Commissioners' Report.

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

Again we present to the tax payers of the county, our annual report in accordance with the New Hampshire statutes, also the reports of the Superintendent of the County Farm, Physician, Chaplain, Treasurer, Solicitor, Sheriff, Jailor, Clerk of the Supreme Court and Auditors.

The financial standing of the county we omit in this report, as the auditors give a full and complete report, and if given here would only be a repetition as regards the amount of the indebtedness of the county, December 31, 1897.

Permanent improvements the past year include the building of a new horse barn, fifty by eighty feet with the basement finished for the accommodation of one hundred hogs, refitting the steam pipes, repairing and furnishing long shed for cow stable which accommodates twenty-four cows.

Again we report an increase in number of cows and young cattle over one year ago—from ninety to one hundred and three head. The freshet early in July flooded the island and damaged the hay to such an extent to make it unusable, thereby necessitating the feeding it to stock on the farm. The amount received from calves, creamery and profit on sale of cows have been quite satisfactory during the past year.

Owing to the change in the laws in regard to settle-

ment of paupers, a large number of those supported by towns became county charges, yet we have to report only slight increase in the cost of supporting paupers off the farm from one year ago.

The new jail, thirty-two by forty-eight feet, containing sixteen cells, office and two strong rooms, is ready for putting in the steel works. It was contracted and will be completed, we think, at a cost of ten thousand dollars. Over three thousand six hundred dollars have now been paid on its construction and one-half could have been paid the present year, after paying the bonds and interest, and not increased the county debt. We now anticipate the jail can be completed and paid for without issuing new bonds or increasing the liabilities of the county.

The Superintendent, Matron and their assistants have shown the same interest in the welfare and comfort of the inmates in the past year, and have cheerfully assisted in carrying out needed reforms to make their lot as happy as possible.

We desire to call your notice to Chapter 27, Sections 9, 10, 11, and Chapter 85, Sections 1, 2, 4, 5, 14 and 15 of the Public Statutes, and inform you that no bills will be PAID for more than thirty days' support previous to the proper affidavits being furnished us according to the requirements of these statutes. The evidence as to the settlement must show the name, age, place of present or former residence of the applicant since 1880; the amount of property owned by and taxed to them in any place since Jan. 1, 1880; whether married or single; if married, when and to whom; if under the age of thirty years, the name and place and residence and parents; the amount of property owned by and taxed to either of them; if they have received any aid, when and by whom; where they have lived

since 1880, and any other material facts bearing upon the matter.

We also call your attention to Chapter 58, Section 1, Pamphlet laws of 1883, entitled, "An act for the punishment of parents who neglect to provide for the support of their minor children," and to report any such case at once to the commissioners, so that such delinquents may be compelled to perform their duty to their legitimate offspring.

We would also call your attention to Chapter 84, Sections 9, 10 and 11, Public Statutes, in relation to aid furnished to indigent soldiers, and providing for entrance to the Soldiers' Home in certain cases, and request you to see that the provisions of said statutes are complied with before furnishing aid at the expense of the County.

You are requested to present to the County Commissioners during the first week of each term of Court all legal claims which said town has against said county for the support of county paupers.

You are also requested to look after the interests of said paupers, and be SURE that each pauper gets a dollar's worth of goods for a dollar, and settle no bills that are not particularly itemized as regards weight, quantity and price.

In accordance with Chapter 30, Section 1, Public Statutes, the Superintendent of the County Farm shall make up his report to January 1st, annually, and also Section 2 of said chapter requires that the superintendent's report shall contain, in addition, a list of the paupers actually supported at the Farm, and the number of weeks each was so supported, also a statement of the average

cost per week for each pauper, with an explanation of the basis upon which said calculations were made.

The whole number of persons supported and partially supported for the year ending December 31, 1897 was (158) one hundred and fifty-eight.

