems of school construction. The School Board meetings have been efficiently operated with every member enjoying the opportunity for discussion and comments.

It is my hope that the citizens of Tilton-Northfield

will unite in establishment of facilities to take care of the enrollments of elementary pupils for September, 1953. It is very evident that six rooms are needed for September, 1953, one additional for September 1954 and one additional for September 1955. This construction would take care of elementary enrollments for several years barring a large influx of population to serve new industry of the area.

The High School facilities are ample for many years as far as classroom space is involved. It is evident that the two classrooms which would be vacated by elementary pupils, will absorb the normal pupil enrollment from the Union School. This situation could be reversed by an influx of pupils for new industry.

# Bonded Indebtedness of Tilton-Northfield School District

The assessed valuation of 1951 for Tilton-Northfield was \$4,492,326.00.

The State Law allows a School District to construct for 5% of the assessed valuation minus any outstanding indebtedness. The assessed valuation is \$224,616.30 minus the present indebtedness of \$40,900 would allow a School District to bond the community to the extent of \$183,716.30. The School District could bond the District up to 8% with the special permission from a committee established by the Governor. This would allow school construction to the extent of \$318,486.08.

May I express my appreciation to the School Board, principals, teachers, office personnel, janitors, cafeteria directors and bus operators for their excellent cooperation during the past year.

May we look forward to continued progress in education.

# REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES For the Year Ending June 30, 1952

If we are to get the greatest benefit from our school tax dollar, it is necessary that every child must be in the best possible health so that he may absorb the education that he is exposed to. With this aim in mind I submit the following report.

As usual in the past school year all school children have had vision and hearing tests made by the most recently approved methods. Reports of all deviations from normal were sent to the parents and in cases of real need, help was provided for getting the necessary care.

The children in both schools whose parents were willing for them to have tuberculosis patch tests, were given them by the County Tuberculosis Nurse at a clinic held in the schools. Four hundred and sixty-six were tested and eleven were followed up with X-rays. A little later in the year the mobile X-ray unit which is provided by the state came to our high school and 126 children whose parents approved were given the benefit of free X-rays. Fortunately all of these proved to be negative.

Transportation was furnished for 49 visits of school children to the Orthopedic Clinic at Laconia Hospital. A few of these required surgery or appliances but most of them were prescribed exercises. In conjunction with this a state physical therapist came to town monthly and gave a total of 67 treatments at our local high school. A total of 314 children called on the nurse for first aid and to consult regarding minor illnesses; and 121 home visits were made by the nurse.

Again this year a complete dental inspection was made of the children of Union School by Dr. Nordholm and Dr. Quain. The parents were informed of the needs and invited to specify their desires regarding dental care. At the school dental clinic which followed, 84 children had all needed work done. The Tilton and Northfield Woman's Club who have worked so hard and long on this project again carried on much of the work of this clinic and they also paid 70.6% of the cost. Their devotion to this cause cannot be overrated nor can the kindly and patient services which the two dentists have rendered at such moderate rates.

Laconia Hospital had "Career Day" for those Junior and Senior girls who thought they might be interested in a nurse's education. Twelve from our high school indicated an interest and were transported to the hospital. There they listened to talks about nursing, saw a moving picture depicting various phases of the life of a student nurse and then had an opportunity to tour the hospital and the nurse's home where tea was served. Two of those who attended are now in training and two more are planning to enter training next year.

A Preview of School was held in May for those children who were expected to enter school for the first time in September. Parents brought 56 of the 72 who were invited. It was found that eight needed care of their vision, three of their hearing and 21 needed to be vaccinated. Immunization for diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus was recommended for eight who had not been protected.
