**MINUTES OF
THE WEARE TOWN MEETING, MARCH 11, 1958**

Meeting called to order by the Moderator, Scott F. Eastman at 2:00 p. m.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, etc.,:

Alden Leeds reported that the recommendation of the Finance Committee was the sum of \$17,600. to cover all of the items in this article (A-P). This was a decrease of \$900. over the amount raised last year, he noted. It was moved and seconded that the recommendation of the Finance Committee be accepted and it was a vote in the affirmative. No discussion.

Article 3. To choose by separate ballot, one Trustee of the Trust Fund for three years.

George Sawyer's term was expiring and he was nominated again. It was moved and supported that the Clerk cast one ballot for George C. Sawyer as Trustee of the Trust Fund. Vote was unanimous.

Article 4. To choose by separate ballot, one Trustee of the Library for three years.

Eva M. Sawyer's term was expiring. Mrs. Sawyer was nominated and it was moved and supported that the Clerk cast one ballot for Eva M. Sawyer as Trustee of the Library. Vote was unanimous.

Article 5. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

Wilfred Lahey made the motion that the collection of taxes be left with the Selectmen. Motion seconded and it was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer, to borrow money on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes, etc.

It was the recommendation of the Finance Committee that this article be accepted as read. It was moved and supported that this article be adopted and the vote was in the affirmative. No further discussion.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to allow discount on taxes.

Mr. Todd moved that the Town would NOT allow any discount on taxes. The Finance Committee reported that they had discussed this and discovered that the Town would actually save approximately \$700. by not allowing a discount. Mr. Todd's motion was seconded and it was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of highways and bridges, and take any other vote in relation thereto.

The Finance Committee recommended that the Town raise \$18,000. for this article, same as previous years. Gordon Russell reported that last year the Committee recommended \$18,000. but that \$2,000. was added to that figure that was appropriated last year. \$11,000. has already been spent, which leaves only \$7,000. for the road agent to take care of the many roads. It is difficult for any road agent to care for the Town's many roads on this amount.

It was moved and supported that the sum of \$20,000. be raised for this article. Vote in the affirmative. No further discussion.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,714.09 to be used with the sum of \$11,427.29 to be furnished by the State, for Class IV and Class V Construction, Reconstruction, and Betterment Aid.

It was moved and supported that this article be accepted as read. Vote in the affirmative. No discussion.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department.

Chester Lowe reported on some of the work that has to be done and he said one never knows just what is

coming next — how many accidents there will be, breaking and entering, etc.

The Finance Committee reported that the Town was getting a great deal of protection for the amount of money paid out. (Last year, \$922. was spent by the Police Dept.) Also, a lot of free service was given the townspeople.

The motion was made and seconded that the sum of \$1,000. be raised for this article. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Volunteer Fire Department.

It was the recommendation of the Finance Committee that the sum of \$4,000. be raised for the Fire Department. It was moved and supported that this amount be raised and it was a vote in the affirmative. No discussion.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of water holes.

The Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$100.

Eva Sawyer reported on the condition of the water hole by her house and said there was about two feet of mud on the top of that one and that, to her knowledge, it had never been touched since it was dug but that it should be cleaned out. Several other similar cases were reported. Gerald Hight replied that it was very difficult to get labor to do that sort of work.

It was moved and supported that the Town raise the sum of \$100. for the care of water holes. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of neglected cemeteries.

The recommendation of the Finance Committee was \$300. It was moved and supported that their recommendation for this article be accepted. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts.

The Finance Committee's recommendation was \$300. It was moved and supported that this amount be raised. Vote in the affirmative. No discussion.

Article 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Library.

The Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$250. It was moved and supported that this amount be raised for this article. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

It was recommended by the Finance Committee that the Town raise \$200. It was moved and supported that this amount be raised for this article. Vote in the affirmative. No discussion.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$298. for the support of the Concord Hospital. (By petition).

Gordon Russell said the Finance Committee had considerable discussion involving this article. It was 5 to 4 in favor of this article, as far as the Committee was concerned.

Wilfred Lahey spoke at length against this article, and thought it should be dismissed. It was his opinion that there was a great deal that should be done to improve the buildings of the Town, rather than support the Concord Hospital. He spoke of many houses in town that are for sale or vacant. He also spoke about how neighboring towns, when trying to get bank loans are successful in getting from 50-80% with banks but this was not true with Weare people, and he felt improvements should be made in town.