The number of weeks' board is ascertained by taking the number of days between the day of admittance and the day of departure of each individual, and dividing that number by seven, it gives the number of weeks each individual has been so supported.

The whole cost of supporting paupers at the farm for the year ending December 31, 1897, is \$7,512.48, and this sum divided by the whole number of weeks board furnished viz: 5,720 gives \$1.31 as the price per week.

During the winter and early spring months the inmates suffered, in common with the community at large, from a severe epidemic of La Grippe, which in several cases ended in Pneumonia.

This amongst so many aged and debilitated people would necessarily increase the death rate somewhat. During the last six months of the year the general health has been excellent. I have been greatly aided in the discharge of my duties by the superintendent and matron and their efficient corps of assistants.

The convention met in room two State House, February 17th, at 1:30 P. M., on call of chairman, twenty-three present. On motion of Mr. Hosford, David A. Grant of Lyme was elected county auditor and on second ballot Henry W. Herbert of Rumney was elected auditor. Both gentlemen being present they took the oath of office. Voted to adjourn for one week on motion of Mr. Hosford.

The convention met agreeable to adjournment February 24th, 1897, in room two State House at 1:30 P. M. Roll call showed thirty-seven members present. On the proposition to build a new jail, remarks were made by Bridgman and Huntington of Hanover. Day of Lebanon and Woodman of Lebanon in opposition, also Hosford of Monroe.

Mr. Green for county commissioners, briefly stated some of the facts in favor of a new jail. Mr. Bellows of Littleton offered the following resolution: "Resolved, that the matter of building a jail be left in the hands of the county commissioners and that they be authorized to build one, if in their judgment a suitable one can be built for a sum not exceeding \$12,000 and that it be built at the county farm, and that bonds be issued at the rate of (\$1000.00)

one thousand dollars per year, at a rate of interest not exceeding four per cent per annum. First payment on bonds to begin at the expiration of ten years from the time issued."

On a rising vote the above resolution was defeated, thirteen voting yes, and eighteen no. Mr. Hosford introduced the following resolution: "Resolved, that the county commissioners are hereby authorized to investigate the question of building a new jail at the county farm or at Woodsville. That the sum of five hundred dollars be appropriated for the expense of same and for plans of new jail"

Upon the foregoing resolution nineteen voted in favor and none against. Mr. Bellows offered the following motion: "To take the sense of the convention as to whether jail should be at Woodsville or county farm." On a rising vote, twenty-five voted in favor of county farm, five voted in favor of Woodsville.

Mr. Bellows of Littleton offered the following substitute for the resolution offered by him January 13th: "Resolved, that the county commissioners be and hereby are authorized and instructed to cause the records now in the Register of Deed's office, to be re-indexed in such modern form of indexes as they may select and that hereafter in indexing deeds, mortgages, etc., the same form of index be used, and that the sum of one thousand dollars be and hereby is appropriated toward the work." On the foregoing resolution with reference to re-indexing records after discussion, Mr. Hosford moved to indefinitely postpone which was lost, four voting to postpone, twenty-five voting not to postpone. On the adoption of the resolution twenty-four voted in affirmative, four voted in negative.

On the recommendation of the county commissioners, it was voted to raise by taxation the sum of (\$50,400.00)

fifty thousand, four hundred dollars for the year 1897, and (\$45,200.00) for the year 1898.

Agreeable to the foregoing petition a meeting was called March 18th, 1897, at one o'clock P. M., in room No. two, State House. Roll call showed all but two present. Mr. Huntington of Hanover brought up the matter of indexing records, and S. B. Page of Haverhill explained the objections to the resolutions as passed February 24th. After remarks by several members, Mr. Hosford moved to reconsider vote taken to re-index records. Carried.

