THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at 10 a.m. in the forenoon for the balloting of town officers, and at 7:30 p.m. of the same day to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, and all other town officers.
- Article 2. To see what action the town wishes to take upon the figures submitted and recommended by the budget committee.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following town expenditures for the ensuing year:
 - a. Town officers salaries.
 - b. Town officers expenses.
 - c. Election and registration.
 - d. Town Hall and other buildings.
 - e. Parks.
 - f. Legal fees and vital statistics.
 - g. Motor vehicle permit fees.
 - h. Insurance.
 - i. Employees retirement & social security.
 - j. Interest on temporary loans.
 - k. Memorial Day.
 - l. Town Dump.
 - m. Street lighting.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for snow removal, salting and sanding.

- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for highway oiling.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for general highway expenses.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars that portion of the highway not being used for the present Route No. 12, starting at the point of junction of the present route 12 just north of Brandy Brook so-called, continuing south to the Troy-Fitzwilliam town line.
- Article 8. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$338.03, to which the State will contribute \$2,253.52 if voted and accepted, for the construction and maintenance of Class 5 roads.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes, paid on or before dates designated at this meeting.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the support of the fire department.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the police department.
- Article 12. (By petition) To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to make a study of, and determine the needs for adequate police protection and report their findings to the town at the 1962 Town Meeting, along with a special article to appropriate funds to support their recommendations. This study is to include the committee recommendations on: 1. Organization of the department. 2. required equipment, 3. authority of the department, 4. responsibilities of the department, 5. estimated annual operatnic costs, 6. other matters deemed necessary by the committee.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following proposal relative to motor vehicle on highways:
- 1. Any police officer in his discretion, or a member of the Fire Department in the discharge of his duty, may remove

any vehicle or vehicles left upon any public way not in the apparent charge of any driver or other person, to another place on such public way; or from such public way to some other public way; or to a public garage for safe keeping at the expense of the owner.

- 2. No vehicle shall be left standing all night upon any of the public ways or bridges in the town, and the owners of all vehicles so standing between the hours of one and six o'clock in the morning shall be deemed in violation of RSA 266.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance and operation of the water department.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for payment of water bonds and interest on same.
- Article 16. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to the Monadnock Regional Association along with the 37 other towns in the region.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the employment of a district nurse.
- Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$903.00 as the towns share toward the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital.
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the continuation of the War Memorial Program.
- Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the support of the Gay-Kimball library.
- Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.
- Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for Public Welfare.
 - Article 23. To see what action the town wishes to take

upon a gift of land and buildings from the Troy School District to the Town of Troy, a description of said gift being printed in the School Warrant of this report, namely the Ripley Memorial property, and described under article 10.

Article 24. To see what action the town will take upon a gift of land in two parts, also two rights of way, from the Troy School District to the Town of Troy, said gift being described under article 9 of the School Warrant printed in this report.

Article 25. To see if the town will adopt the provisions of the following ordinance:

- 1. No land in this town shall be used for a dump or for storage of abandoned vehicles or parts thereof, junk, scrap paper, rags or discarded material of any kind; nor used in a manner that is disorderly, unsightly, noxious or offensive to the public.
- 2. Any person violating the above provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$15.00 for each day of violation.
- 3. This ordinance to take effect upon its passage.

 Article 26. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the following ordinance:
- 1. Every dwelling house hereafter erected in the town within three hundred (300) feet from the center line of a public way shall be provided with the following sanitation and sewerage facilities:
 - A. at least one flush type toilet;
- B. at least one septic tank, or other devise performing a similar function, having a minimum capacity of 300 gallons;
- C. adequate provisions for the drainage and distribution of the overflow from septic tanks conveying it underground or in some other manner that will not be offensive;
- D. such septic tanks, sewerage and drainage systems must be located so as not to contaminate any drinking water facilities

or to be the cause or contributing cause for the pollution of any stream, brook, river or pond.

2. The health officer of the town shall have the same powers and duties in the investigation and enforcement of this ordinance as those given to him under the provisions of RSA 147.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 28. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Your Fire Department can be as good as you want to have it, but we need more public interest and help to make it so. Accordingly, we wish the wives of the members of the department would form an auxiliary, which, we believe, would be an incentive for the department to become more effective. It is an honor, and always has been a great honor, to be a member of any voluntary Fire Department. We wish the public would take this fact more seriously, which, we are sure, would result in more applications for membership.

