

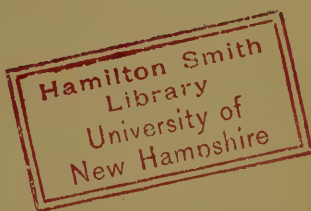

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, as is listed in the Budget.

3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for Laconia hospital (by request).

4. To see if the town will accept \$150.00 from the estate of the late Julius Garner, as a Trust Fund, to care for the lot in Barnstead Parade Cemetery.

5. To see if the Town will vote to allow three per cent discount on all property taxes paid on or before the first Saturday of July next.

To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Barnstead School Board and Citizens:

Herewith I respectfully submit my tenth annual report as superintendent of schools, it being the sixteenth in the series of such reports.

TEACHERS

No changes in the teaching forces occurred during the school year. At the end of the year Miss Skinner resigned as teacher at the South school and Miss Ide was transferred to that school from the Dennett school, which was closed because of the lack of pupils in that district. Because of the large number of pupils in the Shackford's Corner district, that school was opened with Alice L. Powers, a graduate of Plymouth Normal school, as teacher. The following is a list of the teachers for the present school year together with their respective positions, salaries, etc.

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PROMOTIONS

During the school year ending June 30, 1932, one hundred fifteen pupils were promoted to the next higher grade and five only, or 4.2 per cent, failed of promotion. This rate of failure was well below the state average of 7.18 per cent.

The following sixteen pupils received certificates of admission to high school in June: Marjorie Bennett, Gerard Bergeron, Harland Black, Norman Black, Reta Canfield, Kathleen Chandler, Samuel Feuerstein, Louise Gray, Frances Heywood, Altha Kenison, Harry Kenison, Henry Knirsch, Joseph Nutter, Vernol Thompson, Ruth Yeaton, and Frank Ziebarth. Only one of these pupils did not return to school in the fall.

INSTRUCTION

The new system of reading adopted last year for the first grade has proved to be highly satisfactory. This year the system has been continued into the second grade. The children are gaining a power and finding a pleasure in reading that first and second graders have not had before.

The social science series adopted last year for the seventh grade has been extended this year into the eighth grade. If there was ever a time in the history of our country when our boys and girls needed to be taught to think clearly about our social, political and economic problems, it is in this generation. These books that we are using are generally conceded to be the finest textbooks published today dealing with human relationships.

The system of music instruction inaugurated last year is being continued with fine success. The second case of records has been obtained and put into use. We are still handicapped by having only one Victrola for the use of three schools, but by frequently shifting it from one school to another we are getting along fairly well.

Methods of instruction in other subjects are being continued with few changes and I believe the record last year of so few promotion failures indicates the methods in use are truly effective. In this connection I might call attention to the fact that for the first semester this year in Pittsfield High school all of the four highest ranking pupils in scholarship in the four classes, two of the four standing second, and one of the four standing third, were trained in Barnstead schools. I believe Barnstead people may be justly proud of this record.

HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

Forty-four Barnstead tuition pupils, as compared with thirty-five last year, were enrolled in secondary schools last fall as follows:

Alton H. S.: Harlan Black, Norman Black, and Casper Hillsgrove.

Farmington H. S.: Wilson Hier, Catherine Pidgeon, Helen Pidgeon, and Harry Tanner.

Pittsfield H. S.: Marjorie Bennett, Amelia Bunker, Reta Canfield, Mable Cate, Constance Chandler, Helen Chandler, Kathleen Chandler, Dorothy Canfield, Evelyn Cleveland, Stanley Cleveland, Wilbur Crossett, Dorothy Dennett, Ruth Dennett, Dorothy Driscoll, Samuel Feuerstein, Barbara Finlayson, Ralph French, Louise Gray, Frances Heywood, Madeline Hill, Willard Hanson, Alois Jenisch, Richard Jenisch, Rudolf Jenisch, Altha Kenison, Doris Kenison, Dorothy Kidder, Henry Knirsch, Ethel McAllister, Joseph Nutter, Charles Thyng, Harrison Thyng, Vernol Thompson, William Winkley, Earle Yeaton, and Frank Ziebarth.

