1945 TOWN WARRANT

~

Article 1. To choose by ballot and major vote one Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, and two Auditors for ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as are necessary for the support of the poor and other town charges.

Article 4. To raise money for County Tax.

Article 5. To see what sums of money the town will raise for maintenance of Town Roads and Bridges.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,021.50 to be expended on S.A.O. Strafford-Barrington Road.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise \$779.36 for T.R.A.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise sum of money for the Barrington Library.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise \$717.00 for the Lakes Region.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise \$50.00 for the Jr. O.U.A.M. for Memorial Day,

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$3,000.00 in anticipation of Taxes.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, the New Road, so called, leading from the Winkley schoolhouse to the junction of the Fred Stone Road.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 toward a Veterans' Memorial Building.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this town meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT

REPORT OF BARRINGTON FIREMEN'S ASSOCIATION

Due to the increasing fire hazards throughout the town, the Board of Selectmen called a meeting on Sept. 28, 1944, to see what action should be taken to prevent further destruction by fire.

At this meeting the Barrington Firemen's Association was formed to promote means of fighting fire and its prevention. From this Association a volunteer fire department is being organized. It is hoped that by spring when our fire hazard is the greatest we will have an organization equipped and trained to cope with any emergency.

BARRINGTON FIREMEN'S ASSOCIATION

Article 1. Title

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Barrington Firemen's Association.

Article 2. Purpose

Section 1. The purpose of this organization shall be to maintain a permanent organized Fire Department and likewise promote good morale and fellowship in its social activities.

Artcle 3. Membership

Section 1. Any person who has reached the age of fourteen (14) years of age may make application for membership by applying to the Recording Secretary.

Section 2. The Recording Secretary shall present such application for membership at the first regular meeting following its receipt. Section 3. Any applicant for membership receiving seven or more negative votes shall be declared rejected.

Section 4. Should any applicant for membership be rejected all dues paid by him shall be returned.

Article 4

Section 1. No member shall be expelled or suspended from membership except by vote of fifteen or more members present at a regular meeting and who favor such action.

Section 2. A suspended member at the expiration of his period of suspension will have the right of making application for reinstatement providing such application is accompanied by all dues and assessments which may have accrued.

Section 3. A vote of the majority of the members present at a regular meeting will be necessary to reinstate a suspended member.

Section 4. A suspended member shall not enjoy any of the privileges of members in good standing.

Article 5

Section 1. A member entertaining visitors shall be responsible for their actions.

Article 6

Section 1. Members will be required to observe the rules and regulations as set forth in these By-Laws.

Article 7

Section 1. The Officers of this organization shall consist of President (Fire Chief) First, second and third Presidents, (First, Second and Third Fire Chiefs), Recording Secretary and Treasurer. Section 2. The President shall exercise the usual function of a presiding officer at all meetings of the organization.

Section 3. The Vice President shall act for the President should he be unable to attend.

Section 4. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the meetings and likewise collect all dues and assessments and report all delinquents to the President.

Section 5. The Recording Secretary shall pay over to the Treasurer all money received within a period of 30 days from time of receipt.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall keep all the funds of the organization intact, paying all just bills when approved by the President and Recording Secretary.

Section 7. The Treasurer shall give the Recording Secretary a receipt for all funds received from him.

Article 8

Section 1. The President upon assuming office shall appoint a Finance Committee of 3 members including himself and act as chairman of such committee.

Article 9

Section 1. Meetings shall be called by the Recording Secretary the first Wednesday of each month.

Section 2. It shall be the privilege of the President to call a special meeting at such times as he considers necessary.

Article 10

Section 1. Nomination, election and installation of officers shall take place the First Wednesday of October each year.

Article 11

Section 1. Dues shall be \$1.00 per year, payable as soon as possible after October 1st.

On November 7, 1944, the town voted to appropriate from surplus \$1,000 for fire equipment.

The equipment purchased from the appropriated sum consists of a portable Hale pump capable of delivering 150 gallons of water at 100 lbs. pressure, suction lines and nozzles with 1,000 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch double jacket hose to put this pump in operation.

The Firemen's Association from its own funds have purchased an oil tank of 1,020 gallons capacity to mount on a truck given to the Association by Leon Calef. It is hoped to have this tank truck in operation this spring.

This means a lot of hard work and cooperation from all our citizens to make these things an effective fire fighting force.