Gordon Russell was in favor of supporting the Hospital. He thought the Town needed the Hospital and reported that 5 beds were held for the Town of Weare over to Concord in case of emergencies.

Mrs. Bockus spoke for Florence Flanders (who was unable to be present) and reported that several Weare girls had graduated from Concord Hospital with excellent records and it seemed only fair that the Town help support it.

After much discussion, a motion was made and seconded that this article be dismissed. Because of the uncertainty of the vote, a standing vote was required:

IN FAVOR	74
OPPOSED	20

It was a vote in the affirmative that this article be dismissed.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,625. for the printing of the new Town History, and take any other vote in relation thereto.

The Finance Committee recommended that this article be accepted as read.

It was brought out that this money is the cost of the printer which enables the Town to get the book to the public for sale. This amount will, in due time, come back to the Town from sale of the copies of the new Town Histories. The new History will consist of the old one, condensed, plus material added.

A rough estimate of the cost of the new histories was \$6. to \$8. It is to be a 480 page book with a 6x8 page size, including 8 pages of photos.

It was moved and supported that the sum of \$3,625. be raised for this article and that it would be up to the Selectmen as to how this amount is to be financed. Vote in the affirmative. No further discussion.

At 3:00 p. m. there was a recess to allow voting. Meeting resumed at 3:10 p. m.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the new road on the east shore of Weare Reservoir; said road to be maintained as a summer road from April 1 to December 1, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for maintenance. (By petition).

Mr. Hight reported that it was the recommendation of the Finance Committee that this article be dismissed. It was moved and supported that Article 19 be dismissed and it was a vote in the affirmative. No discussion.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and

appropriate the sum of \$100. to purchase advertising space in the 1959 Guide of the Merrimack Valley Region, or act in relation thereto.

The Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$100. It was moved and supported that this amount be raised and it was a vote in the affirmative.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to pay the employees of the Town Highway Department on holidays; also to pay the employees of the Town Highway Department at the same rate, as received by the employees of the State Highway Department, or take any other vote in relation thereto.

The Finance Committee recommended the dismissal of this article. It was moved and supported that this article be dismissed. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. as the Town's share in replacing the two narrow Town Bridges numbers 111/043 and 110/048 at the Tavern, in South Weare.

It was moved and supported that this article be dismissed. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, to purchase a new Town Truck, or take any other vote in relation thereto.

It was the recommendation of the Finance Committee that this article be dismissed.

Mr. Phelps reported that when the Town bought its present truck, it was agreed to keep it 3 years and then trade before it lost its value. The town truck is now 4 years old and badly in need of repair.

It was moved and supported that this article be dismissed. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. to be used at Chase Park.

The Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$200.

Marion Russell reported on progress up to the Park and that a new well had been dug up there to supply drinking water which would be ready in the Spring; a new diving board had been purchased. For the most

part, this was considered a wonderful spot for the children in the Town during the summer.

It was moved and supported that the sum of \$200. be raised. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair the dam and culvert at South Weare Garage.

The Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$300.

There was some discussion regarding this dam and culvert. It was considered important and essential that they be repaired and done properly. It was moved and supported that the sum of \$300. be raised. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for swimming instructions, and the Water Safety Program at Lake Horace.

It was the recommendation of the Finance Committee that this article be dismissed.

Mrs. Leavitt said that the Red Cross usually covers this amount for the swimming lessons but, since there was going to be no canvassing for this in the Town this year, it seemed too bad that the children had to miss the lessons.

Mr. Perrigo reported that last year there was a great response to the swimming lessons given. It was brought to everyone's attention that, even though the Red Cross helped, the Town could not give full support of the expense involved, so the individual parents were asked and they gladly made up the balance of the expenses. It is the one thing that is for the youngsters and a program they enjoy.

It was moved and seconded that the sum of \$200. be raised for this article. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of seven members, with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, etc., etc.

The Finance Committee recommended the sum of \$250.

It was moved and supported that this article be accepted.

George Gunn made an amendment to the effect that the members appointed by the Selectmen must consist of some ladies — at least one-half of the members.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to make some of the natural water supply available to the public.

