The delegation was called to order by its Chairman, James E. French. After roll call by the Clerk, a quorum being present, the following business was transacted :

On motion of Lewando, of Wolfeboro, it was voted to raise the sum of \$16,000.00 to defray the expenses of the County for the year 1898.

On motion of Philbrick, of Freedom, it was voted to raise the sum of \$15,000.00 to defray the expense of the County for the year 1899.

The financial statement shows the county free and clear of debt which must please the tax payers of the county.

The county buildings are in first class condition throughout, and have recently been thoroughly inspected by the State Board of Health, who having no criticism to make, complimented the county that for facilities and apparent comfort of the inmates it stands second to no similar institution in the state.

The stock upon the county farm has been carefully overhauled, the oldest cows have been exchanged for younger and more profitable ones, the old work horses replaced by a young and heavy pair. These changes together with the purchase of some needed tarm implements and the partial failure of the farm crops, made the cost of maintaining the farm slightly in excess of last year.

The farm and almshouse have been under the supervision of Mr. and Mrs. Meloon, who by their judicious management and careful attention to the needs of the poor people under their control have fully sustained their enviable reputation.

We wish to thank their able assistants, who, by their faithfulness, have in no small degree contributed to the welfare of the county and comfort of its poor.

We are pleased to state that we have had the support and co-operation of the selectmen in the various towns in keeping the expense of supporting the county's poor away from the farm to a very low figure.

We earnestly invite every citizen of the county to visit the county farm, and inspect the management, of which they are taxed to support. Respectfully submitted,

During the year the Grand Jury has found twentythree indictments, as follows :

At the April term there were three criminal jury trials; one for breaking, entry and larceny, and one for horse stealing; sentence, five and seven years. One for keeping for sale spirituous liquor, respondent acquitted. One case was continued. In the other liquor cases, respondents were sentenced in three cases, costs and fines paid. Two continued, respondent being in jail. Two continued by advice of prosecuting complainant, and one nol-prosequi. One appeal was entered and continued.

On the continued docket, an appeal case was marked : Not to go forward. Four adultery cases, the three respondents never having lived in the State, were marked : Not to go forward, nisi. Two liquor cases were continued, and one aggravated assault case.

At the October term there was one criminal jury trial under the tramp law; sentence fifteen months. In the burglary case, one respondent received sentence of five years, in addition to sentence of two years for horsestealing (formerly imposed and suspended during good behavior); the other respondent received sentence of one year and one day, sentence suspended during good behavior. The accessory case was nol-prossed, as the respondent became State witness. In one case the

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respondents received sentence of six months each, marked : On payment of costs mittimus not to issue till called for by the Solicitor. Costs paid.

In the liquor cases, one respondent was sentenced for keeping for sale spirituous liquor, fine and costs paid; case v. same respondent for keeping for sale lager beer; no costs, nol-prossed. One respondent was sentenced for keeping for sale lager beer, fine and costs paid. One respondent was sentenced for keeping for sale lager beer, second offense, fine and costs paid; same respondent was sentenced for keeping for sale lager beer, second offense, marked: On payment of costs, mittimus not to issue during good behavior. Costs paid. One respondent was sentenced for keeping for sale spirituous liquor, fine and costs paid; same respondent was sentenced for keeping for sale lager beer, no costs; marked: Mittimus not to issue during good behavior.

On the continued docket, in one case, two respondents were sentenced, for assault, twenty dollars and costs each; marked: On payment of costs in thirty days, mittimus not to issue during good behavior, costs \$145.25, paid. One case continued; one appeal dismissed. Of the liquor cases, three were nol-prossed. In two of which the respondents reside out of the State; the other was for keeping malt liquor for sale, necessitating expert evidence. One was marked: On payment of costs within thirty days not to go forward. Costs paid. One, where the respondent, who had left the county, was sentenced, was marked: On payment of costs, mittimus not to issue during good behavior. Costs paid.

The county has been a party to one civil suit only, which was reserved on agreed statement of fact, the county being plaintiff, in which the defendent prevailed. Costs \$9.92.