The officers of this organization are: Fire Chief, Roswell Gaunya; Treasurer, Harlan Calef; Secretary, Harold Taylor.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Barrington:

For the first time since the new building was put into use, it has been necessary to organize a fifth classroom. This step was necessary, not on account of an excessive total number of pupils, but because of an unusually large first grade, numbering as high as 33 pupils. The flexibility of the Barrington School plant, as planned by the Building Committee, stood in good stead. Space for the extra room, sunny and well heated, was found in the practical arts room, with blackboards and tables ready at hand. Some additional furniture has been provided, which will be of permanent value, and window shades have been installed. The present enrollment, while not quite so large as in September, still warrants the continuation of the present organization, which is as follows:

Reports from Dover High School and elsewhere indicate a good proportion of Barrington pupils on the Honor Roll for excellence in studies, compared with the numbers attending.

At the Dental Clinic arranged in April by Miss Margaret Macdonald, School Nurse, and sponsored by the Women's Club, 21 pupils were treated by Dr. C. H. Manning, D.D.S., practically all receiving complete care, with an average of nearly three operations each.

Defense activities included collection of dried milkweed pods in the fall for life jackets to be used at sea.

The School Board's estimate for 1945-46 will call for an unavoidable deficiency appropriation for the current year, made up of increased costs over and above the estimate of a year ago. \$600 of this amount is for transportation. About half of the rest is for net increased instructional costs and the balance for maintenance.

The frame for educational changes after the war is even now being planned. Many members of the Services are already taking government correspondence courses from the Armed Forces Institute. The "G. I. Bill of Rights" makes liberal provision for re-educating the handicapped veterans and completing the education of those who might have been studying in schools and colleges except for their induction.

Educational leaders are advocating the raising of the compulsory age limit to 18 years, with public education available on the junior college level or in regional trade schools. It is likely that a considerable amount of work-experience for young people will be combined with their academic training, as time goes on.

In our own state, some of the forward steps in school policy advocated by superintendents include a minimum salary limit for teachers, state aid for rural high school transportation (also supported by the state Grange), restoration of an adequate number of supervisory unions, fixing of salaries of State Board of Education administrative officers by the Board itself, and retirement provisions for superintendents as well as other state employees. Many of these measures could be provided for in an orderly way by means of allocating a reasonable millage proportion of the state tax for state aid to school districts and other needs of statewide public education.

After the war, it is more than likely that the government will require a year of universal military training. Shall this be a full year of strictly military training at some fixed time, say age 17 regardless of high school graduation, or will there be an option as to time. place, auspices, and type of training? Shall this requirement include girls as well as boys, and will it make provision for the 40 per cent of rejectees as well as those who are fit? Will all training be in military establishments, or will at least part of it be in civilian schools and colleges, factories, business establishments, hospitals, and summer camps? Will the program provide for a wide class of subjects valuable in both military and civil life, such as science and mathematics. languages, vocational and technical training, aeronautics, radio, nursing, information, and supply? Will the federal government utilize local facilities and encourage further development of education within the state, or will it go to the tremendous expense of setting up and

maintaining a parallel system of education? It is for the American People to discuss these questions and make their wishes known.

HISTORY OF BARRINGTON

Barrington is one of the most picturesque towns in this state. It is bounded by the towns and cities of Strafford, Rochester, Dover, Madbury and Lee.

This town was named for a British ship named "Barrington" which anchored at Portsmouth, very much in need of repairs. This meant work for the ship builders there and not having the necessary timbers there for the job, a crew of men under Captain Cate was sent up beyond what is known as the two mile streak to cut large oak timbers. Capt. Cate and the proprietors made a bargain with the settlers and journeyed for the timbers. He efficiently did his task in getting the timbers and hauled them with oxen to Dover and floated them down the river to Portsmouth where they were used for repairs on the ship named "Barrington." In recognition of this act that town was given a tract of land west of the Dover line which now includes the towns of Barrington and Strafford. The date of this charter for the town of Barrington was May 8, 1722.

The town of Barrington was chartered by proclamation in the name of George I, "King of Great Britain, France and Ireland and dated May 10, 1722. It was signed by Samuel Shute, Governor of the province of New Hampshire. There were many restrictions in the charter, and the proprietors were strict in their terms. It granted all such subjects as were Inhabitants of our Town of Portsmouth, within our province of New Hampshire, who paid rates in said town for four years last paid, to be divided among them in proportion to their respective town rates, which they paid the year year last past." In addition to the territory granted to the tax payers of Portsmouth, the new town included the two mile streak which extended from Rochester to 66

Nottingham line adjoining Madbury and Lee. There were three important conditions in this grant:

1. "That they build fifty dwelling houses and settle a family in each within seven years, and break up three acres of ground for each settlement, and plant or sow the same within seven years."

2. "That a meeting house should be built for the Public worship of God within the seven years."