The sum of \$50. was recommended by the Finance Committee.

This article was for the benefit of those families whose wells go dry every year. There are many springs around town which could be made available during such a time.

The \$50. recommended by the Committee was for the purpose of either buying or building tanks to collect the water.

It was moved and supported that the amount of \$50. be raised. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

George Gunn discussed a tree by Frank Davis' house that, to him, seemed dangerous for anyone to be walking under or by — particularly youngsters. It had been brought to the attention of the State as well as the local road agent, but nothing has been done about it. Mr. Gunn made the motion that the tree in question be cut before the following Saturday night (probably arranged by Selectmen) and that everyone present in the Town Hall be a Committee to see that it is done. Motion seconded and it was a unanimous vote.

Mr. Phelps said he would like to see that the tramp house is moved before another winter. It was moved and supported that the Selectmen see that this is done. Vote was in the affirmative. (It was said that the janitor was going to quit his job if this was not done).

Daniel Sawyer recommended blinker lights be installed at North Weare and Weare Center Store. These are two dangerous corners involving so many youngsters. It was moved and supported that the Selectmen deter-

mine the cost of a blinker light at the Weare Center Store and Crosby's corner. This motion was withdrawn by Mr. Sawyer.

It was then moved and supported that the Selectmen see about installing two blinker lights — one at Weare Center and one at the corner at Crosby's store. Vote was unanimous.

Samuel Chase said before making any move at all on this, the State would have to be contacted as the Town can erect no sign of any kind without notifying the State. It was Mr. Chase's opinion that the State would install these lights if they are requested to do so by the Town, providing the State approves such lights.

Mr. Hight said there was no legal speed limit through Weare Center and he thought there should be.

It was moved and supported that the Selectmen contact the Highway Department to ascertain the speed limit through Weare Center. The recommended speed was 25 miles per hour. Vote in the affirmative.

It was moved and supported that in the future the business of the Weare Town Meeting be conducted in the evening commencing at 8:00 p. m. This was for the benefit of the townspeople who are employed out-of-town and are unable to attend during the daytime. Vote in the affirmative.

No further business. Meeting adjourned at 4:30 p. m. Voting resumed.

SPECIAL MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Weare, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, Weare Center in said Town on Tuesday, the sixth day of January, 1959, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to grant authority to the Selectmen of Weare to enter into an agreement with the United States Government for the purpose of relocating roads in the Town of Weare, as prescribed in Corps of Engineers U. S. Army Plan Hopkinton-Everett Reservoir Relocations Highway dated 24, September 1958, Drawing Number Mer-1 1067, Plate No. IV-4, whereby the Town of Weare, will agree to discontinue certain Town Roads, and grant flowage easements to the United States Government on certain Town roads located within the Hopkinton-Everett Flood Control Reservoir area and bordering on the Piscataquog River below the Everett Dam in consideration of the raising, improvement or relocation of certain roads by the United States Government without cost to the Town of Weare, and take any other vote in relation thereto.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to grant authority to the Selectmen of Weare to enter into an agreement with the State of New Hampshire, whereby the State of New Hampshire, in connection with the Hopkinton-Everett Flood Control Project, will represent the Town of Weare relative to all engineering matters, plan rights of way, advertise for bids, and prepare and enter into contracts for, and supervise, the construction of relocated Town roads.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to grant authority to the Selectmen of Weare, in connection with the Hopkinton-Everett Flood Control Project, to ad-

vertise for bids, and enter into contracts for the construction of the relocated Town roads, in the event the agreement with the State of New Hampshire as set out in Article (2) above is not consummated in due time.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen of Weare to abandon the following Town roads, as prescribed in Corps of Engineers U. S. Army Plan Hopkinton-Everett Reservoir Relocations-Highway, dated 24 September, 1958, Drawing Number Mer-1067, Plate No. IV-4, within the Government owned area of the Everett Dam Project.

January 6, 1959. Special meeting for the Town of Weare was called to order at 8:10 p. m. by the Moderator, Scott Eastman.

Robert Frazer, an engineer on the Hopkinton-Everett Dam project — and representing the United States Government — spoke of the various roads affected by the present project, causing the relocation of same. The River Road from Clough's Reservation, part of the Sugar Hill Road and several roads in that section will be flowed by the project.