Again, we want to extend thanks to Troy Mills, Inc. for their interest and continued servicing the fire alarm system. We also appreciate the help of those members in the Red Network.

We were able to economize more than we thought last year, and for the coming year we are asking for an appropriation of \$2,500.00.

TROY WAR MEMORIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

The 1960 season at the Sand Dam was a reasonably successful one. Among the plans which we saw developed were the addition of the morning program, the expansion of the craft program, and a widely used informal teen-age evening program.

We were happy to note that generally the care of War Memorial Program property was greatly improved. A sizable amount of repairing was done to the main building, bath houses, out houses, clothes racks, and wharves. The three buildings were re-stained and all metal slides, etc. were repainted. All of the pines were pruned. Spring maintenance should include work on the wharves, boats, canoes, main building, and the possible addition of a raft to our waterfront area.

Girl Scout and Boy Scout groups used the area several times before the summer program opened. The Troy school picnic was held at the Sand Dam. The committee would like to see more of this type of activity.

Two pleasant associations carried over from last year were the Little League and Fitzwilliam participation. In each case we believe there were mutual benefits.

Next season we would like to enlarge the craft program which was very popular, to consider improvement of waterfront facilities, to consider the employment of an additional trained staff member, and to further consider making the area available for winter sports.

We wish to thank everyone for their fine cooperation and assistance with this program and to urge them to forward their suggestions for improvement to us. Special thanks go to Bob Girouard, John Callahan, and the boys who assisted them with cleaning the area and putting the wharves in, to Alan Wheeler who moved the area, and to Girl Scout Troop 525 for their flower garden at the entrance.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district in the town of Troy qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 14th day of March, 1961 at 10 a.m. in the morning to bring in your votes for the election of the following officials:

- 1. A moderator for the coming year.
 - A clerk for the ensuing year.
 - A member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
 - A treasurer for the ensuing year.
 - Two auditors for the ensuing year.

You are hereby further notified to meet at the High School Auditorium in said district on March 13, 1961 at 7:30 p.m. to act upon the following: (Polls will be open not later than 10 a.m. nor closed earlier than 6 p.m. on Tuesday, March 14, 1961.

- 2. To determine and appoint the salaries of school board members and the truant officer, and to fix the compensation of any other officer or agents of the district.
- 3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 5. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers, auditors and agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to

authorize the application against said appropriation of any sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 6. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand and one hundred dollars (\$1,100.) to be used as matching funds for Federal Aid provided under the National Education Defense Act for the purchase of equipment and materials in science and mathematics; and to approve the acceptance of Federal Aid Funds.
- 7. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.) to provide for an enriched program of instruction offered in addition to the regular school program for talented pupils.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.) as the district's share of the Supervisory Union contribution to the support of educational TV Channel WENH.
- 9. To see what action the district wishes to take upon the offer of the following property as a gift to the Town of Troy, N.H. as follows:

Beginning at the iron pin on the northeastern corner of the lot on South Main Street known as the Ripley Memorial and belonging to the Troy School District, proceeding northerly along South Main Street a distance of about 58 feet to the land of F. J. Cumings Estate; thence westerly along this boundary a distance of 190 feet; thence in a southerly direction to the land of Miss Belle Spooner; thence easterly along this boundary a distance of 190 feet to South Main Street; then northerly along South Main Street a distance of about 100 feet to an iron pin on the southeast corner of the aforesaid lot, together with a two-story shed attached to the Ripley Memorial Building, and a detached two-car garage. The total land area of the above is approximately 33,240 square feet,

and the above building floor area approximately 1930 square feet. The above being offered by Troy School District.

10. To see what action the district wishes to take upon the offer of the following property as a gift to the Town of Troy, N.H. as follows:

A certain tract of land situated on the easterly bank of the South Branch River, so called, in the northerly part of Troy, County of Cheshire and State of New Hampshire, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the southwest corner of said lot at a stake and stones about 20 feet north of the foot path across said River on land formerly of one Thomas Wright; thence easterly along an old fence 275 feet, more or less, to a stake and stones near a bunch of alders in an old fence on the margin of the old Barrett Meadow, so called; thence northwesterly and northerly along an old fence 1,025 feet, more or less, to the east bank of said South Branch; thence in a general southerly direction by varying courses along said east bank 1,250 feet, more or less, to the place of beginning.

