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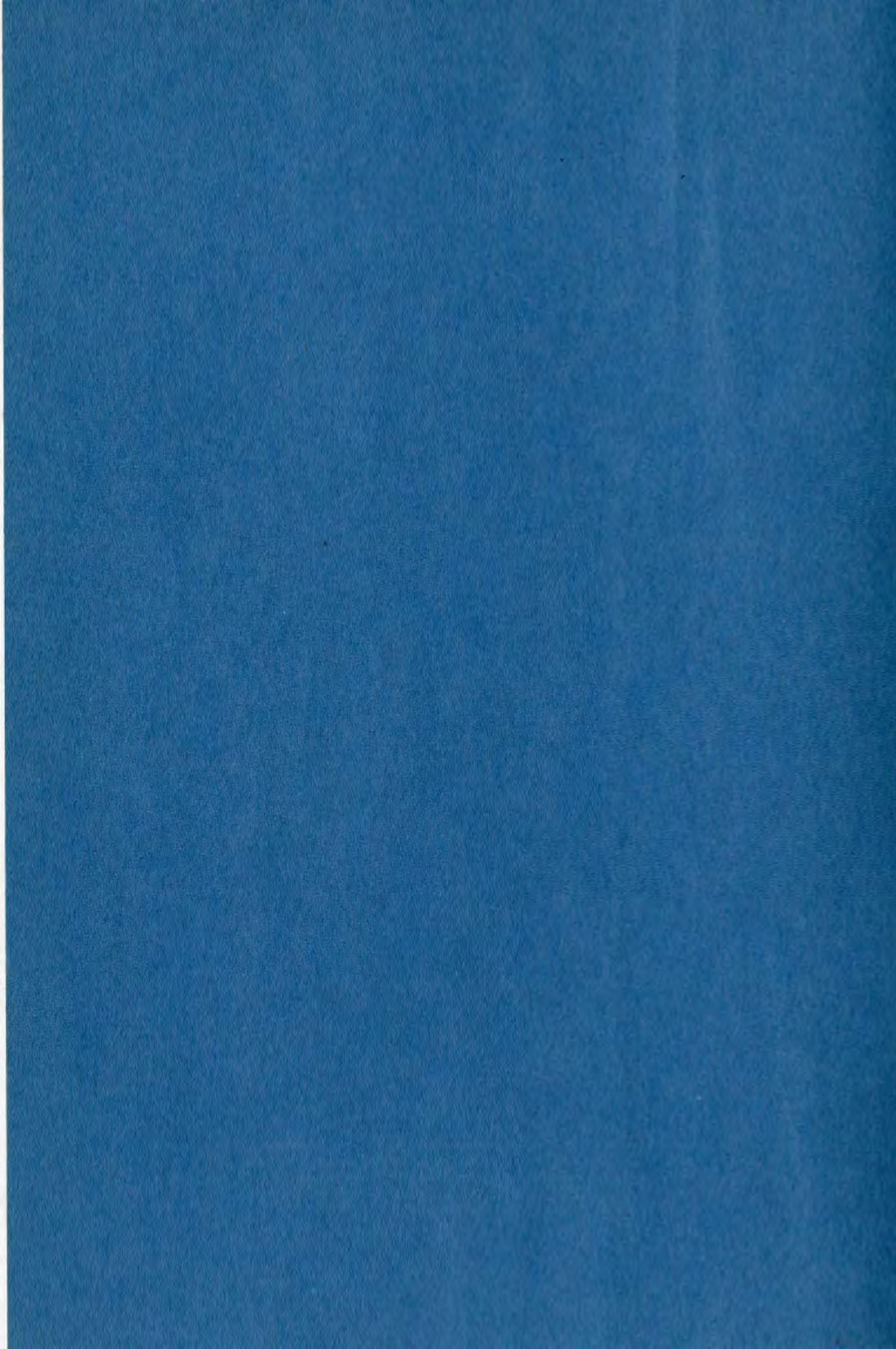

**To the Inhabitants of the Town of Windsor, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:**

You are hereby notified to meet at Woodrow residence in said Windsor on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear reports of Auditors and Agents heretofore chosen and to pass any vote in relation thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing highways and bridges.
5. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid on its highways and raise and appropriate \$28.21 as the town's share.
6. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
7. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for the street light for the ensuing year.

9. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

*To the School Board and Citizens of Windsor:*

I hereby submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

### ORGANIZATION

School Board: Neil Woodrow, Chairman; Charles Nelson, Walter Shanley.

Superintendent of Schools: Stewart V. McCormack.

Transporter: Finley J. Drost.

### PUPIL DATA

Seven pupils are attending the Dole School at the present time, Barbara and Bertha Drost, Caroline, Cynthia and Marshall Strickland, and Lilla and Sally Woodrow. Gloria Woodrow is attending Hillsboro High.

The following pupils maintained perfect attendance for the number of terms indicated during the school year 1944-45: two terms, Sally and Lilla Woodrow; one term, Caroline and Marshall Strickland.

### GENERAL REPORT

The annual report should perhaps give us some kind of picture of the kind of education being provided for our youth from the first year on, but when town meeting comes around we get all "steamed up" over some little item on the Warrant so our over-all problems wait for another year for discussion. Probably the most distressing feature of present day reaction to educational matters is the extreme inertia of the lay-



man. This inertia results in a lack of information which promotes a lack of understanding and a lack of sympathy toward the whole problem of education. Most distressing is the vehemence and ignorance with which views about education are expressed publicly and privately by many prominent people.

