TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hollis in the County of Hillsboro in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Lower Town Hall in said Hollis on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear the reports of the Selectmen and other Town Officers and committees.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer under order of the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute blank inventories at the time of appraisal.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V roads and appropriate the sum of \$850.75.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for repair and construction of water holes for additional fire protection.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the collection and disposal of garbage in Town or act anything in relation thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on taxes paid before August 1st, 1947 and assess fines of twenty cents on all poll taxes not paid by Sept. 1st, 1947.

10. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$1,000 from the cash surplus to the capital reserve fund for the fire department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$1000 from the cash surplus to a capital reserve fund for the purpose of purchasing a new road grader.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000 for the construction of a new road to Audette Shore of Flints Pond.

13. To see what action the Town will take regarding the extension of the street light system.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to the total amount of \$5000 from the capital reserve fund for the purchase of a new fire truck.

15. To see if the Town will vote to create a planning board.

16. To see what action the Town will take relative to giving lumber, from the Town Park, to the American Legion Post No. 89.

17. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the non-partisan ballot for the election of Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditors, Town Clerk, and Trustees of Trust Funds.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

In last year's Town Report we made an explanation of expenses, and a comparison of expenses over a ten-year period. This showed an increase of over 50% during that period and made many taxpayers wonder how our expenses compare with those of other towns in the State. The State Board of Education has prepared figures showing the Per Pupil Costs for 1944-45 for the entire state. We submit these and our own for the same year.

From this we see that our expenses **per pupil** are below the state average in spite of our 50% increase.

TEACHERS' SALARIES

This is our largest expense and has increased greatly during the past 5 years when we have tried to do the right thing by our teachers. In spite of our efforts we find that we now face our most serious problem in this part of our budget.

We are convinced that teachers are much underpaid everywhere and that this is the year when every State will do something to remedy this condition. We must provide liberal increases in the salaries we now pay or face a serious chance of being unable to hire teachers for our schools. There is a serious shortage of qualified (or even unqualified) teachers in the United States today. Statistics prove this—and the situation can not be much improved until more students enroll in, and graduate from, teacher training college courses. This will take at least five years more.

We must keep our schools open. To do so we must pay salaries at least equal to the average paid in this and nearby states. To obtain satisfactory teachers we may find it necessary to pay more than the average for there are many teachers now teaching under “War Emergency Certificates”. This means that they would not be “approved” by the State if fully qualified teachers were available.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hollis:

I herewith present my eighth annual report, the twenty-eighth in the series. I present three topics for your consideration; Teachers, Accomplishment, Suggestion.

TEACHERS

The list of teachers is printed elsewhere; I call your attention to changes since our last report. Miss Pauline Roby resigned to be married and was succeeded by Mrs. Marion Olson of Hollis. Mrs. Olson resigned early in the year because of ill health, and Mrs. Katherine Hills substituted until recently, at which time Mrs. Barbara DeVittori of Milford took over the work with the Junior High. Miss Elizabeth Stowell of Merrimack was employed to continue the Home Economics, and Mr. Albert Mosley of Hillsboro to help the Headmaster and teach Mathematics and Science.

Salaries are again of major importance. I again urge you to increase them to as high a point as you possibly can. Without adequate increases, we will have difficulties in securing teachers and keeping all departments in operation. I have presented a plan calling for salaries ranging from \$1,800 to \$2,400 for teachers with bachelor's degrees; more for master's and less with less preparation. I hope that plan or a better one will be used as a basis for employment next year and will insure an adequate staff.

There are a few points I wish to discuss relative to the employment of teachers. They are the barriers I must face and argue against as I interview teachers to go to smaller towns. First, the salary is inclined to be low in comparison with a larger town or a city. Second, living conditions for board and room might not compare with that to which the candidates are accustomed. This might be extended to include the lack of movies and other recreational pursuits. Third, the schools are organized with more than

one grade to a teacher. Fourth, candidates have heard that people in the smaller towns are very critical of teachers, often to the extent of verbal abuse and social isolation. All of these factors contribute to my difficulties. Possibly they point to the salary scale—that it ought to be higher than the city or larger town in order to attract people and overcome these handicaps mentioned above. Surely, everyone can examine his part in the affairs of the town and see if there is something he can do to correct the difficulty.