Meaning and intending to convey the premises conveyed to the Grantor by deed of Harold J. Mitchell dated February 17, 1959 and recorded in Vol. 661, page 589 of the Cheshire Registry of Deeds as said premises are shown on a plan entitled "School District of the Town of Troy, N. H. Scale 1"—100 feet, prepared by E. F. Bent December 1960", which said plan is among the records of the Grantor.

Also another tract of land situated on the easterly side of the Boston & Maine Railroad property in said Troy, beginning at point which is 28.12 feet southerly on said Railroad property of the northerly end of a culvert over a small brook; thence easterly 381.25 feet to a point which is 50 feet South 4° 30' West from an iron pin by a double elm tree near the south bank of said small brook; thence continuing in the same course 303.12 feet to the west bank of the South Branch River; thence northwesterly on said west bank 190.62 feet to a point which marks the southeast corner of land conveyed to the Grantor by deed of Edward W. Cheshire Registry of Deeds; thence North 18° 40' West crossing said Branch and through an iron pipe on the east bank of the same 441.6 feet to an iron pipe on the east bank of the Branch; thence South 84° West crossing the Branch 240.26 feet to an iron pin near the end of a wall; thence southwesterly on said wall to an iron pin in a rock; thence southwesterly along said wall 290 feet, more or less, to the end thereof at land of the Boston & Maine Railroad; thence southerly on said Boston & Maine Railroad land 177.12 feet, more or less, to the place of beginning.

Bonnette dated June 10, 1941 and recorded in Vol. 491, page 63, and part of the premises conveyed to the Grantor by deed of Francis X. I hereby submit my second annual report as Principal of the Troy School System.

New Staff Members

Grade 1—Because of the large enrollment, Marion Starkey has been employed on a part time basis.

Grade 4—Edith McIntire replaced Dorothy Lagrenade who has retired.

Grade 6—Marian Sabin replaced Francis Lambert who left for another position.

Grades 7 & 8—Robert Murray was hired to relieve the large classes in the Junior High School.

Physical Education and Social Studies—Verne Hesselton replaced Charles Hamel who accepted a principal's position.

Commercial—Gertrude Anderson replaced Gail O'Connell who became a full time homemaker.

The Elementary School

The children of Troy are filling our elementary grades to capacity. The first three years, the children are busy acquiring the basic skills needed to learn the 3 R's. I feel that these first three years are the most important ones of their lives. It is during this period that the student must be molded to his years of education ahead.

The next three years, he is preparing himself for Junior High and High School classes. The Joplin Plan in reading is still being used in grades 4, 5 and 6. The elementary French instruction is still offered, however, due to classes on the stage we have not been able to use our TV. This year science kits and a portable lab table have been obtained for use in the elementary grades.

Troy Junior High School

The Troy Junior High School program builds on the skills acquired in the previous six years of schooling. This is done in part by a comprehensive approach to English and its application, to science and its application, and to history and its implications today.

Following such a program, we hope to develop in each and every student the ability to think for himself, to understand the basics of each subject, and to be able to apply this acquired knowledge, not only in terms of furthur study but in everyday life.

ROBERT BELLAVANCE

Special 7th and 8th Grade

This year we have combined two classes made up of 7th and 8th graders who we feel need extra help in their academic subjects such as arithmetic, spelling, reading, history and science. These students may work more at their own speed rather than that of a more rapid group.

Much of the work that we are doing can be correlated with other subjects. One example is the study of the science of fire on which this class really did a good job. The group was divided into smaller groups according to their own specific interests and needs. The following areas were covered:

Reports—both written and oral—were used for English as well as science. Speeches—were given and a special assembly in conjunction with National Fire Prevention Week was given for the elementary grades.

Demonstrations with knowledge of the local fire protection needs in homes, businesses, and schools were covered.

Field trips were taken to the local fire department, etc.

These are very beneficial if they are approached and carried out in the proper manner. After studying thoroughly the science of fire, it gave all pupils a more serious outlook on the school fire prevention program.

By taking as many subjects as possible and correlating all subject matter into a given area, both the learning situation is made more interesting to each and also more beneficial to others in the class.

