

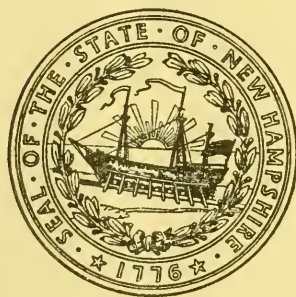

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

CARROLL, SS.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett in the County of Carroll in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at Nine o'clock in the forenoon, and until Six o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sums of money called for in the budget as prepared by the Selectmen.

ART. 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary sums in anticipation of taxes.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through the Tax Collector's deeds.

ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid as Town Road Aid, and will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars for same.

ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars to provide adequate protection due to war emergency.

ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and

appropriate the sum of Ninety Eight Dollars toward the support of the White Mountains Region Association.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell, to the highest bidder, the Covered Bridge over the Saco River, just West of Glenwood-on-the-Saco, provided that the Selectmen may refuse to consider bids which do not appear to be of a reasonable amount of money.

ART. 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SIR:

The Selectmen of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire, respectfully petition you for authority to hold a special town meeting in said town of Bartlett under the provisions of Chapter 56, Laws of N. H., 1927.

The purpose of this special town meeting is to see if the town will vote for the issuance of serial notes in the amount of ten thousand dollars, to run ten years, under authority of Chapter 154, Laws of N. H., 1941.

The reason for this note issue is the accruing of a deficit over a period of several years, due to these specific causes:

A. *Expenditures Without Appropriation.*

1. The sudden demand for payment of School District notes amounting to \$3,500, which the town, as the ultimate source of revenue, paid by borrowing, has constituted a liability.
2. The so-called Wood Job, in which the town, with the approval of the citizens, operated a wood-cutting project to combat unemployment. As this was a relief measure it was operated on a daily pay roll basis regardless of the production element and while over six thousand dollars was paid to the workers as wages a deficit of one thousand dollars resulted.

3. The Hurricane and Flood emergency of 1938-39 necessitated the expenditure of twelve hundred dollars.
4. It is customary to appropriate at a given town meeting sufficient funds to cover the outlay for snow removal for the preceding fiscal period. In 1939 snow removal cost the town \$4,508.12 and the budget of 1940 provided only \$3,000.00 to pay for it.
5. With the general approval of the citizens, the Stillings place was purchased to obviate the necessity of running a school bus to this isolated spot with its concomitant up-keep of road. Seven hundred dollars was expended for this purpose.

B. *Appropriations Exceeded*

1. In 1940 one thousand dollars was appropriated for Town Maintenance. This amount was known to be insufficient, but certain sponsors advocated that amount as a "deterrent gesture" against over-spending. Conditions called for the expenditure of \$2,553 83.

These liabilities give a round figure of \$9,462 00. To some extent this amount has been reduced by applying overlay unexpended balances to the deficit.

We have not raised the tax rate because it would put too great a burden on struggling tax payers. Our valuation is approximately \$1,000,000, and each \$1000 to be raised would increase the tax rate by one point. Public opinion was against this method especially as we were borrowing at the rate of 1% or less.

There is also an old note of \$2,700 for bridges which is held by a local bank at 5% per annum. We wish to retire that by the proposed serial note transaction.

This method of procedure has been recommended and

sanctioned by the State Tax Commission (through Harold Fowler), has been approved by many leading citizens and seems reasonable and desirable to us.

To the Citizens and School Board of Bartlett:

For the sake of the record the following changes in the teaching staff may be reported. To succeed Helen Chambers in Grades 4-5-6 Miss Mary Ellen Flaherty graduate of Gorham Normal School was elected by the Board and Miss Mary Dodge a graduate of Washington State Normal School was elected to succeed Miss June DuGay.

I have been very much interested and pleased with the arrangement in your High School. It is rather unique but very effective. If such teachers as you now have can be retained I would suggest that the arrangement be continued at least for the duration. The elementary schools seem to me to be in excellent shape and the Intervale building is one of the finest two-room buildings that I have ever seen.

Everywhere I go, I am impressed by the evidences of the ability and educational leadership of your Superintendent, Mr. John H. Fuller.

The budget submitted by the School Board is predicated you the belief that Bartlett wishes to keep its schools if possible up to the same high level of efficiency as at present.