3. "That two hundred acres of land be reserved for a Parsonage two hundred acres for the first minister, and one hundred acres for a school."

There was one clause in the charter which was particularly interesting—if an Indian war should occur during the seven years, the proprietors should have the seven years following the close of the war in which to fulfill the conditions of this charter.

It appears from most all records that the first settlements in Barrington were made in the Two Mile Streak between 1732-1740. In 1747 there were sixteen families and upwards of ninety inhabitants who asked the Provincial Governor for protection against the Indians. From all available records there were never any reports of Indian attacks in this town. However, due to persistence, the first town meeting of the settlers was called by Capt. William Cate and held at his home.

Capt. Mark Hunking, son of Col. William Hunking, of Portsmouth was born in 1700. Being the son of a famous sea captain he made many trips to the Orient. On one of his many sailing trips, he purchased a jet black Negro girl, who was then eleven years old. This child came with the Hunking family to settle in Barrington. Capt. Hunking built a garrison to protect his family from raids. It was on an elevation a few rods north of where the Calef Road crosses the town road near Winkley's Pond. Capt. Hunking had rheumatism in his old age and was unable to move about, so he had trucks put under his arm chair and in this chair, Aggie, the slave girl, wheeled him about the house and premises. Records show that Capt. Hunking died in 1750 and was buried on the south side of the Calef Road. Aggie spent the remainder of her life with several different families in town. She lived to be about a hundred years old; over her grave in Pine Grove Cemetery is a marker erected by the Marjory Sullivan Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. This marker is one of few ever erected by white people to the memory of a slave. Capt. Hunking had another negro slave, Richard, as appears in Dr. Jeremy Belknap's record of marriages. In 1790 the census does not report any slaves in town.

On account of disagreement among the owners the Hunking garrison was allowed to go to ruin, but, a part of it was standing in 1899. In 1832, when the house was in good condition, one of Barrington's most distinguished sons was born in it—Col. Daniel Hall—who later lived in Dover.

Another garrison was built by Capt. William Cate on what was known as "Hard Scrabble Hill." That house was taken down by Thomas Wright Hale, who owned it. It had been in a dilapidated condition for several years. Mr. Hale regretted too late, when he ordered the historic house to be taken down.

Both garrison sites are appropriately marked with tablets erected by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

In the beginning of the early settlements various names were given to different localities to inform people in what section of town they resided. Along the southwestern border of town was Ireland, France, Canaan, Bumfagin and Wild Cat Road. Other names were Mellago Section, Smoke Street, Hard Scrabble and Green Hill.

In various histories of town is the story of the corn famine which occurred in 1816. James Hayes had planted some ten acres of corn which yielded abundantly. Mr. Hayes sold the corn for one dollar per peck and became rich as the result. But, alas soon after he became rich, he died. James, the son, led his aged mother a worry as he was continuously asking her for more and more of the hoarded money. One evening while James and his friends were having a party, his mother scooped up a large share of the silver in her apron, rushed out of the house, and wandering in the darkness, dug a hole and buried the silver. A few days later neither she nor the neighbors, whom she anxiously asked to aid her, could locate the money. Nor can I find records to show that it has ever been found.

A noted locality during the eighteenth century and early nineteenth century was Leathers City. It, however, disappeared from the map several years ago and most of the houses are in ruin. The people living there were noted for their manufacture of various kinds of baskets which they sold in some of the larger cities. During the latter part of the nineteeth century most of the basket makers had their names changed and gave up basket making with their names.

The first town meeting of the settlers was called by Capt. Cate and held in his own home as there was no appropriate meeting house. The first meeting house was located at the foot of Waldron's Hill. This location proved inconvenient for the settlers, so the building was torn down and later moved to property owned by Samuel and Nathan Foss.

The Congregational Church of Barrington was organized in 1755 and Rev. Prince, a blind man, was pastor

for the first thirteen years. Later a Baptist Church was formed in the northwesterly part of town and still later another Free Baptist Church was formed. A few Methodist and Friend's religious meetings were held in the early days of settlements.

In 1821 the town was divided and the northwestern half was incorporated as Strafford.

This town has several places of interest as it has many rivers and ponds. Stone House Pond is a favorite place of pleasure seekers, as on the north western shore rises a perpendicular ledge of great height. Devil's Den is another place of interest along with Ayer's Pond, Nippo Pond, North River Lake, Mendum's Pond and Swain's Pond. The Isinglass River is one of the largest rivers in town.

Barrington boasts one of the centralized schools which was built to replace several of the smaller schools in various sections of town. Also, the town library is well worth recognition, having some of the most recent books.