At the present time, the class is situated on the stage proper, using college type desk chairs and a portable blackboard. We hope in time that this class may be moved to a more permanent site.

All parents are welcome to visit this class at anytime for observation or consultation.

ROBERT MURRAY

English Department

The English Department aims to develop and improve the standards of reading and writing for all the students, and to give them a better appreciation of English and American literature.

This year the English teachers have been working on an English curriculum to set up a uniform program for grades nine through twelve. We feel that there should be more continuity for the four year program.

We have a number of new books this year and each year enables us to add to this collection giving the students a chance to increase their reading. Our library facilities are in great need of improvement, however, and this problem cannot be solved until we have adequate room to have a proper library for the students.

MARY LOU MURRAY

Social Studies Department

The Social Studies department of Troy High School is

focusing on the objective of giving the students skills and concepts that will enable them to be more effective and adjusted members of society.

VICTOR COLLETTE

Science Department

With the receipt of new science equipment provided by the citizens of Troy, the Biology and General Science departments have been able to present more comprehensive courses in these subjects, with greater student participation.

MRS. VOLLERTSON

Business Department

The objective of the Business Curriculum is to provide students with sufficient knowledge, ability, and skill in the basic business subjects so that they may find employment in this field or go on for further study. Subjects offered at present are Typing I and II, Shorthand I, Bookkeeping I, and Office Practice. Thorough training in these subjects offers adequate training to most students so that they may follow either of the two pursuits listed above.

GERTRUDE ANDERSON

Home Economics Department

The Home Economics program in Troy High School aims to give girls supplementary training in the phases of homemaking that will accomplish one and possibly two purposes—that of becoming an efficient and happy homemaker. Secondly, encouragement is given to enter into a career in the field of Home Economics.

RUTH CUMINGS

Industrial Arts

Industrial Arts at Troy High School is an important part of the general education in which the primary purposes are to familiarize students with the tools, products, processes, and occupations of industry today. Along with this we have tried to put more emphasis on shop math and getting along with other students while working in shop.

Courses that were offered in Industrial Arts this year were: Mechanical Drawing. Woodworking, Cabinet Making, Power Mechanics, and Electricity.

Driver Education is also taught under the Industrial Arts Department, and this year we will train about twenty-eight to thirty drivers.

ALAN WHEELER

Physical Education Program

Physical education in the Troy High School has been carried on to the full capacity of its facilities. This includes a complete program of indoor and outdoor sports, calisthenics, and individual testing. The Varsity Soccer team went as far as the State semi-finals, and at this writing, it looks as though the Varsity Basketball team will make the State Tournament play-offs. The Cross Country team was undefeated in five meets.

The Junior High Basketball team has played a six game schedule, and the Girls Basketball team has played an eight game schedule.

The people of Troy should be proud of the fine records and sportsmanship shown by the students during this season of competition.

VERNE HESSELTON

Guidance

An additional period each day for guidance has made it possible to devote more time to individual pupils and to expand the guidance program in other respects.

New services this year include: a student handbook containing pertinent information on courses of study, rules and policies of the school, activities, etc.; a list of books, booklets, etc. (on occupational information, schools and colleges, and on

personal problems) that may be borrowed by students or parents; occupational tapes from Northeastern University; films and film strips on choice of a career; and a follow-up questionnaire and study of graduates (1958-60).

Special activities this year include trips to schools and industrial plants; a Career Day scheduled for March; and two additional tests, the California Occupational Interest Inventory and the College Board's P.S.A.T.

The regular testing program and other activities of this department may be found in the Student Handbook to which all parents of Junior-Senior High students should have access.

ALICE R. HILDRETH

Mathematics Department

The mathematics department of Troy High School again this year offers a four-year program of sequential mathematics to adequately prepare college-capable students for further training. Since we are aware of the rapidly changing programs in secondary school mathematics today, an attempt is being made to teach Introduction to Algebra to selected 8th grade students so that they may be prepared to proceed in mathematics studies as rapidly as their abilities allow.

We also have general and business arithmetic classes for those who wish to satisfy mathematics requirements or pursue special interests.

MALCOLM L. GOODELL

It is at this time that I would like to thank the citizens of Troy for their support of the school. It is very gratifying to the people in education to know that the citizens of Troy had the foresight and voted to offer the students of this town a broader education by forming a Cooperative School with four other towns in this area. I am sure that the townspeople and students will receive many benefits from this larger school.