Of these forty-four pupils two have already dropped out and six more are seniors. There are now twenty-one Barnstead pupils in the eighth grade. From these figures it looks as if at least fifty will be in high school next year, for whom not less than \$4,250 will be needed for tuition. This amount seems to improve a heavy tax burden but I see no way to reduce it unless some relief could be obtained by providing an approved high school offering of one or more years in one of the local schools.

ROLL OF HONOR

The following ten pupils, one more than last year, were neither absent nor tardy during the last school year: (5) Marjorie Bennett, Dorothy Gray; (3) Grace Gray; (2) Marion Gray, Velma Gray, Frances Heywood; (2) Harold Kidder; (2) Lloyd Kidder, Virginia Kidder, and Vilma Knirsch. A figure before a pupil's name indicates the number of consecutive years he has had perfect attendance.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

The report of the school nurse, Rurth B. Whitcomb, shows that many children in school were suffering from correctable physical defects. Twelve were at least ten per cent underweight; seventeen had defective vision; one, defective hearing; sixty-two, defective teeth; sixteen, diseased tonsils; nine, adenoids; seventeen, enlarged glands; two, pediculosis, and seven, skin diseases. During the year the following defects, in addition to the cases of pediculosis and skin diseases, were corrected: Defective vision, six; defective teeth, twelve; diseased tonsils, three, and enlarged glands, one. Three of the six who had their eyesight corrected were furnished with glasses by the State Board of Public Welfare. Those whose defects remain uncorrected are severely handicapped. They cannot enjoy the good health and happiness that is their right, nor can they make full use of their educational opportunities. They are frequently out of school with headaches caused by eye strain, with toothaches from ulcerating teeth, with sore throats due to pus laden tonsils, or with stomach aches due to nervous indigestion or because of exclusion on account of a communicable disease, such as pediculosis or impetigo, which could have been avoided by careful attention to cleanliness. The pupils' losses now due to these poor health handicaps will leave their permanent marks, for an hour spent in agony now with a toothache cannot later be brought back and made an hour of happiness, nor can an hour spent now in ineffective study due to poor eyesight be brought back and used effectively, nor can the lesson lost now be made up later without possibly losing a more valuable lesson then.

These figures show that the average number in the Barnstead schools was greater for the year 1931-32 than for any previous year since superintendent's reports have been kept. Although sickness caused more absence than for the previous year, there was much less tardiness, the number of tardy marks being cut more than one-third.

FINANCES

I wish to add a few words of explanation of the budget for 1933-34. It has been the purpose of your superintendent in figuring out a budget for next year to make estimates as close as possible to actual known needs, realizing that these are times when every true saving must be made. The amounts asked for will not permit operation of your schools without sacrifices but they will permit, by careful planning, the retention of most of the fundamental essentials. The operation of the Shackford's Corner school this year will be accomplished without a cent additional appropriation for it. All expenses will be met from savings on the budgets of last year and this. We were fortunate to have a large cash balance with which to start the year but next year we shall not be so fortunate. The amount of money required to meet the estimated budget is considerably larger than the amount raised last year, even though the budget for the operation of seven elementary school has been cut about \$300 below the estimate last year for the operation of six. This increase is due entirely to the \$1500 increase in the high school tuitions.

As the operation of State aid is difficult to understand, perhaps a words of explanation will help. In order to get State aid Barnstead must raise next year \$4,609.75 for the support of its elementary schools. The estimated minimum charge for high school tuitions next year is \$4250. For these two items, then, \$8859.75 will be needed and with the \$368 for the State required per capita tax \$9,227.75 will need to be available. The difference between this figure and the amount asked for is only \$107.25, which, it is thought, will be needed to go with the cash on hand at the end of the year, the income from trust funds, and the dog tax to pay the salaries and office expenses of the district officers, truant officer, and superintendent.

To help out a bit this year I shall return to the districts in the supervisory union three per cent of the amounts they pay toward my salary, and for the next year I recommend that the superintendent, if his salary remains the same, be allowed to return ten per cent of it.

CONCLUSION

With keen appreciation of the assistance I have received from the school board and all others with whom I have been professionally associated, this report is respectfully submitted.