Mr. Frazer had a map showing preliminary plans of the road changes, and this was referred to. The new road would go from the Riverdale Road at the junction of the River Road to Dunbarton, to the Barnard Hill Road to East Weare Village in the Town of Weare, following low land and hit the present Route 77 over road constructed by the town.

Mr. Chase of the State Highway Department pointed out that the purpose of this special meeting was not to

approve a physical layout of a road but that this meeting had two special purposes:

- (1) To authorize the Selectmen legally to enter into agreements with the United States Government regarding the road proposition and,
- (2) To permit the Selectmen to legally enter into agreements with the State of New Hampshire to assist the town.

Subsequent to this special meeting, there will have to be a public meeting held in regards to the physical layout of the relocated roads. The Selectmen will have to post notice formally by law stating the time, place and date of such a meeting.

Article 1. A few voters attending this special meeting discussed at length about the giving of authority to the Selectmen to make the decisions concerning the final layout of the relocation of the roads, and did not think this plan was too desirable. They felt that the townspeople should be the ones to go ahead — not just the Selectmen — but it was pointed out that it was necessary to have a leader or “head” so-called, of any such program, before anything of value can be accomplished, and — in this case — it must be the Selectmen. And, before the State of New Hampshire can enter into any contract with the Town, this action must be voted upon.

Mr. O'Connor, Attorney for the United States, spoke and tried to clarify the situation. He said that the Town has rights on its highways and the Government is coming in and interfering because of the Dam. Since roads are to be discontinued, the New Hampshire law reads that the Town is the only one that can discontinue highways. The Selectmen have the right to lay it out, but must hold a public hearing so the people can protest if they do not agree. Mr. O'Connor stated that the Federal Government desires to cooperate with the Town and tries to solve these problems in such a manner as is agreeable with the Town, and if substitute roads are required, it will substitute such roads.

The idea of Article 1 is to authorize the Selectmen to act for the Town as to the proper disposition of the road problem created as a result of the Hopkinton-Everett Dam. The State wants to enter into an agree-

ment with the Town, so that the State Highway Department can do the necessary engineering work. They do have a preliminary plan for the road, but it may not work out as the map presently shows.

It was pointed out that at the next meeting to be held, the State Highway would have an accurate layout to present to the people.

In the event that this Article was not voted on — and the Selectmen not given the necessary authority, Mr. Frazer pointed out that the Government would then be in a position to go ahead on its own and that if it could not deal with the town, it would — and could — take other means available by law in order to condemn the roads — even if it meant court action, and then the Government would go ahead with the project. To have it done in this manner might not be to the advantage of the town and could be very undesirable from every aspect, whereas if it was done in the orderly manner of giving the Selectmen the necessary authority, it might be to everyone's advantage.

The motion was made and seconded that Article 1 be accepted as read. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article 2. Mr. Traver made the motion that Article 2 be accepted as read. Motion seconded, and it was a vote in the affirmative. No discussion.

Article 3. Mr. Whittaker of the State Highway Department explained the purpose of this Article. He said that in Article 2 there were certain things which might require legislation in order for the State Highway Department to carry out various agreements and the Commission is willing to initiate action to obtain such legislation. This Article would provide means by which the Selectmen could themselves go ahead and do the actual contract, if the need should arise.

The motion was made and seconded that this Article be accepted as read. No discussion. Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made and supported that this special meeting be adjourned at 9:00 p. m.

3. To choose by separate ballot, one trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

4. To choose by separate ballot, one trustee of the Library for three years.

5. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer, to borrow money on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes for the year 1959, and to issue

notes therefor, in the name of the Town, at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

7. To see if the Town will vote to allow discount on taxes.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges, and take any other vote in relation thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,685.68 to be used with the sum of \$11,237.84 to be furnished by the State, for Class IV and Class V Construction, Reconstruction, and Betterment Aid.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Volunteer Fire Department.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of water holes.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of neglected cemeteries.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00, for swimming instructions, and the Water Safety Program at Lake Horace.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, to install toilet facilities, and heating plant in the Town Office. (Stone Memorial Building)

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, to be used to make the grounds in front of the Town Hall presentable, and to start the parking lot project.

23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA Chapter 59:71, 73, 79 through 86, inclusive, providing for the election of Town officers by non-partisan ballot.