Repairs and Maintenance

The following major projects were completed for the 1960-61 school year:

- 1. Painting and puttying windows
- 2. Painting parts of the interior of the high school building
- 3. Construction of fire doors on the stairwells to eliminate hazardous fire conditions
- 4. Construction of an escape exit for the shop area
- 5. Gym wall painted
- 6. All basements painted
- 7. Storm windows installed in the science laboratory
- 8. Installation of new lights in one classroom

What's Ahead?

A great deal of time, energy and effort has been spent in the past months studying and evaluating the Troy school problems concerning curriculum, enrollment, instruction and school facilities. Many meetings, studies, surveys and discussions have been held in hopes of the formation of a cooperative school district involving neighboring communities. I personally would like at this time to thank the School Board, Troy Study Committee, and citizens who have been a part of this project for giving so generously of their time and efforts in order to accomplish this goal for our boys and girls in Troy.

The cooperative formation in my opinion is educationally and financially sound, and it is my hope that this goal will be realized in the very near future. Presently six cooperative school districts are in existence in New Hampshire, and many more districts are undertaking study projects to explore the merits of joining with neighboring communities to operate schools that are needed for the increased number of children in our state. I am proud to see Troy take the lead with other joining communities in this rapidly growing interest.

TROY SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

March 7, 1960

Meeting was called to order at 7:35 p.m. by Moderator, Ernest L. Woodbury.

Attendance 135.

Rev. Arthur Childs gave the prayer.

Reading of Warrant by Moderator.

Article 2

To determine and appoint the salaries of school board members and the truant officer, and to fix the compensation of any other officer or agents of the district.

Parker Whitcomb, M. S. B., gave the figures.

Motion by Calvin Cumings and supported "that the amount of \$300 be accepted."

Yea vote.

Motion was carried in the affirmative.

Article 3

To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Moderator called upon John Callahan to report. Mr. Callahan reported that the building committee recommended to give the firm of Engelhardt, Engelhardt, Leggett and Cornell the survey to make a complete study of the Troy school system; urged that we have this survey and recognize the committee's serious recommendations. Asked for questions. None.

Motion by Charles Shaw, M.S.B., and supported "we accept

the building committee's recommendations and place on file with the district clerk'.

Yea vote.

Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 4

To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Motion by Mr. Shaw and supported "we take care of these matters as they come up in the warrant."

The motion was put to a vote. Show of hands, 92 Yea, No (none). Motion was carried in the affirmative.

Article 5

To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers, auditors and agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of any sums as are estimated to be received from the State equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Suggested by Calvin Cumings proposed budget be read. Moderator read proposed budget.

Mr. Shaw, M.S.B., spoke on the make-up of this budget. Tried to keep teachers' salaries down; one extra teacher on account of crowded condition until we find out what we are going to do.

George Dubina asked question on increase of teachers' salaries, how arrived at. Explained by Mr. Shaw; ability, seniority no set scale of schedule.

Mr. Shaw asked if Mr. Clark, Supt. could better explain.

Mr. Clark explained; years employed here, number of summer courses taken, and job they are in; on a salary schedule is raised each year automatically.

Motion by Charles Shaw and supported by Calvin Cumings "that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$154,060.56 for the support of schools, for the salaries of the school district officers, auditors and agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of any sums as are estimated to be received from the State equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

The motion was put to a vote. Show of hands. 92 Yea. No (none). Motion was carried in the affirmative.

Article 6

To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand and one hundred dollars (\$1,100.) to be used as matching funds for Federal Aid provided under the National Education Defense Act for the purchase of equipment and materials in science and mathematics; and to approve the acceptance of Federal Aid Funds.

Roger Smith, M. S. B., explained; schools pay one-half and the government pays one half. School board recommends.

Motion by Charles Lepisto and supported by Mrs. F. T. Cumings this article be accepted as read.

The motion was put to a vote. Show of hands. 92 Yea. No (none). Motion was carried in the affirmative.

Article 7

To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to provide for an enriched program of instruction, offered in addition to the regular school program, for gifted pupils.

Motion by Calvin Cumings and supported by Ray Poirier article be accepted as read.

George Dubina asked for explanation. Moderator called on Mr. Furlong to explain: explained a course is offered which we do not have here; there are seven boys eligible. Mr. Shaw explained pupils give up their Saturday mornings to take this course.

