TOWN WARRANT

The the Inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Eagle Hall in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To determine and appoint the salaries of Town Officers and fix the compensation of any other agent of the Town.
- 4. To hear reports of agents, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$417.19 if the state will contribute \$2,781.29 for T. R. A. work.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the road agent beginning in 1953.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be used with the \$2,000.00 raised and appropriated last year to complete the improvement of the Jones Road.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to replace culverts and otherwise improve the Venable Road.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to repair a part of the South Road south of the Russell Reservoir Dam.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to lay out and build a road to the cottages along the southwest side of Harrisville Pond.
- 12. To see, if the vote on Article 11 is affirmative, if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to build said road along the southwest side of Harrisville Pond.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to be placed in a sinking fund for the replacement of road equipment under the provisions of the Capital Reserve Fund Act of 1943. Chapter 160, as amended.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be placed in a sinking fund for the replacement of the bridge just south of the Post Office in Chesham under the provisions of the Capital Reserve Fund Act of 1943, Chapter 160, as amended.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivors Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.
- 16. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize Selectmen to put out for bid, road construction jobs which can be handled more economically for the Town in this manner.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to have a street light placed on a pole in front of the McLean and Barcomb residences on the Harrisville Road.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to survey the land deeded to the town with the Russell Reservoir Dam by the late Mrs. Gertrude Russell.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept a parcel of land of approximately 2 acres from the Harrisville Association.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to the playing of games of Beano or act in any manner relating thereto.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a lease with Casper C. Bemis and William F. Bemis of the land on which the fire house is located for a term of five years, at an annual rent of one rollar (\$1.00) per year.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: Dec. 31, 1950-Dec. 31, 1951:

(Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1950 and December 31, 1951, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$1,563.77 during the year 1951.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures— Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibit C & D)

Comparative statement of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1951, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,788.82, less a net revenue surplus of \$434.79, resulted in a net-budget deficit of \$1,354.03.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1951, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of December 31, 1951, is indicated in Exhibit F.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Deficit:

The current deficit on December 31, 1950, of \$7,387.37 was reduced during 1951 to \$1,314.03, as the result of an ap-

propriation which was made for this purpose. The following statement indicates the current liabilities, assets and current deficit as of December 31, 1950 and December 31, 1951:

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of the school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district; and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization funds, together with other income; the schoolboard to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated income and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see what action the district wishes to take regarding the former Johnson plot, now held as a school site.
- 10. To see whether the district wishes to have the minutes of the annual district meeting published in the town report yearly.
- 11. To see whether the district wishes to have all school purchases fully itemized annually in the town report.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town, benefits of title 2 of the Federal Social Security Act (old age & survival Insurance) as authorized by the chapter 234 of the laws of 1951 of New Hampshire and to raise and appropriate the necessary sums of money to defray the school district share of the costs thereof.
- 13. To consider any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

A year ago, the superintendent's report carried the statement that life in the new school environment has improved the personal habits of the children and had developed in them a real respect for property and pride in the new building. I do not hesitate to state that The Wells Memorial School is the most attractive and best kept school building in New Hampshire.

A committee of volunteers directed by board chairman, William Bemis transformed the raw ungraded grounds into a truly lovely lawn and playground. The parking area has been surfaced, the walk paved and the playground equipment installed.

The fact that we have been able to retain a capable staff for some years leads to stability and the accomplishment of long-range goals.

In conclusion, I feel that with the continued application of sound judgement to the problems of school operation, a long period of good progress in growth and learning for our children will be assured.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

I herein submit my report concerning the elementary music program in the school. The aim of the music program is to develop a love and appreciation of good music and the desire to participate spontaneously in group work, both vocal and instrumental. A comprehensive course is given, starting with rote singing in the first grade and covering the prescribed fundamentals in each grade through the eighth. An opportunity is given for each pupil to play in a rhythm band in the lower grades and in a tonette band in the intermediate grades. Folk dancing also is part of the music program as well as is music appreciation.

A Christmas program, combining a puppet show with a musical program was well received by a large audience. In this program rhythm bands from grades 1, 2 and 3 plus tonette bands from grades 6, 7, and 8 were featured. A Memorial Day program was presented and the musical part of the graduation exercises was provided by grades 5, 6, 7 and 8.

The pupils are enthusiastic and appreciative of all phases of the music program. I find the record library available in the Union office, to be of real benefit to the pupils of the schools.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Citizens of Harrisville: In my report of last year it was difficult to enumerate any
definite achievements. This year, however, we have made great

strides not only in educational leadership but also in establishing democratic school participation.

Each year in the new building adds materially to the progress of our educational system. Increased dramatic and music instruction has been noticed from the beginning. This year we have added a new feature—the student-teacher. This is a method whereby seniors at the Keene Teachers College receive actual teaching experience in the local schools for one half of

the school year. For the school this service is of inestimable value. It lightens the teacher's load of work while at the same time it stimulates her to use the more recent methods of teaching and the findings of the latest research. To make this program more effective for the school as well as the student-teacher, the facuty is now enrolled in the Supervision of Student Teaching courses at the Keene Teachers College.

The greatest achievement of the year has been the establishof the Wells Memorial School Association. main organ of the Association is the Council which is made up of representatives from every grade and the faculty and has as its purpose the administration of the school. While the faculty representative retains a veto, the Council has accepted a wide range of responsibility. They have established rules and regulations for the school, scheduled all social and fund raising events, and discussed school problems in general. Through the Council's committees they have begun the printing of a school magazine, taken care of routine disciplinary matters, provided for biweekly assemblies, and raised money for the annual school trip. While this is but a small beginning, we take pride in the fact that our school is the first in the Union to have a student government on the elementary level.

Again this year it is very gratifying that so many citizens of Harrisville and Nelson have shown their interest in the school, both by their visits and by their gifts to the school. In the latter group, I should like to publicly thank the Harrisville Public Library for their contribution of books to our library, the citizens of Harrisville whose generosity made our Christmas Party complete, Mr. Roy W. Williams and his orchestra for their often donated services, and Mr. and Mrs. Clarence C. Pell for their second generous check. The last mentioned gift has, by the unanimous vote of the Wells Memorial School Association Council, been placed in the Pell Projector Fund. When the goal of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) has been reached, we hope to purchase a Bell & Howell New Academy Filmosound motion picture projector.