ACCOMPLISHMENT

I trust more stable conditions will soon prevail so that more time can be devoted to this subject. I desire to continue a testing program to determine educational possibilities as well as educational accomplishments. Without the benefit of this material, teachers feel handicapped in their work. We now have some test material at hand ready to use in the next two or three months.

A study of pupil promotions, and the difficulties encountered, is interesting. The five towns of this Union are listed below by number only.

The above refers to pupils in the first eight grades and shows the numbers in percent promoted, trial promoted or not promoted. Your town is number three on the list and represents the best accomplishment in the Union. There is no great difficulty in this regard. I treat this as a very satisfactory condition and give my commendation to the pupils and teachers concerned.

SUGGESTIONS

Last year I included in this section a suggestion that the outside of the building be painted. I am happy to report that that was done and school opened last Fall with the building resplendent in its new coat of paint.

Some interior work here and there has been done in the last few years. I trust you will wish to continue and keep the interior attractive and clean.

Please examine the other parts of the School Report.

My gratitude is for all those who have helped the school accomplish its goals, particularly I refer to the Board and to the Teachers.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER

Mr. Harold C. Bowley

A community is judged by the attitudes and actions of its inhabitants. Any group, whether large or small, old or young has the responsibility of maintaining its community's good name. Our boys and girls that visit other schools and communities reflect the attitude of their town, and I am sure that we are all proud of the way the boys and girls of Hollis conduct themselves, regardless of whether they are the visitors or being visited.

With so many men returning from the Armed Services it has not been necessary for pupils to be absent to help in the planting and harvesting of crops. There is no doubt that practically all pupils in the High School are taking their subjects more seriously, which is a definite sign that the war is over and that boys and girls are thinking beyond the time that they will graduate and go on to prepare themselves to take an active part in the development of our democracy.

Supplies and equipment are still among the hard to get items. We were fortunate that we were able to secure a bottled gas unit for the laboratory, and needless to say it is a welcome and useful addition to our plant.

The school lunch program appears to be operating to the satisfaction of everyone. Due to the increased costs of supplies it has been necessary to increase the cost of the lunches from ten to fifteen cents per meal. Last year we purchased nearly one hundred dollars worth of equipment, and expect to purchase another hundred dollars worth this year. At the present time we are feeding about 145 persons daily. Paid help include two cooks and janitor, all other services are donated. Miss Stowell has charge of menus and kitchen sanitation, Miss Read is treasurer, Miss Rideout acts as purchasing agent, the Headmaster has general overall supervision, Mrs. Parkhurst and Mrs. Stickney are the cooks and Mr. Weibel is fireman and janitor.

The A. C. E. Association controls most of the school activities of the different classes and clubs. At the beginning of the year the School calendar was made out, leaving most of the winter dates open for basketball. The first activity was the Freshman initiation in October, then the Senior play in November, a Christmas Pageant in December, a New Year's Eve ball by the Juniors. In March the Sophomores will put on a dance, the Dramatic Club intends to put on two one act plays in April, also the Glee Club plans a Music Festival in April or May. Shortly thereafter follows the Junior Prom, the Senior Ball and last but not least, especially to the ten seniors is graduation. In between these many and varied activities basketball takes the limelight. Mr. Mosley and Miss Stowell are to be congratulated on the success of their teams, both in regard to games won and to the attitude of the players. Spring sports are just around the corner, merely waiting for the ground to dry out and the temperature to warm up. Plans are under way for the organization of a Camera Club, which should be especially appreciated by those that do not have time for participating in extra curricular activities.

Through the cooperation of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association and permission granted by parents, the pupils, with the exception of 5, in grades one through high school were tuberculin patch tested. Those who reacted to this test were later X-rayed and physically examined by Dr. Kerr.

The general health of the children has been exceptionally good throughout the fall. An audiometer test was given to pupils from second grade through high school, and those pupils showing a hearing loss are having lip reading.

The dental errors seemed high. Most of the pupils are having the necessary corrections made.

The telebinocular visual test is now being given to all pupils.

The splendid cooperation shown by parents and teachers is a factor in promoting the health program, and is sincerely appreciated.

Help Your Forest Fire Warden Prevent Fires

Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves manpower and permits their use in production channels, saves taxpayers' money and conserves fire fighting equipment.

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property.

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large.

1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.

2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.

3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodland. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.

4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.

5. Help your Forest Fire Warden Prevent Fires. His efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him.

Penalty for kindling a fire without a permit is \$200.00 or imprisonment not more than thirty days.