The motion was put to a vote. Show of hands. 78 Yea. No 6. Motion was carried in the affirmative.

Article 8

To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as the district's share of the Supervisory Union contribution to the support of educational TV Channel WENH.

Motion by Joseph Lagrenade and supported by Arthur Bowers article be accepted as read.

Yea vote.

Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 9

To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the repair of the school roof.

Parker Whitcomb, M.S.B., explained roof on old school needed work done; flashing etc.; roof leaks on new addition. Experts claim on inspection that this is condensation and not a leaky roof. Twenty year bonding company will stand back of same if roof leaks.

Calvin Cumings asked if contractor is liable for leaking roof.

Clarence Abare asked why more leaks each year.

George Ripley explained better to compromise with contractor as more money will be spent fighting same.

Motion by George Dubina and supported by Ralph Oman article be accepted as read.

The motion was put to a vote.

Show of hands. 49 Yea. 14 No.

Motion was carried in the affirmative.

Article 10

To see if the district will authorize continuing the "Committee to study School Needs" for the school year 1960-61.

Motion by Mrs. F. T. Cumings and supported we accept article as read.

Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 11

To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred and thirty-two dollars (\$1,532.) for the purpose of engaging the services of the firm of educational consultants, Engelhardt, Engelhart, Leggett and Cornell to make a complete study of the Troy school system.

Mr. Callahan explained as per attached letter.

Motion by Calvin Cumings and supported by several article be accepted as read.

The motion was put to a vote.

Show of hands. Yea 101, No 1.

Motion was carried in the affirmative.

Motion by Charles Shaw and supported by Calvin Cumings to recess meeting until 10 a.m. March 8, 1960 at the Town Hall to take up Article 1.

SPECIAL MEETING OF THE TROY SCHOOL DISTRICT

November 14, 1960

Meeting was called to order by Moderator Ernest L. Woodbury at 8 P.M.

Moderator asked Mr. Wilho Mattson to give the prayer. Attendance 200.

Reading of warrant by Moderator.

Article 1

To see if the district will vote to petition the State Board

of Education to become a member of a cooperative school district which may include, in addition to this district the following school districts; namely, Swanzey, Winchester, Richmond, Marlboro, Fitzwilliam, Harrisville, Roxbury and Chesterfield.

Motion by Clarence Abare, Selectman, and supported by Edward Lang; That the Troy School Board be instructed to petition the State Board of Education to become a member of a cooperative school district which may include, in addition to this district the following school districts namely, Swanzey, Winchester, Richmond, Marlboro, Fitzwilliam, Roxbury, Harrisville and Chesterfield.

Questions were asked by Mrs. Harold Lang, Mrs. Fred T. Cumings, Mrs. Ruth Platts and Mr. Charles Lepisto; and answered satisfactorily by school board members. Dr. Paul explained about area school three years ago. Mr. Whitcomb took the floor and made the following statements:

"Briefs outline and resume of events and study given to the Troy school needs leading up to tonight's meeting and the important decision we have to vote upon.

"One and one-half years ago you voters of Troy were presented with a plan for a new building addition with an alternative of two sessions. The building program was voted down and great sentiment expressed against any two session system. Since that time our crowded conditions have increased to the point where the stage is in almost constant use as a class-room; several classes, physical education, and the hot lunch program are using the gym; we have no library at all; remedial reading is being taught in a coat closet; the shop is terribly overcrowded and is also used for art classes; several grades are over-crowded and in the interests of good education should be split in two grades. In general, Troy must do something at once if its educational system is to function properly. These crowded conditions must be relieved.

"At our last March annual meeting, you voted to engage the services of the Engelhardt educational consultants firm at a cost of about \$1,500.00. The survey has been completed, was very thorough, and covered all phases of our school program and needs. Open meetings have been held with Mr. Engelhardt, written reports delivered to all residents of Troy, and large detailed books made available to everyone interested. This report clearly indicates that Troy has to make a decision very soon and that a cooperative plan with from six to nine other towns would be the best solution for a far superior education for our boys and girls and at a much more realistic cost than building an addition to our own plant. We were given an alternative of sending our high school students to Keene, but since the report was completed Keene has indicated that it is not interested in tuition students in the future, due to its growth in population.

