

TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Grafton, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Grafton on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to remain in the same highway district system as in 1924, or return to the Road Agent system.
- 4. To choose a member of the board of Trustees of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.
- 5. To choose a member of the board of Library Trustees for the ensuing three years.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges including the amount of ¼ of 1 per cent as required by law.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of cutting bushes and railing embankments along the highways.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2500 to apply on F. A. No. 194 project, contract 1923.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1028 for Trunk Line maintenance, thereby obtaining State Aid of \$3,084.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000 for Trunk Line construction thereby obtaining State Aid of \$3,000.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$400 thereby obtaining State Aid of \$100 for the purpose of controlling White Pine Blister Rust.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day Association.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the Tramp House.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 3 per cent on all property taxes paid on or before the last Saturday in July.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make short time loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to release the Treasurer and his bondsmen of all liability of money deposited in the Peoples Trust Co., to credit of the Town of Grafton. Also to see what action the Town will take in regards to the check held by Leon O. Robinson on the Peoples Trust Co.
- 17. To see what Bank the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to deposit funds of the Town in, in order to avoid his personal liability by loss of funds by failure of any Bank.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

Andover, N. H., February 7, 1925.

To the School Board and the Citizens of the Grafton School District:

I hereby submit my sixth annual report as Superintendent of your schools. This report includes the roll of perfect attendance and the statistical table for 1923-1924.

At the Depot school we suffered a great loss by the death in March of Mrs. Bernice Clarke. The year was finished out by Mrs. Clark's husband, Mr. Frank Clarke. Although the term was broken into by a succession of contagious diseases, the prescribed work was covered and the eighth grade pupils, Dorothy Heath, Velma Leonard and Carl Armstrong passed to Canaan High School, where they are doing good work this year, as is Rita Haskins of the Gifford Hill school, now in Pinkerton Academy. At the opening of the fall term, Mrs. M. E. F. Smith came to the Depot from the Center school, and Mrs. Laura Cadoo, a graduate of the Thetford Academy Training Course, with a summer session at the Vermont University, and three years' successful experience, succeeded Mrs. Smith at the Center. After absence during the winter term, Mrs. Nancy Wells returned last spring to the East and she was retained for the present year. Mrs. Ethel Haskins continues at Gifford Hill and Mrs. Marion Heath came to West Grafton.

In our testing program we used in all the schools Myers' Mental Measure, a test that can be used for all grades, and is, in this way preferable to the National Intelligence Test used in former years, which, as it necessitates reading ability, can be used only in the upper grades. Standard tests were given also in the various school subjects. These tests help in de-

termining pupils ability and achievement; and for the

five schools the cost was only a few dollars.

The attendance of pupils would be much better if parents fully realized how absences retard progress. Teachers work constantly to overcome the indifference One hundred and three tardinesses are better than the 234 of the previous year, yet this record

should be improved upon.

A few new text books have been introduced within the year, Hoyt & Peet's "Everyday Arithmetic," one of the most used arithmetic texts in the state for grades 3 to 8, and Elson's "Good English" series for the same grades, which the teachers are finding a great help in English work. The revised edition of Brigham & McFarlane

geographies has been supplied where needed.

The outstanding job of the year was the remodeling at Gifford Hill. The partition between entry and woodshed and the school room was removed to make the room larger, and a new wood shed with toilets was built on, taking the place of the former disreputable outbuilding. Good light and proper seating make this now an attractive and comfortable room.

Some real health work planned for this year has been from necessity postponed until the spring term. As a result of one friendly visit of a nurse with the Superintendent, one child was exambined at the Canaan clinic. and being found tubercular has been placed in the Pem-

broke Sanatorium.

That citizens might know better what is being done in the schools a Union District community meeting was held in Barney's Hall, on the evening of November 21. The size of the audience showed the keen interest of the community. The exhibition of work was left in the hall for several days and was visited by a good number of The teachers of the several towns deserved great credit for their cooperation in preparing and assembling this exhibition, as did the Grafton teachers for the work demonstrated with classes.

I want to incorporate here some material taken from an Institute Circular "School Progress in New Hampshire in Five Years," published some months ago by the State Board of Education. It may be of interest to tax payers. The circular itself can be obtained from the Concord office of the Board. The schools of each town

are controlled by the local school boards, not by the Department or by a Superintendent. The purpose of the school law passed in 1919 is to make possible, through state aid, full education for all New Hampshire children whether they live in poor or rich equalization of advantages is made towns. This financially possible through a state tax. New Hampshire's state tax for education is small compared with other states. In only eight is it smaller. The sources of school money are: local taxes, 80.1 per cent; state tax, 10.7 per cent; all other sources, 9.2 per cent. Throughout the State the most of this money, that is 60.1 per cent of the whole is spent for teachers' salaries and the expenses of instruction. For other agencies, such as transportation, janitors, medical inspection, mothers' aid, 17 per cent is spent; for buildings and equipment, 10.2 per cent; for general payments of debt and administration, 8.9 per cent; for supervision, 3.8 per cent. According to a scale of values used by the State Board it is found that six years ago country schools were 40.75 per cent as efficient as city schools. One year ago they were 70.25 per cent. School costs have only kept pace with the increased cost of living and this would have been true under our earlier laws. The cost of the improved facilities in the poorer districts has made an increase in three items: Equalization, Supervision and State Administration. "It costs you each year 64 cents on each \$1,000 of your taxed property to give equalized school advantages to all of the children of the state." Grafton's allotment of state aid for the year ending June 30, 1924, was \$1,461.71, that for the fiscal year ending July 1, 1923 and paid in December, 1923 was \$1,678.71.

As I write this, my final report, I bespeak for my successor your cordial support and co-operation.

To all who have worked with me for the improvement of your schools, especially to the faithful teachers of the district, I want to express my thanks and my best wishes.