A resolution was offered as a substitute and carried. After being amended, said resolution as amended reads as follows:

"Resolved, that the sum of one thousand dollars be raised and appropriated for the purpose of re-indexing the records in the office of the Register of Deeds in such form as shall be approved by a committee chosen by this convention to consist of the county commissioners and two others were selected by the convention, who shall serve without compensation. That such re-indexing shall be done by the Register of Deeds for the time being and that his compensation therefor shall be determined by the county commissioners for the time being and all bills for service or supplies paid from the county treasury upon warrants by them approved."

S. B. Page and Charles R. Gibson both of Haverhill were chosen to act with the county commissioners in carrying out the provisions of the foregoing resolution on reindexing records. On motion of Mr. Clement of Warren the convention voted to reconsider the vote taken February 24th, regarding the building of a new jail, twenty-three voting to reconsider and seventeen against.

Mr. Hosford of Monroe moved that the convention reconsider the vote whereby the convention voted to raise money to defray the county charges for 1897 and 1898. Lost. Mr. Bishop of Bethlehem offered a resolution on building new jail which after amendments were adopted, was carried. Said resolution provides that the jail be built at county farm, not to exceed \$12,000 in excess of amount received for old jail and provides for the issuing of bonds payable in ten years, and that a committee consisting of J. E. Henry and H. W. Herbert and of county commissioners for the time being be chosen to construct said jail. Said resolution as amended is attached to this page entire.

"Resolved, that the county commissioners of the county of Grafton be and are hereby authorized to locate and build a jail and House of Correction at the county farm in the town of Haverhill, provided that the cost to the county shall not exceed \$12,000 in excess of the amount received for present jail property. Also the county commissioners

are hereby authorized to sell at public or private sale, and convey the jail property now belonging to said county of Grafton, situated at Haverhill Corner, and to use the avails of said sale toward building the new jail and House of Correction. And they are also hereby authorized to issue the bonds of said county to the amount of \$12,000, such bonds to draw interest at not more than four per cent per annum and be payable \$2,000 yearly after ten years or the whole \$12,000 shall be payable at the end of ten years at the option of the county commissioners, the avails of such bonds to be used to build and equip such jail and House of Correction.

And that a committee consisting of James E. Henry of Lincoln and Henry W. Herbert of Rumney and of the county commissioners for the time being, be chosen to construct said jail and that said Henry and Herbert shall receive the same compensation as is paid the county commissioners for their services and expenses in the matter."

Voted to adjourn.

Auditors' Report.

We have carefully examined the accounts of the County Treasurer, Commissioners and Superintendent of the County Farm, have inspected every order and receipt, verified every computation, and find them correctly east and properly vouched.

When we audited the accounts in July we suggested that, so far as possible, all money received by the Superintendent of the Farm should be turned over to the Treasurer and that expenditures at the farm should only be made on orders drawn by the Commissioners. This suggestion was made, not because we saw anything in the accounts of the Superintendent to criticice, but because we thought that the Commissioners should assume the direct responsibility for all expenditures of that kind. The report for the last six months will show that the Commissioners have complied with the suggestion.

Bonds, coupons and notes reported by the Treasurer as paid were cancelled in the presence of the Auditors and County Commissioners.

A few words in regard to the county farm and its management may be of interest. From our examination we judge that it is the purpose of the Commissioners and of the Superintendent and his wife to render the inmates of the almshouse as comfortable as they can be under all the circumstances. While they have shown a due regard for economy and the best financial interests of the county, they have not sought to demonstrate on how little the lives of the

unfortunates committed to their care could be sustained.

The supplies have been well selected and purchased at the lowest market price. The farm is in an excellent state of cultivation, and its productiveness has been very largely increased in the last few years, necessitating the erection of a new barn and alterations in some other buildings. This work has been well and substantially done.

The cattle and swine are all in fine condition, indicating the best of care, and we saw no signs of waste or extravagance.

We examined the property there and are convinced that the valuations given in the appraisal recently made by the Commissioners are fair and conversative.

On the whole we think that the people of the county have little occasion to criticise the present management of the county farm.
