You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Bridgewater on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Snow Removal.
- 11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Snow Removal Equipment Fund.
- 12. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to Pine Blister Rust Control and make the necessary appropriation.
- 13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Old Home Day.
- 14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 15. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discounting all Taxes (excepting Poll taxes) paid between certain time limits, to fix said time limits and the rate of discount.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

#### To the School Board and Citizens of Bridgewater:

I have the honor to present my fourth annual school report. The most important school events since my last report are probably the two graduation exercises held in the River Road School, and in the Hill School last June. Diplomas were presented to four graduates namely. Marcus Sargent, Verton Gilpatric, Beatrice Cass, and Bernice Wiser. Considering the fact that this year we have graduates in the three schools, it would be a good idea if we could have one common program. Separate programs are not so interesting because they are smaller, they attract less people, they display less talent, they come at a time when the superintendent is overtaxed with many duties all crowded into one week over the six town of the supervisory union, and they cost more money.

Last summer the roofs of the three schools were substantially repaired. The interiors of the Hill and the River Road schools were much improved. Black board space was added to all the schools. A few items still remain unprovided for, such as more modern school room furniture, suitable places for the children's lunch boxes, jacketed stoves, and improved toilets.

This year we are again maintaining three schools. The school district seems to be satisfied with the arrangement. In the three schools we have an enrollment of forty-two pupils, as compared with twenty-nine last year, an increase of over forty per cent. This situation has presented some difficult problems. We have not had sufficient funds for books and supplies. It has been difficult to accommodate twenty-two pupils in the River Road school, a building barely large enough to

accommodate fifteen children, and with one toilet used by both boys and girls. It is not easy to forecast school population. The fact remains, however, that it is up to the school district to provide educational facilities for whatever number of children present themselves to be educated. Considering the present day economic trends it seems safe to assume that the increase we have will be of a permanent nature. Definite plans should be made at the next meeting of the school district in March to solve the problem before next fall.

It goes without saying that the improvements called for mean the expenditure of substantial sums of money. Be it remembered that we are faced with the problem of educating the children of Bridgewater for present day living, different from the times when our schoolhouses were first built.

One of the greatest drawbacks to a school is the child who is absent from school unnecessarily. Such children take up the time of the teachers and that of the other pupils when the regular work has already been done. The school with many absences establishes a poor record. In the end it is the child who must pay the penalty, and perhaps experience a belated sense of regret for lost opportunity. The teachers, and the parents in particular, hold the key to the situation. Unselfish cooperation on the part of every one concerned is ever a present need.