"The study committee voted in by the people of Troy has spent many, many hours on this problem before the hiring of an outside consultant and since that time. Their conclusion is the same, a cooperative school would give us much more education for our money.

"To further help towns wishing to work out their school needs together through a cooperative plan the State of New Hampshire will increase its building aid from 30 to 55% for three or more towns. This 25% is a very substantial gain in dollars and would also apply to the existing debt we have on our buildings.

"A bill coming up at the next session of the legislature would change the foundation aid to cooperative schools from 14 to 10 mills. This would mean another gain to the town of Troy of about \$15,000.00. Since this bill has not been enacted upon it has NOT been taken into consideration in preparing the figures given you. But, since it does seem to have very strong backing all over the state and with good support should pass, it is certainly worthy of our consideration. The governor has expressed his sentiments towards aid to cooperative schools so that this bill would also have his support. About twenty-nine towns in New Hampshire are either in a cooperative school or studying one at this time.

"Later in this meeting we can get into more detailed figures if you wish. Briefly, this plan would mean a tax rate for schools of 68.60. We are presently paying 69.90 for the support of our school system. If we choose to build an addition to our own building the tax rate would increase about \$5.00 per thousand. Perhaps even more important is the fact that with a higher cost of going alone our school still would not be nearly as good as with the lower cost cooperative plan.

"We are well aware of the fact that small high schools are much too costly and neither can they offer the educational advantages of a larger system. A high school should have at least 700 students to operate economically, and to offer a good complete program for all children. Troy has a total of 193 students in the junior and senior high schools combined. We can not operate the type of school we should at a sensible cost with this low student population.

"The educational advantages of a larger school are numerous. All children have far greater opportunities through ability groupings with special help for slower students and a chance for the better students to move ahead more rapidly. Many students need much greater vocational training in all types of shop work that they can use in later life. Other features include a better guidance program, cultural activities including art. music, and drama: teachers would be teaching in their own fields as specialists, a good solid program of science with ample facilities, and more courses and facilities for students interested in training in the commercial area. The courses offered in the cooperative curriculum would be doubled over what we now have. Every student would have an opportunity for an education to best suit his own ability and interests.

"A good school system is extremely important to any community to stimulate growth and promote business activity and to stop the migration of people away from the town.

"Your school board, your study committee, and your superintendent have spent many months studying our school problems and needs, going over the many reports, and looking at the future requirements of the Troy school system. We have all tried to do our jobs thoroughly and most conscientiously and to keep you posted on our findings from time to time. In

all honesty and with great sincerity we unanimously agree that the proposed cooperative school would best serve the interests of the town of Troy and its valuable young people.

"Tonight you people of Troy can vote on the results of our efforts and studies. We hope that we have given you sufficient information so that your decision will be the same as ours; that is, we should join a cooperative school with the other towns in our area for the best solution to our educational problems.

"The other members of the school board, Mr. Clark the superintendent, and the study committee members are willing to answer your questions at this time.

"Thank you all for your interest in our school program and thank you for coming tonight."

Mr. John Callahan reported on the findings of the committee.

Mr. Paul Clark, Superintendent of schools, was asked to make any remarks he wished to; which he did, and explained the situation very thoroughly.

Moderator Ernest L. Woodbury declared the polls open to vote on Article 1 by secret ballot, using the check list.

Voting booths.

School Board members supervised the check lists. Tellers were Calvin Cumings, Don Austin, Parker Whitcomb and Charles Shaw.

Article 2

To elect one representative to serve with representatives of other school districts on an interim committee, who shall prepare a financial budget for the operation of the proposed cooperative school district.

Grover Howe nominated Dr. Samuel Paul. He declined.

Edward Lang moved the nominations be closed, which was supported and carried.

Clarence Abare made a motion that the clerk cast one ballot for John Callahan as there was but one nominee, supported by several. Motion carried.

Clerk cast one ballot for John Callahan, who was unanimously elected.

Motion by C. Lepisto and supported to adjourn. Was carried in the affirmative. Meeting adjourned 9:15 P.M.

YOU, whether YOU be a farmer, homemaker, business or professional man or woman, municipal, state or federal official, clerk or woodsman can play an important part in the continuing and vital prevention program.

First — by setting a good example YOURSELF — being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands.

Second — by using YOUR individual influence in your community and valued council with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise.