The basis of American democracy is that ALL people have value. Each individual has potential abilities, and given a chance, can make a unique contribution to the good of all.

Even from a narrow, selfish point of view, we cannot afford to have an ignorant and suppressed segment in our society. Whether we like it or not, these people are with us. Each individual becomes a producer and a consumer, hence an asset to our economic life, or he fails to produce and becomes a liability. Such persons become expensive liabilities if they have to be institutionalized, when for evidence we consider that America's annual crime bill, exclusive of poverty, is TWELVE billions annually, while her total bill for education is nearer TWO billions annually.

Windsor parents and pupils are to be highly commended for their persistent efforts to maintain good educational standards as evidenced by their travels to the school in Washington every school day. The reports in Washington are that these pupils are well-liked, energetic youngsters who are trying to make the most of their greatest American heritage, the right to, and the duty to, acquire a free education.

The Washington school is well equipped with modern tools of learning and earnest boys or girls should profit greatly by attendance there. Likewise, Hillsboro High has a well-rounded progressive educational program for the older youths.

I wish to call your attention to the accompanying reports which contain pertinent information concerning your school program. Since your youngsters'

health is concerned, I have attached a report of the health program at the Washington school.

In conclusion I wish to thank the school board and parents for their cooperation and hope that I may be of service to any citizen of Windsor.

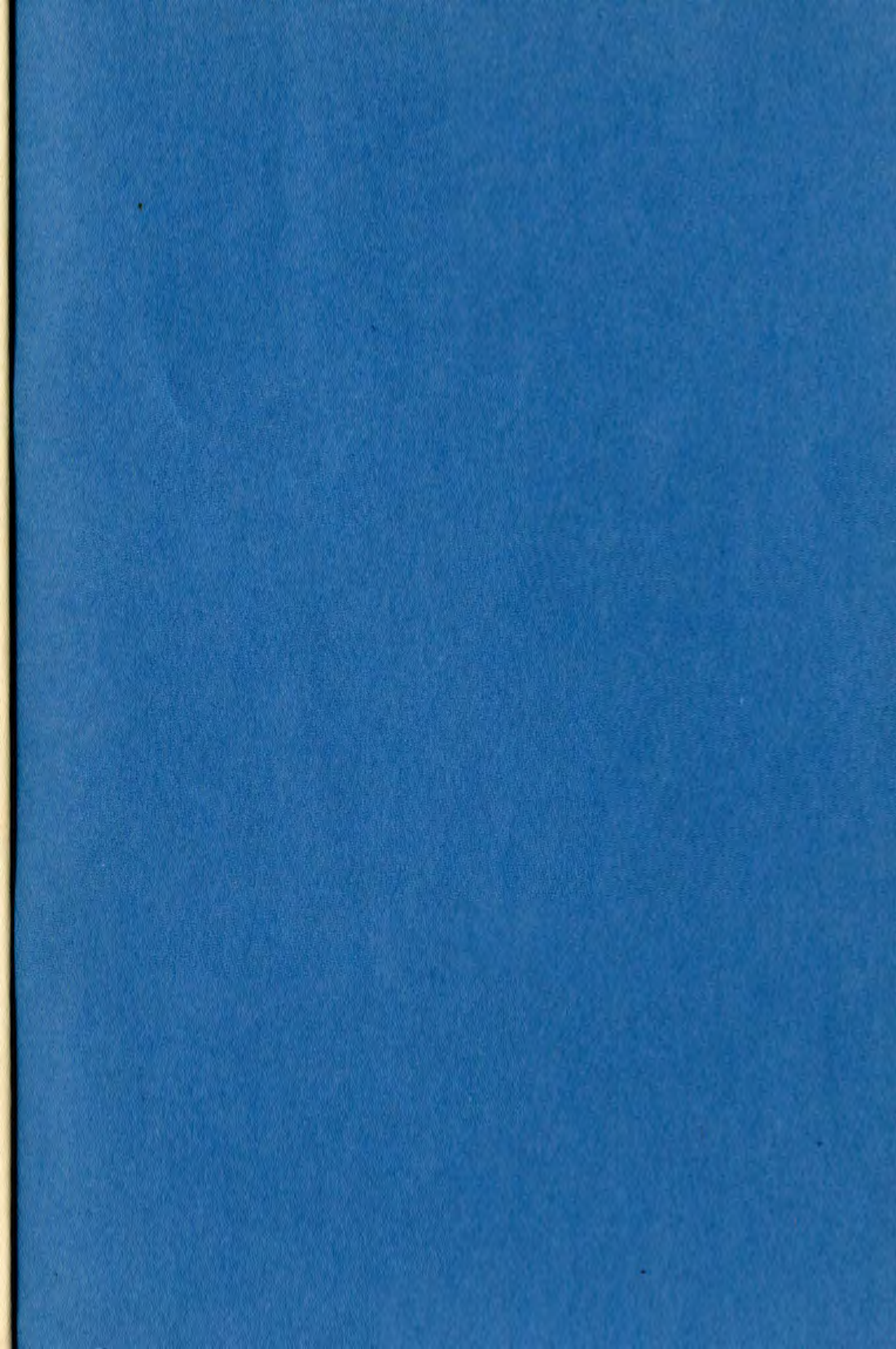