If the Town votes favorably upon the preceding article to see if the Town will vote to require ten petitions for filing for office under RSA 59:81.

24. To transact any other business, that may legally come before this meeting.

As we entered the year, Weare was faced with the problem of changing to the dial telephone system, which posed as a threat to getting emergency calls to the proper person or persons with the least time loss.

This challenge seems to have been met with the so called red phone, which now when called in an emergency, and through the cooperation of the public and diligent and effective operators of this red phone, it has become very effective.

The personnel of the police department have all received both the standard and advanced Red Cross first aid training along with special emergency police first-aid.

The members have also received special training in police techniques, through the cooperation of the F. B. I. and state police. These training sessions were held in Nashua, Manchester, Henniker and Goffstown which it is obvious required a large amount of time and travel, which the men gave freely of. They are now attending a special F. B. I. class being held in Goffstown, which upon completion will be issued diplomas.

The summer of 1959 there will be classes held at the State Police Pistol Range in Henniker under the direction of the F. B. I., State Police, and National Rifle Association. This course is open to all law enforcement officers, in the proper use of their side arm, which is part of an officer's equipment and must be worn while on duty.

We now have an emergency squad, composed of fifteen trained men, all members from within the Fire Dept. They have received standard and advanced Red Cross first-aid and methods of handling accident cases and other emergencies that they are called upon to do.

Letters of several of the cases they were called upon to cover have been received by the chief of this squad, George Welch, for the very efficient and courteous manner in the way their work was carried out.

As the Hopkinton-Everett Flood Control Project progresses in East Weare and more and more property is taken by the United States Government, we have been asked to remind the public that any attempt to break and enter, any malicious damage or unauthorized trespass upon said government property that there is a very serious penalty for such.

The Civil Defense of New Hampshire has asked to have an auxiliary police organized in town to help in any emergency that might come up regards to civilian defense. Anyone interested in becoming an auxiliary police officer, can contact Dave Eaton of Weare Center, as he will be in charge of this unit.

You Can Help Prevent Forest Fires

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning — brush, paper, leaves, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you — personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the year 1958 the department responded to 34 calls. Property loss was low, and two small buildings were destroyed. There were 6 building fires, one brush fire, 19 chimney fires, 2 car fires, 1 oil burner fire, 1 power-line fire, 2 dump fires, and 2 out-of-town calls for building fires.

One building fire started from lightning damage to the electric wiring, 1 from an oil burner, 1 from a fire-place chimney flue, and three from unknown origin. The great number of chimney fires stresses the importance of keeping chimneys clean and in good repair. A large number of the fires resulting in fatalities start from oil burners. Have your oil burners installed and serviced by a responsible service man.

The practice of having the four upper classes of the elementary school visit the fire station for a talk on fire prevention during Fire Prevention Week was continued.

First Aid Courses were conducted. Nineteen firemen completed the Standard Red Cross Course. Fifteen firemen, all members of the rescue squad completed the Red Cross Advanced Course.

The Rescue Squad increased its membership to fifteen men. This squad answered many calls to accidents, 1 drowning, and other emergencies involving children having difficulty in breathing and severe bleeding, etc. Additional first aid equipment was purchased by the department. Two members of the squad took the rescue training course given at the annual Fire School.

The Fire Training School was attended by ten members of the department.

Radios were installed by the department. A two-way central station set and three mobile sets. One mobile set is in a truck at each of the three stations. This radio network is very valuable in coordinating the work of the companies and the dispatching of them to fires. The department donated \$250. toward the purchase of the radio equipment. Civilian Defense contributed one-half of the cost of the equipment.

A complete closed circuit fire alarm system was given to the department by the town of Ashland, Mass. and has been installed in the central station. By running a circuit and installing boxes at several points an alarm box system can be made available to Weare Center and North Weare Villages at small expense.

The change from a local telephone switchboard operator to the dial telephone system was completed in December 1958. A so called "Red Net Work" of fire phones was installed at Weare Center to receive all calls for help for fires, Police, and emergency services. It is working very well, thanks to the cooperation of the operators of the system who give their services without cost to the town. Four phones ring at once and an outdoor horn blows when the "red network" is called. The system is tested daily and the operators set up a schedule for the next 24 hours. This insures that at least one phone is constantly manned to receive calls and act as dispatcher for all emergency services.

Telephones were installed in the stations at South and East Weare. The phones at the three stations are not listed to prevent people calling a fire station expecting to have calls received at these places. In times when we have a fire going these phones will be used. The present system of Red Network and station phones will cost about \$400. per year in rentals.

Additional remote controls for the siren and air horns were installed at Weare Center, South and East Weare. The Red Network operators can sound alarms from their homes at Weare Center and have additional parties in South and East Weare with switches in their homes whom they can call to blow the air horns in those villages.

An additional assistant chief was added in the department. This gives an additional officer to exercise overall control at fires and to be responsible for different phases of the department's activities.

Wilder D. Tenney who had for several years served as assistant chief and forest fire warden, and who was a charter member, and the first clerk of the department died during the year. The whole department mourns the loss of Wilder who was the first active member to be lost to the department by death.

The year 1958 marks the completion of 25 years

service of the Weare Fire Department. It is with some measure of pride and satisfaction that the department looks back over this quarter of a century of accomplishments and growth in the building up of a protection system for the town. Much water has gone under the bridge and only three of the original members are still active, namely; Malcolm Dearborn, Captain; Gerald Purington, and Chief Gerald Hight.

The Ladies Auxiliary has been active this past year. Several improvements in the kitchen at the central station were made. A stainless steel sink was installed, additional cupboard and closet space was installed. Their assistance is greatly appreciated by the department.

New equipment added this past year includes: 400 ft. 2½ inch hose, a large portable pump, boots, helmets, asbestos gloves, and electric lanterns. Additional space on trucks 2 and 3 was provided by installing removable shelves in the hose bodies.

The flood control project which will eliminate East Weare Village raises a problem of relocating the fire station from that village. Weare is already affected by the reduction of manpower in East Weare. It is planned to relocate this equipment and alarm system where it will serve the greatest number of people and retain the insurance district surrounding it and to include the most property in a radius of two miles from the station. Having sufficient men within call distance will be a very important factor in this relocation.

The department wishes to thank all those who have assisted in the activities of the department the past year. Do not hesitate to call immediately should you suspect trouble. Let's get the jump on fires by prevention and quick action.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Weare:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report as your superintendent.

Enrollment

Pupil enrollment has remained fairly constant during the past two years, but the projected enrollment figures for the next five years present a different pattern. The future enrollment for this period shows a slight decrease of three pupils over this fall's enrollment, but the figures for grades 9-12, for this same period show an increase from the 79 enrolled this past September to a high of 102 in 1961. Because the high school is overcrowded this year, and with next fall's 8th grade class of 40 pupils replacing the present graduating class of 13, it is necessary to secure an additional classroom this fall.

The proposed budget includes allowances to keep the 8th grade in the elementary school and to convert the room in the shop building to a high school classroom.

Faculty

The teaching staff has undergone several changes this year and they are as follows: Theodore Gladu replaced Elphege Roy in the high school. Stephen Hensler replaced Bruce Wilson who in turn replaced James Hagianis as elementary principal. Vincent Ferdinando was appointed as a part time band instructor. Mrs. Barbara Larsen was elected to teach the commercial subjects. When these changes are added to the 16 different staff changes in the past 5 years, and 37 during the last 10 years, a serious deficiency in our schools at once becomes apparent; namely, the lack of a stable faculty. It requires time for a teacher to become acclimated before she may give a full capacity of teaching efficiency.

Contributing causes for these teacher changes are low salaries, divided grades, increased enrollments, insufficient and inadequate instructional tools and outmoded school buildings.

A sincere tribute should be offered to the citizens who were successful in accomplishing the construction of the elementary school, as modern, clean buildings are a basic necessity if a school system is to prove effective.

The undesirable high school situation is one of acute importance, not only because of its limited size, but because of the seriously restricted curriculum it is able to offer. Small high schools are more expensive, less efficient, and cannot provide for the type of education which we desire for our children. Because of the size of our school, many subjects cannot be offered and thus many students either drop out of high school or lose interest. The percentage of students who entered Weare High School and either dropped out of school or transferred before graduation over the last 6 years varies from 9% to 25% per year!

Accomplishments

Much has been accomplished this past half year. The employment of Mr. Spiro Anastos as Helping Teacher on a Union basis has been a contributing factor in bringing about correlation and improved teaching efficiency on all grade levels. Adequate instructional tools have been provided for our students in order to correct existing deficiencies, and the new budget includes more facilities which are still urgently needed if we are to provide even a minimum standard of education. Existing instructional deficiencies cannot be corrected during any one year, therefore multiple year plans have been established and priority given to those items of greatest importance. A routine standardized testing program has been established which will aid in evaluating our students' work and the curriculum. A full time commercial teacher and a part time music instructor were added to the faculty. The teachers are in the process of studying and evaluating the curriculum and it is hoped that curriculum guides in all subjects and in each grade will be in every teacher's hands a year from this fall as an aid to more effective teaching.

Our Needs

The most serious needs exist in the grades 7-12

area, both in housing and curricula. As the inadequacy of a small high school becomes more and more apparent as measured both by the school's inefficient curriculum and financial costs, it is clear that the solution is either building a local high school, consolidation through the proposed cooperative high school plan, or sending these students to another high school on a tuition basis. It is your superintendent's professional opinion that the erection of a local high school would not be a practical solution to the problem. The student body would still be small; its curriculum would be limited, and its per pupil costs would remain higher than the state average. The 1958-59 estimated state per pupil high school cost minus transportation costs is \$367. The corresponding local figure is \$443.46.

The practicability of sending pupils to other towns on a tuition basis should be studied, and comparative costs should be made on both an educational and a financial basis.

The proposed cooperative high school plan would benefit us more as we would be able to have voting representation in regards to site, construction, equipment, curriculum, etc., for the new building. I believe, due to existing local situations and the condition of the high school plant and its numerous inadequacies, the proposed cooperative school plan for grades 7-12 should be seriously considered. Grades 7 and 8 are included because the projected enrollments within the next 5 years indicate that these two grades will be large. The following proposals may be considered in order to accommodate these two grades on a local level: the erection of a new building, conversion of the high school, or adding rooms to the Central School. In the event that the latter plan were to be followed, it would be practical to move the shop to the Central School yard.

If the 7th and 8th grades were included in a cooperative plan, the maximum reimbursement to Weare would be 15% greater than if the town provided the extra accommodation by itself. Another advantage in this proposal is that under the proposed cooperative district plan, even though your 7th and 8th grades were housed locally, the cooperative district would be responsible for curriculum, staff, instructional tools, etc. This would guarantee a stronger, more efficient

correlation between these 7th and 8th grades and the new proposed Cooperative High School. Financially this plan would effect reduced per pupil costs for these two grades through greater cooperative district reimbursement and centralized buying etc.

In a larger high school pupils have more advantageous course selection, access to more instructional tools and equipment, better trained, qualified and stable faculties and, through educational grouping of the students, and adjusting the curriculum to individual differences, more efficient results will be obtained.

The educational advantages of a cooperative school are many and completely over-shadow those which could be realized by building a local high school. Dr. Conant's report on "A Study of the American High School" does categorically state that any high school with less than 100 members in its graduating class is too small to adequately serve the educational needs of its community. The local high school has less than 90 enrolled in the entire high school!

Included in the present school warrant is an article requesting a sum of money to be raised to hire an educational consultant to study future enrollments, town growth, and to make an impartial evaluation of the local schools by a staff of qualified experienced experts. He will then submit his recommendations to the citizens for their final approval. The consultant's recommendation may be in two parts: one, a solution to solve our educational needs now and for the next five years; two, an alternate plan which may be used if the preferred solution proves to be too expensive.

Because of Weare's existing school debt and tax rate, I feel it is advisable to give favorable consideration to the proposed study since the town cannot afford impractical and unproductive spending in the future.

The urgency of our problem is acute and decisions cannot be postponed indefinitely. The postponement of these decisions will not only seriously affect the future growth of Weare, but will affect the educational welfare of our children, as any town with an inferior high school will not attract desirable citizens. Your superintendent cannot conceive of delaying action upon these school issues any longer.

Weare may have as good an educational system as the citizens are willing to support.

May I take the opportunity to thank the School Board and citizens of Weare for their cooperation and I hope that we will merit your continued interest, cooperation and support in the future.
